MILITARY

The Reserve Officers Training Corps is one of the major divisions of North Carolina State College and is one of the most active organizations on the campus. The unit is the largest regiment in the Fourth Corps Area, and also maintains the distinction of being one of the finest R.O.T.C. units in the entire country.

The unit is under the direction of five commissioned Army officers. These officers act as drill instructors, military classroom professors, and executives who handle the supplies, training program, and the social activities of the military unit. It is because of the untiring efforts of these tactical officers that the unit has been able to maintain its rank as one of the best drilled units in the country.

The Instruction of the R.O.T.C. is divided into two main divisions. The first two years, or basic course, is required and teaches the fundamentals of military science. It also helps to select those that will be chosen for advance work. The last two years, or advanced course, deals with military problems, aerial photography, military law, the study and use of the various types of weapons, and finally a study of some outstanding military problems. Along with these instructions, the student is taught the proper care of their bodies. Throughout the courses, the student is taught the fundamental duties of an American citizen along with its responsibilities and principles.

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

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
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
THE WATAUGAN

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


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
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




STUDENT GOVERNMENT






THE PURPOSE OF THE Y. M. C. A.


The Sigma Nu fraternity was founded at the Virginia Military Institute on January 1, 1869 and was originated from the Legion of Honor of that Institution. The fraternity was drawn together around James F. Hopkins and together with James M. Riley and Greenfield Quarles, the Sigma Nu fraternity was organized. 

Kappa Sigma was founded at the University of Virginia. December 10. 1869, by William Grigsby McCormick. George Miles Arnold, Edmund Law Rogers, Frank Courtney Nicodemus, and John Covert Boyd. This establishment revived a noble order that had practically disappeared from the continent of Europe. The original Kappa Sigma was of Italian origin. having been founded at the University of Bologna in 1399. The Kappa Sigma has expanded until it has now reached the place of the second largest Fraternity on the North American continent. The fraternity publishes a secret quarterly. The Star and Crescent. In 1885 the fraternity began the publication of a bi-monthly but it was changed in 1890 to a monthly magazine and was renamed the Caduceus.


The Kappa Alpha fraternity was founded at Washington and Lee University, then Washington College, on December 21, 1865. It was founded by James Wood, Rev. William Scott, Stanhope Scott, and William Walsh, but it was due mainly to the work of one of its first members. S. Z. Ammen, that the fraternity was organized and received a motto and the ritual is due chiefly to the labors of Ammen. The Kappa Alpha fraternity considers Ammen as their founder because of the extent of his work for the fraternity. The fraternity was established with the idea of creating an organization to foster and maintain the ideals, manners, and customs of the Southern people. Washington and Lee under the presidency of Robert E. Lee being considered the appropriate place for the inauguration of such an organization.



On March 1, 1868, five students at the University of Virginia met in Room 31 on the West Range and from this meeting came the present fraternity of Pi Kappa Alpha. The fraternity was founded to perpetuate the friendships of these five men who had gone through the Civil War together. The disorganization of the South immediately following the war made the early career of Pi Kappa Alpha uncertain and difficult. From the first chapter at Virginia, charters were issued throughout the state and for a few years following the expansion of the fraternity was limited to the southern states, but in 1919 the convention lifted the ban and permitted charters to be granted anywhere in the United States.



Sigma Phi Epsilon was founded at Richmond College. Richmond. Virginia. in November, 1901. The basis of the organization being a society called The Saturday Night Club. During the first two years of its existence the parent chapter met with much opposition even to attacks on its meeting rooms. At the time of its inception few. if any. ministerial students were made fraternity men at Richmond. Sigma Phi Epsilon admitted several to membership. This departure coupled with the fact that the badge was heartshaped caused them to be called the "Sacred Hearts." North Carolina State's chapter was the thirteenth chapter, and has grown since its establishment in 1905 into one of the largest nationals. The *Journal* which appears quarterly, is the official magazine of Sigma Phi Epilon. and contains news and asperation of active chapters.

Alpha Kappa Pi. organized January 1, 1921, at the Newark College of Engineering. Newark. New Jersey, remained a local society until March 23, 1926, when the Beta chapter was placed at Wagner College. 
FOOTBALL

Hot, sweltering days prevailed during the first two weeks of practice, nevertheless, the work went on. Coach Heartly "Hunk" Anderson had gaping holes to fill in the line—holes left by the graduation of Farrar. Worth, and the brilliant Steve Sabol. The rest of the team was all tried material. Captain Cara and Berry were on the flanks. Fry and Bugg were the tackles, both big and experienced. Regdon, Piliseno, and Kirschner alternated at the guard posts. Louie Mark and Odell Smothers were fighting for the honor of holding down the pivot position. The backfield was composed of veterans: Gadd, Bardes, Entwhistle, and Ryneska. The reserve material was both plentiful and experienced. Thus the opening game found the students and supporters of State with high hopes for a successful season.


Coach Anderson presented the Wolfpack Parade in four quarters and even with the mixing of the second, third, and fourth stringers the Tech goal was only threatened once by Elon and that lone threat was easily turned back by the staunch State line. The only scores of the game were two touchdown runs by Eddie Berlinski. The first came in the second quarter on a seven-yard end run and the last came at the beginning of the second half as the result of a 51-yard gallop through center. Captain Cara, Ryneska, and Entwhistle played brilliant ball to pace the Techs.

A scrappy and inspired Davidson team gave the Wolfpack their first setback of the season and shattered all hopes for an undefeated State year. The first half of the game ended with no scoring. Late in the third quarter, the Wildcats pushed over from the Tech fouryard line for the only touchdown of the game. With two minutes of the game remaining, Captain Cara broke through and threw Teeny Lafferty, ace Davidson back, for a safety and State's only points. The Techs were sluggish and appeared to be over-confident.

The losing jinx continued to dog the trail of the Wolfpack and the Wake Forest Deacons handed them their second beating of the year by the score of 9 to 0. State, expecting an easy workout took the field with a rather off-hand attitude. T e n thousand puzzled people wondered and waited for the vaunted Tech powerhouse that never got started. But the Deacons went to work early and Walt Kitchin kicked a beautiful field goal in the first half and Hobo Daniel intercepted a pass and ran it back for a touchdown to complete the scor-




RYNESKA COMES THROUGH BEHIND EXCELLENT BLOCKING

ing for the day. Joe Ryneska's steady line plunging was the only bright spot in an otherwise drab day for the Wolfpack.

State dropped its third straight game of the season, when a smart Manhattan team turned them back 13 to 6. The first half was scoreless with neither team showing much in the way of an attack. The Wolves scored first in the third quarter as Ryneska rammed his way over for the touchdown. The Jaspers came back strong and scored twice in quick succession. Wheeler intercepted a pass and ran 43 yards for the first score and Savage led a determined drive that ended in the second touchdown.

After waiting for three weeks, the State team presented a victory-hungry student body with a smashing win over Furman. The game was

never in doubt as the Wolves took the opening kick-off and marched 80 yards for the touchdown. "Jumping Joe" Ryneska went over tackle for the first score. In the second period, a long pass from Robinson to Bardes accounted for touchdown number two. Ryneska contributed another touchdown to the score in the third quarter after running 61 yards. The final score came in the fourth period with Pavlosky pounding center for the tally after Edwards had recovered a fumble for the Techs. Regdon kicked two extra points and Helms added the other.

The Wolfpack continued its victory march with a 13 to 0 win over V. P. I. in the Homecoming Game. The Gobblers halted the first two drives of the Wolves, but the third march carried 62 yards and ended only when Ryneska plunged over the pay-off stripe to give the Techs a lead that was never threatened. In the third period, Davis flipped a long pass to Bardes for the second and last score. Regdon's kick was good for the extra point. V. P. I. was unable to pierce the tight defense of the State team at any stage of the game and finished with a total gain of only five yards for the entire game.

From hope to frenzied joy, then into a daze and despair, then back to Raleigh—the Carolina game in a sentence. The game, which Carolina was generally expected to win in a walkaway. was a rough and bitter struggle from the start. The entire first half was all State's and not only did the Wolfpack forward wall smother the Tar Heel backs, but Ryneska slashed over the center for a touchdown to give the Techs the lead at the end of the half. Carolina was not to be denied, however, and they came back strong to counter three times in the last half to sew up the game. Hutchins, Little,



Watson, and Bershak were the big guns for the Tar Heels. Captain Cara and Ryneska led the State team in a losing fight against a team that had superior reserves.

The Wolfpack's second invasion into the East resulted in another loss for the Pack. Boston College was the victor and the score was 7 to 3. Charlie Gadd kicked a beautiful 25-yard field goal to put the State team in the lead until the last quarter. Berlinski returned a punt 60 yards going deep into Boston territory, and a pass from Joe Schwerdt to Gadd carried the ball again into Boston territory, but both threats were halted by the Eagles. A last-quarter pass from Jivilikian to Ferdenzi gave the Eagles their touchdown and their victory margin.



THE COACHES PEPPING THE WOLVES UP

The Catholic University Cardinals celebrated their Homecoming Day by ekeing out a 7 to 6 victory over the North Carolina State Wolfpack. Vidnovich went over for Catholic in the second period. Foley's kick was good and proved to be the margin of victory. The State passes failed to click and the running attack bogged down until late in the final period when Hayden passed to Berry for the lone score for the Techs. In the waning moments of the game, the Wolves were pounding at the Catholic goal but they were unable to reach the pay dirt.

The State Wolfpack closed a disheartening season by dropping the final game to the Duke Blue Devils by the score of 13 to 0. For three periods, the Wolves fought the Devils to a standstill in a marvelous exhibition of superb line play. In the fourth quarter, Captain Ace Parker scored twice for the Blue Devils. The State team went down fighting but not disgraced. The Duke team with Parker, yes assuredly with Parker—had been a little bit superior. As far as State supporters were concerned, it was too much Parker and too cold.





VARSITY BASKETBALL 1936

The hopes for the 1937 State College basketball team rose to a high peak in the Southern Conference tournament here in Raleigh and their hopes were only blasted when their conquerors. Washington and Lee, swept on to the finals and the championship. It was this same bunch of Washington and Lee veterans that had tripped the Red Terrors in an over-time period during the regular season. Nevertheless, Coach Sermon's charges finished their season with a marked supremacy on their 22-game schedule and came out on top in 14 of the tilts. With only two regulars and a few reserves returning from last year's crack team, the hopes were running low for the prospects for a winning team seemed none too bright. However, before the middle of the season had been reached. Dr. Sermon, who rightly deserves the title of the "Rockne of Southern basketball," had taken this group of inexperienced players and had molded a scrappy and hard-working team. Captain Neil Dalrymple and John Allen, a former reserve, were the guards, Bill Mann. another reserve, and little P. G. Hill, a sophomore sensation, held down the forward posts, while Connie Mac Berry, last year's high point man in the Southern Conference, held down the pivot position. It was this same brilliant Berry

that established a new scoring record of 270 points for the Southern Conference before the season had closed.

The new season was launched with an auspicious start as the Red Terrors took the boys from William and Mary into camp and sent them home reeling from a 49-21 loss. It was the first Southern Conference victory for State and sent the Techs off on a flying start in the Conference race. This W. and M. victory was the start of a winning streak that lasted for 4 games. It was not until the Duquesne game



that the Red Terrors tasted defeat. But-until then the Techs humbled three more Southern Conference opponents and firmly established themselves in the fight for the leadership of the Conference. The South Carolina Gamecocks fell before the fighting Red Terrors and although the Gamecocks had more experience, the scrappy Techs managed to win by a four-point margin. The next victim of the Statemen was Clemson who fell before an avalanche of baskets by the deadly Berry, Captain Dalrymple, and Bill Mann. The score of 54-29 left no doubt as to which was the better team. Although he did not score much, little P. G. Hill, played a smart. heads-up floor game and his accurate passing paved the way for many of the goals made by the "Big Three" of the State scorers. A game but completely outclassed Wake Forest quint was struck off the 1937 race as the fighting Red Terrors piled up a 49-31 victory. Again the entire team worked well as a unit and the scoring was paced by Mac Berry. Dalrymple. Mann. and Hill. This game also offered Coach Sermon a chance to use some of his reserves.

seeing. The Dukes rallied near the end of the first half and held a three-point lead at the intermission. The play was rather even until midway of the last half when the superior reserve strength of the Dukes began to show and it was not until then that Doc Sermon's scrapping Terrors were subdued. The game was marked by numerous fouls by both teams. Berry, lanky center for State, led the scorers for the night.

The State basketeers bounced back into the win column by handing the Davidson Wildcats a 41-35 drubbing. The flashy Berry counted 13 points and was closely followed by Mann and Captain Dalrymple with nine points each. This was another Conference win for the victory-seeking Red Terrors.

State's basketball team seemed to be headed for the Old North State championship. But the White Phantoms. State's jinx from Chapel Hill, journeyed over and handed the Techs their first Conference and Big Five setback. The margin of the North Carolina victory was six points. State led by ten points at half time, but they collapsed in the second half when Mac



The Techs dropped their first game of the year when they ran into Duquesne, the city champs of Pittsburgh, who not only presented the tallest team seen on the courts here, but also had one of the smoothest passing quints that this sports writer has ever had the pleasure of Berry, their high-scoring center, was disqualified and removed from the game.


Hitting their stride again after faltering in the Carolina game. State's Red Terrors whipped a favored Duke team by the score of 30-27. The Techs got off to an early lead and although the

score was knotted three times during the game they were never headed in their march to another victory. Captain Dalrymple played a brilliant floor game and Berry and Mann shared the scoring honors with ten points each.

The University of Virginia sent their basketeers into the Old North State and received an overwhelming defeat at the hands of the Techs by the tune of 40-17. Coach Sermon used every available man on the squad and although his ace center, Mac Berry, did not play the entire game he led the scorers with 19 points. The team from the University of Maryland were the next to suffer defeat at the hands of the Red Terrors. The game was a thriller from beginning to end and the State quint was only able to win after playing an extra period. Again it was the lanky Berry that led the play for State.


Carolina again encountered the Red and White courtmen, this time on their own court, but it was with the same result, a victory for Carolina, this time by a three-point margin. The game was merely a repetition of the first one, with the Techs leading at the end of the first half and then faltering in the last half to be nosed out in a well-played game. time period that proved to be just an addition to an already action-crammed, thrilling game. Mac Berry completely outplayed Bob Spessard, elongated General pivot man, who was All-Southern Conference center for the past year. Another win was chalked up by the Terrors when they swamped the Cadets of V. M. I., 49-32. Leaving the grand state of Virginia, the State basketeers swung down through South Carolina. Their first game found them pitted against the South Carolina Gamecocks who tripped the favored Techmen, 30-23. This defeat seemed to stimulate the charges of Coach Sermon, for they bounced back and whipped Clemson, 41-40 in a thrilling over-time game.


The Techs returned to their home court and celebrated their return by trouncing Davidson to the tune of 51-34. They next entertained the Gobblers from V. P. I. and handed them a 38-29 licking. The Deacons from Wake Forest took the Terrors in their own lair and catching the Techs on an off night, whipped them 41-33. Duke nipped the Statemen and nosed them out by three points. The Techs took a short twogame trip and broke even. Maryland handed them a 41-35 beating, even though Berry did



The Red Terrors took off on a five-game trip and when they returned, they had bagged three victories and had dropped two decisions. They also had to work over-time in two of their five matches. The trip started with a win of 36-24 over V. P. I. This was followed by a loss to the future Southern Conference champs, Washington and Lee, by the score of 27-26 in an overscore 19 points. But William and Mary fell before an inspired attack and were hopelessly crushed 58-20. Berry was again high point man.

Coach Sermon's boys won easily over Maryland in the first round of the tourney but Washington and Lee put them out in the semifinals by nosing them out by four points.




VARSITY BASEBALL, 1936

Coach Doak was beset with various troubles from the beginning of the season and continued to dog the Statemen until the end of the year. Lefty Freeman, one of the best pitchers of the pre-



ceding year, showed up at practice with a sore arm and was not able to play during the entire year. Norwood, State number one hitter and outfielder broke his ankle during pre-season practice and was lost to the team until the tail end of the year.

Due to bad weather and sickness, the Doakmen were forced to start the season with only a little practice, most of this being indoor practice, and as a result they got off to a bad start by dropping their first two contests. As they continued their schedule the Techs showed a great deal of

improvement a n d before the season was over they had some close victories to show for their long and untiring efforts.

After their first two defeats. the Doakmen took their annual Easter Monday game with the Demon Deacons of Wake Forest. It was the first Easter Monday victory for the Techs in three years. The State team gained their victory in the last half of the ninth inning when Captain D. C. Williams hit a home run to break a 7-7 tie and win the ball game. From Easter Monday until the second week in April. the Techs played in and out ball. But on the 10th of April they seemed to hit their stride and from then on they played a better brand of ball. During this period of indifferent playing, the Techs dropped two games to the Duke Blue Devils. It was these early season losses that helped to put the Techs just out of reach of the top spot in the Big Five race. It was on the 10th of April when the State

> boys snapped out of their streak of bad playing and whipped a highly favored Rutgers team by the score of 4-2.

> Following the Rutgers game, came a game with the Tar Heels from the University of North Carolina. It was a real battle from the start to the finish and when the smoke had cleared away, the Doakmen were on the top by the score of 3-1. Stuart Flythe, ace of the State pitching corps. turned in a beautiful exhibition of pitching in allowing only five hits. Walter Rabb, rookie shortstop, turned in the fielding gems of the day and Jake Ma

honey, another rookie, led the Techs at the plate.

After the Carolina game, the State team dropped their third game of the current season to the Duke Blue Devils. The score was tied until the end of the eighth inning when the Techs were called for stalling, thereby forfeiting the game to Duke. This seemed to upset Coach "Chick" Doak's charges. for they dropped the next game to the grey-clad Wildcats of Davidson. The final score was 7-4 and it was only through the heavy hitting of Teeny Lafferty, Davidson football star, that the Wildcats were able to edge out the win over the Red and White ball players. A few days later the tables were turned on the Wildcats and behind the masterful seven-hit pitching of Mason Bugg, the Techs were able to subdue the Davidson boys to the tune of 5-3. Jake Mahoney, rookie catcher, was the big gun in the attack of the State team.

The jinx that the Duke Blue Devils held over the Techs at the beginning of the year was broken, as the scrappy State ball players took the measure of the Big Five leaders by a 6-3 score. Stuart Flythe, lanky ace of the State hurling staff, was in rare form and limited the heavy hitting Blue Devils to six hits. At no stage of the game were the Duke players able to reach the speedy Flythe with any degree of success. Captain Williams, Mason Bugg, and Jake Mahoney led a concentrated attack on two Blue Devil hurlers to clinch the game for State. Walter Rabb, sensational shortstop, contributed the fielding gem of the day when he raced far over into foul territory and made a diving, one-handed catch of a hard-hit ball and retired the side at a crucial moment of the game.

The North Carolina State baseball team formerly closed their 1936 season by dropping a close and extremely hard-fought game to the Demon Deacons from Wake Forest. The final score was 8-5 but it was not until the last State player was put out, that the final outcome was sure of. Mason Bugg twirled the last game and with a little better luck would have easily come out on the big end of the score.

At the close of the season, the team elected Mason Bugg, pitcher and outfielder, to lead the team in 1937.

The victim was South Carolina and the score was 6-2. Penland continued his winning streak and with Miller. Caraway, and Pavalosky punching their way to victories, the boys from South Carolina were clearly outclassed. Captain Regdon won by a default and Rudisill and Leet got draws to complete the scoring for the match.


The State fighters hung up their second victory of the season, by whipping a scrappy team of boxers

from Clemson. The final score was 5-3 after an exhibition of close scraps that made ring history at Frank Thompson Gym. The Clemson boys won the first two bouts to take an early lead. Both of these fights

Clemson again forged to the front when Dorne eked out a win over Caraway. Miller evened the score by taking a decision. SWIMMING



NTRAMURALS

Intramurals is perhaps the most important and interesting branch of athletics that is offered to the students of North Carolina State College by the department of Physical Education. This Institute of higher learning has long since realized the importance of developing the body of the student as well as the mind. Courses are required in Gym for the first two years. Intramural is the follow-up of the required courses. The development of the body, of mind, and greatest of all, of character, is the keynote of the Intramurals. Team play fosters the many virtues of courage and self-control. Actual participation will promote interest and association. These qualities serve to create friendships that are lasting and ones that have proven themselves to be indispensable to schools of higher education.

Intramurals first appeared on the campus in 1924. The slogan was, "Athletics for all." It has had a steady and healthy growth until it has reached its present peak of actual participation by more than 2.100 students annually. The Intramural League is divided into three divisions. These divisions are: the Fraternity division with sixteen fraternities, the Dormitory division with sixteen dormitories represented, and the Independent division with six clubs. Yearly records are kept and the winners in the Fraternity and the Dormitory divisions are awarded beautiful trophies. Two new sports, soccer and wrestling, were added to the program this year and have proved to be of unusual interest.

Last year the Pi Kappa Alphas scored enough points to repeat as the grand champions of the Fraternity division for the third successive year. The Sigma Phi Epsilons and the Sigma Nus furnished them most of the competition offered by the rest of the Fraternities. This year the same Pi Kappa Alphas are leading and are being pushed for the top honors by the Delta Sigs, Sigma Phi Epsilons, Sigma Nus, and the Kappa Sigmas.

All-Campus selections in Football, Baseball, Basketball, and Boxing was repeated for the second successive year and is one of the utmost interest to the individual participants who win the coveted awards. Each of these individuals is presented with a Medal indicative of their honor.

Last year, 1st Watagua toppled Third Seventh from the top rung of the Dormitory division and was lucky enough to capture the number one ranking and the cup. The Dormitory division is always a close race until the final sport is run off, and last year proved to be no exception. The teams of 1st Watagua were not dominated by any one particular star, but rather by the smooth brilliance of expert team play. And once again this year, it is this same smooth-working team play that has placed the name of 1st Watagua on the top rung of the Dormitory division.

Intramural boxing has come up by leaps and bounds until now it is included within the first three of the sports offered by the Intramural League. The interest and attraction created by it has lifted the boxing to a major ranking within the League. In the All-Campus Boxing Tourney, well over 700 spectators paid a minor size fee to witness the leather slingers of the Fraternities battle to a draw with the Dormitory punchers.

This year for the second time, the janitors of the social Fraternities, staged a negro Battle Royal. Again it proved to be a huge success and it has now established itself as an annual event.

It has only been through the efforts of Mr. Miller and Mr. Doak that the Intramural League has been such a success and with an ever increasing school, the Intramurals look forward to even bigger and more successful years in the future.



FRESHMAN FOOTBALL


Thirty-five hundred fans including Ted Husing, the noted sports commentator, saw the Techlets open their season by beating Belmont Abbey by a three touchdown margin. The final score standing at 25-6. In this game Bob Warren. State Coach, uncovered a number of good players, ones that we expect to hear from later, not only during this season, but during the coming three years. Bob White led the scoring for the Frosh by counting 13 points and showed himself to be one of the most powerful runners on the field. Gardner, a pile driving fullback, was the spearhead of the attack. Lozier also stood out as potential fullback material. In the line the playing of Kraymak, center: Stackman and Savini, guards: Spivey, Sullivan and Crawford, was outstanding. The baby Techs scored one touchdown in the first period, two in the second and once more in the final quarter. The visitor's only score came on a long pass from Kilborn to Courtier in the fourth period.

In their second game of the season. Bob Warren came close to realizing one of his fondest dreams when his Techlets were held to a scoreless tie by the Duke Frosh in a game played in the Duke stadium. The Blue Imps should consider themselves lucky on coming out of the game with the 0-0 score as they did. Almost the entire game was played in the Duke Frosh territory and their goal line was threatened numerous times. Outstanding in the Techlets backfield was Gardner, the high-powered fullback. In the line the playing of Kraynak, Spivey, Sullivan and Crawford was very fine.

For the fourth consecutive year, the State Freshmen held their "Indian Sign" over the little Tar Babies and whipped them 41-0. In this game Warren proved himself a master of strategy when he had the State Yearlings use Carolina Varsity plays against the Chapel Hill Frosh. The Wolfcubs were complete masters of the situation during the entire afternoon, scoring in every period and making 17 first downs to Carolina's 7. In this game the Techlets gained 274 yards by rushing and 73 by the Aerial route. During the game practically every State substitute went into the game.

In the fourth game of their season, and with the usual drive and spirit characteristic of the State freshman teams. Bob Warren's Yearlings continued their uninterrupted march thru their schedule with a 33 to 0 win over Campbell College. Score came for the Techlets in the second, third and fourth periods. The outstanding touchdown march of the game was that of 70 yards in which Gardner featured, carrying the ball practically the entire route.

In their last game of the season the State Yearlings came out on the large end of a 26-0 score in their game with Wake Forest. This win made the Techlets and Duke end up tied for top honors in the Big Five circle. The State Frosh scored in every period but the second. Practically the entire game was played in Wake Forest territory. Three of the Techlets' scores came on line plays with Fehley. Lozier and McKinley carrying the ball and the last score came in a beautifully completed pass from White to Smart.

FRESHMAN BASKETBALL

Although the Yearling basketeers did not show a great deal of promise at the opening of the season, much progress was made by the Techlets as the season progressed. From their 1937 Frosh squad will come State's court stars of the future.

The Frosh opened their season in a game with the Resettlement Club of the Raleigh Y. M. C. A. and came to the front with a 40-32 victory. Next came Wake Forest on their schedule who handed the Yearlings their first defeat of the season 46-31. Fulton making 16 points took scoring honors for the night.

In their first away-from-home game of the season, the Little Techs took the Wildkittens 34-27 in a preliminary to the varsity game. The Davidsonians led 16-14 at the half. The State Frosh in a very exciting second half came back to hand the Davidson boys a 7-point licking. Carolina's Frosh came up on the schedule as the next team to defeat the Little Techs: scoring 44 points to the Techlets 30. At the half Carolina had a 20-10 lead which the State Frosh could not overcome.

Right in line with the Carolina game came the foes from Duke, who handed the State Frosh basketeers their third defeat of the season by a mere 2 points, the contest was close all of the way with the lead changing often. State had a 17-15 lead at the half, but this was not enough since the Blue Imps came back so strong.

In the sixth game of their season, the Techlets scored an easy win over Wingate Junior College, the final whistle finding State on the big end of a 46-22 score. In their next contest with Louisburg the Techlets chalked up another in the win column by taking the Louisburg boys 47-24.

Following the rather decisive win over Wingate and Louisburg, the State Freshmen met the Carolina Frosh, who handed them their fourth reversal of the season. During the next week the Techlets hit their winning streak, taking Kannapolis Y. Davidson, LaFayette High and Wake Forest, in close but well played games.

The season was closed with the second loss to Blue Imps, being taken by the score of 28-34.

Outstanding during the season was the playing of Crawford, Cromartie, Harris and Sabolyk, around whom Coach Bob Warren built the smooth working team of Young Engineers, who brought winning margins in eight of the thirteen games played by them during the year.

FROSH BASEBALL

Opening their 1936 baseball season, the State College Freshmen dropped their game to the Duke Blue Imps, 5-2. Darwood Harper started as State pitcher but was driven from the box in the fourth inning. In their record game of the season, the frosh were forced to play two extra innings in order to defeat the Burlington High team, 3-2. This game marked the first defeat of the Burlington pitcher in 18 starts.

The Frosh next met the Tar Babies from Chapel Hill and on their own diamond handed them a 7-5 licking. Next to be turned back by Warren's men were the baby Deacons who went home with only 4 runs while State had scored 11. Next the Freshmen were handed their second defeat of the season and the second by the Blue Imps. when they were taken in Durham by the Dukesters. Game ending with State having only 5 runs to Duke's 11.

During the next week the Warrenites suffered their third defeat of the season when the Blue Imps again took them into camp, the score being 6-4. Duke winning this game when they scored 2 runs in the 9th inning.


Next the Duke Blue Imps took the State Yearlings in for the fourth time of the season, scoring an 8-2 win over the Warrenites.

The season's record includes-Lost 8 games: Won 4 games.



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
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
