## FIFTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT

We have the honor to submit herewith the joint report of the President and the General Manager of the Society covering the calendar year 1920.

As the years come and go, it is ever a source of deep satisfaction to know that the record of the Society's usefulness is a convincing testimony to the wisdom and benevolence of the noble-hearted men and women who initiated the civilizing movement. It is not our purpose to review the progress of the past fifty-five years or to dwell upon the success the organization has attained, but to briefly invite your attention to some of the more important features of humane work during the past year.

One of the most important events, and the most encouraging, was the announcement by the Presbyterian denomination that it had established a department of humane education to apply to all animal life throughout the United States and in foreign countries where the church is represented. The church does not expect to undertake to do actual humane work, but to give information and inspiration in a way that will magnify the importance of mercy and kindliness to that part of creation over which man has been given dominion. The Presbyterian Church has set an example which it is hoped other religious bodies will follow.

In our last report, we referred to the enactment of a compulsory humane education law in the State of New York and to the valuable work done by Mrs. Stella J. Preston, under the auspices of the Society, in visiting the schools of the State, attending teachers' institutes and meetings of the State superintendents, for the purpose of promoting humaneness in the schools. The value of this work can perhaps be best attested by quoting from a letter received by the Society from George M. Wiley, Acting Assistant Commissioner for Elementary Education of the State Department of Education, who wrote:

In my judgment the compulsory humane education law has been invaluable in promoting among the young people in our schools an appreciation of the great service rendered to mankind by the animal kingdom. This statute, like many others, means little unless it is transmuted in spirit into the thoughts and acts of the public and more especially into the minds of the boys and girls of school age.

I am very confident that Mrs. Preston through her active interest in this important work has rendered a great service to the school children of the State. She has made this problem one of immediate and vital interest and has done much, I believe, to emphasize its importance in a manner which has appealed strongly not only to the pupils in the school, but also to the young people in training in many of our teacher training institutions.

Through the splendid activity of the principal and her associates in the Maxwell Training School for Teachers, a humane society was formed in the school, with a membership of over three thousand. The dues of ten cents were used to purchase a watering cart, which was formally presented to the Society, and which, with two others already in use by the Society, was the means of relieving the thirst of thousands of horses at the steamship piers during the past summer. This model school, which also performs such an important work in preparing students to become teachers in the elementary schools of the city, was one of the first to recognize what a necessary factor humane education is in the training of the child.

A bill providing that during the winter months horses shall be shod in such a manner as will prevent, or tend with reasonable certainty to prevent them from slipping, was introduced by the Society at the last session of the Legislature. It passed the Assembly, but failed to be reached in the last crowded days of the Senate. The bill will be introduced again this year. In the meanwhile, several of the anti-cruelty societies have joined in offering a prize of \$1,000 for the best non-slipping horseshoe or device submitted, and it is hoped that some inventor will be stimulated to produce a shoe that will afford some measure of relief to the horses on the smooth, hard pavements of our cities. The competition is being held under the auspices of the American Humane Association.

A most inhumane measure introduced in the Legislature last winter to reduce from three weeks to ten days the age when calves may be shipped for food, was defeated through the intercession of our Society.

The public press has contained many protests against acts of cruelty to animals as depicted in motion pictures. That the criticism is justifiable, any one who attends the motion picture threatres can testify. The societies for the protection of animals should not, however, be censured for permitting such films to be shown. No organization and no police powers, at the present time, can prohibit such exhibitions. The pictures are generally taken in secret, behind closed doors, and it is practically impossible to discover the perpetrators, much less to apprehend them. Occasionally an offender is brought to justice, and our Society has several prosecutions of this kind to its credit. Mere prosecutions and fines, however, will not deter a producer or director whose only object is to obtain a realistic scene regardless of expense and regardless of animal suffering. Only the passage of legislation prohibiting the showing of films in which cruelty or neglect is portrayed, or a strict censorship by an official state commission, can eliminate these degrading scenes from the screen. A bill with this object in view has been prepared and will be introduced at the present session of the Legislature.

The Society has also prepared, and will introduce, a bill in relation to the use of the steel trap in this State, and at the same time

is offering a prize of \$500 for a humane trap for capturing fur-bearing animals.

The constitutionality of the dog license law under which this Society has been operating for more than twenty-six years has been passed upon and upheld by the several courts of the State, and these decisions have now been unanimously affirmed by the highest court in the land,—the Supreme Court of the United States. In an opinion rendered December 6, 1920, Mr. Justice McReynolds said:

The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals was incorporated by Chapter 469, Laws of New York, 1866. 'The purpose of the corporation was to enforce the laws enacted to prevent cruelty to animals.' \* \* \* It has long been recognized by the legislature as a valuable and efficient aid toward the enforcement of those laws. \* \* The payment of public funds to a similar corporation for assistance in enforcing penal statutes has been declared unobjectionable. \* \* \*

Property in dogs is of an imperfect or qualified nature and they may be subjected to peculiar and drastic regulations by the State without depriving their owners of any Federal right. \* \* \* Its power to require those who wish to keep dogs to secure licenses from and pay fees to a public officer is clear. And when the State in the reasonable conduct of its own affairs chooses to entrust the work incident to such licenses and collection of fees to a corporation created by it for the express purpose of aiding in law enforcement, and in good faith appropriates the funds so collected for payment of expenses fairly incurred and just compensation for the valuable services rendered, there is no infringement of any right guaranteed to the individual by the Federal Constitution. Such action does not amount to the taking of one man's property and giving it to another, nor does it deprive dog owners of liberty without due process of law.

The judgment below must be affirmed.

The officers of the Society never had any doubt of the validity of the law, and the clear, unqualified opinion of the Supreme Court of the United States, with its direct and inferential commendation of the Society and of the law, should be gratifying, not only to the officials whose only pleasure in this work is the satisfaction of a disagreeable duty well performed, but to dog owners as well, who are anxious to have the dog kept out of politics and left in humane hands.

The Society gratefully acknowledges the valuable work done by its volunteer special agents throughout the State; and also the cordial assistance and co-operation received from the police force of the City of New York; and especially are our thanks due to the New York State Troopers for the splendid services they have performed in behalf of suffering animals in rural communities, where, before the advent of the State Police, the laws, and particularly those for the protection of animals, were but feebly enforced. There is a certain type of farmer, usually residing on some isolated farm, who, when the winter sets in, finds it more comfortable to sit at home and keep himself warm than to care for his stock. The short-sightedness and moral deficiency of this class of otherwise useful citizen, is a psychologic problem. It is with such delinquents that the State Troopers have been called upon frequently to deal. Through snow that nearly reached to their horses' bodies, through drifts so deep that not even a postman had been over the road for days, with the temperature 20 degrees below zero, the men in grey have travelled long distances to give relief to starving stock and to cattle without shelter. In some cases an ample supply of hay and grain has been found in the barns, and in others the Troopers found it necessary to provide sustenance for the starving and dying animals. Often thick ice had to be broken to give them drink. The responsible persons were always brought to justice, heavy fines and jail sentences being imposed. This and many other forms of cruelty and neglect, which went unchecked before the Troopers rode the countryside, are now punished and corrected by the State Police.

The time at our disposal will not permit a review of the varied activities of the Society, but some operations that lend themselves to tabulation have been included in the following summary:

Your Society has, we believe, done a noteworthy work during the past year, though financially it has suffered the greatest loss

in any one year of its existence, -not because of any lack of support, which ever remains generous and is a conspicuous proof of the esteem and confidence in which the institution is held, but because of the increased expenses in every direction. Had our work been measured by our income, a material reduction in all departments would have resulted. There would have been fewer agents in the field, fewer workers in all departments, and fewer activities in all lines of endeavor. Our hospital work, for instance, would have shown a decrease, instead of a gain; the number of small animals rescued from privation and starvation would have been smaller instead of greater; the number of our watering stations would have been less than in former years, and the fountain upkeep-always a heavy expense-would have suffered. But we did not believe it wise either from humanitarian or business motives to slow up the vast work of the Society, which it has for so many years carried on so uniformly and yet so effectively as to become a part of the every-day life of our great city.

## REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

A vacancy has been created in the Board of Managers by the death of General Rush C. Hawkins. Elsewhere in this report the Managers have made a minute of the loss they have sustained in the tragic passing away of this sterling character and friend of animals.

The Society has been represented by delegates at the State and National Conventions of societies for the protection of animals and through correspondence and otherwise has kept in close touch with its sister organizations throughout the country and done what it could to assist them in their work, by co-operation and advice, and in some instances by giving financial assistance.

The increase in the membership of the Society, showing a gain of one hundred and thirty-eight during the year, is a gratifying testimony to the interest taken by the public in the cause of animal protection.

The Society had the honor of placing in nomination for the Hall of Fame the name of its illustrious founder and first president, Henry Bergh, believing that his efforts in behalf of suffering animals had produced an ameliorating effect upon the whole continent, and that as a unique personality in the history of the world he stood alone and was justly entitled to a place among the immortals. Mr. Bergh received a number of votes, but not enough, we regret to say, to elect him at this time.

The protecting influence of the Society has been further extended by the appointment of volunteer agents in various parts of the State.

In the obituary record will be found the names of twenty-five members of the Society who have passed away during the year.

## DISPENSARY AND HOSPITAL REPORT

I take pleasure in submitting a summary of the work accomplished at the Society's dispensary and hospital during the year ended December 31, 1920.

The facilities of the hospital have been taxed to the utmost. During the year we have prescribed for, treated or operated upon 6,875 cases.

The work at the hospital has increased to such an extent that we will require the assistance of another permanent graduate assistant. It has been possible to accept only a portion of the cases brought to us for hospital treatment, and those accepted have been mostly surgical cases. It has been my ambition to develop our hospital work to the highest point of efficiency and I believe that we have already made good progress in that respect; but owing to the large and ever increasing number of cases that we are treating, it is a physical impossibility to spend as much time in deliberation over any one case as we would like. With the aid of another permanent assistant we will be able to make more careful examination of our patients and also find time for the chemical and microscopic analysis of the blood, body excretions, and of the skin. We all hope that the wonderful work the Society is doing at the hospital in the curing of disease, in surgical operations, in the alleviation of suffering and in the education of owners as to the proper care and treatment of their animals, will become better known and result in the moral and financial support of the community, to the end that the hospital may keep abreast of the demands that are made on it and maintain the lead it has always taken in veterinary hospital practice.

One of the most fatal diseases peculiar to the horse, is azoturia, or commonly known as spinal meningitis. A great many of these cases are brought to the hospital in the Society's ambulances. Briefly, this disease can be defined as a rapid toxemia of the blood occurring in plethoric horses, causing degeneration of the muscles of the loins and the extensor muscles attached to the stifle, with a paralysis of one or both hind legs. The symptoms are accompanied by acute pain and suffering, intensified by frequent but futle efforts on the part of the animal to regain its feet. The onset of the disease is rapid, occurring in most cases after working for a short time after a period of one or more day's rest in the stable.

The history of most of these cases is that the stableman or driver has fed the horse on the same rations while resting in the stable as the animal receives while working. The consequence is that the lives of some of the very best horses are, unintentionally, sacrificed every year.

The remedy is the education of drivers and owners in the proper care and feeding of their animals to avoid the occurrence of this disease, and to this end the Society has sent out to horse owners and posted in stables and elsewhere, thousands of circulars and posters warning against the disease and giving instructions how to avoid it. The Society should also have the power to summarily destroy a horse afflicted with azoturia, when, in the opinion of one of its veterinarians or experienced agents, the attack is of a fatal nature. This power can only be given to the Society by legislative enactment, and the Legislature has recently refused to delegate such summary powers, on the ground that property can only be destroyed by due process of law. Taking advantage of this, many owners decline to consent to the destruction of their animals, even when they believe that the attack is fatal, preferring to take a chance of possible recovery.

We have been carrying on some interesting work with the radium treatment for cancer in animals and are constantly cooperating with the Memorial Hospital in this matter. Our results are not complete as yet and little can be said at this time, excepting that the emanations of the radium are utilized instead of the radium itself, and these emanations are given off by a gas imprisoned in minute capillary glass tubes which are imbedded in the cancer tissue and are not recovered. In the cases so far treated at the hospital, the cancerous growths have entirely disappeared, with no indication of recurrence.

While the majority of animals cared for at the hospital are dogs, horses and cats, we have also treated or operated upon monkeys, bulls, deer, rabbits, goats, guinea pigs, ferrets, canaries, geese, turkeys, ducks and opossums.

Sentiment, pathos and tragedy enter into many cases brought to the hospital, and the history attached to some of the cases is most interesting. Many emergency cases, resulting from automobile accidents, collisions, horses falling into excavations or into the river from piers and dumping platforms, require prompt emergency treatment day and night. Any one familiar with this character of work alone will appreciate that it justifies the existence of the Society's hospital.

## REPORT OF THE BROOKLYN OFFICE

During the year 1920 the Special Agents attached to the Brooklyn Office made 233 arrests for various infractions of the laws relating to cruelty to animals.

The Police made 13 arrests during the same time, making a total of 246 arrests for the year.

The Agents suspended from labor 824 horses which were not in proper physical condition to be used, and in every instance after the suspension these animals were kept under observation by the Agents until they were either fit for work, or if disabled beyond recovery, humanely destroyed.

Nineteen hundred and thirty complaints involving allegations of cruelty to animals were investigated, and in every one of these complaints from one to twelve visits were made by the Agents before the investigation was considered completed.

The three auction markets where horses are bought and sold were kept under strict surveillance during the year, and a number of horses brought there for the purpose of being sold, were condemned as being unfit for sale, and were humanely destroyed.

The provisions of the Penal Law making it a violation "for any person holding an auctioneer's license to offer for sale or to sell at public auction any horse which by reason of debility, disease or lameness, or any other cause could not be worked in this State without violating the law against cruelty to animals" has materially helped the Society in the prosecution of its humane work, and has brought every auctioneer who conducts sales at the various horse markets in the city directly under the supervision of the Society's Agents.

For leaving horses unblanketed in cold, stormy and freezing weather, 102 arrests were made, and for locking the wings of fowl at the various markets where chickens, ducks, geese and turkeys are offered for sale and sold, 15 arrests were made and convictions secured in all cases.

Grateful acknowledgment is made of the splendid co-operation and assistance given to the Society by the Magistrates of the Borough of Brooklyn during the past year.

# HISTORY

Prior to the enactment of the statute entitled "An Act to Prevent the Cruel and Improper Treatment of Cattle," introduced in England in July, 1822, by the late highly esteemed Mr. Martin, the general treatment of animals in all countries of the world was inhuman.

\* "Whether from ignorance, thoughtlessness, heedlessness, or wanton brutality, animals were subjected to extreme pain and torture, and their condition failed to excite the commiseration of the public. The best classes of society contained a few persons only who openly protested against this cruelty, while the majority were engaged in divers pastimes that caused much animal suffering, and regarded with scorn and indignation any appeal made to them in favor of the brutes. Naturally, the lower and lowest orders were therefore more or less insensibe to the claims of lower animals; taking cue as well as example from their betters, they also indulged in cruel sports and maintained a right in man to behave toward dumb domestic dependents as he pleased. In fact, the protests of humane people were silenced by ridicule which came from the platform, the pulpit, and the senate, as

well as from the galled pens of satirists.

"No better instance can be quoted of the prevailing indifference of men in even the highest social position to the feelings of animals than the mocking treatment of the Peers when Lord Erskine stood up in the House of Lords, in the early part of the present century (1811), to ask for justice to the lower creatures of God. Insensible alike to his moderate demands and appeals for compassion and mercy to all defenceless animals that man had pressed into service, the chamber broke out into open derision when he argued in favor of their rights to humane treatment. It is said that loud jeers, vulgar ejaculations, indecorous demeanor, and even whistling and cock-crowing were practicaly the only reply given to the grand speech of this high-souled man. No wonder, therefore, that the man in the street ridiculed also, and that callous coachmen and other persons vented their unrestrained passions on animals without let or hindrance. The public records of eighty years ago certainly do show that the friends of the brutes were few, and their foes many and cruel.

"The most reckless and savage punishment, and the most disgusting disregard to the bodily sufferings of animals, were exhibited unconcealed in the highways and streets daily; festering sores, discharging wounds, excruciating lameness, and tottering infirmity called not forth modern devices to evade public reprobation, and without disguise the lash and goad worked their bloody inflictions. The uncombined efforts of a few benevolent individuals were no check to these evils; and hence it became necessary to establish a society which

should unite the friends of dumb animal creatures.

"The founders of this Society met on the 16th of June, 1824, and inaugurated the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, appointed a committee, and conceived the following plan of operations:

The circulation of suitable tracts gratuitously, or by cheap sale, particularly among persons intrusted with cattle, such as coachmen, carters, and drovers.

2. The introduction into schools of books calculated to impress on youth the duty of humanity to inferior animals.

3. Frequent appeals to the public through the press, awakening more general attention to a subject so interesting, though too much neglected.

4. The periodical delivery of discourses from the pulpit.
5. The employment of constables in the markets and streets; and

5. The employment of constables in the markets and streets, and the prosecution of persons guilty of flagrant acts of cruelty, with publicity to the proceedings, and announcement of results.

"Steadily working by the above means, bravely bearing contumely and overcoming difficulties, the founders became stronger year after year: subscribers and co-workers gradually joined their ranks; and a marked improvement slowly manifested itself in the treatment of animals. Then followed the distinguished patronage of Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, Her Royal Highness the late Duchess of Kent, the Nobility, and many distinguished Members of both Houses of Parliament; and in 1840, by command of Her Majesty, the Society was honored with the prefix of 'Royal.' Since that period the progress has been regular, and its achievements encouraging, and now it is regarded as a permanently established institution, which has outlived ridicule, and secured for its founders the esteem of good and practical men of this and succeeding generations.

"During many years the committee advocated the removal and enlargement of Smithfield Market. Owing to its agency, bull-baiting, bull-running, cock-fighting, badger-baiting, and other wicked sports of a barbarous age have been prohibited by legal enactments. In 1835 the Society obtained an amendment of Martin's Act; in 1845 an amendment of the law for regulating Knackers' Yards; in 1849 a new and much improved Act for the more effectual Prevention of Cruelty to Animals; and in 1854 an Act prohibiting the use of dogs as beasts of draft or burden throughout England; and recently many other Acts of Parliament."

The first society organized in America for the protection of animals was The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, its founder and first president being the late Henry Bergh, to whose noble self-sacrifices and untiring energies the cause of animal protection in this country owes its origin. The history of the Society, therefore, is practically an account of the inception and development

of the work of animal protection in America.

In 1862 Mr. Bergh was appointed Secretary of Legation at St. Petersburg. While in Russia he found himself on several occasions constrained to interfere in cases of atrocious cruelty, and but for his official position he would have been exposed to personal violence. His attention was thus directed to the subject of humanity to the brute creation, and while in London on his way home in 1865, he made the acquaintance of John Colam, Esq., Secretary of the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, who gave him much valuable information concerning the operations of that Society in England. On Mr. Bergh's arrival at home, he found that no similar society existed in this country, and he immediately devoted himself to the establishment of a society for the United States. At the outset the proposition met with little encouragement, and, without the assistance of the press, it might probably have failed. On February 8, 1866, Mr. Bergh delivered a lecture in Clinton Hall, in which he pleaded his

cause with such force of argument and such warmth of eloquent conviction, that expressions of sympathy and offers of assistance were freely made by persons in attendance. The press then lent its powerful aid; the lecture was published in whole or in part in all the great cities of the country; public sentiment in favor of Mr. Bergh's movement was quickly aroused, and on April 10, 1866, "The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals" was incorporated by the Legislature of the State of New York. Among the original charter members of the Society were many of the most eminent citizens of the City and State of New York.

On the 19th of April, in the same year, Mr. Bergh secured the passage by the Legislature of New York of the first comprehensive law enacted in this country for the protection of animals. It provided that "every person who shall, by his act or neglect, maliciously kill, main, wound, injure, torture, or cruelly beat any horse, mule, cow, cattle, sheep, or other animal, belonging to himself or another, shall,

upon conviction, be adjudged guilty of a misdemeanor."

On the 22d of April a meeting was held in Clinton Hall for the purpose of effecting a permanent organization, and at that meeting the first society for the protection of animals in this country came into active existence. The purpose of the association, as set forth in its constitution, was "to provide effective means for the prevention of cruelty to animals throughout the United States, to enforce all laws which are now, or may hereafter be, enacted for the protection of animals, and to secure, by lawful means, the arrest and conviction of all persons violating such laws." As a matter of fact, the only law of that kind then to be found on the statute books of the States of the Union was that which had been passed by the Legislature of New York nine days after the incorporation of the Society. Within twelve months, however, another "act for the more effectual prevention of cruelty to animals" was passed by the Legislature of the same State; and from time to time additions have been made to it, so that there is now hardly a phase of cruelty which the Society has not the legal power to prevent within the boundaries of the State of New York. The legal definition of the word "animal" now includes every living creature except members of the human race, and the words "torture" and "cruelty" include every act, omission, or neglect whereby unjustifiable physical pain, suffering, or death is caused or permitted.

ORGANIZATION OF OTHER SOCIETIES—PROGRESS OF THE WORK.

The organization and influence of The American Society soon led to the establishment of local societies in all parts of the Union and in other countries of the American Continent and elsewhere. The number of local societies incorporated in the United States is now 405 and in other American nations 32 societies have been established and in the United States.

lished and incorporated since 1866, making a total of 437.

The prevention of cruelty to animals has been the beginning of many other humane organizations. Thus, in 1874, the Society appeared as prosecutor in a case of cruelty to children, and it then appeared to be advisable to organize a separate Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children. This was done in 1875, under the Presidency of Mr. John D. Wright; Mr. Henry Bergh becoming Vice-President of the new society, the first of its kind in the world.

The establishment of these and other organizations has represented an increased interest in humane work which has found a practical expression in the legislation of nearly every State in the Union. At this date there is not a single State in which cruelty of any kind is not forbidden by the law, under stringent penalties for disobedience. Some defects continue to exist of course; but, speaking broadly, it may be said that the laws on this subject are good. What is now required is that the great mass of the people shall be educated into sympathy with the humanity of the law. That is now the greatest work of the Society, and it has constant reason to be grateful for the assistance and encouragement which it receives from the press, the pulpit and the judges of the courts.

The abuses growing out of the then prevailing system of dog catching and impounding having become so flagrant as to demand immediate checking, a bill, entitled "An Act for the better protection of lost and strayed animals, and for securing the rights of the owners thereof," was introduced into the Legislature of 1894, providing for the abolishment of the city dog pound, and empowering the Society to carry out the provisions of the act. This bill became a law on March 8, 1894 (Chapter 115, Laws 1894), and the Society immediately thereupon commenced the erection of a Shelter for Animals at 102d Street and East River, provided with every accommodation for the care of animals and their humane destruction.

In rescuing the community from the reign of the old dog catchers, the Society earned the gratitude of the dog owners of New York, and in 1895, at the request of the Mayor of Brooklyn, the law was amended (Chap. 412, Laws 1895) so as to include that city as well. A Shelter was then established in that city, at the corner of Malone Street and Nostrand Avenue, and when Staten Island became a part of the greater City of New York, a Shelter was also opened at Stapleton, Borough of Richmond. In 1913 the Shelter at Malbone Street was succeeded by a modern structure at 233 Butler Street, Brooklyn.

Much suffering has thus been spared the vagrant, lost, and abandoned dogs and cats of the city. Unwanted animals are no longer thrown into the streets, to suffer and die of exposure and starvation, but are given into the care of the Society and by it mercifully destroyed or placed in good homes.

Through the generosity of kind-hearted people interested in the work of animal protection, the Society was enabled, in 1896-97, to rear a commodious fireproof building as its permanent Headquarters, adequate to the increased needs of the Society, and supplied with every facility for carrying on the work to the best advantage.

In 1912 a modern free dispensary and hospital for animals was erected at Avenue A and Twenty-fourth Street, Manhattan, equipped with every known appliance for the care and treatment of diseased and injured animals. The shelter formerly at 102nd Street and East River, and the Ambulance House formerly at 111 East 22nd Street, also occupy modern quarters in this building. The public is invited to visit this plant between the hours of 3 and 5 p. m., Sundays and holidays excepted.

Meanwhile the practical work is not neglected. The officers of the Society are clothed with ample police powers. They wear a distinctive uniform and patrol the streets by day and by night. They have full power to arrest and prosecute offenders against the laws relating to animals. In addition to the uniformed police, the Society has over two hundred special agents in different parts of the State, clothed with the same authority and engaged in enforcing the laws for the prevention of cruelty. In the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn the Society has ambulances for the removal of injured, sick, and disabled animals, equipped with appliances for the rescue of drowning animals and animals which have fallen into excavations, and horsedrawn and motor ambulances especially constructed for the removal of sick, injured, and homeless small animals. A large corps of men is employed in this service.

In addition to its permanent headquarters, Madison Avenue and 26th Street, and the Shelters and the Dispensary and Hospital and ambulance house above mentioned, the Society also maintains an office and ambulance house at 114 Lawrence Street, Brooklyn.

# CHARTER

AN ACT to incorporate "The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals." Passed April 10, 1866, by the Legislature of the State of New York—Vol. I., Chap. 469, page 1019, of the laws of 1866.

SEC. 2. The officers of the said corporation shall consist of a President, ten Vice-Presidents, one Secretary, one Treasurer, an Executive Committee of fifteen members, and such other officers as shall from time to time seem necessary to this society.

SEC. 3. The foregoing officers shall be chosen from among the members of the Society.

SEC. 4. A library may be created for the use of the Society.

Sec. 5. The said Society, for fixing the terms of admission of its members, for the government of the same, for the election, changing, and altering the officers above named, and for the general regulation and management of its affairs, shall have power to form a code of By-Laws, not inconsistent with the laws of this State or of the United States, which code, when formed and adopted at a regular meeting shall, until modified or rescinded, be equally binding as this act upon the Society, its officers and members.

SEC. 6. This Society shall not, in its corporate capacity, hold real estate exceeding in value, at any one time, the sum of one hundred thousand dollars.\*

Sec. 7. The police force of the City of New York, as well as of all other places where police organizations exist, shall, as occasion may require, aid the Society, its members or agents, in the enforcement of all laws which are now, or may hereafter be, enacted for the protection of dumb animals.

Sec. 8. One-half of the fines collected through the instrumentality of the Society, or of its agents for violations of such laws, shall accrue to the benefit of said Society.†

SEC. 9. The provisions of this act shall be general, within the boundaries of the State.

SEC. 10. This act shall take effect immediately.

#### AMENDMENT OF CHARTER.

An Act relative to the acquisition of real property by The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, and to amend the Charter thereof. Passed 7th March, 1871.

The people of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SEC. I. The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, a Corporation created by an Act of the Legislature of this State, passed April 10th, 1866, is hereby authorized and empowered to take, hold, use, and enjoy all the lands, tenements, and hereditaments which were, by the last will of Louis Bonard, devised unto the said Corporation, for the uses and purposes in said will expressed. And all the estate, claim, right, title, and interest of the people of this State, of, in, and to said lands, tenements and hereditaments, and every part thereof are hereby released, granted, confirmed to, and vested in said Corporation.

SEC. 2. The Sixth Section of an act entitled "An Act to incorporate The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals," passed April 10th, 1866, is hereby amended, and shall read as follows:

§ 6. This Corporation shall be capable of taking, holding, and enjoying any real property by virtue of any deed, or of any devise contained in any last will of any person, whomsoever, subject to the provisions of law relative to devices by last will. But this Corporation shall not, in its corporate capacity, hold real estate, the yearly income derived from which shall exceed the sum of fifty thousand dollars.\*

Sec. 3. Nothing in this act contained shall in any manner affect the rights of any heir or creditor of the late Louis Bonard.

SEC. 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

# BY-LAWS

THE AMERICAN SOCIETY FOR THE PREVENTION OF CRUELTY TO ANIMALS, REFERRED TO IN THE FIFTH SECTION OF ITS ACT OF INCORPORATION,
AS ADOPTED JANUARY 10, 1907.

The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals hereby adopts and declares the following to be the By-Laws of the Society.

### CHAPTER I

#### TITLE

The title and name of this Society is "The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals."

#### CHAPTER II

#### OBJECTS

The objects of this Society are: to provide effective means for the prevention of cruelty to animals throughout the United States; to enforce all laws which are now, or may hereafter be, enacted for the protection of animals; and to secure by lawful means the arrest, conviction and punishment of all persons violating such laws. A further object of the Society shall be to instruct the people to be kind to animals by the dissemination of humane literature and other effective methods.

#### CHAPTER III

#### MEMBERS

- 1. The Society shall consist of Annual, Life, and Honorary Members.
- 2. Annual Members are those who pay dues annually in advance.
- 3. Life Members are those who pay at one time one hundred dollars.
- 4. Honorary Members shall be chosen on account of some conspicuous act of mercy to the brute creation, or material aid to the purposes of the Society, and shall be entitled to vote at any meeting thereof.
- 5. Members shall be elected by the Board of Managers as follows: all nominations of candidates shall be made in writing and presented at a meeting of the Board of Managers, by a member of the Society, and together with the name of such member entered on the minutes. The persons thus nominated, when elected by the Board of Managers, by a majority vote of the members thereof present and voting, shall, on payment of the annual dues if elected an Annual member, and without such payment if elected as an Honorary member, become members of the Society accordingly.
- 6. Any member of the Society may on due notice and for cause be expelled by a two-thirds vote of the Board of Managers.
- 7. Any member over twenty-one years of age and not in arrears shall be entitled to vote at any meeting of the Society.
- 8. Any member may resign from the Society by letter in writing to either the President or Secretary, stating his intention so to do.

#### CHAPTER IV

## OFFICERS AND BOARD OF MANAGERS

1. The affairs of the Society shall be managed by a Board of Managers, consisting of twenty-one members of the Society.

There shall be elected at the regular monthly meeting of the Board in January of each year, from the Board of Managers, a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary and a Treasurer, to serve for one year or until their successors are elected.

The Board of Managers, at its regular monthly meeting in January, 1907, shall be classified by lot into three classes, each of which shall consist of seven members. The members of each class shall hold office for one, two and three

years, respectively.

At the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Managers in January, 1908, there shall be elected by the Board of Managers, seven members of the Board of Managers in place of those whose terms will then expire; the Managers so elected shall serve for three years or until their successors are chosen. Thereafter at each succeeding regular annual meeting in January, seven members of the Board of Managers shall be similarly elected to serve for three years or until their successors are chosen.

All nominations for members of the Board of Managers shall be made by a nominating committee to be composed of six members, of which three shall be chosen by the Board of Managers, and three elected by the Society at large, at its annual meetings. The members of such committee to serve for one year

only, or until their successors are appointed or elected.

2. The Board shall have full power to fill all vacancies which may occur from time to time in its own number and in any of the said offices, and in its discretion remove any officer, or any member of the Board of the Society by an affirmative vote of fourteen members of the Board present and voting at a meet-

ing thereof convened as hereinafter provided.

3. The Board of Managers shall be convened by the Secretary when so directed by the President, or Vice-President, or three members of the Board. A written or printed notice of the time and place of the meeting shall, at least three days previous thereto, be mailed to, or left at the residence, or place of business of each member of the Board. Five members of such Board present at its meeting so convened, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

The Board of Managers shall have the management, investment, control, and disposition of the affairs, property and funds of the Society; and shall designate an incorporated bank or trust company in the City of New York, where the said funds shall from time to time, as they accrue, be deposited by the Treasurer.

5. It may from time to time determine the salary or pecuniary compensa-

tion of all officers, agents, and employees of the Society.

6. It may also direct the appointment of the necessary clerks and servants of the Society (other than those elsewhere provided for in these By-Laws), in such manner and with such powers, duties, privileges, and compensation as it may from time to time determine.

7. It shall make and establish from time to time all orders, rules, and regulations for the government of such clerks and servants; and also of the members of the Society in the exercise by them of the powers conferred by law.

8. It shall have power in its discretion to declare vacant the seat of any of the members of its own body, who shall have been absent from its meetings for three successive months, and also by a vote of a majority of the whole Board to remove from its own body any members for cause.

9. All members of the Society shall be elected by the Board of Managers. 10. It may in its discretion remit the annual dues of any member or class of members of this Society; and may drop from the roll of members, without further notice, the name of any member of the Society neglecting for two suc-

cessive years to pay the annual dues.

II. The Board of Managers shall hold meetings for the transaction of business at least once in every month, at such time and place of meeting as it may designate. Special meetings of the Board shall be called by the Secretary at any time, as provided in Sub-Division 3 of this Chapter.

#### CHAPTER V

#### PRESIDENT

I. The President shall be the chief executive officer of the Society. At all meetings of the Society, and of the Board of Managers, on the arrival of the appointed hour, and the presence of a quorum, the President, or, in his absence, the Vice-President, or, in the absence of both, a Chairman pro tem, shall immediately take the chair, call the meeting to order, and preside.

2. The President shall have charge of the Headquarters of the Society,

and its records and Library, and the employment of all clerks and other employees, subject to the approval of the Board of Managers.

3. He shall make regular monthly reports to the Board of Managers, and

annual reports to the Society.

# CHAPTER VI

#### SECRETARY

1. The Secretary shall keep in suitable books to be provided for that purpose, at the Society's Headquarters, true copies of all letters written by him on behalf of the Society; and shall preserve, on proper files, at the said Headquarters, all letters received by him on the same account; and at each stated meeting of the Society or the Board of Managers shall respectively report the correspondence and read the same, or such parts thereof as may be required.

2. It shall be the duty of the Secretary also to give due notice of the time and place of all meetings of the Society and Board of Managers.

3. An Assistant Secretary may be appointed by the Board of Managers, who shall hold office at the pleasure of the Board, and who shall be charged with the performance of such duties as may be determined, from time to time, by the Board.

# CHAPTER VII

#### TREASURER

I. The Treasurer shall supervise all accounts and with the President shall safely keep all contracts, certificates of stock, securities, and muniments of title belonging to the Society. The Treasurer shall collect the dues and keep the funds of the Society, and disburse the same under the direction of the Board of Managers. He shall deposit the funds, in the name of the Society, in some incorporated bank or trust company in the City of New York, to be designated for that purpose by the Board of Managers. for that purpose by the Board of Managers; and the said funds, thus deposited, shall be drawn out of the said bank or trust company only on the check of the Treasurer, or Assistant Treasurer, countersigned by the President of the Society, or in his absence or disability by the Vice-President.

2. The Treasurer shall, previous to the annual meeting of the Society, prepare and submit to the Board of Managers, for audit, a detailed account of his receipts and disbursements on account of the Society during the past year; and which annual account, duly audited, he shall present, with his general report, to the Society, at its annual meeting. He shall produce to the Board of Managers or any committee appointed for that purpose, all original vouchers, papers, books of account, and other evidence of receipt and disbursement whenever he may

be so required.

3. An Assistant Treasurer may be appointed by the Board of Managers, who shall hold office at the pleasure of the Board, and is authorized to sign checks drawn on account of this Society, countersigned by the President.

## CHAPTER VIII

#### GENERAL MANAGER

1. A General Manager of the Society shall be appointed by the Board of Managers, and hold office during its pleasure.

The General Manager shall, under the supervision of the President, have the general management and control of the affairs of the Society.

### CHAPTER IX

#### SUPERINTENDENT

1. A Superintendent shall be appointed by the President, with the approval

of the Board of Managers, and hold office during its pleasure.

2. The Superintendent shall, under the direction of the President and General Manager, have the general supervision and control over all the Special Agents mentioned in the next chapter of these By-Laws.

3. He shall receive for his services such salary or pecuniary compensation as may be determined from time to time by the Board of Managers.

#### CHAPTER X

#### AGENTS

1. This Society has no general agents authorized to bind it, or to incur pecuniary obligations in its behalf, by their acts or omissions. No such agents shall be at any time created or appointed by any of its officers.

The Special Agents of the Society shall be appointed from time to time by the President, with the approval of the Board of Managers, and may be removed by the President at will. They shall be subject to and governed by such rules and orders as he may prescribe and issue, consistent with these By-Laws.

3. The appointment of every Special Agent shall be in writing signed by the President, under the seal of the Society.
4. Special Agents shall receive such salary or pecuniary compensation for their services as may be from time to time determined by the Board of Managers.

Only Special Agents (except the officers mentioned in the Fourth Chapter of these By-Laws) may, upon being designated according to law, as Agents of this Society, make lawful arrests, and by lawful means bring before any court or magistrate thereof having jurisdiction, offenders found violating the provisions of laws now existing, or which may hereafter be enacted for the protection of animals, and for the more effectual prevention of cruelty to animals, as in and by said laws provided.

6. No Special Agent is authorized to incur any debt or pecuniary liability on the part of the Society by his acts or omissions, nor are any acts or omissions on his part contrary to, or in excess of, or unauthorized by law to be deemed as within the scope of his authority as such Special Agent, or as authorized,

sanctioned, or ratified by this Society.

## CHAPTER XI

#### ANNUAL DUES

1. The annual dues for the fiscal year, payable in advance, shall be five dollars. Payment thereof shall be made immediately upon notification of election.

2. Any member of the Society, not in arrears, may commute for life all dues for membership, by the payment at one time of one hundred dollars; but any sum so paid in commutation shall be deemed forfeited to the Society upon resignation or expulsion therefrom.

3. The fiscal year of the Society shall, for all purposes, commence on the first day of January, and end with the thirty-first day of December in each year.

#### CHAPTER XII

### ANNUAL MEETINGS

The annual meetings of the Society shall be held on the second Thursday of January. Notice of time and place shall be posted on the bulletin in the offices of the Society, and given by publication in four daily papers.

2. At the annual meeting of the Society, the President shall present a general report of its proceedings during the past year; and the Secretary and Treasurer shall also present their annual reports. The Society may also transact such business as may properly come before it.

### CHAPTER XIII

### SPECIAL MEETINGS

1. A special meeting of the Society may be called by the President or, in the absence of the President, by the Vice-President, stating the object of such meeting, and also shall be so called when requested in writing by

twenty members.

Such call shall be made by keeping posted a notice of the time and place of such meeting in a conspicuous place in the Headquarters of the Society, during at least three days before the same is proposed to be held; and a written or printed notice of the time and place of the meeting shall, at least three days previous thereto, be mailed to, or left at the residence or place of business of each member of the Society, and published in four daily papers; also notice of time and place shall be posted on the bulletin in the offices of the Society.

# CHAPTER XIV

#### QUORUM

At all meetings of the Society twenty members shall be a quorum for the transaction of business, but a less number may adjourn to a certain day, provided only one adjournment is allowed.

### CHAPTER XV

#### ORDER OF BUSINESS

- I. At all meetings of the Society, and Board of Managers, for the transaction of ordinary business, the order of proceedings shall be as follows, unless otherwise specially ordered:
  - I. Reading of the minutes.
  - 2. Reports and communications from officers of the Society.
  - 3. Reports from Committees.
  - 4. Special orders.

- 2. All propositions presented for the action of the Society, at any of its meetings, shall be in writing, when requested by the presiding officer, or any member. A proposition thus presented, when seconded, and the question thereon stated from the chair, shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Society, and open for discussion; but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision.

# CHAPTER XVI

#### BADGES

- I. All Badges of the Society shall be in such form as the Board of Managers may designate.
- 2. Each member of the Board of Managers is entitled to own and wear the Badge of the Society.
- 3. All other Badges of the Society are to be its property, and are to be worn only by the Special Agents as shall be designated by the Board of Managers, and during its pleasure and under such rules as it shall prescribe.

## CHAPTER XVII

#### ALTERATION OF BY-LAWS

- r. No alteration shall be made in any of the By-Laws of this Society, unless such alteration shall first be proposed in writing at a meeting of the Board of Managers, and entered at length on their minutes, with the name of the proposer, and then approved of by such Board at a subsequent meeting thereof, previous to which such meeting a copy of the proposed alteration shall be sent with the notice of the meeting to every member of the Board of Managers.
- 2. But no alteration shall be made in either Chapter Four or this Chapter of such By-Laws, except, in addition to the provisions and requirements of the first section of this Chapter, such alteration shall be further approved and confirmed by the Society at its next annual meeting thereafter, by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, and voting thereat.
- 3. The name of every person voting upon the approval or adoption of any alteration in any By-Law, and whether in the affirmative or negative, shall be so entered upon the minutes of the meeting. This section shall apply alike to the Board of Managers and to the Society.

# CHAPTER XVIII

All By-Laws and portions of By-Laws heretofore formed and adopted by this Society and Board of Managers are hereby rescinded; and this code of By-Laws shall take effect immediately, as a substitute for and modification of all previous By-Laws.

# PROVISIONS OF PENAL LAW OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK

# RELATING TO CRUELTY TO ANIMALS

# ARTICLE XVI-ANIMALS

- SEC. 18c. Definitions.

- § 180. Definitions. I. The word "animal," as used in this article, does not
- include the human race, but includes every other living creature.

  2. The word "torture" or "cruelty" includes every act, omission, or neglect, whereby unjustifiable physical pain, suffering or death is caused or permitted.

  3. The words "impure and unwholesome milk" include all milk obtained from animals in a diseased or unhealthy condition, or which are fed on distillery waste, usually called "swill" or upon any substance in a state of putrefaction or fermentation.
- § 181. Keeping a place where animals are fought. A person who keeps or uses, or is in any manner connected with, or interested in the management of, or receives money for the admission of any person to, a house, apartment, pit or place kept or used for baiting or fighting any bird or animal, and any owner or occupant of a house, apartment, pit or place who wilfully procures or permits the same to be used or occupied for such baiting or fighting, is guilty of a misdemeanor. Upon complaint under oath or affirmation to any magistrate authorized to issue warrants in criminal cases, that the complainant has just and reasonable cause to suspect that any of the provisions of law relating to or in any wise affecting animals are being or about to be violated in any particular building or place, such magistrate shall immediately issue and deliver a warrant to any person authorized by law to make arrests for such offenses, authorizing him to enter and search such building or place, and to arrest any person there present found violating any of said laws, and to bring such person before the nearest magistrate of competent jurisdiction, to be dealt with according to law.
- § 182. Instigating fights between birds and animals. A person who sets on foot, instigates, promotes, or carries on, or does any act as assistant, umpire, or principal, or is a witness of, or in any way aids in or engages in the furtherance of any fight between cocks or other birds, or dogs, bulls, bears, or other animals, premeditated by any person owning, or having custody of such birds or

animals, is guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by fine not less than ten dollars, nor more than one thousand dollars, or by imprisonment not less than ten days nor more than one year, or both.

- § 183. Officer may take possession of animals or implements used in fights among animals. Any officer authorized by law to make arrests may lawfully take possession of any animals, or implements, or other property used or employed, or about to be used or employed, in the violation of any provision of law relating to fights among animals. He shall state to the person in charge thereof, at the time of such taking, his name and residence, and also, the time and place at which the application provided for by the next section will be made.
- § 184. Disposition of animals or implements used in fights among animals.—The officer, after taking possession of such animals, or implements, or other property, pursuant to the preceding section, shall apply to the magistrate before whom complaint is made against the offender violating such provision of law, for the order next hereinafter mentioned, and shall make and file an affidavit with such magistrate, stating therein the name of the offender charged in such complaint, the time, place and description of the animals, implements or other property so taken, together with the name of the party who claims the same, if known, and that the affiant has reason to believe and does believe, stating the grounds of such belief, that the same were used or employed, or were about to be used or employed, in such violation, and will establish the truth thereof upon the trial of such offender. He shall then deliver such animals, implements, or other property, to such magistrate, who shall thereupon, by order in writing, place the same in the custody of an officer or other proper person in such order named and designated, to be by him kept until the trial or final discharge of the offender, and shall send a copy of such order, without delay, to the district attorney of the county. The officer or person so named and designated in such order shall immediately thereupon assume such custody, and shall retain the same for the purpose of evidence upon such trial, subject to the order of the court before which the offender may be required to appear, until his final discharge or conviction. Upon the conviction of such offender, the animals, implements, or other property, shall be adjudged by the court to be forfeited. In the event of the acquittal or final discharge, without conviction, of such offender, such other property shall, on demand, direct the delivery of the property so held in custody to the owner thereof.
- § 185. Overdriving, torturing and injuring animals; failing to provide proper sustenance. A person who overdrives, overloads, tortures or cruelly beats or unjustifiably injures, maims, mutilates or kills any animal, whether wild or tame, and whether belonging to himself or to another, or deprives any animal of necessary sustenance, food or drink, or neglects or refuses to furnish it such sustenance or drink, or causes, procures or permits any animal to be overdriven, overloaded, tortured, cruelly beaten, or unjustifiably injured, maimed, mutilated or killed, or to be deprived of necessary food or drink, or who wilfully sets on foot, instigates, engages in, or in any way furthers any act of cruelty to any animal, or any act tending to produce such cruelty, is guilty of a misdemeanor.

Nothing herein contained shall be construed to prohibit or interfere with any properly conducted scientific experiments or investigations, which experiments shall be performed only under the authority of the faculty of some regularly incorporated medical college or university of this state.

§ 186. Abandonment of disabled animal. A person being the owner or possessor, or having charge or custody of a maimed, diseased, disabled or infirm animal, who abandons such animal, or leaves it to die in a street, road or public place, or who allows it to lie in a public street, road or public place more than three hours after he receives notice that it is left disabled, is guilty of a misdemeanor. Any agent or officer of The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, or of any society duly incorporated for that purpose, or any police officer, may lawfully destroy or cause to be destroyed any animal found abandoned and not properly cared for, appearing in the judgment of two reputable citizens called by him to view the same in his presence, to be glandered, injured or diseased past recovery for any useful purpose; or after such agent or officer has obtained in writing from the owner of such animal his consent to such destruction. When any person arrested is, at the time of such arrest, in

charge of any animal or of any vehicle drawn by or containing any animal, any agent or officer of said society or societies or any police officer may take charge of such animal and of such vehicle and its contents, and deposit the same in a safe place of custody, or deliver the same into the possession of the police or sheriff of the county or place wherein such arrest was made, who shall thereupon assume the custody thereof; and all necessary expenses incurred in taking charge of such property shall be a charge thereon.

- § 187. Failure to provide proper food and drink to impounded animal.— A person who, having impounded or confined any animal, refuses or neglects to supply to such animal during its confinement a sufficient supply of good and wholesome air, food, shelter and water, is guilty of a misdemeanor. In case any animal shall be at any time impounded as aforesaid, and shall continue to be without necessary food and water for more than twelve successive hours, it shall be lawful for any person, from time to time, and as often as it shall be necessary to enter into and upon any pound in which any such animal shall be so confined, and to supply it with necessary food and water, so long as it shall remain so confined; such person shall not be liable to any action for such entry, and the reasonable cost of such food and water may be collected by him of the owner of such animal, and the said animal shall not be exempt from levy and sale upon execution issued upon a judgment therefor.
- § 188. Selling or offering to sell or exposing diseased animal. A person who wilfully sells or offers to sell, uses, exposes, or causes, or permits to be sold, offered for sale, used or exposed, any horse or other animal having the disease known as glanders or farcy, or other contagious or infectious disease dangerous to the life or health of human beings, or animals, or which is diseased past recovery, or who refuses upon demand to deprive of life an animal affected with any such disease, is guilty of a misdemeanor.
- § 188-a. Selling disabled horses. It shall be unlawful for any person holding an auctioneer's license knowingly to receive or offer for sale or to sell at public auction, other than at a sheriff's or judicial sale under a court order, any horse which by reason of debility, disease or lameness, or for any other cause, could not be worked in this state without violating the law against cruelty to animals. Any person violating any provision of this section shall upon conviction be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars, or by imprisonment for not more than six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.
- § 189. Carrying animal in a cruel manner. A person who carries or causes to be carried in or upon any vessel or vehicle or otherwise, any animal in a cruel or inhuman manner or so as to produce torture, is guilty of a misdemeanor.
- § 190. Poisoning or attempting to poison animals. A person who unjustifiably administers any poisonous or noxious drug or substance to a horse, mule or domestic cattle or unjustifiably exposes any such drug or subtance with intent that the same shall be taken by a horse, mule or by domestic cattle, whether such horse, mule or domestic cattle be the property of himself or another, is guilty of a felony, punishable by imprisonment in a state's prison, for not more than five years. A person who unjustifiably administers any poisonous or noxious drug or substance to an animal, other than a horse, mule or domestic cattle, or unjustifiably exposes any such drug or substance with intent that the same shall be taken by an animal, other than a horse, mule or domestic cattle, whether such animal be the property of himself or another, is guilty of a misdemeanor.
- § 191. Throwing substance injurious to animals in public place. A person who wilfully throws, drops or places, or causes to be thrown, dropped or placed upon any road, highway, street or public place, any glass, nails, pieces of metal or other substance which might wound, disable or injure any animal, is guilty of a misdemeanor.
- § 192. Keeping milch cows in unhealthy places and feeding them with food producing unwholesome milk. A person who keeps a cow or any animal for the production of milk, in a crowded or unhealthy place, or in a diseased condition, or feeds such cow or animal upon any food that produces impure or unwholesome milk, is punishable by a fine not less than fifty dollars, or imprisonment not exceeding one year, or by both.

§ 193. Transporting animals for more than twenty-four consecutive hours without unloading. A railway corporation, or an owner, agent, consignee, or person in charge of any horses, sheep, cattle, or swine, in the course of, or for transportation, who confines, or causes or suffers the same to be confined, in cars for a longer period than twenty-four consecutive hours, without unloading for rest, water and feeding, during ten consecutive hours, unless prevented by storm or inevitable accident, is guilty of a misdemeanor. In estimating such confinement, the time during which the animals have been confined without rest, on connecting roads from which they are received, must be computed. If the owner, agent, consignee, or other person in charge of any such animals refuses or neglects upon demand to pay for the care or feed of the animals while so unloaded or rested, the railway company, or other carriers thereof, may charge the expense thereof to the owner or consignee and shall have a lien thereon for such expense.

§ 194. Running horses on highway. A person driving any vehicle upon any plank road, turnpike or public highway, who unjustifiably runs the horses drawing the same, or causes, or permits them to run, is guilty of a misdeameanor.

§ 195. Leaving state to avoid provisions of this article. A person who leaves this state with intent to elude any of the provisions of this article or to commit any act out of this state which is prohibited by them, or who, being a resident of this state, does any act without this state, pursuant to such intent, which would be punishable under such provisions, if committed within this state, is punishable in the same manner as if such act had been committed within this state.

§ 196. To whom fines and penalties are to be paid. All fines, penalties or forfeitures imposed or collected for a violation of the provisions of this article, or of any act for the prevention of cruelty to animals, now in force or hereafter passed, must be paid on demand to The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals; except where the prosecution shall be instituted or conducted by a society for the prevention of cruelty to animals duly incorporated under the general laws of this state, in which case such fine, penalty or forfeiture must be paid on demand to such society. A constable or police officer must, and any agent or officer of any of said societies may, summon or arrest and bring before a court or magistrate having jurisdiction, any person offending against any of the provisions of this article. Any officer or agent of any of said societies may lawfully interfere to prevent the perpetration of any act of cruelty upon any animal in his presence. Any person who shall interfere with or obstruct any such officer or agent in the discharge of his duty shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. Any of said societies may prefer a complaint before any court, tribunal or magistrate having jurisdiction, for the violation of any law relating to or affecting animals and may aid in presenting the law and facts before such court, tribunal or magistrate in any proceeding taken. The officers and agents of all duly incorporated societies for the prevention of cruelty to animals or one hundred and fifty-four of the code of criminal procedure.

### OTHER SECTIONS OF PENAL LAW

§ 1755. Obstructing passage of ambulance. A person, who wilfully stops or obstructs the passage of any ambulance or vehicle used for the transportation of sick or wounded persons or animals upon any public street, highway or place, or who wilfully injures the same, or wilfully drives any vehicle into collision therewith, is guilty of a misdemeanor. All sheriffs, constables and police officers must, when called upon by the persons in charge of such ambulance or vehicle, aid in placing sick or wounded persons or animals therein, and in enforcing the provisions of this section.

§ 1841. Provision as to neglect of duty. A public officer, or person holding a public trust or employment, upon whom any duty is enjoined by law, who wilfully neglects to perform the duty, is guilty of a misdemeanor. This and section eighteen hundred and forty do not apply to cases of official acts or omissions the prevention or punishment of which is otherwise specially provided

by statute.

§ 1857. Omission of duty by public officer. Where any duty is or shall be enjoined by law upon any public trust or employment, every wilful omission to perform such duty, where no special provision shall have been made for the punishment of such delinquency, is punishable as a misdemeanor.

§ 1937. Punishment of misdemeanors when not fixed by statute. A person convicted of a crime declared to be a misdeameanor, for which no other punishment is specially prescribed by this chapter, or by any other statutory provision in force at the time of the conviction and sentence, is punishable by imprisonment in a penitentiary, or county jail, for not more than one year, or by a fine of not more than five hundred dollars, or by both.

§ 413 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York. "Every person who shall throw, expose or place, or who shall cause or procure to be thrown, exposed or placed in or upon any street, highway or public place, except upon the curves, crossings or switches of railroad tracks, any salt, saltpetre or other substance for the purpose of dissolving any snow or ice which may have fallen or been deposited thereon, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. It shall not be lawful for any person to throw or place upon the curves, crossings or switches of railroad tracks any salt, saltpetre or other substance for the purpose of dissolving snow or ice unless permission therefor be first obtained from the respective Borough Presidents."

Laws of New York, 1866, Chap. 469, § 7. Police to aid The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. The police force of the City of New York as well as of all other places where police organizations exist, shall, as occasion may require, aid the Society, its members or agents, in the enforcement of all laws which are now, or may hereafter be, enacted for the protection of dumb animals.

# HOW TO PROTECT ANIMALS

THE RIGHTS OF CITIZENS, MEMBERS AND AGENTS OF THE SOCIETY, AND THE DUTIES IMPOSED ON POLICE OFFICERS, IN RESPECT TO THE LAWS FOR THE PREVENTION OF CRUELTY TO ANIMALS.

Any citizen has the right to interfere to prevent an act of cruelty to animals committed in his presence.

Section 183 of the Code of Criminal Procedure provides as follows:

"Sec. 183. In what cases allowed. A private person may arrest another:

- 1. For a crime committed or attempted in his presence;
- 2. When the person arrested has committed a felony, although not in his presence."

There are three modes of proceeding, viz.:

- I. By arresting the offender.
- II. By giving the offender into the custody of a policeman, constable or other officer.
- III. By the apprehension of the accused under a summons or warrant.

When you make the arrest yourself, you must immediately take the prisoner before a magistrate, or deliver him to a peace officer.

Sec. 185. (Code of Criminal Procedure.) "A private person, who has arrested another for the commission of a crime, must, without unnecessary delay, take him before a magistrate, or deliver him to a peace officer."

While the law gives a citizen the right to make an arrest for a crime committed in his presence, this course should be followed only in extreme cases, where the circumstances will not permit of any other method of procedure.

When you personally witness an act of cruelty, and do not care to make the arrest yourself, call the attention of an officer to the nature of the offense, insist on the arrest of the offender; accompany the accused to the magistrate, and be sure to take the officer's number, name and precinct, in order that you may compel attention to the case. The law requires the police throughout this State to aid in the protection of dumb animals from injury and abuse; and should an officer refuse his assistance—which is not likely to occur—then take the number on his hat or shield, and report the same to the Society.

The enforcement of the laws for the protection of animals is mandatory on police officers:

Penal Law, Sec. 196. . . . "A constable or police officer must . . . summon or arrest and bring before a court or magistrate having jurisdiction, any person offending against any of the provisions of this article." (Article XVI.—Cruelty to Animals.)

When you do *not* personally see the act of cruelty, or when you can *not* procure an officer on the spot, or if the officer refuses to act, then obtain the name and address of the offender, and the name, number and address painted on the vehicle, if any, and the names and residences of those who witnessed the act, and lay the facts before a magistrate.

If, in your opinion, the act is a trivial one and does not warrant arrest and prosecution, or if the cruelty is the result of ignorance, the reprehensibility of the act should be pointed out to the offender in a kindly way.

If the offense is that of driving a horse that is unfit for work by reason of painful sores or lameness, the driver should be instructed, if possible, how to care for his animal so that the unfit condition shall be avoided. He should be advised to consult a veterinary, or, if he be a poor man, direct him to take his animal to the Society's Free Dispensary and Hospital for Animals at Avenue A and Twenty-fourth Street, Borough of Manhattan.

# IN ALL CASES

Make a note of the time when, and the street or place where, the offense occurred, and also the names and residences of all persons present and of any others who may be called as witnesses. If the offense was that of driving a horse or other animal with galled neck or shoulders, or other wounds, note the size and location of such wounds—especially if raw, discharging, or in contact with the harness. If the offense was flogging or beating, note the instrument, the number of blows, on what part of the body inflicted, and the effect, if any, on the skin of the animal; if overloading, carefully observe the symptoms of distress, such as the trembling, falling, unusual perspiration, or exhaustion. Report all cases of mutilation, such as docking tails of horses, cutting tails or ears of dogs, or any other torture; also cases of cruelty in the transporting of sheep, calves, game, fowls, or other poultry, or animals, while bound by the legs or otherwise, in any part of this State, either on land or water. In every instance observe minutely and take down in writing the facts and details, and also the language of the offender at the time.

## FINALLY

Complaints or inquiries made to the Society at its headquarters, by night or by day, will receive prompt attention; and ALL ARRESTS FOR CRUELTY SHOULD BE PROMPTLY REPORTED THERE, TO INSURE A PROPER PROSECUTION OF THE CASE.




# TO KILL A HORSE HUMANELY



Shoot with a 38 calibre (or larger) pistol at the point indicated by the dot, which would be four or five inches above a line drawn between the eyes of a horse, and just off the centre.

When the animal is standing, the shooting is done by the officer holding the halter strap or bit ring firmly by the left hand and placing the revolver within an inch of the head and pulling the trigger. The pistol should be held in such a way that the bullet will reach the base of the brain and bury itself in the neck. When the medulla at the base of the brain is reached instant paralysis and insensibility set in and there is an almost total absence of hemorrhage. This can be accomplished by shooting carefully and according to directions.

# TO KILL A DOG OR CAT HUMANELY





Shoot at the point indicated, which would be in the centre of the head between the two ears, above the eyes and on a line with the ear openings. The pistol should be held within a half inch of the head and pointed downward and backward so that the bullet will pierce the brain, pass on to the medulla at the base of the brain, and bury itself in the muscles of the neck or in the body. When this is done, instant insensibility and death follow and the possibility of injuring a bystander is averted.



Reports are invited of acts of cruelty and accidents. Such reports should give full particulars, time, place of occurence, names and addresses of witnesses. The information will be considered confidential if desired. The Headquarters of the Society are never closed.
