All nominations for 1957 officers of the State 4-H Council will be made at a meeting of all members of the State 4-H Council, at 4:15 p.m., Tuesday, July 23, in Williams Auditorium. The officers of the State 4-H Council will conduct the meeting.

ELIGIBILITY FOR ATTENDANCE AT STATE COUNCIL MEETING: The current president, vice president, secretary-treasurer, and historian (or reporter) of each county 4-H council, and all district officers are members of the State 4-H Council. Only these officers, or appointed substitutes, are eligible to attend the State Council meeting and participate and vote in the business of the State Council. Four identification cards will be issued to one agent from each county at registration on Monday, July 22, and the officers, or appointed substitutes, will be required to show their cards for admittance. Campaign managers who are not members of the State Council will be admitted to the meeting but cannot vote or take part in the discussion.

CANDIDATES ELIGIBLE FOR OFFICE: Only members of the State 4-H Executive Board (who are the present district officers), now active in 4-H work, may be nominated for one of the State 4-H Council offices of president, vice president, secretary-treasurer, and historian. Club members who have completed one year of college work and are currently enrolled in college are not eligible for nomination. The officers this year will follow the usual rotation plan: President - girl, Vice President - boy, Secretary-Treasurer - boy, and Historian - girl. Candidates must mail their picture, glossy print suitable for reproduction, and a short summary of their qualifications for a particular office to the secretary of the State 4-H Council, Clara Vann Tysinger, c/o State 4-H Club Office, State College Station, Raleigh, before July 20. A summary of these qualifications will be published in a special election edition of the "Clover Leaves."

ELECTION REGULATIONS: Short qualification speeches for each candidate should be made by his or her campaign manager when the candidate is nominated at the 4:15 p.m. council meeting in Williams Hall on Tuesday. Then these candidates will be presented to the entire group at the Club Members' Assembly on Wednesday at 9:30 a.m. in the Coliseum. Short qualification speeches for each candidate should be made by campaign managers at this time and the candidate should make a short speech — limit, two minutes for campaign manager and candidate.

The names of the candidates will be entered on a printed ballot.

Primary elections will be held Thursday afternoon, July 25, from 12:00 noon to 2:00 p.m. Polls will be held during these hours by the Head Counselors at the main entrance to each dormitory. (Ballot boxes and ballots are to be picked up from and delivered to the Information Desk at the Gym by these Counselors.)

Final elections will be held Friday afternoon, July 26, from 12:00 noon to 2:00 p.m.

CAMPAIGNING: Posters and campaign literature may be used. Posters may be used if they are placed on or near the bulletin boards in the YMCA, Dining Hall, Gymnasium, and Coliseum. There is a limit of four posters per candidate. Other campaign literature may be distributed only in the dormitories and cafeteria. Glue, nails, or any other material which will harm structures are not to be used. No campaigning will be permitted during classes or assemblies (except Wednesday morning assembly when time is provided).

State College and personal property must be respected at all times. No campaigning allowed within 50 feet of the polls.

All literature must be taken down and picked up after the elections. No cars are to be used by anyone for campaigning purposes.
