This issue of "Clover Leaves" proudly salutes North Carolina's State 4-H Club Staff. Through the effort of these men and women, club membership in North Carolina has increased from 20,000 to more than 166,500. Your North Carolina State 4-H Club Staff was not selected at random. They were chosen because of their outstanding leadership abilities, their Christian traits, their hard and earnest work, and their sincere belief in developing rural youth into better citizens of tomorrow. The 4-H Club Staff at present is headed by Mr. L. R. Harrill, State 4-H Club Leader, with six assistants. Each assistant is known as a District Agent and is assigned to one of the six Extension Districts in North Carolina.

Mr. Harrill has been State 4-H Club Leader in North Carolina since 1926. In 1949, he was selected by the Department of Agriculture and sent by the U. S. Army to Austria to survey the agricultural program and the rural youth activities in that country. He then made recommendations to the United States authorities for further development of youth activities in Austria. During the same year, Mr. Harrill was named Chairman of the State 4-H Club Leaders in the Southern Region and thus became a member of the National 4-H Club Sub-Committee. In 1950 he received a gold key from the National 4-H Camp for 25 years of outstanding leadership in 4-H Club work, and was named as North Carolina's Man of the Year. In 1955, he received a Superior Service Award from the USDA.

The Eastern District 4-H Club Agent is Lyman Dixon. Mr. Dixon assumed his duties as District 4-H Club Agent in January of 1950. He is a native of Greene County and a graduate of State College. Mr. Dixon was Assistant Farm Agent in Northampton County for four years. During the Second World War, he served with the United States Air Force in the Southwest Pacific.

On May 15, 1950, Dan F. Holler, who had been serving as a Cotton Marketing Specialist at State College, became Southeastern District 4-H Club Leader. He is a native of Anderson, South Carolina, and a graduate of State College. Mr. Holler served as Assistant Extension Agent, and County Agent in Wilkes County. He is a member of the Presbyterian Church and lists his special hobbies as gardening and fishing.

Miss Mary Sue Moser, who was born in Union County, joined the State 4-H Club Staff as Northwestern District Agent in 1948. Prior to that time she had served as Home Demonstration Agent in Davidson County and as an Assistant Home Demonstration Agent in Forsyth County. Miss Moser has been outstanding in helping to set up and promote an Extension Recreational Program for 4-H members in North Carolina.

Fred Wagoner, native of Greensboro, North Carolina, joined the State 4-H Club Staff in 1949. Prior to that time, he had served as an administrative Assistant to the School of Agriculture at State College and as an Assistant County Agent in Tarboro. Mr. Wagoner is a member of many organizations, including the N. C. 4-H Honor Club, and was an outstanding 4-H member himself. He is also a member of Alpha Gamma Rho Fraternity, and while at State College served as president of the Student Government.

Dick Wayland Smith is the newest addition to the state 4-H Club Staff. He joined the staff on February 16 of this year. Mr. Smith was born in Texas and grew up on a farm in Tennessee. He holds a B. S. degree from University of Tennessee in Agricultural Business and also a M. S. degree in Agricultural Economics.

Margaret Emily Clark joined the State 4-H Club Staff in 1950. Miss Clark has served as Home agent in Johnston, Sampson and Carteret Counties before her appointment to the State Staff. Miss Clark served served as president of the State Home Demonstration Agents Association from 1941 through 1945, and was Treasurer of the State Home Economics Association in 1943. She received the Distinguished Service Award from the National Home Demonstration Agents Association in 1949. She was N. C.'s delegate to serve on the National 4-H Record Judging Committee in 1958.

4-H'ers do you not consider yourselves lucky to have a staff with such experience, such know-how, and such leadership? I am sure that we all agree that no state in the union can boast a 4-H Staff as outstanding as that which N. C. has at the present time.

STATE WINNERS IN LIVESTOCK JUDGING



Twenty-two county livestock judging teams got their heads together Monday for the state judging contest.

Columbus County was 1st place winner followed by Wilson County second place. There was a three way tie for 3rd place by the teams from Caswell, Tyrrell and North-Northampton Counties.

The State Livestock Team which will represent N. C. in the contest is made up of the top 4 high scoring individuals, rather than the top team. The high scoring individual in Monday's contest was Milton Coleman of Columbus County, followed by Stephen Cobb, Guilford County. Kathy Hoff, Beaufort County and Wayne Cross, Johnston County.

The coach of the high scoring team will accompany this group. This was Archie Martin Assistant County Agent, Columbus County.

Mr. Bob McGuire, Livestock Specialist, State College was in charge of the contest and announced the winner.
