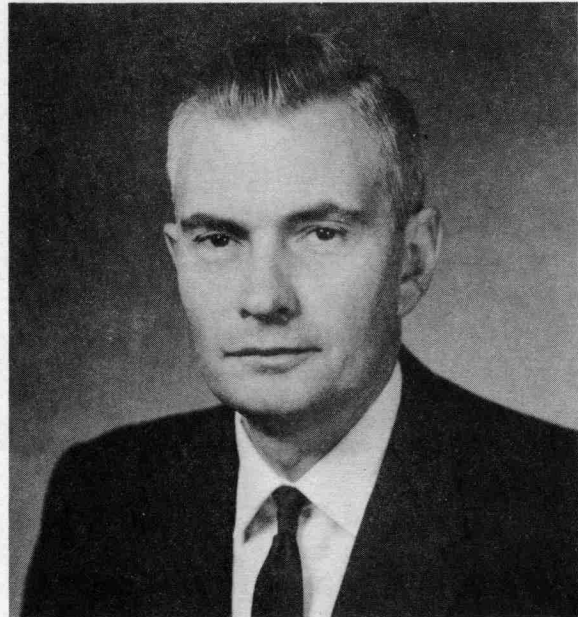
Then, Dr. Blalock presented Mr. Royal with the 4-H Service Award which was given to Cities Service for their interest in and financial support of 4-H activities.
