
Some of our greatest Americans have risen from failure to victory by using one method, work, work, work, and more work, she said. We, too, can strive to be a better 4-H'er by working harder.

Friendship - We never attain this goal with a large cost.


Freedom - Pleasing to do what is right instead of wrong, for we are all biased to do wrong.
