The activities through which physical fitness is achieved were demonstrated by representatives of Columbus County. A team of boys from Whiteville High School captured the full attention of the audience as they went through trampoline and tumbling acts. 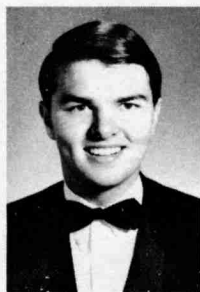
TOMMY CAHOON -- TYRRELL COUNTY
