DELEGATES TO MEET NATIONAL WINNERS

Ten national winners in competitions open to 4-H members will be recognized at the first general session of the North Carolina 4-H Congress. Representing one of the most important activities which takes place during Club Congress, competitions to select 1969 State winners are already underway.

The 1968 winners will be introduced to the Congress tonight by Dr. George Hyatt, Director of the North Carolina Agricultural Extension Service.

Nine of the winners were named at the National 4-H Club Congress held in Chicago last December. The 10th won in national competition held in Atlanta.

EVELYN McDOWELL---Henderson County. Won an \$800 educational scholarship at the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago.

She is the daughter of Mrs. Pearl McDowell, Rt. 3, Hendersonville. She is one of two girls in the nation to receive one of the grants from the S&H Foundation, Inc. in the national 4-H Home Economics scholarship program.

A junior at Western Carolina University at Culowhee, Miss McDowell won the scholarship on the basis of her 4-H project achievement and leadership ability.

HELENA PINCHBECK---Robeson County. Won a \$600 scholarship from Tupperware at the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago for accomplishments in her <u>Home</u> Management project.

Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Pinchbeck of Pembroke, she has completed 125 projects during eight years of 4-H work. These include home improvement, safety, child care, horticulture, food preservation, achievement and health.

ANNA BURGESS --- Northampton County. Won a \$600 scholarship from Allis-Chalmers at the National 4-H Club Congress for accomplishments in her Horticultural project.

Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Burgess of Pendleton, she began horticultural projects seven years ago. She is enrolled at the University of North Carolina in pharmacy.

Friends affectionately call her "Blueberry Anna" because she is quite proficient in raising blueberries.

SUZANNE THOMPSON---Alamance County. Won a \$600 scholarship from the General Food Corporation at the National Congress for accomplishments in her Food-Nutrition project.

Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. G. Thompson, Jr., of Burlington, she has prepared and served meals for her family as part of her project for seven years. Last year she planned 37 meals, prepared 643 dishes, gave two demonstrations on ways to prepare foods, made 31 exhibits, and gave eight talks.









NANCY HODGE---Mecklenburg County. Won a \$600 scholarship at National Club Congress from the Ralston Purina Company of St. Louis for her Dog Care and Training project.

The 14-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil R. Hodge is a member of the surburban Matthews 4-H Club.

She has established and operated her own kennel and earned \$300 since the kennel was established. She has also organized and conducted two dog shows.

RICHARD HEDGEPETH---Lenior County. The 16-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Hedgepeth of Kinston was named winner of a \$600 scholarship at last year's National Club Congress.

The only boy cited as a winner in the <u>Bread</u> project, Hedgepeth has been a 4-H Club member for seven years. He has prepared corn meal muffins 130 times and assisted in serving corn meal muffins at eight community suppers. He also launched a countywide campaign promoting the use of breads and cereals.

ROGER McSWAIN---Rowan County. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde McSwain, Jr., of Salisbury, he won a \$600 scholarship from Eli Lilly and Co., for his Health project.

During the winner's eight years of health project work he estimates that he has assisted over 1,500 youths in some phase of fitness and health improvement. A former State health king, McSwain is attending North Carolina State University.

KAY SLOOP---Iredell County. Miss Sloop was a delegate to Club Congress where she won a \$300 bond as a member of the livestock judging team. But the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. Avery Sloop had to travel to the National Junior Horticultural Convention in Atlanta to become a national winner.

There she was named first place winner in the Fruit and Vegetable Use division and was named second place winner in overall competition.
