#### TOMMY CAHOON---TYRRELL COUNTY

Delegate to National 4-H Congress and first alternate field crops project winner. Delegate to National 4-H Citizenship Short Course and national 4-H Conference. State winner in field crops, livestock conservation demonstration, forage crops demonstration. Member of Key Club and State Honor Club. District records winner five times and demonstrations four times. Has won 20 county projects. President of Northwestern district and of his county council twice. Recipient of 9 special county awards.

#### RICHARD HEDGEPETH --- LENOIR COUNTY

Delegate to National 4-H Congress and national winner in breads and cereals project. Delegate to National 4-H Citizenship Short Course. The 4-H program all over the United States is undergoing a transition. There is a move to the special interest groups and to urban clubs. "The old days of rural 4-H are over. 4-H can better meet the challenges of many of our domestic problems than can any other youth organization. 4-H in North Carolina is one of the extreme quality and we hope to continue that reputation as we proceed into the next years. I regret leaving the 4-H program as an active member, but I shall always hold 4-H near and dear to my heart and I shall continue to contribute as a leader and as an alumni member. "

Judy McLean, vice president, is from Henderson county. She is a sophomore at UNCG. She was inducted into the Honor Club in 1967. Her main 4-H project was dairy.
