North Carolina's 4-H King and Queen of Health were crowned Tuesday night.







GEORGE G. CUNNINGHAM---MACON COUNTY




JANE NANNEY---RUTHERFORD COUNTY


LAURA PIPPIN---WAYNE COUNTY

AUDREY WHITE---CHATHAM COUNTY



AMY DREW---ROWAN COUNTY



JANET WHITE---CRAVEN COUNTY




DAVID BUFFALOE---WAKE COUNTY


TIM HART---CALDWELL COUNTY
