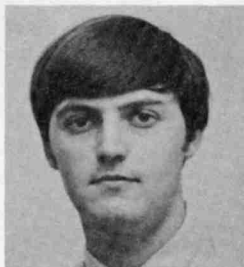

NATIONAL WINNERS TO BE PRESENTED TO CONGRESS AT MONDAY EVENING SESSION

Dr. Chester D. Black, assistant director of the North Carolina Agricultural Extension Service, will present 1970 national winners to the delegates on Monday Evening.

Those to be recognized are:



GARY DAVIS---Iredell County. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Claude E. Davis of Mooresville, Gary is attending the University of North Carolina majoring in political science. He won a \$600 scholarship in the Health program. He speaks up for adequate breakfasts and the dangers of drugs. During 1970, he served on an advisory and discussion panel on drug abuse. The panel appeared on several radio and television programs and before 48 civic groups. His health projects resulted in 250 health improvements involving family, community, and himself.



MARCIA WINNIES---Columbus County. Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Francis Winnies of Chadbourn, Marcia is attending the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and majoring in home economics. She won her \$600 scholarship in the national Clothing program competition. She presented three clothing demonstrations on television and gave three clothing programs on radio. She has taught sewing and modeling techniques to about 300 individuals and held fashion shows for her graduates. She has made 136 garments and articles of clothing and some 375 repairs in six years.



WAYNE BLACK---Davidson County. Son of Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Black of Lexington, Wayne is attending Davidson County Community College. He won his \$600 scholarship in the 4-H Agricultural competition. He considered dropping out of 4-H after he lost money on his first calf, but older members encouraged him to try harder. His calf the following year did show a profit and he won a blue ribbon at the county show. Wayne is the recipient of the 1970 North Carolina 4-H Commissioner of Agriculture Award and trophy. He has been in 4-H seven years.



JANET WHITE---Craven County. Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Archie B. White of New Bern, Marcia graduated from high school this past spring. She won her \$600 scholarship in the Dairy Foods demonstration. She is planning on a career in food science. She started in the project in 1966 after realizing that most of her work in the foods-nutrition project had been with dairy foods. Since then she has collected 1,055 recipes containing dairy products and has prepared 1,001 of them. She has also conducted 29 experiments to enhance her knowledge.



LLOYD PLEDGER, JR.---Tyrrell County. Son of Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Pledger of Columbia, Lloyd is presently attending Atlantic Christian College. He won his \$600 in the 4-H Electric program. He has conducted tours of an all electric farm and home, installed TV antennas, rewired and electrical system, helped conduct a 4-H electric workshop, and repaired appliances. He has also had projects in forage crops, wildlife, forestry, small engines, living in a family, automotive, photography, and dog care.
