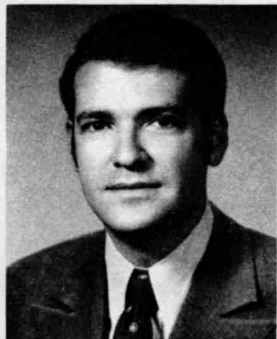
Miss McAuley has been very active in community health activities and has served as a volunteer in a day care center for handicapped children.

Serving as national vice-president of Junior Horticultural Association, delegate to National 4-H Congress, twice, and has attended the National Citizenship Short Course.

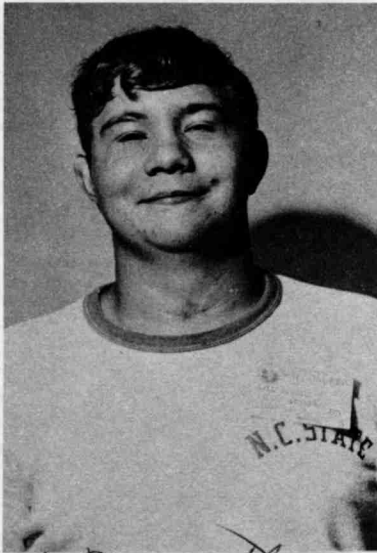

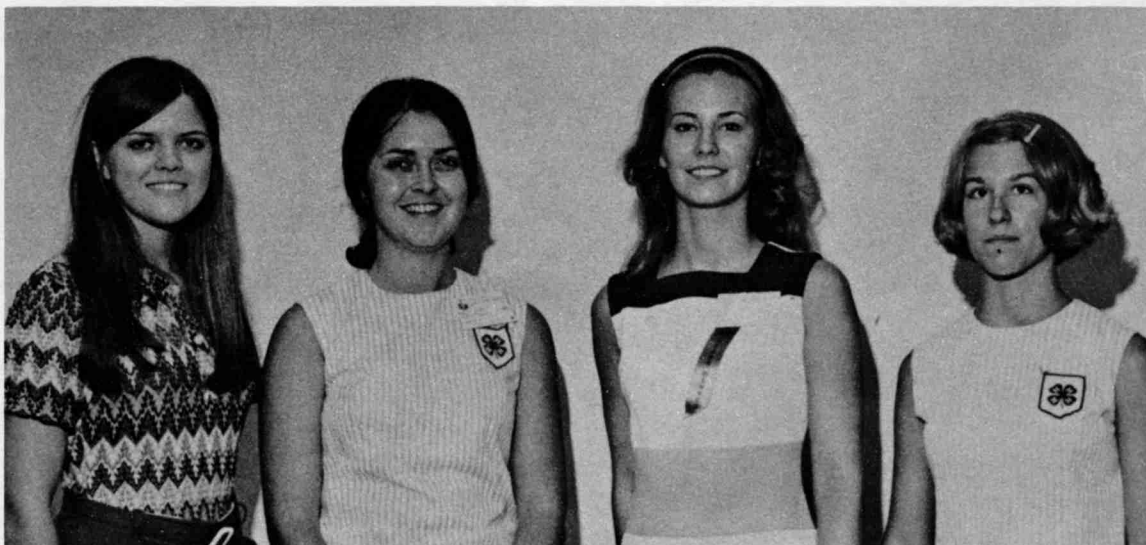
KERRY DAVID COX---BEAUFORT COUNTY

In our interview, Mr. Holler stated that his most enjoyable experiences in 4-H

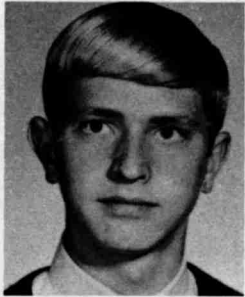
were the people he met: the leaders, and the members who came to 4-H Congress. He also enjoyed his work very much.
