In Towe, the Wolfpack has one of the country's most unique players. Despite his 5-7 frame, the tiny backcourt dazzled opponents with his pinpoint passing and his long-range shooting, and his value to the team as its quarterback was limitless. "The little guy is simply amazing," says Sloan as much in awe as in admiration.

In addition to his sterling play, he proved a natural leader, taking charge on the floor with a confident and fiery attitude. His high game was 29 points against East Carolina.

"Monte very well may become our quarter back," says coach Sloan. "He's a fine ball-handler and has the ability to move the team on the break." His diminutive size and daring exploits endeared him to all the fans who saw him perform. He is sure to become the darling of Reynolds Coliseum crowds this winter.

Towe won letters in four different sports at Oak Hill High, quarterbacking the football team to two undefeated seasons, he was all-conference and all-state selection in basketball and earned a letter with the Wolfpack baseball varsity last spring at second base despite a late start. He batted only .220 but was a whiz with the glove. Born September 27, 1953 he is in the School of Liberal Arts.

LEGATES SPEAKS TO DELEGATES AT MORNING SESSION

"Discipline, when self imposed, does give us freedom," declared Dr. E. J. Legates as he addressed 4-H'ers at the Tuesday morning session of the 1973 4-H Congress. Dr. Legates, dead of North Carolina State University's School of Agriculture and Life Sciences, welcomed delegates to the campus in an address which stressed the opportunities available to youth today.

Declaring that America "has been known as a country of rugged individualists," Dean Legates noted that "initiative and adventure are still needed and required" but "we know in human relations the law of the survival of the fittest rather than the spirit of cooperation can only lead to destruction and extinction."

Stating that freedom today "is often taken to be a matter of doing as one pleases," Dr. Legates asserted that freedom really "denotes an inner quality of control rather than an absence of restraint."

With this in mind, he stated that "If there were only some way that people could be made to realize that this greatest power--the power to choose and choose wisely--exists within their own minds" then they could really live "the way they may have dreamed of living."
