Fred Baggott of Forsyth received a \$1,600 forestry scholarship. Susan Craft of Duplin won a \$1,000 scholarship in the safety program.

Winners of \$700 scholarships and their programs were Adrian Gaskins, Craven, health; Julia Lynne Snyder, Forsyth, horse; Robin Kinton, Harnett, food-nutrition; Neal Grose, Iredell, dairy; and Lynne Yow, Randolph, bread.

David Palmer of Haywood County received a \$600 scholarship in the achievement program, and Danny Moore of Caldwell won a \$600 scholarship from the Alpha Gamma Rho Educational Foundation.

Dr. Gerald M. Bolick of Caldwell was sited as one of eight national 4-H alumni winners.

Some 400 persons from 35 states attended the Horticultural Meeting, including a delegation of 35 North Carolinians.

DEVELOPMENT FUND

Twelve 1974 Tar Heel high school graduates have been awarded \$500 scholarships through the North Carolina 4-H Development Fund.

Recipients were announced by Wayne A. Corpening, senior vice president of Wachovia Bank and Trust Co., Winston-Salem, and president of the fund.

Corpening pointed out that this year's 12 grants of \$500 each bring the total amount to \$78,000 that the fund has awarded outstanding 4-H members in the state during the last 13 years.

The 4-H Development Fund, with headquarters at North Carolina State University at Raleigh, was organized in 1958 by friends and alumni of 4-H to help support certain phases of the youth program. The 4-H program is conducted by NCSU through the N. C. Agricultural Extension Service which has an office in each county.

The winners were selected on the basis of their high school records, evidence of college aptitude and 4-H records. The scholarships are to be used for college study during the 1974-75 school year.

INTERNATIONAL DELEGATE

Melanie McKinney, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Earl McKinney, Rt. 2, Salisbury, was one of eight U.S. delegates to the Canadian National 4-H Conference, Nov. 10-14.
