HONOR CLUB INDUCTION HIGHLIGHTS FIRST CONGRESS SESSION

Frank Cherry, president of the North Carolina State 4-H Honor Club will preside at ceremonies tonight "tapping" new members into the nearly 1,000 member organization.

The traditionally colorful candlelight ceremony represents a reward to 4-H club members for outstanding service to 4-H work. The 4-H'ers are judged on their leadership abilities, moral standards, 4-H activities, and project achievement.

Selection is made after careful study by the Honor Club members. The tapping is a distinction reserved for less than onehalf of one per cent of the State's 4-H members.

Other officers of the State 4-H Honor Club include Gwen White, vice-president, Jane Hamrick, secretary, Rebecca Byrd, treasurer, and Bob Hilton, historian.

STATE PROJECT WINNERS NAMED

Forty-four North Carolina 4-H members have been selected as state winners on the basis of long time project records.

The 1975 state project winners were announced by Dr. Chester Black, state 4-H leader at North Carolina State University. "These 44 winners represent the boys and girls who will be rewarded for their project work this year," he reported.

"The 4-H'ers are being rewarded for their project achievement, but they have also demonstrated superior leadership responsibility," Black said.

Some 25 of the 44 winners receive expense-paid trips to National 4-H Congress in Chicago in November. The others receive such awards as savings bonds and cash.

Most state winners will place their project records in competition with others from all over the United States for \$800 educational scholarships and other awards.

Recipients were announced by H. Dail Holderness of Tarboro, president of the fund.


Holderness pointed out that this year's 12 grants of \$500 each bring the total amount to \$84,000 that the fund has awarded outstanding 4-H members in the state during the last 14 years.

The winners were selected on the basis of their high school records, evidence of college aptitude, and 4-H records. The scholarships are to be used for college study during the 1975-76 year.
