Highlighting Tuesday evening's activities was the announcement of the '75 Health winners.


Michael Ritter, Moore, and Jennifer Cross, Rockingham, were named king and queen of health during the health program held at Scott Pavillion.

4-H GIFT TO ADD ANIMALS TO STATE ZOO

North Carolina 4-H'ers ended a yearlong fund raising drive for the North Carolina Zoological Park near Asheboro today with the presentation of a check for \$10,125 to zoo director William Hoff.

The presentation was made by State 4-H president Chris Heavner on the third day of the 1975 North Carolina 4-H Congress.

The 4-H'ers ask that the money be used to buy a pair of oryxes for the zoo. The oryxes--a type of antelope---were selected during a meeting Monday afternoon.

The zoo fund-raising drive was launched in July, 1974, as a service project. The initial goal was \$8,000.
