BRIEF SUMMARY OF 4-H CLUB ACTIVITIES AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

There is a total of 767 4-H and Y. M. W. Clubs organized for Negro boys and girls with a total enrollment of 45,223 club members. These club members are assisted by 4,705 voluntary local leaders. This represents 29,032 farm and non-farm homes in 48 counties. As a requirement for 4-H Club membership, each boy and girl must conduct a farm or home project covering some of the activities and enterprises that fit into the farm and home plan of the individual family. Last year 33,598 of these club members carried such projects which included poultry, corn production, home gardens, dairying, home beautification, food preparation, food conservation, health and first aid, etc.

Four-H work helps develop specific skills of boys and girls, and this is done through judging teams, demonstration teams, music appreciation, recreation, etc., in terms of community development. Last year 14,000 club members participated in fire and accident prevention; 21,000 carried health projects, and approximately 20,000 had health examinations as a part of their 4-H Club program. Four-H Club members as a means of developing leadership, participate in the State Camping Program, attend State 4-H Short Course at A. and T. College, and they are represented in the Regional 4-H Camp for 4-H Club members in the Southeastern States.
