What Home Demonstration Club Work Means To Me

To tell what Home Demonstration club work has meant to me would be to just about tell the story of my life. Of course, before we had a club, I had already been reared in a Christian home, had been to high school and college, had married a wonderful man, and had one of my three (I think) lovely daughters. But, there are always voids in one's life, no matter how contented or happy she may be. Home Demonstration club work has completely filled mine. Now, don't misunderstand me—it is not first in my life—although it runs a close third—after my church and my family. But, we should not make a com-

parison like that for Home Demonstration work intertwines all of our life. For one thing, it has helped to make me a better leader in my church. The leadership training which I have received has, I suppose, meant more to me than anything else. It has helped to open my mouth. Some people may not understand what I mean by that, but I'm sure there are many timid souls, as I have always been, who would like to be able to say something!

I just must mention our music program, as this is my pet. For many years, this jiggy (I don't know what else to call it) type of music has been seeping into our country churches. Our country people were considered ignorant. We Home Demonstration Clubbers knew we weren't ignorant and we were determined to do something about it. We started a music program in 1950 to get before the country people better types of music. I was happy to be a part of a rural church music school in my county.

Home Demonstration club women all over the state give—give to UNESCO, give to UNICEF and other charitable causes, but we give to our own women too. We have a delegates fund with which women are sent to all National and International meetings. I have been privileged to attend two National meetings, one in Mississippi and one when the National Council met in Raleigh. Now I am about to embark on a great venture for Home Demonstration work, one which may take me around the world. I am a delegate to the A. C. W. W. Triennial conference to be held in Ceylon in July. Wish the other delegates and me Godspeed and pray that we may bring back to our state much information that will be helpful as we continue to march forward in Home Demonstration work in North Carolina.

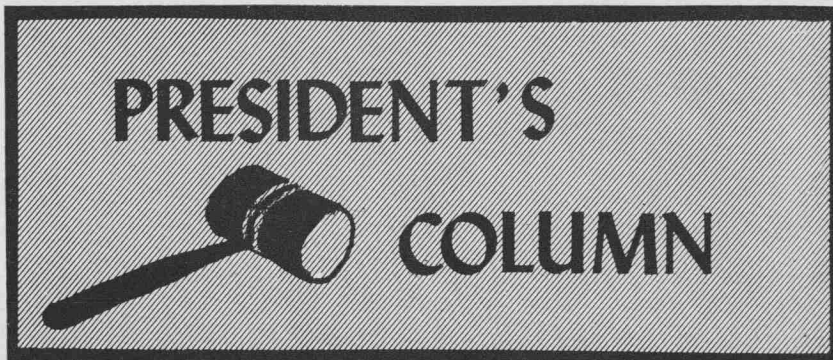

Family Life Forum

Sixty-five parents attended a Family Life Forum at Midway Church, Rockingham County, on April 10. Dr. Irvin Sperry discussed informally "What the Typical Children are Like, Why and What they are getting into."

A Peanut Story

In cooperation with the Roanoke Rapids Chamber of Commerce, Mrs. W. T. Eure of Halifax arranged a window display on Peanuts the week of April 1. The theme, "From The Fields Of Halifax County To The Shores of Tripoli," was suggested by Mrs. Estelle White, Home Agent. The purpose of the display was to show how a Home Demonstration Hobby developed into a Home Industry.

Mrs. Eure covered the life-span of the peanut in the display; from the shock to the cans and bags in which she markets the salted peanuts.

It all started about 30 years ago, the first year of her membership in Home Demonstration Clubs. Mrs. Eure says, "A man came in the Halifax Drug Store and I happened to hear him ask the boy behind the counter for a bag of peanuts." There just were none. When he left I said; "Well, I suppose I'll have to start putting up some of my own peanuts so that folks coming through can get them when they want them."

In 1927 Mrs. Eure's first toasted peanuts were put into bags and sold in local stores around Halifax, Weldon and Roanoke Rapids. Mrs. Eure's kitchen was an assembly line where she blanched them, roasted them in deep fat, and put them in bags.

She really went into full production in World War II. Local boys in service overseas wrote home for some of her peanuts. Miss Florence Cox, who was then Halifax County Home Agent, assisted Mrs. Eure in securing cans for shipment overseas and in that way Mrs. Eure's reputation literally circled the Globe.

Mrs. Eure sent her nuts to almost



every European Country. She has regular customers in Alaska, Washington, New York, Ohio, Florida, and South Carolina, to say nothing of the resort hotels and country clubs which serve her home-toasted nuts.

Once a week she spends a day in her kitchen with two colored women toasting and packaging peanuts. She always puts them up once a week to guarantee freshness.

When asked if she did all the frying herself, Mrs. Eure laughed and said, "Oh yes, I don't let anyone else fry the peanuts, not even my husband."

Mr. Eure assists his wife in packing the nuts, and then he goes with

her on a Monday or Tuesday to make deliveries to the local stores and restaurants in Scotland Neck, Enfield, Weldon, Roanoke Rapids and Halifax.

Many people have approached Mrs. Eure wanting to "buy into" her business. "They wanted to make it a real big thing," she explained; "bring in new equipment and lots of help. Nuts prepared that way just wouldn't be home salted and that is what gave me my reputation."

She said that the helpful advice and cooperation given her by the Home Demonstration Agents of Halifax County through the years, has been a tremendous assist to her in her work.

Rivermont Home Club Equips Playground And Picnic Area

The Rivermont home demonstration club in Lenoir County realized a growing need in their community, and decided that they'd do something about it. It's a closely settled community with a great number of children, who had no place to play safely.

About a year ago, plans were begun to equip a playground and the project brought much enthusiasm to the community. Since that time, reports Mrs. Ralph Holland, president of the Home demonstration club, the club, with the help of other community women, raised \$625 for equipment.

The equipment is as strong and sturdy as any equipment on any public playground. It is all permanently set in concrete and a six-foot fence borders the front, protecting the children from the highway traffic.

For the little tots, there are two large sand boxes with seats. For those a little older, there are six large swings, and four see-saws. The older children enjoy a baseball diamond complete with a 16-foot backdrop. In addition, there's a football practice goal, a volleyball court, and a basketball goal.

For the whole family's enjoyment, there's a picnic area at the back of the playground. Here there is a large fireplace with a complete oven, a rack for a large pot used for fish fries and one for a coffee pot.

Four large tables with benches and complete lighting for the area complete the picture.

The women didn't stop here, however. As well as wanting the playground well-equipped, they wanted to make it beautiful, too. The club has landscaped the grounds by planting trees and various shrubs. These have been added to the borders of the grounds to add beauty without interfering with the play.

Future plans include a slide, vertical bars, marble circles, benches and many smaller games. They are also hoping for periods of supervised play in the not too distant future.
