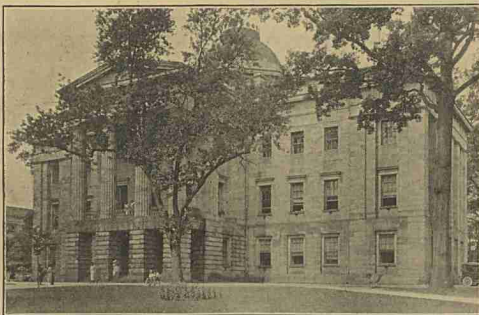

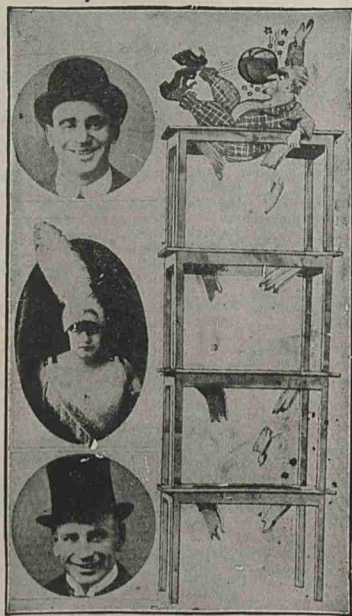

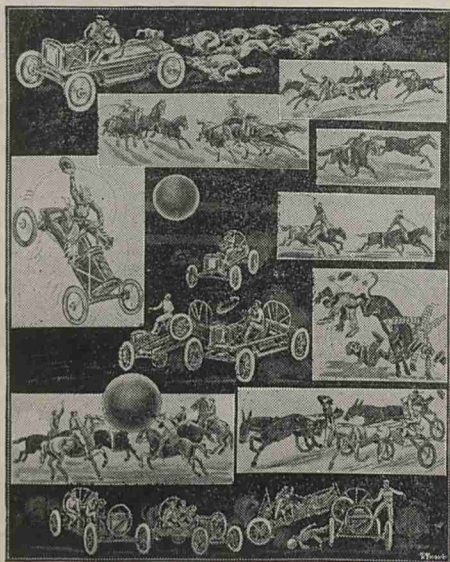

CHARTER AND BY-LAWS
of the
NORTH CAROLINA AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY

Organized 1852

Charter Amended 1921 and 1925

Chapter 109, Private Laws Extra Session 1921, being an Act to Amend Article 21, Part 1, Chapter 84, Consolidated Statutes of North Carolina, and Chapter 349, Private Laws of North Carolina of 1913, relating to Charter of North Carolina Agricultural Society, and Chapter ——— Public Laws 1925, amending Section 4937 of the Consolidated Statutes.

The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:

Incorporation

The North Carolina Agricultural Society, as organized by a voluntary association on the eighth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, at the City of Raleigh, shall be incorporated under the name and style of The North Carolina Agricultural Society, and may take and hold real and personal estate: Provided, however, that, upon a dissolution of said corporation, for any cause, all of its property, real or personal, after applying so much thereof as may be required to pay its debts and obligations, shall escheat to the State of North Carolina, except such property rights as may belong to the City of Raleigh, for the purposes hereinafter specified.

Officers: Election and Term

Such corporation shall have a board of directors, which shall consist of seventeen members, five of whom shall be ex-officio as follows: The Governor of North Carolina, the president of the North Carolina State College of Agriculture and Engineering, the Commissioner of Agriculture, the Mayor of the City of Raleigh, and the president of the North Carolina Agricultural Society; the remaining members of the board of directors shall be appointed as follows: two by the Governor of North Carolina; two by the president of the North Carolina State College of Agriculture and Engineering; two by the Commissioner of Agriculture; four by the members of the North Carolina Agricultural Society, and two by the Mayor of the City of Raleigh. The directors shall hold office for one year and until their successors are elected and qualified, and shall have the usual powers with reference to the affairs of the society as do directors of other corporations, and shall elect officers of the society in such manner as the by-laws of the society may prescribe.

By-Laws

The corporation shall have power to make by-laws and regulations consistent with this chapter and the laws of the State, for its own government and for the due and orderly conduct and management of its affairs; and to rescind, alter, or modify any of the rules, articles of association, by-laws or ordinances which existed before such society was incorporated by the General Assembly, to the end that it may improve its organization and be empowered to adapt its operations to the great and useful purposes of its institution.

Annual Fairs to Be Held

It shall be the duty of the corporation to provide a place for the holding of annual fairs, in order that the citizens may be encouraged by exhibitions, premiums, and other means to develop and improve the production of agriculture, and every species of native industry; and to this end, and for these great and valuable purposes, and to no other, shall the corporation apply all the funds which by any means it may acquire.

Appropriation From State: Payment

1. It shall be the duty of the State Treasurer to pay to the treasurer of the corporation, on the first Monday of October during each year, out of any moneys not otherwise appropriated, the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars, to be disposed of in the payment of premiums, as hereinafter directed: Provided, the treasurer of the corporation shall first produce a certificate from the president thereof showing that during the past twelve months the like sum has been raised by the corporation for the same purposes, and actually paid out for premiums, as provided in this section.

2. Or the corporation shall be paid a sum not to exceed twenty-five hundred dollars, equal to the sum raised and paid out by it for such premiums.

3. Unless all games of chance shall be excluded from the grounds of the corporation the appropriation hereby made shall not be paid to it as herein directed.

4. The money hereby appropriated shall be applied, under the direction of the corporation, to the payment of premiums upon agricultural productions, implements of husbandry, and domestic animals, and to such other purposes as may, in the judgment of the corporation, be calculated to advance the interest of agriculture and manufactures.

That, in addition to the powers granted in Article 21, of Chapter 84, of the Consolidated Statutes, the said North Carolina Agricultural Society shall have the power, through its governing body, to borrow money and make and issue its promissory notes, bills of exchange, bonds, and evidences of indebtedness for the purposes of said society, and to secure the payment of the same by deed of trust, mortgage, pledge, or otherwise upon its property, real and personal; should it be deemed necessary by the governing body of said society, for the purposes of said society and the furtherance of the objects thereof, and all such bonds, and all interest or income therefrom, shall be exempt from taxation in the hands of the holder thereof. Said North Carolina Agricultural Society may, under that name, sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded in the courts, may purchase, hold, accept, and convey real and personal property; may have and use a common seal, and do all other things necessary or convenient for carrying forward the business and affairs of the society not inconsistent with the laws of the State.

Said society shall, in addition to all the powers heretofore enumerated, have the right and power, and it shall be its duty, to encourage and promote agriculture, domestic science, domestic manufactures, stock raising, poultry raising, mechanics, arts and crafts, and any and all other things conducive to the improvement and development of the State, and use any moneys it has at its disposal to promote, foster and encourage all such matters and things as to the governing body of said society may seem proper and conducive to the accomplishment of the objects of said society.

The membership of said society shall consist of such persons as may have heretofore been duly elected and qualified as life members thereof, and such other persons as may be elected to membership and qualify by the payment to the society of such dues as may be fixed by the society: Provided, however, that, except in cases of life members, any person ceasing to pay such dues shall cease to be a member of said society.

Any county, city or town may appropriate such moneys as may be deemed advisable by the governing authorities of such county, city or town, to aid and co-operate in the objects of said society.

That such portions of Chapter 349 of the Private Laws of 1913 as are in conflict with this act are herewith repealed.

That this act shall be in force from and after its ratification.

BY-LAWS

North Carolina Agricultural Society

Article 1.—Officers

Section 1. *Election and Term.* The Board of Directors shall annually elect a President, four Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a Secretary, a Business Manager and Superintendent of the State Fair and such other officers as may be necessary, all of whom shall hold their offices until their successors are elected and qualified.

All ex-Presidents shall become honorary Vice-Presidents of the Society.

Section 2. *Board of Directors.* The Board of Directors shall be composed of seventeen members selected as is required by the Amendment to Section 4937 of the Consolidated Statutes of North Carolina, and shall meet annually on the third Thursday in January for the purpose of electing officers of the Society and for such other business as may come before said Board. The Board of Directors shall meet at other times upon the call of the President.

Section 3. *Executive Committee.* The Executive Committee or governing body of the Society, consisting of not less than five nor more than nine, shall be appointed by the President from the Board of Directors, of which the President shall be ex-officio chairman, and shall have general supervision of all of the work of the Society and carry out all instructions of the Society and the Board of Directors. The Executive Committee shall be appointed for one year and shall hold office until their successors are appointed and qualified.

Article 2.—Duties of Officers

Section 1. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Society and of the Board of Directors, and shall be the executive head of the Society. In the absence of the President, the Vice-Presidents shall preside according to numerical order.

Section 2. The Secretary shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Society and of its Board of Directors and Executive Committee and shall do such other work as is customary to be done by such an officer.

Section 3. The Treasurer shall receive all moneys and deposit same in the name of the Society. He shall invest all funds not needed for current disbursements and improvements to the State Fair Grounds as shall be ordered by the Executive Committee. He shall make an annual report and such other reports as may be prescribed by the Board of Directors. The Treasurer shall give bond in such sum as may be prescribed by the Executive Committee, conditioned for the proper accounting of all money coming into his hands and the faithful performance of his duties. The security on said bond shall be approved by the Executive Committee, and any premiums to be paid to any security company which may sign said bond shall be paid by the Society. The funds shall be deposited in such bank or banks in the City of Raleigh as may be designated by the Executive Committee, and such funds shall be drawn out in such manner as may be prescribed by the Executive Committee.

Section 4. The Board of Directors shall manage the affairs of the Society in conformity to the laws under which the Society is organized and the provisions of its charter. It shall direct the investment and care of the funds of the Society; make appropriations for specific purposes; take such measures to advance the interests of the Society as it may deem advisable; appoint any and all employees that it may deem necessary to carry on the work of the Society, in addition to those definitely authorized by the charter and by-laws, and fix their term of office and compensation; shall fix the salaries and prescribe the duties of the officers, as well as the employees of the Society; prescribe the duties of all employees not inconsistent with the charter and by-laws; shall have the power to fix the price of admission to the fairs; fix the price for space occupied by the exhibits;

arrange for dates of fairs; determine hours for opening and closing of same, and do any and all things which it considers necessary to conduct the State Fair in the best interests of the Society; and shall provide such rules and regulations for the government of the fair as it may deem best; and, generally, manage and direct the affairs of the Society. Such powers as are herein authorized to the Board of Directors may be delegated by it to the Executive Committee.

Section 5. The issuance of passes to the fairs held by the Society shall be controlled by the Executive Committee, and no passes shall be issued except as authorized by said committee.

Article 3.—Membership

Section 1. Membership in the Society shall consist of persons who have paid a membership fee of \$50.00 and of all present life members.

Section 2. Membership shall be terminated by written resignation.

Section 3. Members shall be entitled to two free admissions to all fairs held by the Society; of the two admissions issued to members, one shall be made out in the name of the member and one in blank.

Article 4.—Meetings

Section 1. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held in Raleigh on the third Thursday in January.

Section 2. Special meetings of the Society may be called at any time during the year that the President or the Executive Committee may deem proper; Provided that ten days' notice of such meeting shall be mailed to the members. A majority of those present at any meeting of the Society shall constitute a quorum.

Section 3. The Board of Directors or the Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the President; and at the request of a majority of the members of the Board or Executive Committee, the Secretary shall call a meeting, giving the notice thereof to the President. A majority of those present at any meeting of the Society or of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum. Four shall constitute a quorum of the Executive Committee.

Article 5.—Local and County Sections

Section 1. Local sections of the Agricultural Society, representing two or more counties, may be organized upon petition of ten members in good standing of the Society, and the approval of the Board of Directors of the Society.

Section 2. County sections of the Agricultural Society may be organized upon petition of five members of the Society in good standing, with the approval of the Board of Directors of the Society.

Section 3. County and local sections shall have the power to form their own constitution and by-laws, not to conflict with the charter and by-laws of the Society.

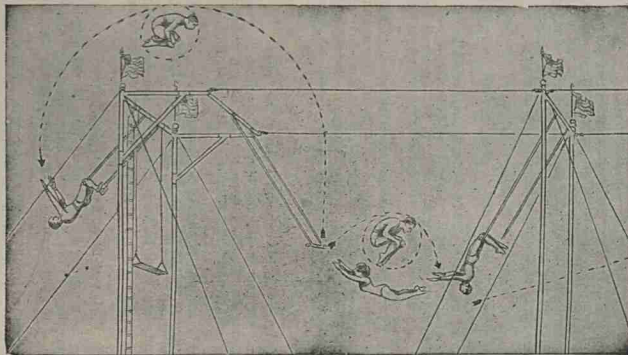
Article 6.—Amendments

These laws may be amended by two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular meeting of the Society or any regularly called meeting, when the purpose of the meeting to amend the by-laws is stated.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The North Carolina State Fair is a member of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, and its rules are a part of the rules of this Fair. In case of any conflict the rules of this Fair will take precedence.

Special Days

The Sixty-fourth Annual North Carolina State Fair opens to the public Tuesday, October 13, 1925, at 8 o'clock a. m., and closes Saturday, October 17, at 10:30 p. m. The Fair will be open Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights until 10:30 o'clock.

Monday, October 12th, is Preparation Day. All exhibits must be ready for exhibition by 6:00 o'clock p. m.

There will be special attractions for each day of the Fair, announcement of which will be made later through the press and the official program.

Automobiles will be parked by competent and reliable attendants in the employ of the Fair.

No money shall be accepted by the gatemen. Admission will be by ticket only.

Bureau of Information

A Bureau of Information will be maintained by the Chamber of Commerce at their rooms in the Capital Building, 14 W. Martin Street, and also on the State Fair Grounds.

Telephones

The Southern Bell Telephone Company will maintain service on the grounds. Toll pay stations will be located at convenient points.

Telegraph

The Western Union and Postal Telegraph Companies will maintain offices in the central part of the Floral Building.

Express

The express companies of Raleigh will maintain offices on the grounds a few days prior to and during the week of the Fair.

Postoffice

A substation of the Raleigh postoffice will be located on the State Fair Grounds. The office will receive and distribute mail, sell stamps, postal cards and money orders.

Press Bureau

A press bureau and newspaper headquarters will be centrally located, with an experienced newspaper man in charge.

Copies of reports of awards will be furnished the press, as well as special orders and announcements, official decisions, and other items of news value.

Visiting newspaper and magazine men are invited to make this bureau their headquarters.

Children's Nursery

Mothers with small children will find rest rooms on the grounds. Competent nurses will be in charge, with whom mothers can leave their babies and small children, free of charge.

Emergency Hospital

An emergency hospital will be maintained throughout the Fair, in charge of skilled physicians and nurses. Patients must pay the physician for services rendered.

Check Room

A check tent will be provided where patrons may check wraps, baskets, parcels, etc. Competent attendants will be in charge.

Transportation

Exhibits shipped by freight should be billed as follows: "For exhibit, State Fair Grounds, Raleigh, care of Seaboard Air Line." Exhibits so billed will be delivered to the grounds.

Two dollars and fifty cents is the charge for switching cars from Raleigh to the Fair Grounds if billed over a noncompetitive line.

Exhibits shipped over the Seaboard Air Line or any competitive line will reach the grounds without extra switching charge.

The tariff rules, governing the shipment of articles for exhibition at expositions and fairs, provide for a free return of such exhibits when accompanied by a certificate from the manager of the Fair, certifying that such shipment was on exhibition and the ownership of same was not changed. Intending exhibitors should consult their local agent for particulars governing Fair shipments, as some kinds of exhibits are not returned free, and other conditions enter in if shipment is not returned direct. If your agent is unable to give you full particulars, write the management of the State Fair.

The management will consider it a kindness if mistreatment or extortion practiced by an employee of the Fair or concessionaire is reported at once. Do not wait until the Fair is over to make complaint; report immediately.

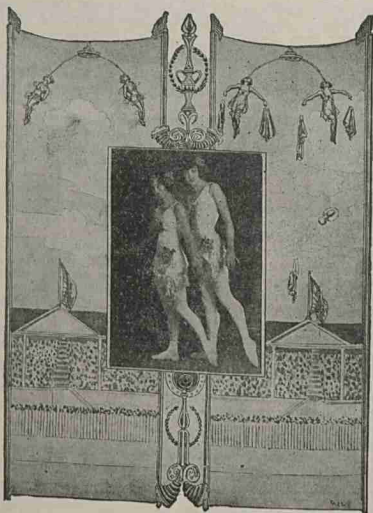

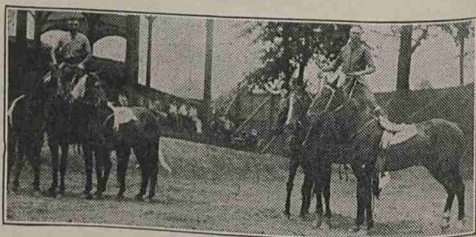

RULES GOVERNING ENTRIES, EXHIBITS AND AWARDS

General

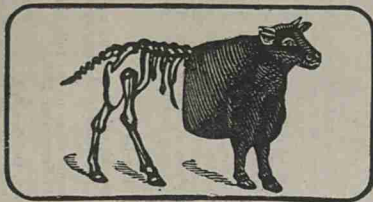
1. The Executive Committee of the North Carolina Agricultural Society reserves the right to rule on all questions not covered by these rules. Interpretations of all rules will be made by the above said Executive Committee.
2. In the event of conflict between the general rules and the special rules governing the various departments, the special rules will take precedence.
3. Disregard of any rule or misrepresentation by exhibitor or concessionaire forfeits all premiums, rights and privileges without recourse.
4. The management will use diligence to insure the safety of livestock and articles entered for exhibition or display after their arrival on the grounds, but under no circumstances will it be responsible for loss, injury, or damage by fire, lightning, wind or any other agency, to such livestock or article on exhibition or display. The Fair and management thereof shall be indemnified by the exhibitor against all legal or other proceedings relating thereto.
5. Exhibitors must place all exhibits under the direction of the superintendent in charge, and in no case can they be removed until the close of the Fair, except by written order of the manager. All animals in the horse and cattle classes will be expected to participate in the livestock parade on the race track at 1 o'clock Thursday. Every exhibitor in these classes will be required to have all his entries in this parade.
Neglect or refusal on the part of any exhibitor to promptly comply with the call of the superintendent will forfeit all or such portion of the prizes awarded him as the management of the Fair may see fit to withhold.
6. Promiscuous advertising is strictly prohibited. Exhibitors may advertise and distribute from their places of exhibit only. The distribution of advertising matter that conflicts in any manner with a concession sold by the management is prohibited.

Entries

1. Competition is open to the world, unless specially noted.
2. Entries will be received at the office of the manager any time after September the first.
Entries in the various departments close on the following dates:
Livestock and Poultry, Monday, September 28th.
Speed, Tuesday, October 6th.
All other departments, Saturday, October 3rd.
In order to have the records ready for the judges, it is important that entries in all the departments be made at the time designated above. *No entries will be received the few days preceding the Fair.*
3. Entries in all departments must be made on printed forms provided by the manager for that purpose, and must be in full compliance with the printed instructions on same. These forms are mailed with copies of the Premium List. Exhibitors should study the list carefully, and when decision has been made in which classes to enter, they should fill out the entry blank with class number and name as they appear in the Premium Book.
If you are in doubt as to how to make your entries, write the manager, and instructions will be furnished.
Entries must be made at the office of the manager, in person or by mail. Remember that articles must be entered before being sent in for exhibit. No entries will be taken at the time of the Fair, unless there has been some mistake in copying the original entry, in which case correction can be made only in the office of the manager.
If records are altered and do not conform with the entries on file, payment of premiums will be withheld.
The right is reserved to reject any entry offered.

4. All entries must be made in the name of the bona fide owner. In order that a permanent record be on file, it is essential that the name and record number or record number and ear-tag number be given of all animals entered. Entries will not be accepted unless this information is furnished at time of making entry. All animals in the horse and cattle classes over 6 months old, and in the swine and sheep classes over 3 months old, must be recorded and appear in the name of the exhibitor on the records of their respective associations. In the case of young animals the date of birth and name and record number of sire and dam must be given.

5. Misrepresentation as to breeding and irregularity in showing will be exposed, and any premium won by such exhibitor will be withheld.

6. A firm, to be entitled to exhibit as such, must have been organized for a time not less than thirty days next preceding the closing of entries, and such firm must be organized as a bona fide firm for the purpose of producing or buying and selling the animals or articles they propose to exhibit in the name of such firm. A firm will be regarded as one exhibitor.

7. Incomplete entries will be returned for correction if there is time to do so. Exhibitors are urged to enter early and to use great care in filling out entry blanks, being particular to give all the information requested on the blanks, in clear terms, easily understood. This will save work and annoyance for both exhibitors and management.

8. All exhibits must be in place by 6 o'clock p. m. Monday, October 12th. Grounds will be open to receive exhibits one week before the Fair opens.

9. Collections and displays must be made up of specimens other than those entered in single classes.

10. All livestock on exhibition must be cared for by the exhibitor. All stalls and pens will be well bedded before the Fair, free of charge. Thereafter exhibitors will be required to furnish their own bedding. Feed and straw will be on sale on the grounds at reasonable prices.

11. All articles and livestock must be delivered to the grounds. No charge for transportation, express, freight or drayage will be paid by the Fair.

12. No free tickets will be furnished exhibitors or helpers.

Exhibitors entering for premiums amounting to \$10.00 or less, or exhibitors paying an entry fee, as in the Poultry Department, will not be required to pay an exhibitor's fee.

If the total of all premiums which can be won amounts to more than \$10.00, an exhibitor's fee of \$2.00 will be required, and it must accompany the entries. For this fee an exhibitor's admission ticket will be issued, good for the entire week, with the privilege of entering the grounds with an automobile, when the license number of the machine appears on the ticket.

13. Only one person will be admitted to the grounds on the ticket that entitles the exhibitor or firm to compete, a firm being regarded as one exhibitor, and in no case will such ticket be transferable. Exhibitors must purchase necessary helper's tickets from the manager, at \$1.00 each. No exhibitor's tickets will be mailed from the manager's office after Monday, October 5th.

14. Exhibitors will find their entry cards and exhibitor's tickets ready for them at the office of the manager on the Fair Grounds on and after Thursday, October 8th, 1925, unless same has been ordered delivered by mail.

Fees

1. All applications for stalls and pens must be noted on entry blank at time of filing. Exhibitors must indicate on the blank the number of animals or birds they will exhibit. This request is important, that ample provision may be made to properly house the exhibit.

2. Reservations will not be made unless accompanied by the required fee. Assignments will be made by the superintendent in charge.

3. The following fees will govern, and remittance covering same should accompany entry:

2. No unworthy animal or exhibit will be awarded a premium.

4. Premiums in the Horse, Cattle, Swine, and Sheep departments will be paid at the office of the manager on the grounds, Friday, October 16th. Premiums in all the other departments will be paid as soon as possible after the close of the Fair.

Release

1. Speed horses are automatically released when their racing engagements are concluded.
2. All livestock will be released at 5 o'clock p. m. Friday, October 16th.
3. Exhibits in the Agricultural and Horticultural departments may be sold and removed after 2:30 o'clock p. m. Saturday, October 17th.
4. All other exhibits will be released at 4 o'clock p. m. Saturday, October 17th.
5. All exhibits are under the direct supervision of the superintendents in charge, and are on exhibition as a part of the Fair's attractions.

It is agreed by the exhibitors in making their entries that they will comply with the rules of the State Fair. The superintendents must see that all exhibits are in place until time for removal, as designated above, unless for special reasons, when it will be necessary to have a written order from the manager.

Protests and Appeals

1. Protests must be made in writing and filed with the manager by noon of day following award, accompanied by a protest fee of \$5.00, which will be retained by the North Carolina Agricultural Society if protest is not sustained.
2. All protests will be considered at a time set by the president of the North Carolina Agricultural Society, and all parties interested will be notified.
3. The North Carolina State Fair has adopted the rules of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions governing appeals.

Concessions and Privileges

1. Purchasers of space and each concessionaire will receive one season coupon ticket free.

This ticket is good for the week, with privilege of entering the grounds with an automobile, when the license number of the machine appears on the ticket.

No free tickets will be furnished to helpers, but employees must secure season helper's tickets, at \$1.00 each.

2. Concessionaires are bound by the terms of the contracts they sign at the time of securing concessions. In addition, they are liable to strict supervision by the management. The right is reserved to promulgate and enforce whatever rules appear necessary for the regulation of concessions.

3. The abuse of any privilege granted, by extortion, impure or unwholesome food, sale of dishonest goods, untidy appearance of booths, or other acts or practices objectionable to the North Carolina Agricultural Society will forfeit all rights and privileges without recourse.

4. The sale of alcoholic liquors, and games of chance, are strictly prohibited. Any violation of this rule will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law.

Newspaper Solicitors

1. No concession, booth or privilege will be granted to newspaper solicitors, except on written request of the publishers or manager, mailed to the manager ten days prior to the opening of the Fair. This request must contain name of publication, privilege desired, and names of persons, who have been continuously employed for a period of three months preceding date of application, authorized as solicitors.

2. Solicitors must be gentlemanly, courteous, and honest in dealing with the public, and are absolutely prohibited from influencing subscriptions by the issue of tickets for future drawing of gifts, or by the giving away of merchandise, livestock or articles of any kind whatsoever. All subscription sales must be made strictly upon the merits of the publication.

3. All solicitors must purchase season tickets, good for entire week.

4. Solicitors in soliciting subscriptions shall confine their operations to the space or booth assigned them by the management of the Fair.

Livestock Inspection

The Veterinary Division, State Department of Agriculture, will gladly co-operate with all livestock exhibitors in giving information and advice in regard to the requirements for entries at the State Fair.

Arrangements will also be made to assist exhibitors in preparing the necessary certificates, in accordance with State and Federal regulations, when shipping from the State Fair.

Owners desiring to exhibit livestock should read carefully the health regulations appearing under the various livestock departments. These are made for the protection of your livestock, and they must be complied with.

A temporary office will be maintained in a booth near the livestock buildings for the convenience of exhibitors.

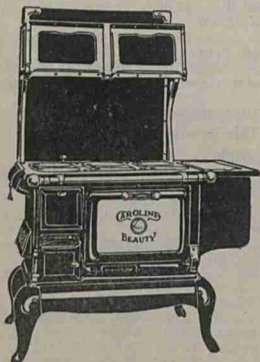

Health Rules

All cattle, regardless of age, must be accompanied by a health certificate and tuberculin test chart issued by a qualified veterinarian and approved by the State Veterinarian. The certificate and test chart must accompany the cattle, and they will not be permitted to enter the barns until the certificate and test chart is submitted to the Superintendent or his authorized representative.

The tuberculin test must have been applied within a reasonable time preceding the opening date of the Fair. The right is reserved to reject an entry or to remove same after entered, should our veterinarian find the animal is affected with a communicable disease.

Full information concerning the above may be secured by addressing the State Veterinarian, Raleigh, N. C.

Special Rules

All females thirty-six months of age, must have produced a living calf, and entries must be accompanied by affidavits of date of birth of last calf, or give satisfactory evidence of being in calf.

Any bull, thirty-six months old or over on the first day of September of year in which shown that has not had dropped to his service during the twelve months preceding said date one or more living calves, will not be eligible to the show.

All applications for entry of cattle must be accompanied by the name of the breeder, name, number, age and date of birth, and name and number of sire and dam of the animal to be exhibited.

All animals exhibited in this department must be recorded with their respective associations.

All animals entered for exhibition must be in place not later than 6:00 o'clock p. m. Monday, October 12, 1925.

Exhibitors will be required to have blankets removed from all exhibits between the hours of 9:00 a. m. and 4:00 p. m. each day of the Fair.

When on exhibition in the ring, each animal must be under halter and in charge of owner or employee.

Only first premium animals in individual classes will be eligible to compete for championships.

The superintendent or ring clerk shall obtain names and record numbers of all animals composing herds and groups, where regularly entered or substituted, that such data may be included in report of awards.

When an award is made, special attention should be given to see that same is correctly entered in the award book.

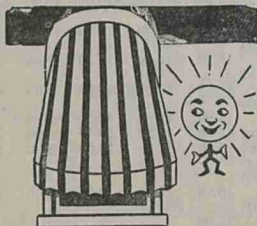

A senior yearling is one dropped between August 1, 1923 and February 1, 1924.

A junior yearling is one dropped between February 1, 1924 and August 1, 1924.

A senior calf is one dropped between August 1, 1924 and February 1, 1925.

A junior calf is one dropped since February 1, 1925.

Graded Herd shall consist of one bull, 2 years old or over; one cow, 3 years old or over; one heifer, 2 years old and under 3; one yearling heifer, and one senior heifer calf.

Yearling Herd shall consist of one bull, 1 year old and under 2, and two yearling heifers. Females must be bred by exhibitor.

Calf Herd shall consist of one bull and two heifers, all under 1 year old and all bred by exhibitor.

Get of Sire shall consist of four animals, any age, the get of one sire. Get need not be owned by exhibitor.

Produce of cow shall consist of two animals, any age, the produce of one cow.

The ages of all animals in two-year-old class and those older, as well as senior yearlings and senior calves, shall be computed to August 1st, while the ages of juniors will be computed to February 1st. Cows 36 months old or over on August 1st of year in which shown, to be eligible to the show, must have produced a calf carried to maturity within 18 months preceding said date. Any bull 36 months old or over on first day of August of year in which shown, that has not had dropped to his service one or more living calves during the 12 months preceding said date, will not be eligible to the show.

All cows in the Dairy Breeds, to be judged in the morning, shall be milked at 6:00 o'clock p. m. on the day previous to being judged. Dairy cows to be judged in the afternoon shall be milked at 6:00 o'clock a. m. of the same day. The judge may, at his option, require any cow to be milked while in the ring or before the awards are made.

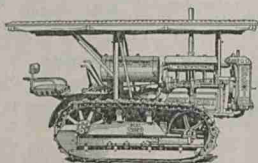

The Holstein-Friesian Association of America, F. L. Houghton, Secretary, Brattleboro, Vermont, offers to pay twenty-five per cent additional to above premiums in open classification under the following conditions:

First, That all animals must be registered before exhibition, that they also stand on our records in the name of the exhibitor. A transfer of ownership for the purpose of exhibiting will debar an animal and operate against the payment of prizes offered by the Association.

Second, The awards must be placed by one of the official judges of the Association (list enclosed). Judges are instructed to award no prizes except where the animals are strictly first-class and merit the award.

Third, The judge or the superintendent of dairy cattle shall examine the certificates of registry and transfer to see that the provisions of Section 1 have been complied with.

Fourth, The Association's share of the prizes will be paid direct from the Secretary's office and not by the Fair management.

Fifth, All animals over six months old must have been tested for tuberculosis within six months by a duly accredited State or Federal veterinarian. The certificate showing freedom from this disease must be exhibited to the Fair authorities. Grounds and barns must be disinfected in accordance with Federal or State requirements.

Sixth, A report of the awards must be made on a special blank furnished by the Secretary of The Holstein-Friesian Association of America within sixty days of the close of the Fair, otherwise, the awards will not be paid.

A junior yearling is one farrowed between March 1, 1924 and September 1, 1924.

A senior pig is one farrowed between September 1, 1924 and March 1, 1925.

A junior pig is one farrowed since March 1, 1925.

All animals over three months old must be recorded in the name of the exhibitor on the records of their respective associations.

All sows two years old or over, to be eligible to show, must have produced living offspring within twelve months preceding the first of September of year shown; and all boars of like age must have sired pigs born within that time. Affidavit may be required to substantiate the above. The State Fair does not obligate itself to furnish pen room for sale animals unless there is a surplus of pens after all show animals have been provided for.

Boars over one year old must have their tusks removed before showing.

Get of sire shall consist of four swine, any age, the get of one boar.

Produce of dam shall consist of four swine, any age, the produce of one sow.

Breeder's young herd shall consist of one boar and three sows, under one year old, bred and owned by exhibitor.

Exhibitor's herd shall consist of one boar and three sows, over one year old; all owned by exhibitor.

All animals entered for exhibition shall be in place not later than 6:00 o'clock p. m. Monday, October 12.

Section 10 of Regulation No. 3 of the Livestock Sanitary Laws and Regulations of the North Carolina Department of Agriculture is as follows:

"All swine exhibited at any agricultural fair, or other exhibit, within this State, must be accompanied by an affidavit from the owner, certifying that such swine are apparently free from any symptoms of a contagious disease; that they are from premises where no known contagious diseased swine exist, and that they have been properly inoculated with serum alone not less than 7 days, or more than 30 days, or with the serum and virus not less than 30 days immediately prior to being placed on exhibit."

All entries must comply with this section. The right is reserved to reject an entry or to remove same after entered, should our veterinarian find that the animal is affected with a communicable disease.

The superintendent or ring clerk shall obtain names and record numbers of all animals composing herds and groups, where regularly entered or substituted, that such data may be included in report of awards.

When an award is made, special attention should be given to see that same is correctly entered in the award book.

An exhibitor's flock shall consist of one ram, one year old or over; ewe, two years old or over; ewe, one year old and under two; and ewe, under one year old, owned by exhibitor.

A breeder's flock shall consist of one yearling ram, two yearling ewes, and two ewe lambs, bred and owned by exhibitor.

Get of ram shall consist of pen of four lambs under one year, either sex, the get of one sire, bred and owned by exhibitor.

Aged rams and ewes must be two years old or over; yearlings, one year old and under two; lambs, under one year.

All sheep entered must be in an apparently healthy condition. The right is reserved to reject an entry or to remove same after entered should our veterinarian find that the animal is affected with a communicable disease.

The clerk of awards must take special pains after an award is made to properly enter it on the records. It is absolutely necessary that the name of animal, registry number, date of birth and ear tag number be given for all animals awarded prizes.

In case a substitute animal is shown or in case this data were not given and recorded in judge's book at time entries were made, it must be supplied by the clerk. Records of awards must be complete in every detail or premiums will not be paid.

Definitions: Cock, a male specimen hatched prior to 1925; Cockerel, a male specimen hatched within 1925; Hen, a female specimen hatched prior to 1925; Pullet, a female specimen hatched within 1925; pen, one male and four females.

A contract has been closed with Spratt's Patent Limited, Newark, N. J., to coop all shipments entered and exhibited.

RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING OPEN CLASSES

1. Exhibits in this department will be limited to the States of Virginia, North and South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Tennessee and Kentucky; excepting the special classification, which is open to the world.

2. No carload or professional string-man exhibit will be allowed to compete for premiums, except those resident in the States named who are owners and breeders of the birds they exhibit, and maintain a breeding establishment sufficient to raise the birds so exhibited.

NOTE: This rule will not be construed to debar any legitimate number of exhibitors from combining and chartering a car to transport their exhibits if by so doing they can save freight and other expenses, but it will be enforced against those it is intended to debar.

3. All entries must be made with the manager not later than Monday, 6:00 p. m., September 28th, and birds must reach Raleigh not later than 3:00 p. m. Monday, October 12th. Judging will begin promptly at 10:00 a. m. on Tuesday. All birds not in place at that time will be debarred from competition.

4. The American Standard of Perfection (revised edition) will be the guide of the judges in awarding premiums.

5. All birds should be banded.

6. When birds are sent by express, designate the number and variety in each shipping crate.

7. Exhibitors need not accompany their fowls, although a cordial invitation is extended to them to do so. When addressed to Superintendent Poultry Department, State Fair, Raleigh, N. C., with express charges prepaid, they will receive proper attention and be returned to owners at the close of the Fair.

When it is necessary that birds be shipped on Saturday in order to insure their arrival in time for judging, they will be penned and fed on Sunday at the Fair Grounds.

8. Any birds delayed in transit may be admitted at the discretion of the Executive Committee.

9. After the judging, the management will endeavor to place a uniform card on each coop, giving the name and address of the exhibitor and the variety of the poultry shown.

10. Premiums will be paid only to worthy specimens. To win the first premium a bird must score at least 90 points, second premium, 88 points; less than that, third and fourth, even if only one or two birds are shown in a class. Thus, if a single bird is entered in a class and the same scores less than 88 points, third premium only will be awarded.

11. Display premiums, unless otherwise stated, will be decided thus: First Prize to count 6 points. Second Prize, 4 points. Third Prize, 3 points. Fourth Prize, 2 points. Pens to count double. First, 12 points, etc., multiplied by the number of entries in the classes.

For Class No. 1090, County Exhibit, a space 16x24 feet will be assigned.

For Class No. 1091, Live-at-Home Farm Exhibit, a space 16x16 feet will be assigned.

For Class No. 1092, Community Exhibit, a space 16x18 feet will be assigned.

In each of these classes, side walls any height may be built out ten feet from back wall. The six feet next to aisle, between spaces, must not exceed four feet in height.

Each exhibitor in classes 1090, 1091 and 1092 must supply the Superintendent of this department on or before 9 a. m. Tuesday of Fair Week with a neatly written list of the products and varieties of the different crops in his exhibit.

The exhibitors or duly qualified agents are required to make affidavit before 9 a. m. Tuesday of Fair week and file with the manager of the Fair, that the products exhibited were grown during the current year in accordance with the requirements given above.

No premiums shall be awarded in any of these classes when, in the opinion of the judges, the exhibits are not meritorious in variety, quality, artistic arrangement and educational value.

The following scale of points shall be used by the judges in placing awards on Classes Nos. 1090, 1091 and 1092: Field Crops, 25 points; Garden Crops, 10 points; Home Industry, 10 points; Fruits, 10 points; Educational Value, 35 points; Artistic Arrangement, 10 points.

In making the awards according to this classification, special emphasis shall be given to the quality of the field and garden crops, fruits, and to the excellence and practical utility of the home industry exhibit.

The educational value of the exhibit shall be construed to mean practical lessons that may be drawn from it by farmers or others with reference to certain methods of handling, marketing, growing, and selecting seed of the different crops; for instance samples of corn might be exhibited showing the effects of a systematic, intelligent system of seed selection, upon the quality of the corn, as well as upon its yielding powers. Again, an exhibit that would show the effect of spraying apples as against unsprayed would have great educational value. The effect of growing leguminous crops upon crop yields might be shown concretely or graphically. This too, would bring out a most valuable lesson to those farmers who might study the exhibits. Many other exhibits of this nature might be devised which would have great value from an educational standpoint.

Each exhibit for Classes Nos. 1090, 1091 and 1092 shall not contain more than five varieties of any one field or garden crop, except for decorative purposes. Only the best varieties for the different counties should be exhibited.

Home Industry includes canned goods, not to exceed 35 cans, no two alike; and not more than 15 cans of preserves, jells, and pickles, no two alike; fifty cans in all; also meat, dairy products, eggs, etc., but not fresh cooked articles, baking, or needlework of any kind.

A neat cloth sign, not exceeding 10 feet in length should be placed above each exhibit under Classes Nos. 1090, 1091, and 1092, giving simply the name of the county.

Plain neat labels or placards should be placed on every group in each exhibit.

In judging, consideration shall be given to standard commercial pack of products.



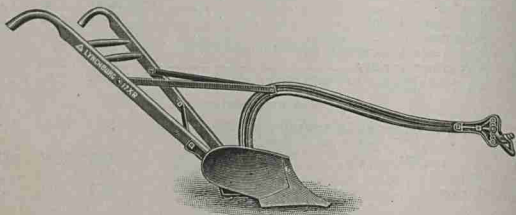

In judging the exhibits of crops in the Agricultural Department, the following score cards will be used:

For Corn

1. Prolificacy 30 points
2. Trueness of ears to variety type..... 20 points
3. Market and seed conditions..... 30 points
4. Character and uniformity of ears..... 10 points
5. Character and uniformity of kernels..... 10 points

Total.....100 points

Prolificacy should be interpreted as the total amount of shelled corn per stalk.

Trueness of ears to variety type should include size of the ears, color of grain and cob, and shape of ears.

Market and seed conditions should apply to the maturity of the ears, their sappiness, chaffiness, adherence of chaff to tip cap, adherence of tip cap to cob, plumpness of tips of kernels, soundness and luster of kernels, and freedom from disease.

In judging the character and uniformity of the ears of the exhibit, consideration should be given to length and diameter of ears, shape and filling out at butts and tips, straightness and arrangement of grain rows, purity and color of kernels and space between grain rows.

Character and uniformity of kernels should apply to size and shape of kernels, size and condition of germs, filling out of space on the cob, color and purity of kernels, uniformity of kernels throughout length of ears, and depth and width of kernels.

Prizes are offered for the most prolific and best exhibits rather than for the greatest amount of corn grown on any one acre. Such exhibits should consist of ten ears accompanied by one stalk with ears attached. In preparing for the exhibit, cut the stalk off about one foot above the top ear and at an equal distance below the bottom ear.

For judging corn, Class 1110, use the following score card:

1. Prolificacy 25 points
2. Trueness of ears and stalk to variety type.... 15 points
3. Market and seed conditions..... 20 points
4. Character and uniformity of stalks..... 20 points
5. Character and uniformity of ears and kernels.. 20 points

Character and uniformity of stalks applies to size and height of stalks, position of ears convenient for harvesting, medium length of shank, husk covering ears.

The size and shape of the kernels should be uniform and of the variety type. The color of the seed should be uniform, clear, bright and fresh.

BOOK 50.—LIVESTOCK JUDGING CONTESTS

R. H. RUFFNER, in Charge.

A students' judging contest, conducted by the Animal Husbandry Department of the North Carolina State College, will be held. This contest is open to any boy or girl who is a regular attendant at any vocational agricultural school in the State of North Carolina. (This does not, however, include any student assistant or instructor.) Contestants will not be eligible who have at any time attended an agricultural college of this or any other State.

Team Contest

Teams of three students from a vocational agricultural school will constitute a judging team. The name of the school and the number of contestants shall be sent to Mr. Ruffner, State College Station, Raleigh, N. C. The names of the members of the teams shall be given to Mr. Ruffner on the morning of the contest not later than 8:30 o'clock. The members of the team will compete for grades along with the individual contestants, and at the same time and place. Unless at least three teams compete, no team prize will be given.

The students will be required to place one class of the following: Mules, Beef Cattle, Dairy Cattle, Swine, Sheep, Poultry. They will be allowed 15 minutes to place each class and 10 minutes to write reasons on each class. The contest will start at 9 o'clock a. m. on Thursday, October 15, and will be held at the judging pavilion.

All teachers are requested to have their teams at the pavilion by 8:30 o'clock a. m. for final instructions. After the work is started, no team or individual will be allowed to enter the contest.

Six pupils from each school shall be the limit to enter the crops and livestock contest.

Three pupils shall compose a team either in crops or livestock.

Members of crop team may serve as individuals in livestock judging and vice versa—or may substitute on any team in absence of any regular member. In case a school brings only three boys, they may serve on both teams.

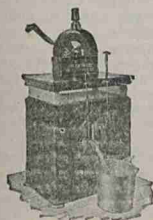

Entries open to individual growers and orchard companies of North Carolina.

IMPORTANT! Each exhibitor should read the following carefully:

As far as possible, it is desirable that horticultural exhibits be brought in and set up by the growers. Where this is not possible, the Superintendent will be glad to receive and place on exhibit all suitable horticultural products sent in. However, the Superintendent will not pack box and barrel entries for exhibit. These must come in already packed. All exhibits competing for premiums must be grown in the State.

In sending in fruit for exhibition, select only those specimens that are perfect in form and color, and free from all insect and fungus blemishes. Do not knock or shake off the fruit from the tree, but pick each specimen by hand, taking care not to pull out the stem.

Fruit to be used in trays, 100 lots, and in plates, should be carefully wrapped and packed. Each fruit should be wrapped separately in paper and packed firmly in box or barrel, taking care to avoid bruising. Label each variety plainly and put in papers to keep varieties separated. Do not use hay, fodder, excelsior, or any other dusty material in packing. Nail up firmly.

Important! Read!

Address each package plainly to "State Fair, Department of Horticulture, Raleigh, N. C." Each package should be plainly marked with the name and address of the exhibitor. Each package should be plainly marked, giving the class numbers in which contents are entered.

PLATES. Plates for the variety exhibits of fruits will be furnished free by the Fair. A perfect plate of fruit should contain 5 specimens, and no more, characteristic of the variety, with stems attached, of high color, uniform, marketable size, free from cuts and bruises, and all insect and fungus blemishes. If additional specimens are sent in by growers, the Committee will select and place on exhibit the best possible plate to be made from all the specimens submitted.

TRAYS. The dimensions of the trays are $11\frac{1}{2}" \times 18" \times 3"$ inside measurement. The exhibitor should make a tray of the required dimensions and pack each variety to be displayed in this class, in order to know how many apples are needed. Four or five extra apples per tray should be sent in order to allow for rot and damage in transit.

BOXES. Commercial box apples should be graded to uniform size, of high color, free from bruises and insect and fungus blemishes. They should be properly packed in standard bushel boxes of $10\frac{1}{2}" \times 11\frac{1}{2}" \times 18"$ inside measurement. The boxes should be of soft, light wood, smooth sawed inside and dressed outside. The ends are three-fourths of an inch thick, the sides three-eighths of an inch, and the bottom one-fourth of an inch. In these classes attractiveness of label is considered.

BARRELS. The same description for apples to be packed in boxes applies to barrel apples. A standard barrel contains 100 quarts and has the following dimensions: $17\frac{1}{2}"$ head, $28\frac{1}{4}"$ stave, $64"$ circumference.

The Superintendents will see that each entry is plainly marked and correctly named, and the entry tag attached to the same, so that the entry can be identified by the judges without difficulty.

A premium offered for a general collection of fruit will not be awarded to a mere pile of apples, or other fruit, but must be for a real collection, arranged on plates and all correctly labeled, and no fruit will be counted in a collection unless it is a fair specimen of the variety. No trashy fruit of any kind will be counted merely to make up a collection. A premium for the best collection of grapes, peaches, or any other fruit will not be awarded for a mere number, but to the quality of the exhibit mainly.

The Superintendent may withhold premiums in any case where the article is not worthy.

No article entered for competition in any one class will be permitted to compete for a premium in any other class, excepting sweepstakes.

No attention will be paid by the committee to any fruit or other exhibit that is not arranged in accordance with these rules.

All fruit must be shipped or brought in so as to arrive at the Fair Grounds not later than Monday noon of Fair Week.

The awards for fruits will be made on the afternoon of the second day of the Fair.

No exhibitor will be allowed to discuss exhibits with the judges, or to interfere in any way while the judges are at work.

A pile of fruit brought for sale will not be allowed to count in a general collection of fruit, as all fruits shown for premiums must be arranged on plates and remain on them until the close of the Fair.

In the nomenclature of fruits, the names adopted by the American Pomological Society will rule, and no variety will be accepted that has not been admitted to their catalogue, except in the case of seedlings never before exhibited.

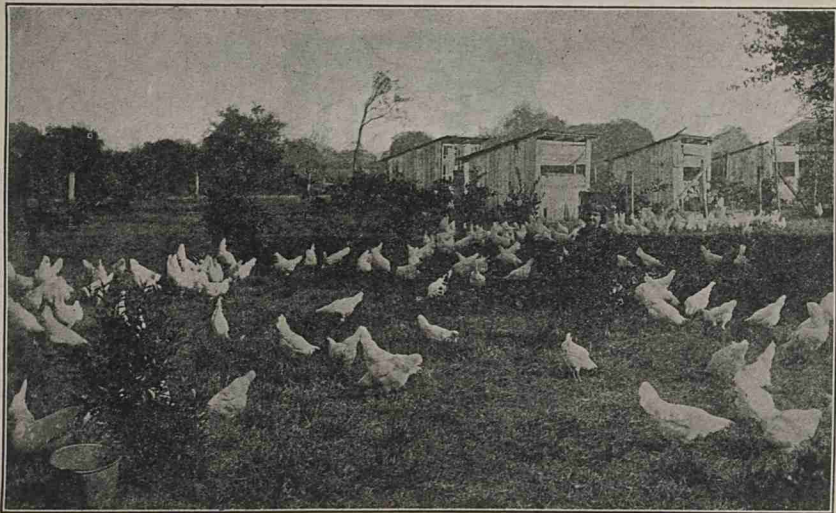

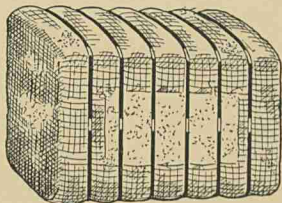
