Daiwen Kang of Raleigh, a doctoral student in marine, earth and atmospherie sciences at N.C. State, has been awarded a 575,000 Canno National Parks Science Scholarship to study air quality in the Southeast's national parks. Kang was one of only eight students nationwide to receive a Cannon National Parks Science Scholarship this year. The scholarship program is the only one of its kind to encourage doctoral students to conduct innovative research on scientific problems facing our national parks. The students' findings will be used by the Park Service to help develop long-term strategies for conservation, park management and pollution re-mediation.

Air pollution is a major problem in
Great Smoky Mountains National Park
and Shenandoah National Park. Kang's
research will focus on the impact that
volatile organic compounds (VOCs)—
emitted by both natural and anthropogenic sources— have on air quality
in the parks, and in particular on ozone
levels there. Numerous studies have
shown that high come levels can have a
harmful effect on human health and the
environment. Kang and this year's other
recipients were selected by a panel of
AAAS scientists and were honored at an
awards ceremony on Nov. 8 in
Washington, D.C.

Study finds Southeast's climate is in fight cooling trend

Sight cooling trend

Despite record-breaking heat this summer and increased levels of greenhouse gases in our air, the climate in the southeastern. United States actually has cooled slightly over the past 50 years. N.C. State atmospheric scientists have found that annual mean daily temperatures at 52 weather stations across the region have decreased, on average, 0.10 degree Celsius — or about 0.18 degree Enhanchiet — from 1940 to 1994. A drop that small may seem insignificant. But lead researcher Vinord Saxena says its implications may be huge as scientists and policy makers from around the world gather this month at a United Nations' Global Climate Conference in Argentina to debate the controversial

Nations' Global Climate Conference in Argentina to debate the controversial Kyoto Treaty on carbon dioxide emis-sions and greenhouse warming. Saxema and his colleagues at NCSU have published their studies on the Southeast's climate in three peer-reviewed scientific papers. They pre-sented their most recent findings at the American Meteorological Society's eighth Conference on Climate Variations in Denver, Colo., earlier this fall.

fall. The Kyoto Treaty mandates cutting carbon dioxide emissions by 5 percent below 1990 levels as a way of slowing or reversing global warming. The Southeast's coal-fired power plants, coal mining and fossil fuel-related industries would likely be adversely affected by such reductions, Saxena says.

Wrestling with the increase

♦ Yesterday afternoon's Chancellor's Liaison meeting provided the latest landscape for debate on a proposed tuition increase, in addition to hosting discussion on Student Center allocations and CHASS curricula

N.C. State should be "more com-parable to UNC-Chapel Hill," said Chancellor Marye Anne Fox Wednesday in a Chancellor's Liaison meeting at which N.C. State student leaders voiced their concerns about university issues, including the possible tuition

increase.

Presidents of various student organizations and other students shared their thoughts on the tuition increase with Fox, Vice Chancellor

Tom Stafford and Provost Kermit Hall.

According to Fox, some students, members of the Legislature and members of the general public feel that NCSU's tuition is too low for a modern-day university.

"We should maintain a quality education but also operate under conditions unchallenged," asid Fox, who stressed that NCSU is currently stuck between two ideals: charging minimal student tuition and providing a quality education.

If the increased tuition proposal is passed, no less than one-third of the money would go toward student financial needs, with the rest being allocated to programs and university improvements such as classroom teaching, the counseling center, Study Abroad and faculty salaries, which are "truly problematic," according to Fox.

Hall pointed out that the increase might be necessary if NCSU wants

to attract and keep a diverse student body, stay competitive and strengthen the success of the university as a whole. "We should all take pride in the fact that this university is moving in absolutely the right direction," said Hall.

Fox said NCSU's situation is more critical than that of UNC-CH because NCSU is technology-oriented and requires a starter cost for the technical professors.

When asked about the proposal's chances with the Board of Trustees and Board of Governors, Fox replied, "Arything can pass, anything can fail," In other action, Student Center President Sabrina Yep requested \$75,000 annually in university funding for academic and administrative use of Talley Student Center, Price Music Center, Witherspoon Student Center and Thompson Theater.

Student fees currently bear the weight of these centers' operation,

and more administrative units are seeking space for their use, "It is inappropriate to provide meeting space for these groups without charging them," said Yep.

Ninety percent of all Student Center money comes from student Center money comes from student fees, with 10 percent conning from other sources of revenue, such as Ticket Central. The subsidy, requested by the Student Center Board of Directors, would be implemented instead of charging individual users and would be used to make imprevements in lighting, equipment and furniture.

Yep said additional university funding would benefit everyone involved: students as well as the academic and administrative users. Stafford said the matter will be considered by university administration. Also, ROIT representative Charles Kistler requested that a set of ROIT Classes be included in the

Second earthquake claims more helpless victims in Turkey

Another mammoth earthquake in Turkey last week claimed still more lives and destroyed more homes in the nation's beleaguered northwest.

For Northwestern Turkey, light

ning has struck twice in the span of three months. Just miles from the site of August's horrific quakewhich killed over 17,000 people, another mammoth earthquake, reaching 7.2 on the Richter scale, in the city of Duzee on Friday with a death toll of 550, according frigures released by the official crisis management center.

Turkish Labor Minister Yasar Okuyan was quoted on Friday by the Anatolia news agency as say-

'Nickels' fund CALS research

♦ A recently approved program will raise money for research and develop-ment projects, which will help farmers to thrive in later years.

County extension officers recently approved the Nickel Program, which will give two nickels per pound of animal feed or fertilizer sold in North Carolina to the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences at NC. State. Beginning January 1, 2001, three nickels per pound of fertilizer sold will be donated to the college. According to Keith Oakley, executive director of the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences, the funds support teaching and research, as well as cooperative extension activities and stoharships.

"The knowledge gamed during research is provided to farmers to survive and compete in the world market," said Oakley. "The research and technology offered drives their ability to compete."

Farmers are educated on recent technology, as well as other activities that will help them to prosper in the economy.

"The Nickel Program is helping us

economy.

"The Nickel Program is helping us stay on the cutting edge of opportunity and research" said Oakley.

About 40 in 50 projects are funded each year. Research is done on purchase activities, as well as equipment and land. Funds are also used on farm crisis management and emergency projects.

The Nickel Program was established in 1951, beginning with one nickel being donated for every pound of fertilizer sold in North Carolina. The amount was increased to two nickels in 1981.

Halmough it is mostly farmers that vote for this issue, anybody who buys fertilizer may give their opinion also. Farmers understand that although they are not keeping many of their profits, it is more efficient in the long run. Research on reducing labor costs and other projects will belp them thrive in the future.

"For the past fifty years, the funds have come back to the farmers and have helped them," said Oakley, They are investing their money in research and development, which, Oakley pointed out, is actually investing money in their own future.

Also, Oakley said, there was some concern that he Nickel Program may get voted down this year. Because a large portion of castern North Carolina was damaged by Hurricane Floyd, prices were very low across the beast un out, with 94 of the 100 counties voting in favor of the Nickel Program. He highest percentage ever.

"We are delighted with the eighty-cilt precent turn out," said Oakley, "It makes a strong statement showing that supporting college research is worthwhile."


U.S. President Bill Clinton and Russian Prime Minister Boris Yeltsin are due at a summit meeting of the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE) in Istanbul today. The meeting is still expected to take place even amongst fears that the area is not safe yet.

In Ankara, Clinton pledged to Turkish President Suleyman Demirel that the United States was making 51 billion in loans to Turkey to help the country recover from both disasters, which have together injured more than half-a-million people and

destroyed most housing and buildings in grief stricken areas. President Clinton and his family visited tents housing survivors of the August quake on Tuesday as part of their five-day visit to Turkey.

The earthquake in August was one of the biggest natural disasters in European history and has already left the country with a huge sear. In Duzce, however, it will be a long time before life before the earthquake continues, if at all. With most victims either grieving for loved ones or living in tents because their homes are no longer standing, the rebuilding process begins, but nothing will ever be quite the same for the people of northwestern Turkey.

jewelry making. Classes are typically offered from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. once per week for six weeks, and cost \$40 for students and \$80 for members of the community. In addition, the center offers studio space for artists interested in working on their crafts on a daily or weekly basis.

Tate takes classes at the Craft Center and assists people with crafts, materials and tools as a desk attendant for four hours per week this semester.

"It's nice," Tate said, "I get to know the people who come in, and I get to see their crafts as they finish."

Parker Havron, a senior majoring in arts applications, began working, at the Craft Center as a desk attendant his first year at NCSU. As an employee, Havron used the pottery studio free of charge and learned more about the craft from members of the community he assisted. He has had booths at the fair since his sophomore year and plans on selling pottery, as well as some photography and woodwork, this year. He said that he has been successful in the past, making about \$500 per year.

"It's a nice way to go on campus and get some really nice presents," said Havron, "and support the local artists."

Havron also displays and sells to work in area art shows and had a personal studio this summer.

"I'll always have pottery as an income-booster," Havron said. "It's a hobby that makes some money. I never want it to become my profession, though ... It's too much fun."

Newell hopes to have 1500 people attend the fair, but would like to see an increase in the number of students in attendance.

"We do have students who come

"We do have students who come year after year. Folks remember us and come back." Newell said. 'And we have people here who have booths in every fair. "It's just wonderful for us to see the variety of the things we do. Chis is the culmination of our year."

The funds from the tax go to pay The funds from the tax go to pay for CALS programs, mostly teach-ing, research and development pro grams. Farmers take part in the programs, and "the research and technology offered drives their ability to compete," according to Keith Oakley, CALS executive

ability to compete," according to Keith Oakley, CALS executive director.

Nickels money also aids farmers during times of agricultural emergency, as issue that has moved to the forefront in 1999.

According to CALS Assistant Director Emeritus D.G. Harwood, interviewed for a September 20 preview of the vote, the money from the Nickels program has amounted \$500,000 annually up until now. The money funds around 50 current CALS programs. That's 50 programs that, more than likely, would not be in existence right now if not for the Nickels program. That's one college that would not be among the thought of the country in its field. That's five cents that goes directly from the pockets of the people into programs that will directly benefit them.


