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# Tar Hell Blitzkrieg in Carrboro

UNC-Chapel Hill forces overtook the tiny town with horrible, awful, nasty violence.

The streets ran with the WASP blood of Carrboro infidels Thursday night as University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill guerrillas took control of the town-with brute force.

In an apparent attempt to gain territory for The University's ever-expanding collective ego, Chancellor Change Mesir ordered the offensive late last week.

Mesir also believes that absorbing a tax-collecting municipality will improve The University's revenue-generating power.

Consulting with Mesir on the decision to overtake the piddling settlement were former mens basketball minister Dean Smith the ghost of Charles Kowalt and the still-animating corpse of Woodrow Dornham. Back in the former Carrboro Thursday night, current mens basketball coach Meat Dougherty was herding a group of UNC-CH II-The Sequel senior citizens out of the charred remains of their former rest home.

Though some residents did resist the takeover, Carrboro higher-ups were complicit.

"I see this as manifest destiny for UNC-CH," stammered a kneeling Tom Putze, Carrboro mayor.

"Say it again, bitch," said spade-wielding UNC-CH undergrad Phil March.

One group of street toughs repelled the UNC-CH women's soccer team for upwards of four hours outside Elmco's Diner. Head coach Handsome Dornham's appearance with an automatic assault rifle brought the rebels under control.

Fires still burned along UNC-CH II-The Sequel's streets late into Thursday night, as Tar Hell reporters were forced to return to the office to "file stories" by "press time," as the advisors called it.

## 'Halloween' Now an Everyday Occurrence

Oct. 31 in Chapel Hill won't be special any more, but not because Halloween has been outlawed. In fact, it's just the opposite.

Chapel Hill mayor Kevin Fie announced late Thursday that his town would be the first in the nation to officially celebrate Halloween every day of the year.

The legislation, dubbed maverold order "Pumpkin 365," will take effect immediately. Fie and members of the town council cited several reasons for their decision.

"I don't know why we've always confined our most special celebration to one day," he said. "This resolution benefits everyone. And don't worry, before I made the decision, I called Dean [Smith]."

Chapel Hillians will now be able to walk down the street dressed up like freaks whenever they please. Stores are already advertising new "winter wacko" and "insane summer" clothing styles.

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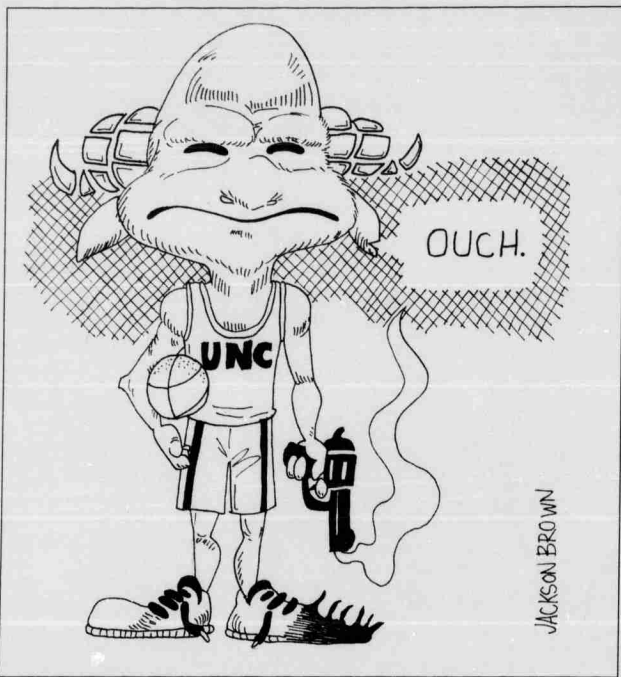
