Revised Red Terrors Tackle Wake Forest On Freshman Field

Having hit upon a combination that can both hit and field, Coach Williams (Doc) Newton sends his rejuvenated Red Terror baseball club against the Demon Deacons here tomorrow afternoon in a game slated to get underway at four o'clock on Freshman Field.

The contest will be the third meeting of the year for the two teams. Wake Forest having eked out a 5-4 victory over the Techs at Devereux Meadow Easter Monday, and a later game played at the Baptist school was theirs by the score of 7-0.

Several changes in the lineup have brought about a new life for the State club. Captain Benny Constant, former centerfielder, is now caworting at second base and is like a child with a new found toy. Ralph Heath, a Raleigh boy, came off the bench to become the centerfielder, and one of the heavy hitters in a heavy hitting aggregation, and Jackie Singer took over the shortstop duties in a sensational manner after an early season slump which found him on the bench shortly thereafter.

Newton has moved Earl Stewart from second base to first, benching big Hoot Gibson. Stewart's play around the initial sack has been a steady influence on the infield. Grady Wheeler is the only boy left of the original infield which opened the season for the Techs against Cornell back in March—and his performance at the hot corner has been the best in the Big Five and possibly in the Southern Conference.

Rugged Ray Hardee will probably get the call to start on the mound against Wake Forest's Deacons tomorrow. Hardee wants a victory over the neighboring Wake County school and the chances of his taking it tomorrow are bright indeed. Now that Ray is confident of his support, which has been very spotty all season, he will probably be able to pitch better ball than usual. Which means that Rugged Ray should be well nigh invincible.

Tom Turner, the string-beanish catcher who started the year as batting practice receiver and soon earned the starting job with his able work behind the bat, has been rounded out the box score for the locals with Jones, Holloman, Coble, Ott, Pease, and Maddy showing their fine running and heaving abilities.

If the necessity of war demands, the deferred status in the Army Reserve may be terminated at any time by the Secretary of War.

The new Army Air Force Enlisted Reserve Plan is part of an over-all Army Enlisted Reserve Corps program shortly to be announced. This program will provide opportunities for college men to enlist in other branches of the Army on a deferred basis and to continue their education through graduation if a satisfactory standard of work is maintained. In case of necessity the Secretary of War shall determine when they may be called to active duty.

It is understood that men so enlisted will have the opportunity of competing for promotions in officer's candidate schools.

This plan has been approved in the belief that continuation of education will develop capacities for leadership. (Reserve enlistment will not otherwise be regarded as established R. O. Y. C. plans.)

Only 130 Sophomores Pass Citizenship Test

Almost Half Of Those Taking The Required Quiz Received Grades Below Passing

Only one hundred and thirty sophomore engineers out of almost 250 who were required to take the first citizenship examination drew passing grades, according to a list made public by Dr. H. A. Fisher, chairman of the Citizenship Committee.

The others will be required to take a course in government and history to be taught by the History Department. The requirement may be filled at any time before graduation.

John K. Beasley made the highest score. His grade of 168 correct answers was considered as worth 100 per cent, and the rest of the papers were then graded on this basis. Ten other sophomores drew A grades, 14 earned B's, 52 C's, and 83 D's.

Two members of the five-man faculty committee were appointed by Dean Van Leer; they were Dr. Fisher and Dr. Greaves-Walker. Dean B. F. Brown chose two other members: Dr. Lockmiller and Prof. Hicks. Prof. Robert E. Rice was picked by these four to be the fifth man.
