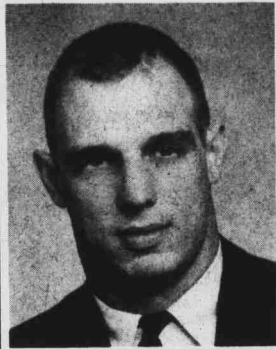
Jim Jones To Seek SG Vice Presidency

Lad Daniels, campaign manager of James B. Jones for Vice-President of the Student Government, released this statement for The Technician:

"I was most happy to see that Jim Jones had entered the race for a prominent position on next year's Student Government. Jim is one of the most dynamic organizers currently enrolled in State College. His ability to motivate and lead people has been exemplified throughout his high school and college career. In high school Jim was a natural leader in student council and class organization work. Extending the resume of leadership ability to the college level Jim has been in those years I have known him, President of the Military Ball Association, Commander of the Pershing Rifles Honorary Military Society, Student Government Orientation Commission member, dormitory floor manager, and member of Young Democrats Club. Lampe, dean of the college's School of Engineering; Rex Anderson, regional engineer for the Bureau of Public Roads, Atlanta, Ga.; N. K. Dickerson, chairman of the board, Dickerson, Inc., Monroe; Cameron W. Lee, chief en-

gineer, N. C. State Highway Commission, Raleigh; Merrill Evans, chairman of the State Highway Commission, Raleigh; W. F. Babcock, director of highways, State Highway Commission; and Dr. R. E. Fadum, head of the Department of Civil Engineering, and Prof. C. R. McCullough of the Civil Engineering Department, both of State College.

The Tuesday and Thursday

programs will be general sessions. On Wednesday, conference participants will be divided into 13 groups for special study.

One of the largest short courses which the State College Extension Division offers, the program will be conducted by the college's Department of Civil Engineering in cooperation with the State Highway Commission and Associated General Contractors.

Tolson Announces Platform

As a candidate for President of Student Government of North Carolina State College, there are a number of programs I would like to promote next year if I am elected. I would now like to reiterate my position on these vital issues.

Of primary importance to the students of any college or university is the honor conduct of its students. I firmly believe that steps should be taken to strengthen the Judicial System of N. C. State College. Specific measures I plan to promote are:

1. Programs to insure better understanding of the Judicial System, to include both Honor and Campus Code, by all students.
2. Special studies to determine the feasibility of eliminating the signing of a pledge after each quiz.
3. Programs to insure stronger faculty response

to the ideals of the Honor System.

I am firmly convinced that it is urgent that steps be taken to improve student-faculty relationships. I unanimously supported the "Climate of Learning Conference" that was held in October, 1960. I believe that future conferences should be held, only on a larger scale to include more faculty and students. Student-Faculty panel discussions are another program I plan to promote in order to improve student-faculty relations.

For three years I have been fortunate enough to be able to engage in the new student orientation work. I feel this is one of the most successful programs ever instituted on our campus. As a result I sincerely endorse this program and pledge to promote continued improvement. The following are

areas I pledge to work on:

1. Faculty-student advisory system.
2. More emphasis to new students on the Honor and Campus Codes.
3. Better campus orientation.

I am quite concerned that the cultural aspect of college life is usually sadly neglected on our campus. We at North Carolina State are blessed with one of the finest cultural projects in the country—that of the Friends of the College. I heartily endorse and support this program. Therefore, I intend to promote a program to increase, where possible, the number of cultural events that are readily accessible to N. C. State students and to encourage wholehearted participation in these programs by all students.

An Old Evil Confronts Board

There was a very important Publications Board meeting today. We are sorry that we can not report the happenings of the meeting to you in this editorial. The meeting was held after our deadline.

The main topic of the meeting was the Agromeck. The Agromeck, as most of you know, has been controlled by one organization on campus for a great number of years. This organization has done a good job in producing a fine annual for State College. However, it appeared at the time this newspaper went to press that this organization was ready to hand the annual over to some other organization or students.

What is the reason for this organization wanting to give the annual to some other organization or student? It is one simple word. Money. From the editor's viewpoint (Lad Daniels, Editor of the Agromeck), the top brass is losing money that past editors and business managers received. Where did this money come from? It usually came from the photographers for the book. We might add that this sum was large (usually in three figures and sometimes four). However, the heads of the Agromeck will not get this sum this year.

The editor and business manager receive sixty dollars a month for their services plus a bonus of two hundred and fifty dollars if the organization realizes a thousand dollars profit. If they received this bonus, they would earn approximately eight hundred dollars for the school year. It has been a long time since the Agromeck missed making a thousand dollars profit.

However, they feel that if they do not receive the bonus from the photographers, they should receive the same salary as the editor and business manager of *The Technician*, and that each of them should receive one-quarter of the profits.

Deans Talley and Bowers of the Student Activities Office say no to this proposal, and it appears that they will have the final word in this controversy that has confronted the board for the last month.

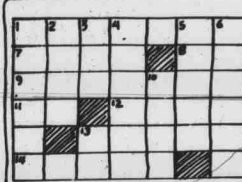

However, the Student Activities Office feels that the real reason is money.

It appears that the reign of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity has ended. They have served the students well in the past, but it appears that an old evil . . . money . . . has killed an old organization. Whether a new organization or some individual students will take over the annual remains to be seen. We might add that the answer to this question will be decided on April 13 . . . the day of campus elections.

Technicality Raised On Student Sit-In Cases

Washington, D. C.—A legal technicality may well have been the reason the United States Supreme Court refused, this week, to hear the first student sit-in case presented to the high tribunal.

The Court, on Monday, refused to hear arguments in a case involving eight Negro and four white students arrested last March in Tallahassee, Florida.

The 12 who were convicted were convicted of disorderly conduct when they refused to leave the lunch counter of an F. W. Woolworth store, after being refused service. All drew fines of \$300 or sixty days in jail.

The Court, as usual, indicated no reason why it refused to hear the case. However, the city of Tallahassee had contended that the 12 had not exhausted all their judicial remedies in the state, before carrying the case to the Supreme Court.

The city also told the Court that the 12 were not convicted because they were sitting at a lunch counter that refused to serve them. It said they were convicted because they refused

to leave after the Mayor asked them to. The city said the Mayor had good reason to believe that if they stayed at the counter a riot would follow.

COURT UPHOLDS CONVICTIONS

However, the Florida Circuit Court, which upheld the convictions, said the store "could serve or not serve any person it chose." Its discrimination against the 12, the Court said, was not unlawful, but their presence there after they were asked to leave was "a wrongful trespass amounting to a breach of the peace."

The Circuit Court in Florida is the final appellate court for most cases arising in municipal courts, as this did. However, the Florida Supreme Court can, and sometimes does, hear cases carried to it from the Circuit Courts. It was the failure of the students to approach that Court that the city said meant they had not exhausted their State remedies.

The effect of the Supreme Court's action is to leave standing the lower court's decision and the convictions, but without

Honor Code Board Tries Two Students

Thursday night the Honor Code Board met in room 252 of the College Union and tried two cases.

The first case involved a student who had been apprehended while attempting to steal a bookholder from the Students' Supply Store. He was found guilty of stealing and was sentenced to be placed on probation through the summer of 1961.

Another student was charged with the theft of a textbook. He had found the book, with no name inside, on the campus and had sold it at the Students Supply Store. The owner of the book later investigated at the Students Supply Store and identified the book. The student was found not guilty of stealing but was reprimanded for his lack of personal responsibility and reminded of his duty to turn in lost articles at the College Union lost and found department.

D'Antonio Sparks Red Team To Win

Riddick Stadium—With All-American quarterback Roman Gabriel on the baseball diamond, the State football team finished up their 1961 spring practice with the Red winning over the White team 15-13 in the annual Red-White clash.

The White team jumped into a 13-0 lead before the Red warriors could get their offensive machinery moving. But after the Red team got going there was no stopping them. They dominated play for the entire second half as the White team got very few opportunities to run the ball.

Jim D'Antonio paced the Red team in the running department with 50 yards in 13 carries. D'

Antonio was a standout full-back for State last fall. The majority of his yardage came in the second half. Tony Koszarsky, a sophomore, was second in the rushing department with 34 yards in eight carries. Koszarsky was one of the big reasons the State freshmen went undefeated last fall. Carson Boshier, another freshman star, picked up 30 yards in five carries. Phil Raiford and Bob Wolfer each hauled the pigskin for 24 yards.

The Red team racked up a total of 219 yards on the ground to only 107 for the White eleven. Bill Kriger, the small junior signal caller, led the White team in rushing with 45 yards in eight tries. Most of his yardage came on the option play of which he is a master. The Penn-

sylvania native pulled off the option play with great ease Saturday afternoon. He seemed to have known just when to pitch the ball out to the half-back or cut back inside and run with the ball himself.

Al Taylor and Roger Moore each had good rushing games for the White forces as they picked up 33 and 32 yards respectively.

In the passing game, the Reds were again the top team as they picked up 99 yards through the air while the White squad managed to move only 38 yards in the air. Jim Rossi sparked the Red aerial attack with five completed passes out of 12 attempts. His five completed passes gave him a total of 66 yards and one touchdown. Don Smith, a sophomore quar-

terback, attempted four passes and two hit their mark for a total of 16 yards and one touchdown. Ron Skosnik, the other Red quarterback, hit two of four attempts for 17 yards.

John Gill, Jim Darrup, and Boshier each caught two passes. Gill's two catches were for 33 yards and one touchdown. Darrup snagged two for 20 yards, while Boshier gained 21 yards. Paul Jaeger caught one pass for six yards and the other Red was the number one passer for the White team with four completions in 11 attempts for 40 yards.

The White team scored first on a two yard plunge by Roger Moore with 13:02 left in the

second quarter. Moore booted the point-after to make the score 7-0. About eight and a half minutes later, Younger Snead cracked over from the three to put the White out in front 13-0 and the point-after attempt failed.

The Red team got fired up and pushed in a TD with about 1:38 left in the half. The score came on a six yard pass from Smith to Jaeger. Smith flicked a pass to Don Faircloth for two points to put the score at 13-8 at intermission. After a scoreless third period, Rossi hit a 20-yard pass to Gill for the last Red score. Jake Shaffer kicked the extra point to put the Red team out in front 15-13.

live in. "For this reason, I have become a candidate for Vice-President of the North Carolina State College Student Government. I feel that I am capable of handling this job and in so doing always be every mindful of the importance of the student at State, for without the student there would be no State College.

"There are many things which can be done to improve the relationship of students and instructors here at State. Often we are forced into situations which we do not like but must tolerate because no one has a better solution. If elected, I shall in every way possible strive to improve the relationship of students and faculty and to increase the importance of the individual student here at State.

"Often, off campus students and residents of Statesville are forgotten and these students must be considered and recognized also. These people's opinion and ideas should be heard and not overlooked.

"There has been much talk recently of delaying Fraternity Rush until second semester. In a few years, this new idea might work well. However, now is not the time to try this idea. Many people feel that being a member of a fraternity hurts a student academically. When the facts

are considered, however, how many fraternity men flunk out of State???

State has a strong and nationally known Student Government. There is, however, no reason for us to rest on our laurels but to continue to go forward. I believe in action and not words and promises.
