

Major Campus Election Thursday Agromeck Referendum Possible

A new referendum on the *Agromeck*, the State annual, may be on the ballot in Thursday's general election.

The Publications Authority approved the last minute referendum at its regular meeting yesterday afternoon even though unofficial talk of a referendum had been circulating for some time.

The Authority ran into problems two weeks ago when it nominated someone for *Agromeck* editor whose proposal had violated the statutes of the Authority.

John DeMao was nominated *Agromeck* editor two weeks ago after he and two other groups made proposals for different kinds of annuals.

He proposed a yearbook without senior pictures and traditional organization shots although organizations would be included informally through their work.

His book would be a pictorial story of the school year depicting State students and what they do.

Other proposals were made for a "traditional" yearbook with senior pictures and organization shots and for a book essentially an arts publication.

After hearing the proposals

the Authority voted seven to one for the DeMao book.

However, it was discovered later that the Authority's statutes included a requirement for senior pictures and organization shots.

At yesterday's meeting the members debated whether to change the statutes and allow the DeMao book or decide on an alternative.

It was decided to go back to the beginning and have a referendum to let the students express their opinion to the Authority.

Then a decision will be made on whether to hear new editorship proposals or not. DeMao is still technically editor.

There will be five separate alternatives on the ballot. The wording is only approximate.

- 1) An arts publication
- 2) All organization and student pictures with students paying for the pictures
- 3) Chronology of the year's events without formal pictures
- 4) A book similar to those in the past
- 5) No book

According to Elections Board Chairman Charles Guignard the referendum will be on the ballot if feasible.

Four Student Body Presidential candidates will be heading those vying for spots in the new general elections this Thursday.

Benny Teal, Jim Brandon, Rick Rice, and Cathy Sterling are fighting for the top seat.

For Student Senate President, David Brown, Glenn Friedman and John Hester are running for that post.

The most dramatic change has been those running for Student Body Treasurer. Last time only one person ran for the office. This time 17 people are running for office.

All Senate seats are up for election as well as those on the Judicial Board. Only Freshman seats will remain unfilled until next fall.

Polling stations will be open from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. at the same locations as the previous election this year.

That election was voided because of voting irregularities.

According to Elections Board Chairman Charles Guignard the spaces on the computer ballots should be clearly filled in with pencil so the scanners will be able to read them.

If not filled in correctly, the ballot will be thrown out.

By computer tabulation the election results should be announced by 8:30 p.m. Thursday night.

Ecologist Stanley Cain Speaking

One of America's foremost ecologists will be on campus this week for a series in the Harrelson Lectures.

Dr. Stanley A. Cain will

speak on the general topic "Ecology's Widening Horizons."

The Harrelson Lectures were set up through the estate

of John W. Harrelson, former Chancellor here.

Cain has served both in science and in government. He conducted early research into

plant studies and became Chairman of the Conservation Department at the University of Michigan.

In 1965 Cain was appointed Assistant Secretary of the Interior for Fish, Wildlife, and Parks. He is currently teaching at Michigan after resigning his position in 1968.

Tuesday night Cain spoke on "Man, Nature, and Society" in Nelson Auditorium at 8.

On Wednesday, also in Nelson Auditorium at 8 p.m., the topic will be "The Need to Take Off the Blinders."

"From Individual to Government" will be the topic on Thursday as the series moves to Dabney Hall, Room 222 at 8:30.

Econ Students Making Food Investigation

BRANDEN SPEAKS

With representation for the politically uninvolved as a basic right of our society, let me discuss why I feel your support is a rational alternative for the Student Body's future. One of the candidates has proposed the hiring of a professional to represent us to the administration. This points out two weaknesses in this campaign. First, a lack of ability to represent our whole campus to the administration or the community on the part of this candidate. Secondly, admittance that both this candidate and the administration realize that any candidate "elected" by less than 25% of the student body is not representative of the majority of our students.

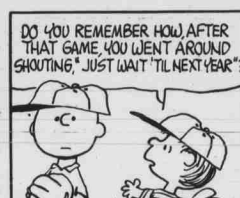
If the majority of our students do not choose to participate let them be represented by a candidate who recognizes their worth as members of a diverse society which is meeting the various needs of 12,000 individuals. Their roles and contributions as well, must be considered when decisions are made which effect us all.

The creditable "experience" of another candidate is admirable, but I ask you to question how much a person can accomplish when he approaches the administration with criticism and compares them with others at neighboring institutions. Would this approach appeal to us if the administration compared us to UNC?

The administration must be approached as a group of professional specialists each concerned with the operations of his department. The Student Body must capitalize on the abilities and enthusiasm of our administration. Having served as WKNC-FM news director, campus YMCA President, and a member of the Chancellor's Liaison committee I have a working knowledge of the University administration and its concerns.

Another of the alternatives on the ballot is a candidate who would have us believe this UNIVERSITY retains a college image that it shed my Freshman year. Actually in this campaign, the grade point average has been the only claim to rationality.

I don't believe the students of this campus care for a representative so behind the times that he is considered a comic. The Student Body needs a Rational Alternative to the last ballot. The only hope we have of improving our University is for each of us to participate in our own area of interest and to gain the respect of the administration and community. Our graduates and athletes have brought recognition to our University. So too can the Student Body when it works together with an appreciation and respect for each of its diverse parts. It will take the leadership of officers backed by voting support from all the students to bring to our campus the recognition we can earn. Jim Branden asks us all to go to the polls tomorrow and vote for a rational alternative for the future of our Student Body.

The incredibly large number of candidates running for the various offices at stake in tomorrow's election indicates that students are finally beginning to take an interest in Student Government.

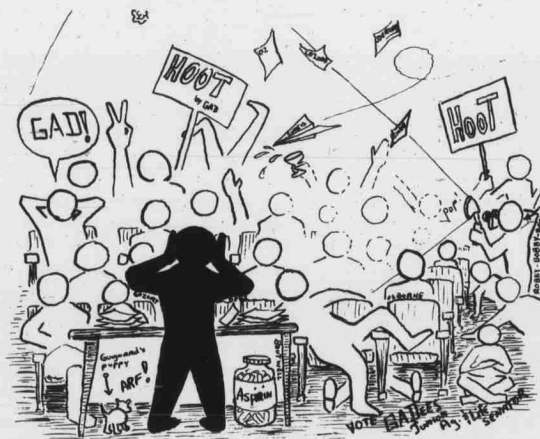

Wake Forest in January, 1970, became the first southern college or university to have a student on its board of trustees. Davidson and the University of Kentucky also have students on their boards of trustees. Senator Ralph Scott, the Governor's uncle, tried hard to pass a bill in our 1969 state legislature to allow student representation on the board. But the good old N.C. General Assembly refused to allow students their proper voice. We must be represented on the board.

IMPLEMENTATION OF PLATFORM

How can SG implement these proposals? By voicing these issues through the SG President and appropriating sufficient funds to hire a lawyer to defend student rights against the administration, board of trustees, and city and state governments when the necessary arises, and to lobby with the legislature to get the funds for campus improvements.

IMPROVEMENT TO RESIDENCE HALLS

Do you know the reason our residence halls are an inadequate? It is because our state allows us to spend only the meager sum of \$3400 per student per residence hall. Students—not the State—pay for the residence halls. Yet the state ensures their inadequacies by setting their low ceiling limits on building expenditures. It is interesting indeed that a state more backward educationally than North Carolina—South Carolina—allows residence hall expenditures of \$5000 per student. Indiana allows \$8000 per student. Even UNC-CH has far better facilities than we do. They at least have a large lounge on each floor! When asked how UNC-CH did it, our housing officer said they left out the furnishings and added them later. NCSU left out the lounges and the furnishings. How's that for being short-changed? So I ask, why have we and why do we continue to put up with such foot-lothens? As long as we students are paying the bill, we should have some say-so about how residence halls are built.

FOOD SERVICE

The Administration bought over four thousand dollars worth of sandwich-making machinery for Slater when they were given the sandwich services. The Union Food Service went of the business also and needed the revenue, but were barely considered. Babington's Cafeteria also wanted to operate a food service on campus, but received little encouragement from the Administration. Others have met with similar response. The Administration seemed content with Slater in the past and will probably continue unless students through SG voice their disapproval of the food problem. I would like to lead in the examination of the issues of the year with a format similar to the Moratorium. The University as a whole must begin to look at our world, not just its knowledge.

And there is such a thing as violating the Campus Code but still not deserving even the lightest sentence now available. To most of you, the Judicial Board is a distant reality. But even the most typical good

guy can find himself thrust before this group of seemingly unfriendly faces. I know because it happened to me. I was tried and convicted of "ungentlemanly conduct," and given a reprimand. I am not proud of this, but I consider it a qualification—I have been on the other side of the table.

In a recent letter in *the Technician*, I accused the present Judicial Board of being illogical in the election invalidation, and challenge students to become concerned enough to run for office. I would like to think that this letter was responsible at least to some extent for the fantastic number of candidates now running. There are fourteen candidates for the senior Judicial Board seats. Four will be chosen. This is a good situation, but it can be risky unless you as a voter know who you are voting for. No vote is better than a guess vote!

Perhaps you agree with my views. The final problem is associating my views which you read now with my name which you will see later on the ballot. My name as it appears on the ballot is Flashy Phil Gieseler. Yes, this is a gimmick and admittedly pretty corny, and I don't really claim to be either flashy or conceited. But perhaps this will help relieve the problem of associating a name with what, hopefully, you believe to be a good candidate.

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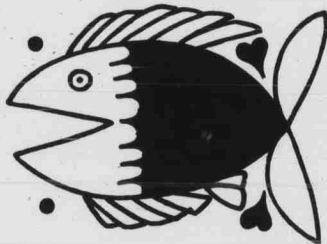
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
