# Wardrobe workshop conducted by Belk

Career Planning and Placement program teaches students how to dress for success

The N.C. State Career Planning and Placement Center will sponsor a free workshop on building a career wardrobe on a limited budget Wed., Jan. 30.

The workshop will be from 6-7 p.m. in Room 216 Mann Hall and requires no registration. The workshop will be presented by personal wardrobe consultants from Hudson Belk department store in Crabtree Valley Mall.

The workshop, geared toward both men and women, will focus on "building a core wardrobe for someone who's just starting out," according to Ashley Brook, a consultant with Hudson Belk.

"Some students don't have any-

"Some students don't have anything but their interview suit," said Susan Wyatt, workshop coordinated for Career Planning and Placement, "they will tell you how to build paycheck by paycheck. They know everyone's on a limited budget and may not have paychecks coming in immediately."

The consultants will use a cloth.

immediately."
The consultants will use a clothing grid, a presentation of suggested outfits mounted on a metal grid, rather than a fashion show format to coordinate a wardrobe that is fashionable as well as professional.

"It's more of a seminar than a fashion show," said Wyatt.
Hudson Belk's wardrobe consultants boast the ability to create 100 different outfits out of 16 carefully selected clothing items, although there will not be enough time to demonstrate that many changes in the seminar at NCSU. According to Brook this is possible through "subtle changes and changing around of accesories" making trans-seasonal clothes work year round.

"You might want suede accessories in the fall and patent leather ones in the spring for the same out-fit," said Brook. Brook and Hudson Belk's other personal clothing consultant, Melissa Donnell are also available for free in-store consultations.

# Off-campus escort service to begin operating on Feb. 6

N.C. State students who live off-campus will never have to walk alone again when Dial-A-Ride, an escort service organized by two NCSU students, begins operating

students, begins operating Feb. 6.

Jeff Bernard, a junior in psychology and the princi-ple organizer of the escort service, said the purpose of Dial-A-Ride is to pre-vent rapes and assaults on and around the NCSU campus.

and around the NCSU campus.

Dial-A-Ride will consist of a 14 passenger vans operating with Raleigh Transportation Services. The van will be available to students free of charge and will operate within a predetermined five mile radius of campus. The radius will include Centennial Campus and the College of Veterinary Medicine. Dial-A-Ride will operate Thursday through Saturday from 10 p.m. to 2 a.m.

The hours of operation for the service were chosen based on Uniform Crime Report rape statistics. The statistics indicate that the requency of rapes tends to increase on Thursdays and escalates through the weekend.

According to Public Safety Crime Prevention Officer Larry Ellis, there were two rapes and one sexual assault on campus in 1990. He said that, in general, only one in 10 rapes are actually reported.

Heather Turner, a senior in accounting who assisted Bernard in the final stages of planings axid, "Every student deserves to feel like they are safe wherever they go. This escort service will make them feel like they have some extra security."

Bernard said the project received stiff criticism from a university college whose administration felt that the escort service's honswere not conducive to academic study.

Bernard said his critics felt that the operating hours were party hours, not study hours, and they feared the service would turn into a safe-ride service for students who had had too much to drink.

The operating hours were chosen to "hit the problem at the heart" since not enough funding is currently available to run the service seven days a week, said Bernard.

Both Bernard and Turner agree that their purpose in pursuing this project is to ensure safety of NCSU students, and they said they hope the service will not be abused. Furthermore, the students said they would deal with any problems as they arise.

Bernard said, "I know there are possibilities for people to use the service for the wrong

purposes but at this point I'm more concerned that it be known as an escort service, and if the question arises later about whether the service is an excuse for someone who has had too much to drink to have a safe way home, well, we'll deal with it then."

"I'm not saying I'd turn them away if they needed a ride, but when (the service) is actually abused, then the situation will be looked into."

ally abused, then the situation will be looked into."

Ralph Harper, director of Public Safety, said, "You can perceive the service anyway you want to, but (Bernard's) overall objective is to provide the safest way possible to get from point A to point B. If someone who has been drinking is taken off the road, the service has served a useful purpose."

The service will not pick up or deliver students to and from bars, however.

Bernard started working on this project by himself in September. The idea to organize an escort service that would be available to off-campus students was given to Bernard by Trent Carrier, chairman of the Community Affairs Committee for Sigma Phi Epsilon, the fraternity of which Bernard is a member.

Carrier expressed the problem of rape on and around campus as a problem that needed to be solved, and Bernard accepted the challenge to try.

Bernard said organizing something of this magnitude was often "difficult and depressing

Mean added that his efforts have not been to benefit the Greek system, but to benefit the students of NCSU.

"A main concern on a campus of 26,000 people should be safety," said Bernard.
Bernard said he started researching the feasibility of the project by going to Raleigh Transportation System and Public Safety for help with the logistics of setting up the program.



Public Safety has supported Bernard's efforts by providing the advice and logistic support that would allow the system to work, as well as providing some potential financial donation contacts, Harper said.

Dial-A-Ride is a "great idea because it offers a service to a lot of people who otherwise would not have it." he said.

Harper also said he is optimistic that, with sufficient funding, the program will be an ongoing service and that Dial-A-Ride will complement Public Safety's existing escort service for campus residents.

Bernard got assistance with his project after approaching student government for financial appropriations. Turner, who works as an administrative assistant for Student Body President Ed Stack, said she was assigned by





# Corchiani breaks two ACC records against Marquette

Corchiani, who plaved the entire game without a break, worked his style of magic that Wolfpack fans have come to expect en route to breaking, the all-time Atlantic Coast Conference marks for career assists and steals. ## Just support the troops

mbiguity will always surround any decision to fight or not fight a war. No decision concerning the use of military force will escape the omnipresent scrutiny of a governed people—a scrutiny that many cannot voice.

In the United States, though, we have the freedom and the right to express our dissatisfaction with military actions. The use of force in Iraq has generated a predictable response: flower children on one side and war mongers on the other. It is an exercise that has been repeated throughout this country's history with ire and hatred on both sides. It is an exercise that makes the people with the most at stake in the war, the soldiers, feel confused, guilty and uncertain of their place in society.

Militants will say peace rallies like the one organized by Students for Peace Thursday are to blame for the divided front our nation consistently shows toward war. The organizers of the rally will say hardline military proponents who push for war do not best represent the interests of the entire population. To both groups, neither of which desires war, John F. Kennedy says, "War will exist until that distant day when the conscientious objector enjoys the same reputation and prestige that the warrior does today." Kennedy makes this claim as a rhan who has actually experienced war — a claim few college students can make. students can make

while this maxim is idealistic and impractical to try to implement world-wide, the war we have generated within our own nation and more specifically, our own campus, can be conquered if we adopt these words as our own.

While we exercise our rights to free speech, let us take care not to tread upon someone else's. A discussion of ideas between equals rather than a session of mutual taunting and aggravation will not only serve to help us understand the logic behind the decisions each of us has made concerning the understand the logic behind the decisions each of us has made concerning the war, but it will also provide unity in a time that is otherwise an emotional vacuum. This unity is what our soldiers need to see, what they need to feel empowered and sure of their purpose. They did not ask for this war. They represent this country only out of duty and love. The 17th-century author Richard Baxter lived by the motto, "In necessary things, unity; in doubtful things, liberty; in all things, charity."

The war in the Persian Gulf, despite its controversial beginnings, is now a necessity for our soldiers, our families, our friends, our neighbors and our enemies. The time to quell our petty arguments about political issues that are no longer relevant has come. Unity is the order of the day.

## Why are we over there? Economics.

This letter is by no means a condemnation of the men and women serving in the Persian Gulf but is a condemnation of the governmental and corporate structure which has placed their lives in jeopardy. The administration and members of the legislature who support the use of military force in the gulf have attempted to seduce the American public's view with empty rhetorical justifications. Their stance has been, basically, that Hussein is a deranged, civil dictator whose aggression America must stop without concession or negotiation.

However, the facts disprove this stance

However, the facts disprove this stance and reveal it to be a mere moral tag the administration is attempting to place upon a clearly economic issue. First, Hussein's gassing of the Kurds and the reported human rights violations in Kuwait, although truly abominable, would be non-issues for our administration if American economic concerns weren't, at stake. Our administration has effectively turned its, head from human rights violations in the past (Tinanamen Square, Apartheid, and the Palestinian issue for example. This long history of ignoring human rights violations proves that any official statement regarding violations committed by Hussein is hypocritical and retorical justification for our presence in the Gulf. Thus, Hussein became Hitler overnight, not because the administration concerns itself with human rights, but because it needs to equate Hussein with evil to sway public opinion.

President Bush tells us that we as Americans must "follow the dictates of our inner moral compass" and fulfill our "moral obligation" to "stop ruthess aggression." I agree aggression must be stopped, but is our presence in the gulf truly based upon stemming aggression? We have indeed approved aggression in the past and we have indeed approved aggression (for example, we have

pumped \$4 billion into El Salvador over the past 10 years to support a military dictatorship that oppresses, terrorizes and murders its people). Once again, our past actions prove our current statements hypocritical, empty and false. Now, given we are not present in the Gulf for any moral or idealistic reasons, why are we there? Economies. The potential control Hussein could have over this oil-nch area doministration has turned to a military solution for an economic problem, at problem that exists in the States, not in any foreign land. In essence, our presence in the Gulf amounts to placing a bandage on a festering sore.

Dependency on foreign oil is a problem America must solve through alternative energy sources, mass transit systems, and development of energy efficient technology and industry.
However, this solution wobild prove costly to the American economy and would require a total restructuring and re-evaluation of our energy needs and uses. Thus the administration, rather than develop an economic solution to an economic problem, has decided to solve the problem with American blood. But, even if we win this conflict in the Middle East and ensure the flow of oil, what happens when another petula amexation takes place, and what will the lives be worth that we spend to solve the current problems.

No one can justify the use of force and loss of lives for purely economic reasons and, in fact, we do not need to justify its use

because the sanctions have been working, in December Hussein decided to release all American hostages. Admittedly, this move was designed to divide American public opinion and make Americans view Hussein more sympathetically. But why wou!? Hussein give up such a valuable strategic and diplomatic tool as the hostages on the slim chance that such an action may divide American opinion. If Hussein field american opinion? If Hussein field and the pressure from economic and diplomatic force, he would never have needed to divide public opinion and release the hostages. Now, if we look at the basic fundamental cause of Hussein's release of the hostages it proves that economic and diplomatic force is working and has been working since the beginning of the embargo. Shouldn't we want for the economic pressure to build rather than carelessly squander lives to fix the problem quickly?

Another distressing aspect of the gulf situation is the administration's non-negotiation, no-concessions stance. Bush has balanced Americain, Kuwaiii, and Iraqi Jives, on one hand and negotiation and diplomacy on the other. Apparently he finds it logical to waste these lives rather than "concede" to a Middle Eastern peace conference amend at solving Arab Israeli conflicts. In light of the cost in lives, our stance of no negotiation and an unconditional fraqi withfrawal is foolish. Is it truly "concession" to Saddam Hussent no promise a peace conference in the Middle East?

Our moral aild idealistic justifications provide no excuse for war. Hussent must leave Kuwaii but we must not spend American lives to ensure he does. The time for diplomacy seems to have passed but even now we must work for peace.

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
