Dear Governor:

It is with much pleasure that I notice your interest in promoting the cleaning-up and beautifying the highways of North Carolina.

Much can be accomplished along this line if the Highway Commission would only do a good job of cleaning up the brush while clearing the highway right-of-way, rather than banking this waste material against the woods as both an eye-sore and a fire hazard.

Now, I want to call to your attention a Garbage Dump maintained on State College Property, same being located near the creek and on the public highway running from the Camp Polk Prison to Reedy Creek State Park. This dump is a public nuisance, an eye-sore, and a health menace. While this dump is on State College property it is my understanding that the College does not do any of the dumping there. However, the Camp Polk Prison, the Highway Department, the State Fair and the general public have been observed dumping garbage, brush, building rubbish and other waste material there. Today, August 9th I observed a highway truck dumping a load of brush there.

The above matter has previously been called to the attention of the Chancellor (both past and present) of State College, the Highway Department, Camp Polk Prison, and the Wake County Health Department. Temporary clean-ups have been made on several occasions, but the dumping continues.

Now as a citizen, a tax-payer, and a property owner in that vicinity, I am appealing to you as Governor and as Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Greater University of North Carolina and asking that you use your authority in making sure that this dump - nuisance, eye-sore, and health menace is effectually cleaned up, and further dumping there be prohibited.

Dear Chancellor Bostian:

The committee you have appointed to make recommendations relative to a suitable candidate for the O. Max Gardner award in 1954 has completed its study.

Before considering the names of candidates whose qualifications have suggested possible consideration for this award, your committee has invited suggestions from all members of our faculty. The request for suggestions published in the Blue Bulletin over your name has been followed by letters to the deans of the several schools, again asking for the names of faculty members who, in their judgement, appear qualified for this honor. The committee believes, therefore, that ample opportunity has been provided for every member of our staff to express opinions and to recommend the names of qualified persons.

After examining the qualifications of possible candidates, your committee is unanimous in the opinion that Dr. Z. P. Metcalf of the Division of Biological Sciences best exemplifies the high qualities of scholarly achievement associated with the O. Max Gardner award. A bibliography of Dr. Metcalf's contributions to knowledge in his field of study is attached, together with a brief summary of his professional achievements.

Dr. Metcalf's whole life has been closely identified with North Carolina State College. His contributions to the fields of Zoology and Entomology have brought international recognition to this institution. The high regard with which he is held by his fellow scientists is reflected in the positions of honor and responsibility that he has held in professional societies of which he is a member. Dr. Metcalf has been elected to the presidency of the Entomological Society of America, to the presidency of the Ecological Society of America, and to the presidency of the American Microscopical Society. He has also served as president of the North Carolina Academy of Science. To be chosen as the president of any large national society by its membership of professionally trained scientists must be considered evidence of genuine distinction and superior achievement. To have such recognition from three large national societies is a kind of recognition that has been accorded to very few scientists in this country.


The long list of scientific papers that Dr. Metcalf has written represents only a portion of his contribution to the intellectual life of the College and the State. For more than twenty years, he was Director of Instruction in the School of Agriculture and in this position was responsible for administering the instructional programs of thousands of students. He served as Director of Graduate Studies and then as Associate Dean of the Graduate School for ten years, during which period his high standards of scholarship molded the policy of graduate education at this institution. With all of these heavy administrative duties very few years passed without the appearance of two or more scientific papers under his name.

For many years, Dr. Metcalf has been engaged in the preparation of a complete catalog of the Homoptera. This is a task of monumental proportions. Nineteen volumes are now in manuscript form ready to be checked for the final time before being sent to the printer. Fifteen volumes are nearly completed so far as the card catalog is concerned. The National Science Foundation has made a large grant to Dr. Metcalf to make possible the publication of these volumes.







Max Gardner award.

During the current year nine scientific papers have been completed and two others are in an advanced state of preparation.

For many years, Dr. Metcalf has been engaged in the preparation of a complete catalog of the Homoptera. This is a task of monumental proportions which will require when complete the publication of forty-two volumes. Thirteen volumes have been published, one is now in press, thirteen are in manuscript form awaiting final checking and the remaining fifteen volumes are now in preparation. When complete the forty-two volumes will bring together a complete record of all existing literature on these insects, together with a critical evaluation of their taxonomic status. The National Science Foundation has made a large grant to Dr. Metcalf to assist in the completion of this project and to support in part the costs incident to publication.

By his exceptional achievements as a teacher and as a distinguished scientist Dr. Metcalf has made, in our judgement, greater contributions to the general welfare of mankind than any other member of our faculty. For these reasons we recommend him to you as the member of our faculty most worthy of consideration for the O. Max Gardner award in 1955. A bibliography of Dr. Metcalf's published work is attached.

At the meeting on May 27 of the Advisory Council for the School of Engineering, North Carolina State College, rather detailed discussion and inquiry was held concerning the school's proposed request for \$62,500 of the General Assembly for the year 1955 and equal amount for 1956 for research purposes; after which the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Very few events we have ever conducted were more thoroughly enjoyed than our Board Meeting on Thursday, due largely to your magnificent hospitality.


