At the Tobacco Chemists' Conference Banquet on Thursday, October 6, we would like to ask you to extend greetings to the group, Assuming that you are willing to do this, I am making available the following information which may be of help as background material for the occasion.

This is the first time that North Carolina State College has served as host to the Tobacco Chemists' Conference. The first meeting was held in 1947 at the Eastern Regional Research Laboratory in Philadelphia. One year it was held at Duke University and on another occasion, at Winston Salem, the other meetings having been outside of North Carolina.

It would seem appropriate to comment upon the role of Land Grant Colleges in serving the total tobacco industry through aggressive research and educational programs, the close cooperation of industry being important in fulfilling these responsibilities.

The Chemists' Conference is essentially without organization, personnel of the host institution assuming responsibility for its affairs during a particular year. It is providing a wonderful opportunity for exchange of technical information on tobacco chemistry and each year since the beginning, the program has improved. This reflects, of course, an increased volume of research effort on tobacco in industry as well as in federal and state agencies. It seems to many of us that the exchange of information through a work conference of this nature on the subject of tobacco chemistry will take on increased importance as the years advance.

If there are additional details regarding the meeting, please call me and I shall try to make available to you any needed information.

Dear Mr. Clark:

In response to your letter of November 3 and because of your great interest in our athletic program, I am glad to bring you up to date on the situation regarding the continued employment of Harry Stewart.

On Tuesday of this week, Messrs Kennett, Carl Harris, and J. W. York conferred with Mr. Vann, Lex Ray, and me about this matter. Mr. Vann and I made it clear that we have not been convinced that Mr. Stewart is not doing a good job at the Cafeteria. We know that arrangements for feeding students are always criticized and are never satisfactory to every patron.

We also testified that Harry has done a superb job in raising funds for scholarships. If we were compelled to make an immediate choice between the value of his services in these two positions, we would rate of greater value his services in raising funds for scholarships. There are other individuals who can be obtained to manage the Cafeteria, but I doubt that we could ever engage another individual who would do as well with the Wolfpack Club as Harry has done.

In my position I am obliged to try to choose a course of action which is best for the overall good of the College. In arriving at a decision, the advice and counsel of various individuals is sought and carefully considered. I realize that it is impossible for me to escape the responsibility of making the ultimate decision.

I made it very clear at the conference on Tuesday that the dual arrangement has been approved up to the present time and will be permitted to continue for a while longer, because it appears to be in the total best interests of the College. At the same time I made it clear that the situation is still to be regarded as temporary and cannot be maintained indefinitely. It was agreed by most of the group that the very nature of the arrangement invites criticism and becomes the basis for much unjustified complaining.

Criticiam comes from students, faculty, alumni, and state officials. When there is a delay in payment of a bill by the Cafeteria, a complaint is made to state officials that the Cafeteria is delinquent because the manager is holding down two jobs. If a student or member of the faculty buys a meal and finds a piece Mr. David Clark

of meat which is tough and unpalatable, as occasionally happens in the best of eating establishments, he at once concludes that the manager is neglecting to give the Cafeteria adequate supervision because of another job. Of course, this might be remedied by having a top-notch assistant manager but then students will complain that they are being overcharged for meals in order to subsidize the salary of the Executive Director of the Wolfpack Club.

I do not believe critics of the dual arrangement wish to cripple the athletic program. It appears to me that while the athletic program is improving so rapidly, no better time could be found to make a different arrangement with Harry Stewart. I have assured the Directors of the Wolfpack Club that no order will be issued by my office to require Harry to give up one job or the other without further consultation with them. I am very grateful for their continued interest and support of our programs and realize fully that we cannot go ahead without that assistance. Things frequently have a way of working out for the best, and I believe this situation will do that.

Dear Mr. Coker:

Thank you for your letter of November 26 and the reference you make to Mr. Cooke's and my conference last Saturday morning. I assure you that we are most appreciative of the fine working relationships with your company and that we are always pleased to discuss with you any matters of common interest.

With the aid of Dean D. W. Colvard and others of our School of Agriculture, I am outlining certain points that have a bearing upon the College's statement which included reference to your two new tobacco varieties and I trust that the information will be of help in further considerations of the matter.

The Farm Bureau meeting held on Monday, November 21, was a public annual meeting announced through the press on several occasions. It is my understanding that invitations to attend this conference are usually sent out only to those who are asked to participate on the program. Your Dr. Rogers was a speaker at this meeting in Asheville last year.

Some time ago officials of this organization requested Dr. Colwell to speak on the subject of tobacco variety recommendations for 1956. It was in response to this request that he presented the statement to which you referred, a copy of which is attached. It is my understanding that for several weeks Dr. Guy Jones and others of the technical staff had held December 1 as the "target date" for the completion of their data summaries, and the preparation of the annual crop performance report. Our staff avoided the issuing of premature statements on this matter, in which there was great public interest, until there was opportunity to summarize the total information on the subject and to bring to bear on the problem the considered judgment of the entire staff concerned with it. With the Farm Bureau meeting scheduled for November 21, intensive work during the previous week, and even on the week-end, was required in order to have the statement prepared for that date.

The decision to advise growers of the release of Dixie Bright 244 on this occasion was made by our School of Agriculture in order to make the report on the subject of varieties as complete as possible and it was not their intent to tie this announcement in with discussions on Coker 139 and 140 to place the latter in bad light. We regret it if there have been any misinterpressions on this point. Mr. Robert R. Coker

In your letter you refer quite properly to certain data regarding Coker 139. Our group is also much impressed with the production records of Coker 139 and Coker 140 and Dr. Colwell discussed these fine records before the farm group assembled in Raleigh on November 21. Detailed information was presented on alides and I understand that copies of the data have already been transmitted to your company. I feel that you are to be congratulated upon the contribution you have made to the genetic improvement of tobacco.

The reasons for our not recommending the two varieties in question are outlined in Dr. Colwell's statement. Attacks on your two varieties are not being made by North Carolina State College. Complaints are coming from the industry itself. It is ny understanding that the characteristics which are so displeasing to the industry have been brought to your attention as well as ours. These we cannot afford to ignore. Withholding from our grovers information as important as this is not our way of meeting problems. Rather, we want the growers to feel that they have in North Carolina State College a source of information which will make available to them full facts upon which they may base their own decisions. The threat of losing our emport market, or a sizeable portion thereof, would have such a serious impact upon the total industry and economy of our State that we are compelled to give to grovers the best information possible on the matter. Cur official position is taken from Dr. Colwell's report:

"It is our belief that each grower, in making his decision as to which variety to plant in 1956, will wish to weigh carefully available facts from all the agencies and groups serving the total industry, interpreting them in relation to his own situation. We are not including them (Coker 139 and Coker 140) on the recommended list for 1956 pending further studies of these varieties grown under varying seasonal and cultural conditions, and pending the completion of studies on the aged leaf and its subsequent manufacture into cizerettes."

You may be interested in some of the complaints of industry. These are taken from communications recently received.

Company No. 1

"But primarily our domestic trade, and particularly our export trade, is looking for flavor in U. S. Tobacco. It is here that the Coker 139 has been so appallingly deficient this year."

Company No. 2

"We can only underline the seriousness of the objections against this new off-type variety 139, as we see absolutely no way to use this tobacco for the mentioned reasons. In exchange of thoughts and experience with manufacturers of other countries and people in the tobacco trade we find that our views are quite in accordance with theirs and that there is very much concern about continued planting of Coker 139 and/or similar off-type varieties."

Mr. Robert R. Coker

Company No. 3

"Our overseas trade does not like Coker 139 type and prefer that we restrict their purchases to the old fashion tobacco similar to the Hicks wariety. We have been told by Europeans that tobacco obtainable from Rhodesia or Rio Grande do Sul Brazil, in other currencies, are as desirable as type 139 from Eastern or South Carolina."

Company No. 4

"Most of our customers are foreigners and consequently our remarks are directed mostly with regard to our foreign trade. There was consistent complaint all during the year that 139 was alick, pale, having little grain, inclined to run red due to its thin texture. In addition to this, none of our customers who smoked redried 139 had any complimentary remarks about it. I am positive that if our farmers in this locality continue to grow the same type of 139 as was sold this year we will eventually lose practically all of our foreign trade. Our customers do not like anything about 139. They are frank to say that their principal reason for the preference of American flue-cured tobacco is entirely based on the inimitable flavor of American tobasco. Since they can't seem to detect any flavor in 139 it is therefore obvious that our customers were thoroughly displeased."

It is our hope that the concern of industry over the factor of flavor and aroma of your two varieties will be removed in subsequent years. Our decision to await further information before placing these varieties on the recommended list should not be construed to reflect upon your intentions or integrity. You may be assured that all of us have the highest regard for your company, its president, and technical staff and I trust that you will appreciate our point of view that no injustice has been done. I have the fullest confidence that our School of Agriculture staff gave to this matter thoughtful and objective study. In my judgment the decision to withhold recommendation of these varieties for 1956 is in the best interest of the future of the tobacco industry of our State.

Should you desire to discuss this matter with us in further detail, we shall be pleased to arrange a conference for that purpose.
