SUBJECT: Retention of Afro-American Graduate Students

Please note the letter and materials attached which were sent to each School Dean. These materials feature a concept intended to aid the promotion and retention of Afro-American Graduate Students. We would appreciate your properties in this effort.

In addition to the normal obligation that you have, there are **three** ways in which you can be of particular help: (1) Most importantly, encourage the Afro-American Graduate Students to attend this function. Often our students have mixed emotions about what the attitude of a department might be along these lines and how that attitude might effect them. Therefore, encouragement could serve to foster a positive image. (2) Your recommendation of the overall best graduate student among the Afro-Americans would be of help. In this case, "best" encompasses all academic attributes, i.e. GPA, papers presented in or outside the department, writing or research skills, leadership or service within the department with some form of documentation. (3) Attend the awards dinner with an expressed decision by April 6, 1985. (4) Raturn the attribute form with and quality of our Afro-American Graduate Students at NCSU. 

5. The organization understands that it is responsible for removal of all decorations and props immediately after the event. A service charge will be made by University Food Services if decorations and props are not removed by the designated time.


