

# ADMINISTRATIVE MEMORANDUM

SUBJECT Minimum Undergraduate Admission Requirements for the Academic Years 1988-89 and 1989-90 NUMBER 151 DATE Aug. 6, 1987

This memorandum confirms the interim minimum undergraduate admissions requirements to be in effect at all constituent institutions beginning with the fall of 1988 and continuing through the academic year 1989-90.

As discussed in Administrative Council in June and presented to the Board of Governors on July 31, the minimum requirements for the academic year 1988-89 and 1989-90 in all constituent institutions shall be these:

Applicants who otherwise meet the institution's own admissions requirements may be admitted, provided they have successfully completed

- (1) In English, four course units emphasizing grammar, composition, and literature:
- (2) in social studies, two course units including one unit in U.S. history, but an applicant who does not have the unit in U.S. history may be admitted on the condition that at least three semester hours in that subject will be passed by the end of the sophomore year;
- (3) In mathematics, two course units including Algebra I and one additional course unit; and
- (4) In science, two course units, one in physical science and one in biological science.

Copies of this Memorandum are being sent to all superintendents of schools and to all high school guidance counselors in North Carolina. Please see that notice of these interim requirements is included in all pertinent institutional publications. Please note also in your publications the selective in the fall of 1990, the minimum requirements as adopted worthe Board of Governors shall be in effect. Those requirements are described in

the attachment.

The Board of Governors has directed that there be a comprehensive system for monitoring and reporting on the preparation of applicants for admission with respect both to these interim requirements and the requirements that will be in effect in 1990. Further information on these monitoring and reporting responsibilities will be sent to you early in September.

#### RECOMMENDED MINIMUM GENERAL CRITERIA FOR ADMISSION

In accordance with the Delegations of Duty and Authority to Boards of Trustees, as adopted on July 7, 1972, it is recommended that the Board of Governors establish "minimum general criteria for admission" as undergraduate students in the constituent institutions of The University of North Carolina.

#### Background

The undergraduate admissions policies of all the constituent institutions have in common that admission requires the high school diploma or its equivalent. The institutions vary in their specification of any particular courses (units) that an applicant is required or advised to have taken and passed in high school.

The State Board of Education has substantially changed the basic requirement for graduation from the public high schools of the State. The "Standard Course of Study" was for many years set at 16 units as the basic, minimum requirement for grades 9-12. Effective 1982-83, the minimum requirement was raised to 18 units, and on February 2, 1983, the State Board adopted additional changes under which each student will be required, beginning in 1986-87, to complete successfully 20 course units in grades 9-12 as the minimum graduation requirement.

This revised 20-unit graduation requirement specifies the following distribution of course units:

- (a) 4 course units in English;
- (b) 2 course units in mathematics;
- (c) 2 course units in social studies, one unit in government and economics, and one unit in U. S. history;

- (d) 2 course units in science, one in a life science or biology, and one unit in one of the physical sciences;
- (e) 1 course unit in physical education and health; and
- (f) 9 course units as undesignated electives or as determined by the local education agency from study areas included in the "Standard Course of Study."

The State Board of Education has also established a North Carolina Scholars' Program. Designed to encourage "some students . . . to pursue a well-balanced but more vigorous high school program," the North Carolina Scholars' Program offers two optional courses of study each consisting of a 22-course unit requirement with an overall grade average of B or its equivalent for grades 9-12.

### Recommendations

- 1. It is recommended that the Board of Governors prospectively establish a minimum general undergraduate admissions requirement consisting of the high school diploma or its equivalent and including this common core of course units:
  - (a) 4 course units in English, emphasizing grammar, composition, and literature;
  - (b) 3 course units in mathematics, including geometry, and algebra I and algebra II;
  - (c) 2 course units in social studies, including one unit U. S. history; and
  - (d) 3 course units in science, including at least one unit in a life or biological science and at least one unit in a physical science, and including at least one laboratory course.

The Board of Governors strongly recommends that institutions advise that prospective students also complete at least two units in one foreign language, and that a foreign language course unit and a mathematics course unit be taken in the twelfth grade.

- . 2. These requirements will be effective beginning with the fall semester, 1988.
- 3. The President is requested to develop plans and further recommendations, in consultation with the institutions and with the public schools and the Department of Public Instruction, to inform students and parents of these requirements, and particularly to seek the active help and support of teachers, guidance counselors, principals, and local school boards in making these known to students and encouraging them to take and pass the required course units.
- 4. The President is further requested to develop, in consultation with the Chancellors, standards and procedures for making any exceptions to these minimum requirements, and procedures for the review and oversight of such exceptions. It is the intent of the Board of Governors that exceptions be made only under special circumstances.

RE: Procedures for Admission of Marginal Athletic Applicants

Following are the procedures to be used for considering applications for admission from marginal applicants who are also under consideration for athletic financial aid. They are effective immediately.

- Marginal applicants who are being considered for athletic financial aid awards will be identified by the Admissions Office and the Athletic Department.
- An interview with the Director of Admissions and the Associate Provost responsible for the Academic Skills Program (or designee) will be arranged for each applicant after application and supporting credentials have been received.
- 3. After the interview, the Director of Admissions and the Associate Provost will make a recommendation to the Provost on admission to the University and on athletic eligibility. In all cases the final decision on admission and athletic eligibility will be determined by the Provost, Associate Provost and Director of Admissions.
- 4. The Director of Athletics and the appropriate coach will be notified of the admissions and eligibility decision before the applicant is asked to sign the national letter of intent.

#### SUMMARY Search Committee Meeting Director of Admissions

Monday, November 10, 1986, 1:30 p.m. Room 206, Poe Hall

Chairman Carl Dolce convened the meeting and reviewed the agenda which was approved by the Committee. It was agreed that a summary of each meeting would be sent to the members.

Provost Nash N. Winstead met with the Committee for a portion of its first meeting. He announced the delay in the first scheduled meeting of the Search Committee was due to a decision being made on the title of the position. The decision was to title the position "Director of Admissions" rather than "Dean of Admissions." Dr. Winstead indicated that the person we should look for should have a number of years of experience in admissions. That this individual may be the director at a smaller institution or an assistant director at a larger college or university. Experience in admissions is vital and required. Proven ability of the individual selected is most important. Someone with a doctorate is preferred. The Committee is to do a national search for the position. Dr. Winstead requested that before bringing candidates to campus he would like to meet with the Chairman and/or the Committee to discuss the candidates. The Provost asked the Committee to give him three names to be considered. Currently their are 17 on the admission's office staff including a director, one associate director and four assistant directors. Following his presentation and questions, Dr. Winstead left the meeting.

Review of the Position Description: Several changes were made in the draft description including changing the application deadline from January 1, 1987, to January 12, 1987. The word "nominations" was also struck from the description. The total number of undergraduate students enrolled, as well as, the number of new freshmen and transfer students admitted for fall 1986 were added to the position advertisement. The Committee agreed to advertise in the Chronicle of Higher Education in the November 26 and December 10 editions. The notice will be sent to the UNC publication that list professional openings in the 16 campus system. The advertisement also will be listed in the NCSU Official Bulletin.

Planning Committee Procedures: After discussion, it was agreed that the Committee would be divided into subcommittees to screen the applications. The subcommittees will rank each applicant as "in" or "out." The subcommittees will give their reports to Chairman Dolce by January 26. The week of January 26 and February 2 will be used for a second round of readings on those candidates that are still "in." We will meet the week of Telephone interviews will follow with committee members being assigned references of candidates to call. It is planned for two committee members to call some references on each candidate.

Following telephone interviews the Committee will meet to shorten the list of those to be invited to campus for interviews. Three final recommendations will be made to the Provost.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned at 2:52 p.m.

Admissions Committee

The Admissions Committee, during its re-admissions deliberations in January 1987, developed a contract between the University, the Athletic Department, and suspended athletes seeking re-admission to the University. This contract required commitments by all three parties for continued enrollment of the athletes in the University. It was the intention of the Admissions Committee that this contract, requiring the athlete to be more academically responsible, would convince the athlete that academics are important to NCSU.

The Committee recently met with personnel from the Academic Skills Program, one of the three athletes who signed the contract in January, and the Athletic Director to evaluate the effectiveness of the contract. Two of the three athletes (one football and one basketball) who signed the contract have ignored it; one for the entire semester and the other since the basketball season has ended and he has no remaining athletic eligibility. Therefore, the contract's goal of making these individuals more academically responsible has not been realized. The third athlete, who has athletic eligibility remaining after this semester, met the contract during the athletic season (basketball) but has had a limited number of missed classes and tutorial sessions since then. However, it does appear that the basic goal of the contract has been met in his case and the Academic Skills personnel believe that he will be off suspended status at the end of this semester.

It is the belief of the Admissions Committee that the athletic contract, or some reasonable facsimile, is required for scholarship athletes who are appealing academic suspension and who appear to have potential for academic success at NCSU. However, the Committee is more concerned that steps be initiated to provide scholarship athletes, many of whom are marginal students, the means by which they can at least have the opportunity for academic success and not be in the position requiring a contract for continued enrollment at NCSU. To this end, the Admissions Committee unanimously passed the following recommendation at its meeting on April 16, 1987:

The Admissions Committee recommends that a permanent position be authorized within the Athletic Department with responsibility as academic advisor/counselor to the scholarship athletes and to serve as liaison between the Athletic Department and the Academic Skills Program.

North Carolina State University is a Land-Grant University and a constituent institution of The University of North Carolina.

This recommendation may be on the fringes of the purview of the Admissions Committee but a valid case can be made that it falls under Objective Number 5 of Chancellor Poulton's letter appointing the Admissions Committee - "To recommend any stipulations or conditions that should be an appropriate part of the admission, readmission, or continuation decisions for students ...." The Admissions Committee believes that this recommendation will have a direct, positive result on the academic success for the scholarship athletes.

The creation and staffing of this position will demonstrate to the athletes the importance of academics at NCSU. The individual filling this position should be an academician with training in counseling and the ability to work closely and cooperatively with the Academic Skills Program in establishing tutors and tutoring schedules. There will be no coaching responsibilities for this individual. Continuous monitoring of the academic performance of the athletes, not just during the respective athletic seasons, will be a major responsibility of this position. It is also the desire of the Admissions Committee that another responsibility of this position be to meet with the athletic recruits during the on-campus visit to further emphasize the importance of academics at NCSU.

The Admissions Committee feels very strongly that efforts are required by the University and the Athletic Department to provide the academic support to scholarship athletes which will enable them to realize academic success at NCSU. Given the marginal academic ability of many of these recruits, and assuming the University is going to continue to enroll academically marginal athletes, it is the belief of the Admissions Committee that the University is obligated to make concerted efforts to help these athletes.

SUBJECT: Readmission of Former Students

James Bundy, University Registrar, and I have discussed at length the readmission of former NCSU degree students. The present policy as stated in the undergraduate catalog and the Adviser's Handbook is:

> "Readmission of Former Students Students who were eligible to continue at North Carolina State University at the time of their leaving are eligible to return (except as indicated in (a) or (b) immediately below). Students in this category need only complete a readmission form to be readmitted to their former program.

chard admitted

a. Students who were eligible to continue at the time of their leaving who have subsequently taken work at another institution and earned less than a C average on such work must complete a readmission form and write a letter of

petition to the Admissions Committee.

b. Students eligible to continue at the time of their leaving work at North Carolina State University and earned grades which resulted in suspension must complete a readmission form and write a letter of petition to the Admissions Committee.

The changes in the grading systems have caused some confusion with the status of the former student and in some cases students reenter only to be suspended at the end of their first semester back even though their grades have been satisfactory.

Former students have automatically been readmitted by the Registrar if they were eligible to return at the time they left and had not taken subsequent work that changed their eligibility. Eighty-two (82) students have applied

for readmission for the fall semester, 1987 and in reviewing these records we have found 6 of the readmitted students are not now eligible to return because of their grade point average and the present academic rules. I also have concern with 21 of the readmitted students who have been readmitted but have less than a 2.0 average. About half of the readmitted students are in good standing with the present academic rules. There are 18 of the 82 applications now pending who have not been reviewed pending the acceptance of this memo.

The following categories have been identified as needing attention:

- Students can be eligible to return but need to be warned that they could be suspended after registering for one or several courses (which would place them in a higher required gpa).
- Students who are now eligible to return and reenter must be made aware of the difference in grading systems and the grading system they are now under.
- Students who have transferred hours into NCSU must be told that transfer hours are counted with the NCSU attempted hours in computing the required grade point average for continuation under the current suspension/extention policy.
- 4. Students who were eligible when they left NCSU but are now ineligible because of the number of hours (over 160) or their grade point average must not be permitted to reenter and must be given an explanation and alternatives.

As we are in the middle of a cycle, I propose the following readmissions process for the fall semester, 1987:

The Admissions Office will be responsible for overseeing the readmissions process and will be responsible for overall numbers which fit into the enrollment projections. When space availability and/or limitations in enrollment cause changes in the process they will be dictated by the Admissions Office to the Registrar. The Registrar will furnish the Admissions Office a summary of all actions involving the readmission of former students every Friday.

- Students who are eligible to return and who are in no academic difficulty will be reviewed and readmitted by the Registrar in routine processing.
- Students who are eligible to return but are in academic difficulty or are in danger of academic difficulty will be reviewed by the Registrar and will be warned in a letter of the problem. Letters will be sent out by the Registrar.

> Students who are ineligible to return to NCSU will be reviewed and notified by the Admissions Office of their status and of alternatives.

As these procedures are changes in the current policy involving the readmission of former students, the new information must be placed in the undergraduate catalog and the Adviser's Handbook.

I will be available to discuss this memorandum with you at any time and after approval I will proceed with communicating the information to the applicants and the proper offices on campus.
