The two seminars co-sponsored by the Provost Office and academic departments during 1985-86 provided an excellent opportunity for dialogue and exchange with black scholars. The November 4, 1985 seminar, "The Black Family", presented by Dr. Joyce Ladner and the March 27, 1986 seminar, "Freedom's Yoke: The Impact of Race and Sex on the Free Black Community given by Dr. James O. Horton were both favorably received by faculty and staff.

I do hope that similar seminars can be presented during the 1986-87 academic year. For next year, a presentation by Dr. Lawrence Gary on "Black Male-Female Cooperation" and one by Dr. John McAdoo on "Black Men in Families" may be of interest to faculty and staff. The Chancellor's Advisory Committee on Afro-American Affairs may have some interest in sponsoring these seminars next year.

Dr. James O. Horton, historian and director of the Smithsonian Institution's Afro-American Communities Project, will conduct an interdisciplinary seminar at North Carolina State University Thursday (March 27).

Horton will speak at 4 p.m. in the Faculty Senate Chambers, Room 2320 of NCSU's D.H. Hill Library. His topic will be "Freedom's Yoke: The Impact of Race and Sex on the Free Black Community." The seminar is free and open to the public.

Horton, associate professor of history and American civilization at George Washington University, is a specialist in antebellum black history. He is the author of "Black Bostonians: Family Life and Community Struggle in the Antebellum North" and "City of Magnificent Intentions," a history of the District of Columbia. His current study of antebellum free black communities is a project of the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History and the National Endowment for the Humanities.

The seminar is sponsored by the Office of the Provost and the Department of History at NCSU.






