University last week. I found the faculty and a few public citizens from the Raleigh-Durham area to be quite interested in my research.

I especially found your questions during the morning seminar regarding student-faculty contact particularly provocative. I believe that the solution to many of the performance problems among college students will be found among the characteristics, attitudes, and behaviors that I have demonstrated. Of course, there is much more work to be done, especially in the areas such as student-faculty contact, to understand better the frequency and quality of student-faculty contact that leads to higher performance among college students.

In the area of minority student performance, the challenges are even greater in order to achieve equality in performance and the quality of the college experience. I find that the interest that the faculty members showed during my presentations at your university represents a start in the right direction. I also sensed that your participation in that type of activity will continue to encourage faculty members to have a great interest in the desegregation issues.

If I can be of any further assistance to you or your university as you attempt to address some of the qualitative aspects of desegregation, or even in the areas of student access, recruitment, and retention, please let me know.
