Report of June, 1975 - March, 1980
IFAS Support of Affirmative Action
in Resident Instruction in Agriculture

The support of the Rockefeller Foundation of the highly successful IFAS Academic Development Program was terminated in June, 1975. In this program, the Rockefeller Foundation provided the stipends for students in the post-baccalaureate, pre-graduate registrations; upon admission to a graduate program the students were then funded directly by IFAS. A decision was made to continue the support, from IFAS funds, of all students currently in the program at that time. Subsequently, applicants for admission and support were to be considered on an individual basis; special stipends would be made available for continuation of pre-graduate study for "qualifiable" students who could not be admitted directly into graduate programs.

In June, 1975, seven former Academic Development Program participants were in IFAS graduate programs and on IFAS assistantships. These students subsequently graduated with the majors and degrees as follows:

Two additional black Americans were among IFAS graduate students in Summer Quarter, 1975. One, supported in part by IFAS and in part by a Graduate School Minority Fellowship, is a doctoral student in Food and Resource Economics; he is currently inactive. The other was an IFAS-supported doctoral student in Plant Pathology who graduated (Ph.D. degree) in August, 1978.

Two students were in the post-baccalaureate pre-graduate program at the termination of the Rockefeller support. One was funded a total of five quarters and was then terminated because he had failed to demonstrate potential for graduate study. The other was admitted to the graduate program of Food and Resource Economics in Spring Quarter, 1976 and received the degree, Master of Agricultural Management and Resource Development, in December 1976.

As of Winter Quarter, 1980 there are no black Americans in the special, post-baccalaureate, pre-graduate program. There are four black Americans, all women, enrolled as post-baccalaureate students. Three are in a pre-veterinary curriculum and are not eligible for the support. The fourth expects to attend graduate school but was not offered support in her initial quarter because of her marginal grade point average and GRE scores. There are eight black graduate students in IFAS programs in Winter Quarter, 1980. Two of these are on minority fellowships from the Graduate School, two are funded by GPOP, and all the others are on IFAS assistantships.

As indicated above, it was decided at the termination of the Rockefeller Foundation's support that IFAS would not actively promote the special pre-graduate program on a national scale but would consider the applications for qualifiable students on an individual basis. We have subsequently enrolled two students in this program. One withdrew during the first quarter for personal and financial reasons while enrolled in pre-professional courses needed as background for his chosen graduate program. The other was a doctoral student who had completed a master's degree but who, because of low GRE scores, was admitted initially in the post-baccalaureate program. He subsequently was admitted to the graduate program but is no longer at the University and did not finish his degree. Both of these individuals were funded at the rate of a 1/3-time assistantship during their post-baccalaureate status and the one was funded on an assistantship after being given graduate admission.

It is apparent that the effectiveness of our Academic Development Program, initiated in 1969, was successful primarily for two reasons. One is that Dean Marvin A. Brooker gave this program publicity on a national basis and in particular throughout the predominantly black colleges and universities of the southeast. The second reason is that it was one of the early programs related to graduate education for black Americans in colleges of agriculture. Since that time the recruiting pressure for qualified black Americans has become so intense in all career and education areas that agriculture has been relatively ineffective in recruiting qualified students at any acceptable level or ratio. A portion of this problem can be attributed to the dilemma of the historical association of blacks in agriculture with field labor. The most qualified black applicants for graduate or professional schools elect to go into medicine, dentistry, law, engineering, etc., rather than into agriculture.

The Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences continues to support the concept of Affirmative Action in Resident Instruction in Agriculture. We recently submitted to the black colleges and universities of the southeast posters describing our graduate programs with cards that could be mailed back for additional information (most of the replies received were from international students attending these universities). We currently have an undergraduate scholarship program in which two scholarships are set aside specifically for undergraduate black Americans who indicate an interest in agriculture.

I am attaching a draft statement designed to clarify the intent of the new Graduation Requirements and Suspension Policy as they apply to undergraduates who were enrolled as special students (UGS) prior to the 1982 summer sessions and who, during the 1982 summer sessions or thereafter, are admitted to a degree program or to unclassified status. While some members of the Coordinating Committee previously interpreted the phrase "admitted to the University in any classification" to exclude special students, the new language on the attached draft is designed to reflect what the Registrar, the officers of the Faculty Senate, and the Provost's Office had intended the policy to mean.

SUBJECT: Clarification of New Graduation Requirements and
Suspension Policy Applied to UGS Students

In the preliminary discussions concerning the impact of the new Undergraduate Graduation Requirements and Suspension Policy on various categories of students, we discovered that there were differing understandings of the applicability of the phrase "admitted to the University in any classification" to undergraduate special students (UGS). Therefore, in consultation with the Coordinating Committee for Undergraduate Advising and the officers of the Faculty Senate, we are clarifying the intent of the policy as it pertains to undergraduate special students by revising the implementation schedules which were set forth in the Chancellor's memorandum of April 19, 1982, as follows:

I. GRADUATION - 2.0 GPA REQUIREMENT

(no change in the policy statement)

- A. All undergraduate students admitted to the University or initially enrolled as special students (UGS) for the 1982 summer sessions or 1982 fall semester and thereafter will be required to have at least a 2.0 GPA to graduate.
- B. All undergraduate students initially enrolled in the University in any classification, including UGS, prior to the 1982 summer sessions will be allowed to graduate under existing University requirements through the graduation of May, 1986. After that date a grade point

average of at least 2.0, based on all courses attempted at NCSU, will be required for graduation for all undergraduate students.

II. GRADUATION - OTHER REQUIREMENTS
