State College Moves Forward with Broad Expansion Program

THE goal of a \$1,400,000 building program at State College, visualized and brought to fruition by President Frank P. Graham and Col. J. W. Harrelson, dean of administration, has been attained and State College stands today in the forefront of American educational institutions making major improvements.

Approval of PWA has been given to the final project included in the current expansion program—a proposed new textile building to cost approximately \$300,000—and all eight projects in the program will be under construction by January 1 and ready for use when the 1939-40 term begins.

"We are elated with the success our applications have met," declared Col. Harrelson, who has been a moving spirit behind State College's recent growth. A site for the new textile building will be selected soon by the faculty building committee, he said.

Forty-five per cent of the funds for the structure will come from PWA and the remainder will be paid from State appropriations authorized by the special session of the General Assembly. Provision also was made for renovation of the old textile building for use in vocational education. The

college has a \$45,000 appropriation to equip the new textile building.

Construction has started on the new chemistry laboratory building which will cost approximately \$380,000. Work is progressing on two dormitories started in August, and PWA regulations require work to begin on two additional dormitories by Nov. 7. Bids will be opened on the latter structure about Oct. 27, according to Prof. Ross Shumaker of the Department of Architecture, who is preparing the plans during a leave of absence from his college work.

The new dormitories will provide space for 710 additional students when the 1939-40 term begins. The dormitories now under construction are situated between Seventh Dormitory and Frank Thompson Gymnasium, and the other two will be located west of the present site of the dairy barns on the southwestern edge of the campus.

Two new dairy barns, estimated to cost \$75,000, will be constructed by the college on the prison farm site near Method. These projects also have received PWA sanction.

Need of an auditorium to accommodate the college's rapidly-growing student body, which has increased by 700 in the past five years, remains as one of the most pressing problems facing the administration.

Capt. Holloman Awarded High Honor in Aviation . . .

THE 1937 Mackay Trophy, highest award in U. S. Army aviation, has been awarded to Capt. George V. Holloman, '25, jointly with Capt. Carl Crane, a native of Texas. Neither attended the U. S. Military Academy at West Point.

Capt. Holloman was born at Rich Square in 1902. After graduation from North Carolina State College in 1925 he became a second lieutenant in the regular Army. He served two years with an infantry regiment before being transferred to the Air Corps.

The recipients of the award, both of

whom are stationed at Wright Field, Ohio, received the Mackay Trophy for outstanding achievement in developing and actually demonstrating the airplane automatic landing system. The first flight under their system was accomplished on August 23, 1937, and marked the first entirely automatic landing in aviation history. The entire landing control was incorporated within the aircraft itself, with no human manipulation of plane controls at any time. The officers devoted two years to perfecting the system.

The Mackay Trophy was tendered to the Aero Club of America in 1912

His duties include supervision of improvement and maintenance of rivers, harbors and the inland waterways of the State.

A native North Carolinian, Major Gillette studied electrical engineering at State College. His son, George, Jr., graduated here in civil engineering in 1935. Major Gillette also graduated from the Army Engineer School and studied engineering in France and Germany. During the construction of Wilson Dam, at Muscle Shoals, he was on duty with Brigadier General M. C. Tyler, now assistant chief of Army engineers.

During the past two years, since his return from duty in the Hawaiian Islands, Major Gillette has been in charge of the construction section of the military division, in the office of the Chief of Engineers in Washington.

Serving with the 30th Division and the Sixth Engineers, Third Division, during the World War, Major Gillette saw service in Belgium, France and Germany. He was awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action.

Prof. A. F. Greaves-Walker Awarded Doctor's Degree . . .

THE degree of Doctor of Science in Ceramic Engineering was awarded to Prof. Arthur F. Greaves-Walker, head of the Department of Ceramic Engineering at State College, by Alfred University on June 13. A unit of Alfred University, which is located at Alfred, N. Y., is the New York State College of Ceramics, the world's largest ceramic school.

Dr. Greaves-Walker this year is president of the Institute of Ceramic Engineers, which gives him a "grand slam" of the presidencies of all the engineering, technical and honorary ceramic organizations on the North American continent.

In presenting him for the degree, M. E. Holmes, dean of the New York State College of Ceramics, said:

"He was born in London, England. At the age of ten he came to this country. He was educated at the Haughton Preparatory School of Cleveland, Ohio, and the Ohio State University at Columbus, Ohio. He then started a twenty-year career in the industries, serving in the various capacities of engineer, superintendent, manager and vice-president. With this background of industrial experience, he turned his attention to ceramic education and organized the Department of Mining Engineering and Ceramic Engineering at the North Carolina State College, serving as the head of the latter department to date.

"He is a Fellow and past president of the American Ceramic Society, past president of the Canadian Ceramic Society and past president of the professional fraternities Keramos and Beta Pi Kappa. He is a member of twelve other technical organizations in which he is prominent as organizer, fellow or officer.

"During the war he served the government as consultant and employee. He is the author of thirty-six technical publications covering almost the entire field of ceramic engineering. As an associate editor of three ceramic periodicals he has had a prominent part in molding the character of our technical literature.

"Typical of his unselfish devotion to the welfare of the ceramic profession at large, are his activities during the past two years in organizing the Institute of Ceramic Engineers, in organ-

izing the Institute of Ceramic Educators and in the development of effective coöperation between the American Ceramic Society for the Promotion of Engineering Education."

Catawba County alumni held a supper meeting at the Virginia Shipp Hotel in Newton on Wednesday night, Aug. 24.

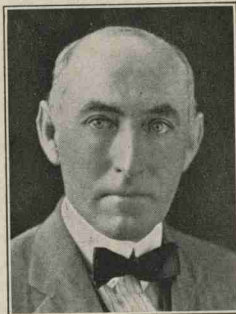

A Good System

CONGRATULATIONS to Dean Van Leer and the School of Engineering on their Personality Rating of Graduates. These ratings are entered on the student record cards the same as grades and other information. The qualifications considered in the Personality Rating are: (1) Character, (2) Leadership, (3) Judgment, (4) Industry, (5) Initiative, (6) Courtesy, and (7) Health. These qualities are defined by the Dean, in order that the ratings will be made on a uniform basis by the different departments.

Each member of the graduating class is rated A, B, C, D, or F on each of the seven points. The ratings are made by the head of each department or by a special committee from the department's faculty, then the ratings are passed on to the Dean. This information is used with other information on the record cards in preparing letters of recommendation for graduates.

In commenting on the Personality Ratings, Dean Van Leer says: "When this becomes general knowledge, I believe there will be a decided tendency among the students to make a conscious effort to improve in some of these matters and, as we all know, all of these qualities can be improved with conscious effort."

With the improvement of Character, Leadership, Judgment, Industry, Initiative, Courtesy, and Health among the State College students there will be an ever increasing demand for our graduates in positions of prominence and importance.

Debate Team Wins New Honor . . .

ANOTHER signal honor has come to the State College debate team which won national recognition last year by winning forensic encounters over several of the nation's larger colleges.

Prof. Edwin H. Paget, debate coach, announced that State College's direct clash debate with the University of Pennsylvania had been published in *Intercollegiate Debates*, national year book, as one of the ten outstanding debates staged in the United States during the last school year.

Other colleges honored in this year's selection are Cornell, Pitt, Wisconsin, Puerto Rico, Missouri, Winthrop, Arizona, Virginia, George Washington and Iowa.

The direct clash form of debate was devised by Prof. Paget and made its debut at State College in 1932. It is now being used extensively over the nation.

The debate with Pennsylvania was won by State College, 2 to 1.

Nearly all of State College's crack debate squad of last year has returned for the current session.

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Ceramics Head Planning Trip . . .

Dr. A. F. Greaves-Walker, head of the Department of Ceramic Engineering at North Carolina State College, will leave October 16 for Des Moines, Iowa, for a three-day meeting of the National Council of State Boards of Engineering Examiners.

Special efforts will be made, Dr. Greaves-Walker said, to persuade ten states to install boards of examiners to license engineers for practice of their profession. North Carolina and 37 other states already have such boards.

Dr. Greaves-Walker will attend as representative of the Institute of Ceramic Engineers, of which he is president. From Des Moines, he will go to Rolla, Mo., to speak at the Missouri School of Mines on "Technical Problems of Ceramics."

Wolfpack Defeats Cats...

SAFELY past the first of eleven hurdles on its football schedule, our Wolfpack is primed for the all-important game with the Chapel Hill division of the Greater University of North Carolina.

That first hurdle was Davidson College, downed in powerhouse fashion before the largest crowd ever to see a football game in Charlotte.

Those 13,000 souls saw an impressive Wolfpack, one that boasted plenty of power and claimed headlines in the daily prints that spoke of Wolfpack greatness. But a forward pass defense that Davidson's Bill Davis riddled caused a worried look to creep across the brow of Coach Williams (Doc) Newton of the Wolfpack.

Like a flash out of a cannon, Handy Andy Pavlovsky took the game's opening kickoff and led a charge downfield that netted the Wolfpack a touchdown on eight plays. Ken Sands, the team's only benedict, crashed over from the three-yard line. Bobby Sabolyk place-kicked the extra point. In the second quarter, Pat Fehley whipped a 13-yard pass to Don Traylor for a second touchdown. And in the third period, little Artie Rooney ran through left tackle for three yards necessary for a touchdown.

Davidson's Davis passed four yards to Fred Stair for the Wildeat touchdown and whipped another to Bob Benfield for the extra point.

Coach Newton used 25 players—two complete teams and an extra tackle and two extra guards. Only Walt Novick, understudy of Ed (Ty) Coon, the Wolfpack's sturdy left tackle, suffered severe injury. Walt is on the shelf with a bad leg laceration that came from contact with a cleat.

Expected to baffle the Wildeats with his bootleg play and huddle shift, Coach Newton instructed Quarterback Rooney to use just as few plays as possible. Not once was it necessary

for the bootleg play to be unveiled, but the huddle shift was used successfully throughout State's offensive part of the meleé.

Rooney chose his plays wisely and with a hard-charging line operating ahead, the names of Pavlovsky and Sands literally broke into the headlines. They had been touted little and their aggressive ball carrying was indeed gratifying to the coaches.

However, the most outstanding part of State's play was the way Captain Steve Acai and Alternate Captain Warren Wooden (appointed for the game) led State's offensive line play. Press box commentators said they had never seen better line play and in their Sunday and Monday editions sports writers sang the praises of these two

gallant Wolves and Coon and Bill Retter, the latter a center who is going places.

Loss of Novick caused Newton to switch Bill Windley, a 195-pound sophomore guard from Pantego, to tackle. J. B. Thompson, letter tackle, and Monte Crawford, end, returned from the injury list after the Davidson game, strengthening the reserve forces. Windley and Thompson will understudy Coon, while Ralph Burt and Julian White will work at right tackle as relief men for George Fry. Gene Conrad, who was rushed into the Davidson affray after Novick's injury, will alternate between right and left tackles.

Welfare Committee Is Selected . . .

A BROAD step to liberalize student-faculty relations at State College was taken recently with formation of a joint committee to hear student propositions and report on their merits to the general faculty.

This Student Welfare Committee is a direct outgrowth of the campus agitation that followed the order banning the Monday night dance in the commencement series last spring. The faculty council revoked the ban on that dance with provision that no ball shall be held in ensuing years following commencement exercises and the formal closing of the college year.

Under the new set-up, matters affecting student activities will originate in the joint committee, which will meet monthly for any hearings desired by students. The joint group will study the proposition or grievance and then make its recommendation to the faculty, which has authority to adopt or reject the proposal.

Tentative Dates For Dorm Bids . . .

BIDS for construction of two new dormitories at State College will be asked Oct. 12 and the letting will be held Oct. 27, Prof. Ross Shumaker, head of the Department of Architecture, announced today in setting tentative dates for the procedure.

Of brick construction, the dormitories will be three stories high and their total cost is estimated at \$323,000 of which PWA will provide \$145,000. Rent receipts from the dormitories will be used to retire bonds for the college's share of the cost.

Two other dormitories already are under construction. The four buildings will provide quarters for 710 additional students when the 1939-40 term begins at State College. Prof. Shumaker is designing the dormitories during a leave of absence from his college work. His staff is composed almost entirely of State College alumni.

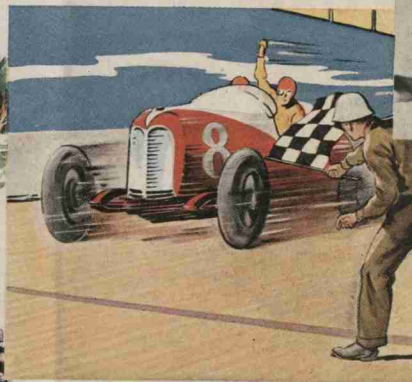

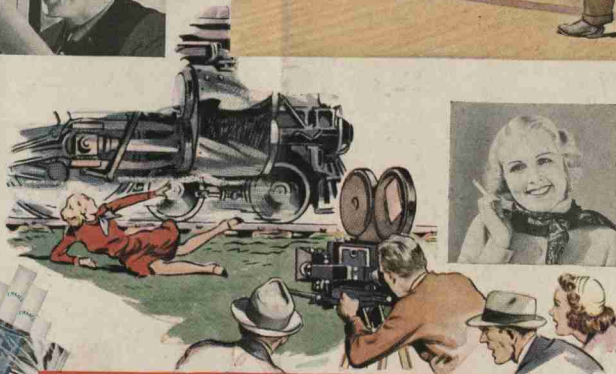
