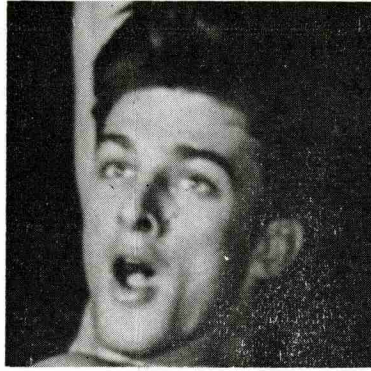

Southern Conference Senior All-Stars



Forward Hugo Kappler has been a stand-out at Carolina for three years. During his sophomore season he was selected to a first-team All-Southern position and as a junior performed brilliantly. During the past season Hugo was handicapped by a broken wrist for most of the year, but came back to Carolina's lineup near the end to star. An excellent scorer, Kappler is a driver and fine rebounder.



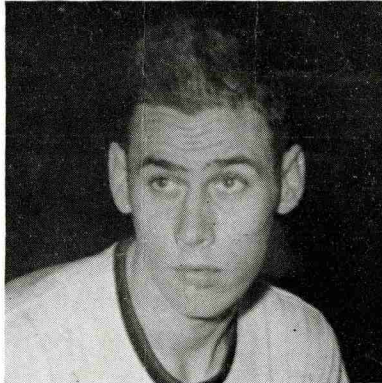
Center Alton McCotter led the Demon Deacons of Wake Forest in scoring during the past season. He uses his 6-6 frame well off the backboards and is a fine shot from his pivot position. Averaged 17.5 points per game during the last season and has scored more than 1,000 points for his collegiate career.



Guard Scotty York of Duke is one of the best set-shot artists in the Southern Conference, but the blond-haired Cleveland Heights, Ohio lad can drive well too. He saw four years of duty with the Blue Devils and is regarded as one of the best "team" players in Duke basketball history. Scotty is a play-maker, often feeding to teammates for baskets. He sets up the offensive patterns and keeps hustling all the way.



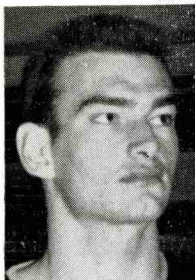
Forward Stan Najewaj has completed four years of varsity competition at Wake Forest and joins the All-Star squad for his last game. He maintained a scoring average of above 15 points per game for his entire career with the Deacons. Stands 6-4 and is an aggressive rebound artist. Uses hook shot to good advantage and is excellent free throw shooter.



Center Jim Slaughter was the nation's fifth ranked scorer at the end of the regular season. He broke all scoring records while a member of the University of South Carolina Gamecock squad. Slaughter tallied 555 points in 24 games for a 23.1 average. "Slim Jim" stands six-feet, eleven inches and is one of the nation's top rebound men. He pulled down 400 rebounds in 24 games for an average of 16.7 per game. He is a native of Roanoke, Va.

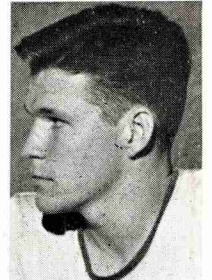


Guard Charlie Thorne of Carolina is one of the most consistent performers ever to don a White Phantom uniform. Although not a high scorer, Thorne is brilliant as a team player. He led the Carolina squad in assists during the past season and was responsible in a great measure for the success enjoyed by the squad during the latter portion of the season. Thorne can hit the basket well from the outside and is a good rebounder for his size. Stands 5-11 and hails from Rocky Mount, N. C.



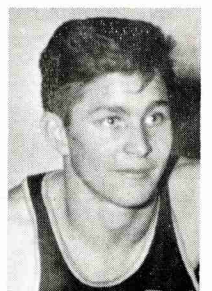
Center Tex Tilson of Virginia Tech is one of the great stars of the Southern Conference. During the past season Tex scored 566 points for a 20.5 game average. His hook shot is one of the best seen since Chet Geirmack graduated from William and Mary. He is a hard worker off the backboards and an excellent shot at the free throw line. Stands six-feet, four inches and hails from Blacksburg, Va.

Guard Fred Hengeveld of Davidson is another brilliant outside shooter on the All-Star squad. He's a constant threat with his looping shot and can drive for the basket, if the occasion demands. A fine competitor, Hengeveld has been hampered by a knee injury, but is due to be in top shape for the All-State game.



Forward Arthur Cerra led the George Washington Colonials in scoring this year. He tallied above 20 points on 15 occasions and averaged nearly 18 points per game for the entire season. A native of Brooklyn, N. Y., Cerra can hit well from the outside and drives in close for lay-ups. Is very deceptive dribbler and great ball-handler. Stands six-feet, four inches and weighs 190 pounds.

Guard Ed McMillian of William and Mary has been nicknamed "The Gunner" for his shooting habits. He had hit the basket with unusual accuracy from the outside and can give and go with the best players seen in the conference. McMillian was a unanimous selection to the 1951 Southern Conference All-Tournament team and he was among the highest scorers in the tourney. McMillian is a great ball-handler and dribbler and keeps going at a terrific pace during the entire game.

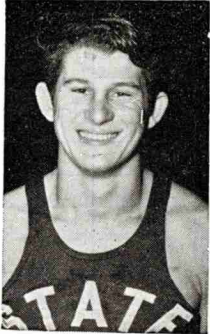

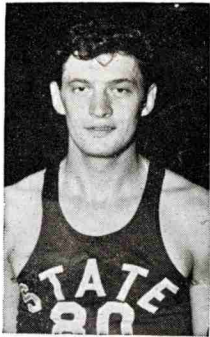
#77 SAM RANZINO, Gary, Ind.

6'1" Forward . . . Made seven All-America squads last year, three first teams, three seconds and one third . . . Scored 624 pts. last season, breaking several NCAA tournament records, which include most number of free throws scored in tournament, most number of total points in three games, most number of points in one game (32) . . . Sam's one-handed push shot is one of best in game . . . senior this season and captain of the 1950-51 squad . . . Will be featured in number of national magazines this winter . . . won team free-throw trophy last year with 72 percent accuracy . . . Earned three previous monograms . . . All-Southern too.



#81 BOB COOK, Columbus, Ind.

6'4" Forward . . . 190-pounds . . . Earned varsity letter last year, and looked vastly improved toward end of season . . . Can play center or forward. Good hook shot. Very aggressive. Will come with experience this season.

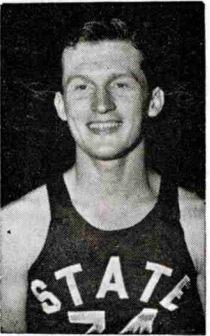
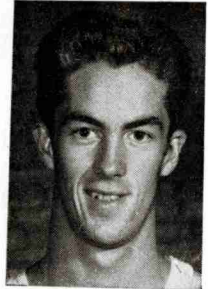


#84 PAUL HORVATH, Chicago, Ill.

6'5" Forward . . . 195-pounds . . . Held out of action during freshman season because of transfer rule in Southern Conference. Transferred to State from Bayonne, N. J. Junior College where he was star performer. Fast and good shot. Great rebound man. Likely to be paired with Ranzino as starters. Sophomore.

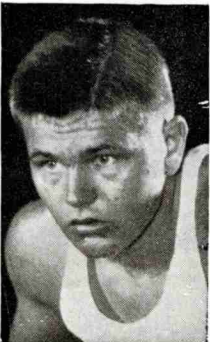
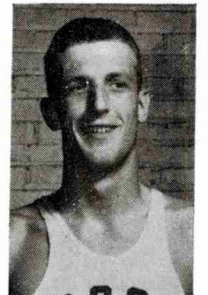


#78 Victor Bupas, Gary, Ind.

6'2" Guard . . . Great defensive player and one of the finest set-shots on club . . . Very deceptive dribbler and drives for basket well . . . Selected All-Southern last season, All-Dixie Classic, All-Southern Conference tourney . . . Team man of highest caliber . . . Always hustling and sparks club through some tough times . . . Field goal percentage of 40 percent highest on team and would score more points if he made more attempts. Shot fewer times last year than any regular on squad . . . Senior . . . Married, one child . . . Three-year veteran.

#80 BOBBY SPEIGHT, Akron, Ohio

6'7" Forward . . . 185-pounds . . . Sophomore . . . Number two scorer on freshman team last year, averaging 11.3 points in 24 games. Tallied 273 points . . . Fine shot from outside and works many tip-ins off backboard . . . Born in Raleigh, N. C., but moved away as child . . . Is rated as fine prospect and should have impressive season.

6'0" Guard . . . Excellent ball-handler and defensive man . . . Has improved shot this year and may become more potent scorer. Last year he scored only 42 points in 27 games . . . Scrappy type and loves game . . . Has improved a great deal as a result of experience in Catskill Mountains this past summer . . . Junior . . . Earned letter last year.

#85 EDDIE MORRIS, Winston-Salem, N. C.

6'5" Guard . . . 200-pounds . . . Sophomore . . . One of the bright defensive stars developed as freshman last year . . . Can hit outside set-shot well and really works hard on defense . . . Battles for rebounds off both offensive and defensive backboard . . . Could easily break into starting lineup this season, particularly if he improves his offensive scoring punch . . . Prepped at Reynolds High . . . One of the best North Carolina prospects ever to attend State.
