John P. "CLIPPER" SMITH Head Coach of Football North Carolina State College

John P. "Clipper" Smith, State's new head football coach, is a graduate of Notre Dame where he played football for three years under the late Knute Rockne.


Rockne named Smith, a guard, as one of the seven greatest football players ever developed at Notre Dame. It was Smith's clipping ability that won him football fame and also the title, "Olipper" Smith. In 1927 as captain of the Irish team, he was named All-American guard.

Following his appointment as head coach last winter at State, Smith named Frank Reese, a member of the Notre Dame backfield during the reign of the Four Horsemen, as his assistant. At the time of his appointment as assistant, Reese was head coach at Spring Hill College in Mobile, Ala.

Coach Smith has had three years of coaching experience. Following his graduation at Notre Dame in the spring of 1928, he became one of Rockne's line coaches. Reese was also a member of the Irish coaching staff at this time, helping Rockne with the backfield. In 1929, Smith became line-coach at Hartford, Conn., and last year worked in the same position at Georgetown University in Washington, D. C. Reese has also coached at Wabash College.

Smith is one of the youngest head coaches in the country, being only 27 years of age, but is believed to have excellent coaching ability. He has a thorough knowledge of the Rockne system. Smith will work with the State line and Reese will devote his time to the Wolfpack backfield.



1930 FOOTBALL RECORD

North Carolina State's football record for 1930 was not impressive. The Wolfpack won two games and lost eight.

Many obstacles interrupted the "Packs" ambitions. Soon after the season opened, it became evident that State's newly acquired coach, John M. Van Liew would not do as a mentor and at the middle of the season, he resigned, causing a change in the coaching system just at the time the team should have been working at its best. Then too, the freshman team of 1929 had walked off with the yearling championship with a display of wonderful freshman football and unfortunately, football fans expected to see these same freshmen cop the varsity title as sophomores. From the 1929 team which won one game, only seven letter men were back for the 1930 squad. These were: Captain Mack Stout. guard; Bud Rose and Coon Silver, ends; Sparky Adams, quarterback; Dink Dellinger, Johnny Johnson, and Hank McLawhorn, half backs.

Despite the bad showing of the Wolfpack, State placed two men on the all-State team, namely: Capt. Stout, guard and Charlie Cobb, sophomore tackle. Both were mentioned several times for All-Southern honors. For his brilliant play as a sophomore, Cobb was elected as captain of the team for 1931.


Twenty-three men of the varsity team were awarded sweaters and monograms. They were: Coon Silver, Allen Nelms, Willie Duke, Bob Greason and Bud Rose, ends; Charlie Cobb, Milo Stroupe and Rudy Seitz, tackles; Capt. Stout, Richard Davis, Mat Matlack and Romeo Lefort, guards; Red Espey and Robin Gardner, centers; Sparky Adams and Snoozie Morris, quaterbacks; Bob Cook, Dink Dellinger, Hank McLawhorn and Johnny

Johnson, half backs; and Sam Gurneau, O'Deal Sharpe and Charlie Jeffrey, full backs.

Of this list, all are back this year except Stout, Silver, Gardner, Adams, Johnson and Sharpe. Sharpe was a sophomore last year, but failed to return to school this fall. Thirteen of the 23 were sophomores. They are: Cobb, Stroupe, Espey, Matlack, Seitz, Gurneau, Cook, Greason, Nelms, Duke, Jeffrey, Sharpe and Morris. The other five, Leforte, Rose, Davis, McLawhorn and Dellinger are seniors. Frank Gorham, a letter man of the 1929, is also on hand this fall.

During the early fall, State installed a lighting plant for the expected use at night games, but only one game was played under the arcs, this, the first contest with High Point College which State won 37-0. The Techs lost to Davidson at Greensboro 12-0 in their next game and this was followed by a 27-0 defeat at the hands of the University of Florida at Tampa. Clemson won by the same score at Charlotte the next week and in the annual State Fair classic, Wake Forest defeated the Pack 7-0 on Riddick Field at Raleigh. Following the Deacon game, State defeated Mississippi A. & M. 14-0 at Raleigh. This game was the first with Dr. Ray Sermon. athletic director at State, acting as head coach. Dr. Sermon was placed in charge of the squad to succeed Van Liew. At Asheville. Presbyterian College stopped the Wolves 2-0. State's best game of the season was with Carolina at Chapel Hill, the Tar Heels winning, however; 13-6. In a game played in a sea of mud at Raleigh, Duke won 18-0. State closed its 1930 season with a 19-0 defeat at the hands of South Carolina at Columbia.

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STATE'S 1931 BOXING RECORD

Boxing was made a minor sport at State College during the past winter and immediately became one of the leading sports at the institution.

Several attempts at organizing a boxing team at State had been made prior to last year, but nothing definit was done until the athletic council adopted the sport.

State's first team, under the coaching direction of Lieutenant C. H. Elms of the College R. O. T. C. unit, won two of its six matches with outstanding teams in the south. An estimated crowd of 3,000 turned out for State's first home 'appearance with Duke University, Duke winning 4-3.


State's outstanding boxer was found in William "Red" Espey of Hickory, a sophomore. Espey won all six of his fights in the unlimited and heavyweight classes. Capt. Sam DiMeo, in the 145 pound class, won three and lost three as did H. E. Karig in

the 115. Karig and Espey were elected cocaptains for this years team. Karig is a senior.

The Techs opened the season by losing to Duke at Durham 6-1. Washington and Lee took all but one of the bouts at Washington and Lee in the next meet. In a return engagement with Duke at Raleigh, the Blue Devils won 4-3. South Carolina won by the same count in a fight at Columbia. State's first win came at the expense of the Citadel, State getting a 4-3 decision at Charleston. Returning home, State wound up its six match schedule with a 5½-1½ win over Presbyterian College.

Men receiving the first boxing awards were: Capt. DiMeo, Espey, B. Beavers, L. E. Bowers, Carl Hinson, Karig and Harry Foreman. Of this number, DiMeo, Beavers and Foreman were lost by graduation.



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STATE'S 1931 BASKETBALL RECORD

Although winning but one game more than it lost, State's 1931 basketball season was successful. The team more than broke even in Big Five play, with five wins and three loses placing the Red Terrors second to Duke in the State standing. It was against schools in Georgia and South Carolina that State found the going rough. The seasons record was eight games won and seven lost. State lost out in the first round of the Southern Conference tournament at Atlanta to Kentucky who went in to the finals to be defeated by Maryland.

Dr. Ray R. Sermon, athletic director at State, coached the varsity cagers this year for the first time. He took over the duties left vacant by Gus Tebell who resigned in the spring of 1930. Sermon developed a smooth working team that listed three letter men and two sophomores. Another letter man alternated with a sophomore at forward. State's first team consisted of John Gammon and Ralph Johnson, a sophomore, forwards; Claude Morgan, center and Bud Rose and Gilbert Clark, another sophomore, guards. Skeet Atkinson, letter man, played half of the games at forward in place of Johnson.

State placed three men on the all-State team: Gammon, forward, and Rose and Clark alternating at one of the guard berths. State's two guarls were without doubt, the best pair of defensive men in the State and both were fairly accurate at the basket from mid floor. Rose will captain the team this year.

Other stars were found in Johnson, forward, Gurneau, center and forward and Allen Nelms, guard. These three were sophomores.

State's two biggest wins of the season were over the Duke Blue Devils, Duke's only defeats in Big Five play. The scores were 24-19 and 26-23.

Monograms were awarded the following players: Gammon, Johnson, Atkinson, Morgan, Gurneau, Rose, Clark and Nelms. Of this number, only Gammon and Atkinson were lost by graduation.

Several promising freshman players will be on hand to fill these two vacancies. They are: Jay and Beaghen, centers; Roach and Brown, forwards and McQuage and Kinken, guards.

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STATE'S 1931 BASEBALL RECORD

State started its 1931 baseball schedule off with a bang by defeating Maryland, 7-0 but after that win, its record for the remainder of the season was up and down, the final tabulation showed six games won, nine lost, one tied and two rained out.

State's hope for a Big Five title were virtually shattered when it became known that Captain Bill Averette would not be eligible for play. Averette was Coach Chick Doak sole mound staff as Lefty Wade, the expected other half, did not enter school for the third term. Zeb Plonk, eatcher and cocaptain with Averette also failed to reënter school.

Despite the set backs, Coach Doak began his work of shaping up a team with eight letter men and several promising yearling players. The letter men were: Outen Gerock, first; Tony Furtado, second; Fred Wilkie, short; Charlie Turner, third; Bill Brake, Willis Hargrove and J. O. Meade, outfielders.

Doak shifted Turner from third to catcher and placed Snoozie Morris, a Sophomore, on third. The rest of the team was composed of the letter men to start the season except for Willie Duke, another Sophomore, who was in the field. Before the season was a third underway, Doak had placed Duke on third and Allen Nelms and Troy Goodman, two Sophomores, in the outfield with Hargrove. Morris was alternated from short to second with Bill Ebey and Fred Wilkie, short stops and Tony Furtado, second baseman. This team functioned as a unit practically the entire season.

The outstanding players were Willie Duke and Snoozie Morris in the infield and Troy Goodman in the outfield. John Lanning, and Hank McLawhorn divided pitching honors with Seitz as a third best.

Willie Duke was named all-State third baseman.

Seventeen men were awarded letters. They were: Tony Furtado, Ned Wood, second baseman; Bill Ebey, Fred Wilkie and Snoozie Morris, shortstops; John Lanning, Rudy Seitz and Hank McLawhorn, pitchers; Willie Duke, third; Charlie Turner and W. N. Fuller eatchers and Willis Hargrove, Allen Nelms, Troy Goodman, Bill Brake and Charlie Jeffrey, outfielders. Furtado, Hargrove, Brake and Turner were lost by graduation. Ebey, Lanning, Jeffrey, Seitz, Duke, Nelms, Goodman, Morris, Wood and Fuller were Sophomores and Wilkie, McLawhorn and Gerock, Juniors.
