

COACHING STAFF AND MILLIGAN MAKE DEBUTS

Head Coach Beattie Feathers of State College, one of the greatest backfield stars in the history of the nation, tonight presents the first team which he has coached at State College. The Wolfpack, under Coach Feathers' direction, will use a combination of the vaunted Tformation and the Tennessee style of offense.

Coach Feathers, a familiar figure to the nation's pigskin fans since 1933 when he was selected as an All-American player, is an unassuming but effective leader and has gained the respect and admiration of his associates for his efficient work in molding a group of 29 inexperienced players, many of whom have never played on a college gridiron until this fall, into a spirited, versatile, and fast-working ball club.

When he was a member of the rugged Chicago Bears' professional football team, Coach Feathers gained 1,006 yards in one season, a record that has never been equalled and probably never will be. Each time the husky Feathers carried the ball he averaged gaining 9.8 yards almost a first down each trip!

The other two members of State's coaching staff are making their first public appearances in Riddick Stadium tonight, also. They are Line Coach Al Thomas, former Tennessee guard and Rose Bowl veteran, and End Mentor Star Wood, ex-Milligan athlete and former assistant to Coach Feathers at Appalachian.

Milligan College, located at Johnson City, Tenn., tonight plays its first game against State College, which extends a cordial welcome to its well-known visitors. The Milligan team, known as the Buffaloes, is composed mostly of Navy V-12 students, while State's Wolfpack is an all-civilian squad.

Milligan has played two games on this season's schedule already. The Buffaloes played Emory and Henry on September 10 and Carson-Newman on September 17.

Although it is the first meeting of State and Milligan, the two schools have already become known to each other through End Coach Star Wood of State College, who was an outstanding member of the Milligan team in 1933 when he was selected for the All-Conference team in Tennessee.

Tonight marks the opening of State College's 1944 football season during which the Wolfpack will play host to four colleges on this field and will play away from home on five occasions.



General Dwight D. Eisenhower, Supreme Commander of the Allied Armies. He learned the way to victory as a cadet at West Point.

IVIDENDS IN BATTLE

THE BITTER RIVALRY between Salina and Abilene High Schools in Kansas was brewing at an unusually high pitch. Salina had a great team. Its coach had developed a powerful play, a delayed smash through tackle, that had been primarily responsible for Salina's long string of victories. Eager to run up a large score on the underdog Abilene team, the Salina quarterback called for this off-tackle play in the early moments of the ball game. As expected, the play clicked perfectly as the frail Abilene tackle was sucked out of position and hurled aside by a pair of fierce blocks. The play worked out so well the first time that the Salina quarterback enthusiastically barked out the signals for the ground-gainer in the next sequence of downs. But the lid was off and the young Abilene tackle bounced the ball carrier back four yards behind the line of scrimmage. And he repeated this spine-tingling defensive play again and again throughout the remainder of the game. Every time Salina attempted their heretofore infallible line smash the result was the same. That young player who was fooled the first time but never after that is none other than the Supreme Commander of the Allied Armies now throwing the Germans back in his great drive on Berlin.

By a curious quirk of fate young Dwight D. Eisenhower entered the United States Military Academy in June, 1911, at the age of twenty-one. His first choice, strangely enough, was to enter the Naval Academy at Annapolis, but upon submitting his papers it was found that the future general was a few months over the age limit. Today, his choice is still West Point, we'dened by the fact that his only child, a son, John Sheldon Doud, followed the Eisenhower tradition by arraduating from the Military Academy last June.

Kansas in general and Abilene in particular claim General Eisenhower as their native son, but actually he was born in Dennison, Texas, while his father was working on an engineering project. When only two months old he was taken to Abilene and so the stamp of Kansas is deeply marked upon him.

When young "Ike" entered high school he was many pounds lighter than the average of his classmates, but he was, according to his old football coach, "the most outstanding tackle in the valley." His special talents were his speed and ability to diagnose the plays of his opponents. At West Point Eisenhower turned out for the Academy freshman team and was shifted to the backfield. His brilliant ball carrying capitizated the entire freshman coaching staff and West Point looked forward to the following season with high hopes as this Plebe kept churning off the yardage.

True to form, Ike was rapidly developing into the most promising back in Eastern football. Against a strong Colgate eleven, Eisenhower could not be stopped. But fate again caught up with him. In a game with Tufts, Cadet Eisenhower broke his knee on one of his daring plunges into the line and the career of a truly great football player was abruptly ended.

Not content to be entirely severed from the game he so dearly loved, Eisenhower turned to coaching the Cullum Hall or freshman team and also urged the varsity eleven on to victory as the cadet cheerleader.

General Eisenhower graduated from West Point in the upper third of his class in 1915 and became a specialist in tank warfare, serving in the last war as a Lieutenant Colonel.

The General likes and respects a good soldier and speaks his language. He is a soldier's soldier who never forgets in the large scope of the strategic pattern that it is usually the foot soldier, tramping through thick and thin, mile after mile, who achieves the final victory. Nothing bears this out more firmly than his stirring military achievements in North Africa, Tunisia, Sicily and the ever-progressing march into fortress Europe today.

General Ike won his license as an airplane pilot at the age of 48. Of flying, Eisenhower said: "There's exultation being up there in the blue all by yourself. No muddy roads, no detours, no signs. If you want to take a look at something, you dive down and look at it. If you don't like it, you soar up and find something else. You can do any dammed thing you like."

While the bombs of enemy artillery and aircraft are exploding all about the Supreme Commander's headquarters in France, far from the battlefronts, in the peaceful little town of Abilene, Kansas, a slight, white-haired, 83-year-old mother gives us the assurance that: "Dwight's there... and he can't lose!"
