Chattanooga's Moccasins, winners of three games in five starts, provide Coach Beattie Feathers State College Wolfpack with the opposition tonight and though you may be expecting only a fair to mediocre ball game, let us assure you that there'll be plenty of action on the gridinon of Riddick Stadium.

Victors over Tennessee Polytechnic Institute, 12-0, Centenary, 20-0, and Dayton University of Ohio, 19-13, the Moccasins bring a fine team here tonight, which is rated by many experts as one of the better smaller college outfits in the nation.

The Mocs operate from the Notre Dame shift and display a colorful brand of hipperdipper football. In case you aren't up on your football the Notre Dame shift, dreamed up by the immortal Knute Rockne, is a variation on the T-formation. The Moccasins come out of the huddle, line up in the T, then with the first series of numbers called by the quarterback, they shift into the single-wing. The shift moves the quarterback over from behind center to a position directly between the strong side guard tackle, with the wingback wide as usual in the single-wing. Simple, isn't it, or is it.

Chattanooga is coached by A. C. (Scrappy) Moore, a former University of Georgia quarterback. He's an old hand at this coaching business and a past master with the Notre Dame shift. You'll probably see a lot of thrilling football from the Moccasins, for they're as treacherous on the gridiron to their opponents as their name implies.

State seeks lonight to get back on the victory road from which they were so roughly brushed two weeks ago by a dogmatic band of Florida 'Gators and a swivel-hipped halfback named Bobby Porbes. Last week's open date in the schedule didn't do much to improve the nuch-injured Wolfpack, but there'll still be enough Red and White warriors on the field to give the visitors a rough time of it. You'll witness a change over in the State backfield for the first time tonight. Fullback Leslie Palmer, who ranks as the fifth best punter in the nation, has been shifted to the tailback position to help out State's regular Ball-carriers, Gwynn Fletcher and Charlie Richkus. At fullback its husky George Allen of Kings Mountain as the starter with John Huzvar, and Dick Johnson on hand as reserve strength.

Despite the loss to Florida, the Wolfpack still elings to one of the top spots in the nation as a defensive team. In four games against Duke, Clemson, Davidson and Florida, State has yielded an average of only 105.8 yards to opponents. This includes running and passing. State, too, has been impressive on pass defense and was rated the third best team in the nation after four games, having given up only 32.0 yards per game. State is the only team in the mation which has held the mighty Duke Blue Devils to less than 70-yards gained both running and passing.

You'll probably witness one of the most interesting punting duels ever exhibited in Riddick Stadium tonight. Chattanooga's Halfback Hartford Granitz holds at 42.3 yard mark for the season. He kicked a total of 273 yards from scrimmage in six tries against Tennessee for an average of 45.5 yards per try. State's Palmer has a 44-yard average for four games and against Duke Palmer booted for a neat 53-yard mark. When these two men lock up in a punting duel, you'll be seeing two of the best in the nation.

The next big date on State's schedule is Nov. 15 when the Wolfpack bangs heads with the highly-rated Wake Forest Deamon Deacons in this stadium. It's an afternoon affair with the kickoff set for 2 o'clock. Next week State is at Chapel Hill to face the University of North Carolina Tar Heels.



AFTER 58 YEARS



North Carolina State College, the center of technical education and research in the South, celebrated the 58th anniversary of its establishment on October 3, 1947, and rededicated itself to the ideals and principles of its founders.

Chancellor J. W. Harrelson, the present chief administrative officer of the institution, has led the College to its greatest period of usefulness. The College and its allied agencies reach many thousands of North Carolina citizens annually with its varied services in agriculture, engineering, teacher education, and textiles.

Establishment of the institution was due largely to the militant efforts of Col. Leonidas L. Polk, hard-hitting editor of The Progressive Farmer, the Watauga Club, and the provisions of the Morrill Act of 1862. From its humble beginning, the college has marched straight ahead to take a position of leadership among the institutions of technology in the United States.

The College has grown from its one building in 1889 to a physical plant valued in excess of \$7,000,000 today, with a building program of over \$6,000,000 now in progress. The enrollment has advanced from 72 students—who reported to President Alexander Q. Holladay during the first academic year—to over 5,000 today.

The teaching faculty has jumped from President Holladay's original staff of 20 to approximately 400 now.

During the pre-war years, State College reached about 11,000 persons annually through its regular residence courses, extension classes, correspondence courses, and special short

courses. More than 23,000 men and women were trained at the college for war work during World War II.

Adjoining the campus to the west are 456 acres including the College orchards, gardens, poultry plant and farms, and the Central State Agricultural Experiment Station. About one mile west of the campus, the institution has acquired 1,300 acres which are maintained as livestock farms by the Department of Animal Husbandry and Dairying.

The College's main division include the School of Agriculture and Forestry, the School of Engineering, the School of Textiles, the Division of Teacher Education, the Graduate Division, the Basic Division, and the Summer School. The Department of Military Science and Tactics, providing ROTC training for the students, consistently has received an annual rating of "excellent" from the War Department.

Principal landmarks on the campus include Holladay Hall, the school's first building; the birthplace of Andrew Johnson, 17th president of the United States; Memorial Tower, impressive monument to the State College students who served in World War I; the home of the chancellor; Pullen Hall, named in honor of R. Stanhope Pullen, who donated the land for the original campus; a memorial to the 13 original colonies; and other sites of interest.

State College has more than 25,000 living alumni, many of whom are nationally known for their accomplishments in industry, science, military progress, agriculture, education, and political life...Rudolph Pate.

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



Additional funds and pledges are needed in order that this building may soon be a reality.

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
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
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
