





State plays host tonight to Coach Raymond (Bear) Wolf's University of Florida 'Gators and the glad hand of welcome is herewith extended to the Ploridians from Gainesville. Wolf is a former head coach at nearby University of North Carolina, so he's no stranger to these parts.

Although Florida lays no claim to gridiron greatness, it's a scrappy outfit that Wolf brings to Riddick Stadium tonight. The 'Gators haven't tasted victory in 13 previous starts, but don't sell them short. It's been a season of tough breaks and but for ill-timed penalities and a run of heart-breaking luck Florida might be bringing an unbeaten eleven against Coach Beattie Feathers' Wolfpack.

Be bringing an unbeen extended again the second sec

Florida makes no excuses for its current record, so why should we try to set them forth here. Keep in mind as you watch this contest that the potentialities of the 'Gators are many. They're big and fast, even if lacking in experience. Their freshmen are talented and if given half an opportunity they are capable of displaying plenty of power.

Top men in the Florida colors are Hal Griffun, No. 80. a highly-underrated taiblack. He scatted 80-yards against State last year, even though the Pack won by a lopsided 39-6 score. Too, there's Halfback Loren Broadus, a former All-Southern high school star at Jacksonville. He's wearing No. 58. For future reference also mark down Doug Belden, No. 77, a starter at quarterback in Florida's T-formation.

Florida's line is led by Paul Mortellaro of Tampa. He's a three-year letterman at guard and weighs 205. Also there's John Natyshak, a hot freshman tackle at 220-pounds and ends Tom Bishop and Dewell Rushing. The Wolfpack is gunning tonight for its third victory in a row and to keep clean a perfect home record, which dates back to the 1945 season. State will be banking on the running and passing of Tailbacks Charlie Richkus, No. 14, and Gwym Fletcher, No. 60. Richkus, a great runner, boasts a 5.5-yard average for 34 tries in three previous games, while Fletcher has a 4.2-yard mark for 32 tries in the same number of contests.

From end to end State has a great line. That's no overstatement, for defensive averages prove that the Wolfpack forward wall is among the best in America. Tackles Jim Rees, No. 73 and Ted Dostanko, No. 67 are two big reasons why opponents have failed to net more than a 34-yard average rushing in three games. End Al Phillips, a senior from Cary, is a genuine candidate for All-Southern honors this season. Guards Bernie Watts, John Wagoner, and Charlie Musser stack up with the best in the South also. Center Harold Saunders, a sophomore from Statesville, is tops at his center slot.

On Tuesday of this week State was rated as the 18th best team in America in a nationwide Associated Press poll. We make no apologies for the Wolfpack. They're capable of playing great football. But behind the performance of the team is the unceasing work of the State coaching staff composed of Line Coaches Bob Suffridge and Lyle Rich, and Backfield Coach Walter (Babe) Wood, who assist Head Coach Feathers.

And last, but far from least, is the work of State's fortheall managers led by J. B. (Red) Walker of Marion. Red along with his assistants William Joyner of Wilson and Bill Musseer, a brother to starting guard Charlie Musser, have done a fine job. Their work is often thankless, but it should not go unrevarided.

On the schedule: State has an open date next week end, but on Nov. 1 the Wolfpack meets Chattanooga U. in this stadium at 8 o'clock.



AFTER 58 YEARS



North Carolina State College, the center of technical education and research in the South, celebrated the 58th anniversary of its establishment on October 3, 1947, and rededicated itself to the ideals and principles of its founders.

Chancellor J. W. Harrelson, the present chief administrative officer of the institution, has led the College to its greatest period of usefulness. The College and its allied agencies reach many thousands of North Carolina citizens annually with its varied services in agriculture, engineering, teacher education, and textiles.

Establishment of the institution was due largely to the militant efforts of Col. Leonidas L. Polk, hard-hitting editor of The Progressive Farmer, the Watauga Club, and the provisions of the Morrill Act of 1862. From its humble beginning, the college has marched straight ahead to take a position of leadership among the institutions of technology in the United States.

The College has grown from its one building in 1889 to a physical plant valued in excess of \$7,000,000 today, with a building program of over \$6,000,000 now in progress. The enrollment has advanced from 72 students—who reported to President Alexander Q. Holladay during the first academic year—to over 5,000 today.

The teaching faculty has jumped from President Holladay's original staff of 20 to approximately 400 now.

During the pre-war years, State College reached about 11,000 persons annually through its regular residence courses, extension classes, correspondence courses, and special short

courses. More than 23,000 men and women were trained at the college for war work during World War II.

Adjoining the campus to the west are 456 acres including the College orchards, gardens, poultry plant and farms, and the Central State Agricultural Experiment Station. About one mile west of the campus, the institution has acquired 1,300 acres which are maintained as livestock farms by the Department of Animal Husbandry and Dairying.

The College's main division include the School of Agriculture and Forestry, the School of Engineering, the School of Textiles, the Division of Teacher Education, the Graduate Division, the Basic Division, and the Summer School. The Department of Military Science and Tactics, providing ROTC training for the students, consistently has received an annual rating of "excellent" from the War Department.

Principal landmarks on the campus include Holladay Hall, the school's first building; the birthplace of Andrew Johnson, 17th president of the United States; Memorial Tower, impressive monument to the State College students who served in World War I; the home of the chancellor; Pullen Hall, named in honor of R. Stanhope Pullen, who donated the land for the original campus; a memorial to the 13 original colonies; and other sites of interest.

State College has more than 25,000 living alumni, many of whom are nationally known for their accomplishments in industry, science, military progress, agriculture, education, and political life.—Rudolph Pate.




