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
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
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Notes from The Wolfpackage

The mythical Wake County football championship is at stake tonight in this annual gridiron contest between N. C. State's Wolfpack and Wake Forest's Demon Deacons. Each year these two rivals provide more thrills per minute than any other contest played in this immediate locality. Tonight's affair should be no exception.

Wake Forest will be seeking revenge for last year's 6-6 tie at the hands of an underdog Wolfpack squad. The Deacons, according to all reports, have been pointing for State since practice opened on Sept. 1. Even before last week's game with Boston College,

Wake Forest was working against State formations.

There's still some controversy concerning the play which netted the State touchdown last year. Wake Forest folks still contend that the lateral pass tossed by Tailback Ed Mooney to Fullback Jim O'Rourke was thrown forward and was illegal since no pass behind the line of scrimmage may be thrown forward. O'Rourke passed 70-yards downfield for the touchdown which tied the contest.

State, too, has its reasons for wanting badly to win tonight's contest. Last week at Chapel Hill the Wolfpack bowed before the University of North Carolina, 21-0. Many thought State had a fine opportunity to win from the Tar Heels, but the breaks were against Coach Beattie Feathers squad and after a mistake on a fourth down pass at the Carolina one-foot line which prevented State from keeping possession of the ball, the Wolfpack was unable to cope with the superior reserve power of the Tar Heels.

The Wolfpack is determined to make a better showing against Wake Forest, Just as last week State will be the underdog. Wake Forest's impressive 20-6 win over Boston College tabbed the Deacons as one of the finest clubs in the South. But upsets in this 44-year old State-Wake Forest series have occurred before and the Wolfpack is anxious to regain some of the

prestige lost in last week's defeat at the hands of Carolina.

Both teams will have plenty of stars to offer in competition tonight. The Deacons boast husky Bill George, one of the nation's best tackles, and Quarterback Dickie Davis, who pitched for two scores against Boston College last week. State has its own counterparts of the Deacon aces, All-America Tackle candidate Elmer Costa and Tailback Alex Webster, Costa, who made several All-America selections last year, suffered an ankle injury three weeks ago in a practice game with Camp LeJeune and may not be up to par against the Deacons, but the big State star will give a good account of himself.

Wake Forest will have a definite weight advantage in the line, boasting a corp of forwards that average 197-pounds, against State's average of 192-pounds. There's plenty of beef on both clubs and the going will be rough for the backfield stars of either squad.

The Deacons also have an advantage in weight in the backfield. Big, bruising Bill Miller, Wake Forest's fullback deluxe, Guido Scarton and Bill Hillenbrand at the halves and Quarterback Ed Kissell will likely be the starters for the Deacs and they'll boast a weight average of 187-pounds. For State only one backfield man, 200-pound Alex Webster will be as husky as Wake Forest's biggest ball-carrier, Miller. Fullback Jim O'Rourke, Wingback Jimmy Smith and Blocking Back Ray Barkouskie will bring State's average weight to 183-pounds.

Next week the Wolfpack faces another perennial Southern Conference opponent against the Clemson Tigers of Coach Frank Howard, Tickets are still available, but are going fast. If you'd like to see the Wolfpack tangle with the Tigers in a game that is certain to produce plenty of fireworks, we suggest you get the ticket as soon as possible. That's one week from tonight, Saturday, Oct. 6 here in Riddick Stadium, Reserved seats are priced at \$3,00,

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

Meet North Carolina State's Director of Athletics,



After three years at the helm of N. C. State's athletic program, Roy Bennett (Dogaton has shown that he knows his way around, His popularity has grown by leaps and bounds and everywhere he has made additional friends for the school's athletic teams.

Taking over the reins at State on August 1, 1948 Clogston found many problems confronting the program, but with a systematic effort he set about the task of building Wolfpack teams and facilities to the point where today they are considered among the best in the Southern Conference.

Under Clogston's administration the huge William Neal Reynolds Coliseum was completed and readied for the 1949-50 basketball season. It was largely through his personal efforts that the first contest was staged in the structure on December 1, 1949.

Clogston has untiringly devoted his time to the progress of athletics at State. He has been instru-

mental in helping round out the schedule of intercollegiate contests for State teams and through his efforts a full-time tennis and soccer coach was added to the Wolfquek staff. Not only is Clogston vitally interested in the major sports on the campus, but he is a close follower of the so-called minor sports of swimming, track, tennis, golf, soccer and wrestline.

A graduate of Springfield College at Springfield, Mass., Clogston is a native of Ballston Lake, N. Y. He holds a degree in physical education from Springfield and a Master's degree in physical education from New York University.

Clogston's background in college athletics is extensive. For nearly 20 years he was director of athletics at St. Lawrence University at Canton, N. Y. and during his tenure there established St. Lawrence as one of the leading small colleges in national athletic circles. At St. Lawrence he served as head football coach as well as golf and wrestling mentor.

During World War II Clogston saw extensive service with the Navy, He served as administrative officer under Commander Tom Hamilton in the farfamed Hamilton-program which brought recreation facilities to the far corners of the world. He also served as rehabilitation officer on Guam and several other bases in the South Pacific. Clogston left the service with the rank of commander and is still active in the U. S. Naval Reserve.

"Roy" as Clogston is known by all his friends lends a personal interest in all of the school's athletic teams. He participates in tennis, swimming and golf in his spare moments and shoots in the low 80'c not he golf course. Clogston is a keen judge of athletic talent and has recommended several top stars to State coaches.

Clogston is also active in the civic life of the community. He is a member of the Lions and Elks Clubs, serves as a member of the Southern Conference Baskethall Committee and is on the National Colleginate Athletic Association's committee for Physical Education, Health and Recreation. During the past summer Clogston took a course in Animal Husbandry in the School of Agriculture.

During the past year Clogston joined the ranks of the benedicts as he married the former Ruby Garrison. The Clogstons make their home in Raleigh on Glenwood Avenue Extension.

BEATTIE FEATHERS, Head Coach



Beattie Feathers will inaugurate his eighth season as head football conch at North Carolina State with the opening of the 1951 season, establishing a new record in longevity for a Wolfpack mentor. During, his tenure on the West Baleigh campus, Feathers' popularity has increased with each season. His present contract runs through the 1953 season.

Very few college coaches in the nation can boast the Feathers' background as an outstanding player in both collegiate and professional circles. Although many mentors have served longer as coaches, probably no more than a handful can claim 15 years of actual participation in the game, which Feathers achieved with four years of high school play, four years in collegiate circles and seven seasons in the professional ranks.

During his career as a player Feathers' achieved that top selection in each of his three divisions. As a prep schooler he was all-state Virginia as a backfield star at Bristol (Va.) High, at the University of Tennessee he was a unanimous All-America pick during the 1933 season, and with the Chicago Bears in 1934 he was named to the first All-Professional team, tantamount to the professional All-American

Feathers gained wide acclaim as a college star, but gained even more recognition as a professional ball-carrier. During the 1934 season he set a pro football record by gaining 1,026 yards for an average of nearly 10 yards per carry from scrimmage. That record stood until Steve Van Buren of the Philadolphia Eagles cracked it in 1949. Besides a five-year stretch with the Chiegop Bears, Feathers also performed in the play-for-pay ranks with the Brooklyn Dodgers and the Green Bay Packers.

In 1940 Feathers gave up the playing side of the gridiron to join the coaching ranks assistant at Appalachian State Teachers Coeching in Bloone, N. C. After two years as an active to the state of the

Although he had to put together a representative squad from a crew of World War II draft rejects and youngsters who had little experience, that first Feathers-coached team rolled up a remarkable record of seven wins in nine contests. The next year with even the 4P's missing the Wolfpack won only two of the nine game.

But in 1966 with a brand new team composed of war with the Wolfpack bounced back into the real part of the Wolfpack bounced back into the ranking among the top 10 clubs in the country as the Feathersmen copped cight out of 10 contests and whipped such outstanding teams as Duke, Wake Forest, Virginia, Florida and Maryland. The great success was followed by a bid to the 'Gator Bowl at Jacksonville, Florida where State dropped a 34-13 decision to the Oklahoma Sooners.

During his seven-year reim over the Wolfpack deathines Feathers has become widely known for his ability to pull at least one major upset during a season. Even during the lean years of 1948 and 1949 when State elevens could win only a combined total of six contests, the Wolfpack succeeded in holding a highly-favored Duke team to a scoreless tie and licking Wake Forest by a remarkable 27-14 count in the '49 season when most of the experts had favored the deacons by at least 18 points.

Last year with one of the smallest squads in State gridiron history (34 men) the Wolfpack continued its reputation as "giant-killers." After losing to top-ranked North Carolina, Clemson and Duke, State bounced back for four consecutive triumphs, including an amazing 16-13 upset over the University of Maryland which knocked the Terrapins from a fifth ranked position in the nation. Another highlight of the year was the 6-6 deadlock with Wake Forest's Demon Deacons, a team favored by 14 points in the pre-game betting. State moved 80 yards with just two minutes to play in the contest to gain the dead-lock.

Feathers has proven to be one of the most popular mentors in the history of the college. Only one other State coach, Doc Newton, has served as long as seven seasons as head football coach of the Wolfpack, and Feathers, beginning his eighth year this season, will set a new record for length of service.

Although Feathers' record with the Wolfpack of 33 wins against 31 losess and four ties is not among the best in the nation, this record has been compiled against the best opposition in the Southern Conference, one of the toughest leagues in the country, Each year the Wolfpack has met a minimum of seven conference opponents and no one can accuse Feathers of taking on a "taylor-made" schedule.

During his seven years at State the Wolfpack bosshas never been defeated by all three other members of the Big Four—Duke, North Carolina and Wake Forest, three of the nation's leading football powers, State of the nation's leading football powers. Each year he has managed, despite adversity, to whip for or te at least one of these three old-time fose. No other coach in the compact Big Four can boast such a mark over seven seasons.

An amiable, easy-going sort of fellow, Feathers has a host of admirers all over the Southern Conference area. His football teams are always respected and his ability to win friends has endeared him to college alumni and friends alike.

The Wolfpack coach is the father of three lovely girls and he and Mrs. Feathers make their home in Carv. N. C. We're Pulling for



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WILLIS R. CASEY, Assistant Athletic Director and Swimming Coach



Jack-of-all trades on the State athletic staff is Willis Casey, who has one of the most impressive records as a swimming coach of any tank mentor in the Southern Conference. His teams year after year have always been in contention for the loop title and during his four seasons as top man of the Wolfpack mernen he has never finished lower than second place in the conference. Last year his State club had a 10-2 mark.

Besides handling the State awimning team, Casey doubles in brase as assistant at athletic director, assistant track and cross country coach, director of the Southern Conference Cross-Country Championships, tournament manager of the Dixie Basketball Classic, and a dozen other jobs too numerous to mention. If there's truly a jack-of-all trades in the coaching profession it's Mr. Casey.

Willis is a graduate of the University of North Carolina where he majored in Physical Education. He was also a championship swimmer in his undergraduate days, Casey is married to the former Ethel Laughlin, who was one of Eastern North Carolina's finest feminine swimmers. She is a graduate of Meredith College. They have one son, Bobby, four years old.

This year Casey's State swimming team will have some of the best material ever available, Bob Mattson, sensational freshman ace from Worchester, Mass, set five new records during the summer and will lead the 1951-52 team along with three other freshmen, Billy Churn, Tommy Duniap, Craig Lynes, Sophomores who are certain to standout include Donald Sonia, and Paul Arata. Casey sums up the outlook thusly: "We should be improved in every

Casey is vitally interested in the so-called minor sports at State as well as football, baseball and basketball. His initiative in starting the North Caroline Cross-Country and Track Championships have brought two outstanding events to the State campus. He has been praised highly for his work with both track and cross-country and follows both sports with the same interest that he has always had in his own swimming teams.

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HORACE (Horse) HENDRICKSON, Backfield Coach and Chief Scout



Newest addition to the Wolfpack coaching staff is Horace Hendrickson, former Duke University football star, who takes over as backfield coach and chief scout. Hendrickson assumed his new duties August 1, 1951. Hendrickson has a wealth of experience on the gridiron. After a colorful career at Duke as quarterback under Coach Wallace Wade's 1933 Southern Conference champions, "Horse" was retained as assistant freshman football coach at the Methodist institution until 1937 when he was named athletic director and head football coach at Elon College. Hendrickson remained at Elon until 1942 winning two North State Conference football titles. In 1942 Hendrickson moved to the University of Pennsylvania where he served as backfield coach under George Munger through 1948.

During Hendrickson's tenure at Penn the Quakers captured the Iyu League football championship each season. At Penn Hendrickson also served as head baseball coach. In 1948 Hendrickson joined Carl Voyles on the staff of the professional Brooklyn Dodgers as backfield coach and chief scott. "Horse" remained with Brooklyn until the Dodger football team was dissolved and in 1949 he returned to Duke where he was head coach of all freshmen teams. Hendrickson's frosh squads at Duke were among the best in the Southern Conference.

Besides his football know-how, Hendrickson is a first-rate basketball and baseball coach. At Elon College the popular Beaver Falls, Pa. native won two North State Conference basketball championships and two baseball titles. At Duke as an under-

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graduate Hendrickson was a star third baseman under Coach Jack Coombs and was a regular on the basketball squad under Coach Eddie Cameron. During his senior year he was one of the few men in Duke athletic history to earn three varsity monograms.

Hendrickson's early career in athletics began at Kiski Institute when he was a top flight star in football, baseball and basketball. After his prep school graduation he entered Duke in the fall of 1930. He was a member of Coach Wallace Wade's first Blue Devil team in 1931 and in 1933 starred in Duke's 10-2 upset victory over Tennessee.

Coach Hendrickson will confine his duties to football at State, but is certain to be a close follower of baseball and basketball teams.

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ALBERT ROTELLA, Line Coach



A native of Paterson, N. J. and University of Tennessee alumnus, 200-pound Al Rotella has held forth as Wolfpack line coach for the past three years, joining State staff at the beginning of the 1948 season,

Jovial, smiling, Al has turned in a topnotch job grooming State's forwards on both offense and defense. He has carned the respect of more experienced coaches over the Southern Conference and has worked tirelessly, often under handicaps caused by the lack of manpower, to turn out some of the best sets of linemen in State College history.

Rotella learned his football under Gen. Bob Neyland at the University of Tennessee where he served for four seasons. He came directly to the Wolfpack coaching staff after his graduation at Tennessee and with the personal recommendation of Gen. Neyland.

Rotella entered Tennessee in 1943 after starring for three years at Paterson (N. J.) High. His playing career was interrupted by World War II, but after his discharge he returned in 1946 and 1947 to see service in the Volunteer line.

During World War II Rotella saw combat service with the 38th Regiment of the famed 2nd Division. He was wounded in action in the Battle of the Bulge in December, 1944.

A popular figure, Rotella is a fun-loving, easy-going, hard-worker. He is particularly proud of one of his fellow-townsmen, Tackle Elmer Costa of Paterson, N. J., whom he has groomed into an All-America linesman. It was Rotella who persuaded costa to give up a job as a truck driver in Paterson to enroll at State in 1948. Costa last year was named to the first-team All-Players All-America calected annually by the Chicago Tribune and he is a leading All-America candidate this eason.

DICK PEACOCK, Assistant Line Coach



A graduate in Textiles at State, Dick Peacock is one of two former Wolfpack stars on the coaching staff. Dick, a native of Lexington, N. C., played center under Coach Beattie Feathers in 1946 and 1947 following his discharge from the Army Air Corps where he served as a bomber pilot.

Prior to his entry into the service Peacock played two seasons under Coach Gordon (Chubby) Kirkland at Catawba College at Salisbury, N. C. He transferred to State after the war in order to go into Textiles.

Peacock became State's first full-time freshman football conch after World War II when he was named to that post in 1949. His team won three games and lost two. Last season Peacock moved up to the varsity as assistant line coach and he will serve in that capacity again during the coming season.

Well-versed in the Wolfpack style of line-play Peacock works primarily with the State centers on both offense and defense. He also aids Line Coach Al Rotella with other line positions.

Last season Peacock's accurate scouting of State's opponent proved a big factor in the winning of several games. His report on Maryland's Terrapins was regarded by Coach Feathers as one of the big reasons why the Wolfpack scored a surprising upset victory.

Coach Peacock is married to the former May Pleasant of Raleigh.

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GWYNN FLETCHER, Assistant Backfield Coach



Named to the State staff during the past summer, Gwynn Fletcher, a native of Barium Springs, N. C., starred for three seasons at tailback for Coach Beattie Feathers' Wolfpack from 1946 through 1948. He is a graduate of State in Industrial and Rural Recreation.

Gwynn enrolled at State in 1946 after a hitch in the Navy during World War II. Prior to entering service he played freshman football at Davidson College, Fletcher understudied Tallaack Howard Turner during the 1946 season and performed brilliantly as both runner and passer. Despite a hand injury following the 1946 season which kept him out of the 'Gator Bowl game in Jacksonville, Flai, Fletcher came back in 1947 to spearhead the Wolfpack team to five wins, and a tie in nine games.

For the past two seasons Fletcher has acted as an assistant freehum notoball coach. This year he steps up to the varsity squad and will handle general assignments, concentrating primarily on work with the Wolfpack backfield and helping Coach Feathers. Fletcher is a welcomed addition to the State staff. His knowledge of the Wolfpack style of play is expected to prove valuable to the squad.

Coach Fletcher is married and he and his wife make their home in Raleigh.

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THOMAS FITZGIBBONS, Head Trainer and Cross Country Coach



Tom Fitzgibbons, a native of Milwaukee, Wise,, is a familiar figure around State's athletic teams. He was appointed head trainer and track and cross country coach in June, 1949 and has posted a brilliant record.

Coming to State from George Washington High,

Alexandria, Va., where he was trainer and track coach, Fitzgibbons has turned out some of the best cinder teams in the college's history along with his duties as trainer. His 1949 and 1950 cross country squads were undefeated in Big Four competition and his track teams have been impressive.

Fitzgibbons has an outstanding knowledge of administering treatment for athletic injuries. He has kept players on the field during the past two seasons where a less experienced man might have failed. His ability at repairing bruised muscles and pulled tendons has meant much to State's football effort at a time when manpower was of extreme importance.

The 46-year old "Fitz" is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin where he took a B.S. degree in physical education. After his graduation he served for a long period at the University of Toledo under Dr. C. W. Spears, one of the nation's most brilliant college trainers. During his undergraduate days at Wisconsin he served as an assistant trainer to T. C. Jones, Ionz-time trainer of Wisconsin adultic teams.

During World War II Fitzgibbons served with the Medical Corps for two years. Most of his duties were as an instructor for a medical detachment. Following his discharge from the service Fitzgibbons took up the post at Alexandria, Va., where he turned out three Virginia state championship track souads.

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N. C. STATE COLLEGE MOVES AHEAD

North Carolina State College is aptly the Cinderella of the South's educational institutions. Kicked around at the start, she has grown into a proud Alma Mater who holds her head high among the foremost colleges and universities in the Western Hemisphere.

Today the college stands as a living monument to the far-sighted citizens who, roughly 70 years ago, aroused the State with their inspired crusade for practical education in the technological sciences.

On October 3, 1889, the college opened its doors. The 45 students were greeted by six professors, including the first president, Col. Alexander Q. Holladay. The physical plant consisted of one building, later named Holladay Hall, and a stable.

State College, meek but confident, was ready for business.

Some of the greatest men of their day sadly shook their heads over the futility of it all, loudly predicting a brief but misguided existence for the educational stripling. Even neighboring college presidents cited the uselessness of giving higher education to "mechanics and farmers."

But State College from the start had a rugged, individual spirit that throughout the years has set it apart from many other institutions. In the single building, the handful of studients, slept, ate and studied, and from it they sallied forth daily to work the college's 60-acre farm with the two little mules and one horse that were the college's sole work stock.

Without plumbing, running water or electric lights, the first students buckled down to the task of confounding the prophets of doom.

Next year the college had 84 students. Enrollment was 110 in its third year, and in 1918 it passed the 1.000 mark.

An all-time high was set in 1947 when more than 5,300 students registered — 5,300 young men and women with confidence that "farmers and mechanics" had best be educated. And before them, gone into every nook and corner of the world, are thousands of well-trained, substantial alumni who had the same idea-men who are throwing bridges over giant chasms, teaching farmers all that science has learned about agriculture, building dams to rescue wastelands and give light to millions, stringing highways throughout the land, clothing the civilized world in the best raiment the mighty textile industry can produce, creating new magic in chemistry and ceramics so that the world will be a more comfortable and beautiful world, developing and conserving our natural resources, putting power into mechanical giants, designing new homes and buildings, getting the most from their farms, and delving into a thousand research projects from which a richer and fuller life for untold millions will emerge.

At the Golden Anniversary celebration on October, 3, 1939, the late Governor and Ambassador to the Court of St. James, O. Max Gardner, an alumnus of both North Carolina State College and the University at Chapel Hill, described the creation of State College as the symbol of democratic progress in higher education in North Carolina and added:

"Its founding broke the log jam that held back the benefits of education to the sons and daughters of the masses of our people. It literally sprung from the grass roots of democracy."

North Carolina State College, now beginning its Gard year of service to the State and nation, has risen to new heights in the scademic world and is a world-famed center of learning and research. It is headed by Chancellor J. H. Harrelson, a gentleman whose eminent leadership has seen the college pioneer in many fields of activity and reach the zenith in others.

With a current expansion program of \$15,000,000 now in progress, with higher State appropriations for its operations, and with firm support from a number of foundations, the college is faced with its brightest future—an era which may mean better days for all North Carolinians.

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There's a peculiar brand of "snake oil" being peddi'd in America today. It's the "cure-all" variety whose sponsors talk like this: "Let the federal government solve our problems by running things. Let it take over the doctors ... the railroads ... the electric light and power companies ... and other industries and services."

DEALING WITH THE DEACS

Wake Forest's Demon Deacons and N. C. State's Whighest once again resume their Wake County, Big Four, and Southern Conference rivalry in Raleigh tonight and all indications point to another colorful and exciting contest.

Coach Beattie Feathers' teams have proved more troublesome to the Deacons than any of their Conference rivals since the war. In fact, State has won three, lost one, and tied one in post-war competition with Wake Forest and the Baptists were favored to win in each of the five games.

Five seasons ago in 1946 the Feathers-coached team upset the undefeated Deacons 14 to 6 and the following Saturday Wake Forest took the cue from the Wolfpack and stunned the nation with an amazing 19 to 6 conquest of powerful Tennessee—the lone defeat of that season for the highly regarded Vols.

State turned the tables again in 1947 by winning a decisive 20 to 0 decision but Wake Forest came back the following year with an impressive 34 to 13 conquest of the underdog West Raleigh club.

In 1949 State stopped Wake Forest again 27 to 14 after the Deacons had gained a string of three brilliant victories over William and Mary, Clemson, and Duke.

Last year Wake Forest won its first state championship in a quarter of a century but again it was the Wolfpack that proved the stumbling block. While the Deacons were able to beat both Duke and North Carolina they wound up in a 6-6 tie with the scrappy but underdog Wolfpack.

The two teams appear to stack up on even terms for this 45th meeting of a series which dates back almost 60 years. State still enjoys a comfortable edge in victories, 25 to 14, although most of the games have been very close. Five of the contests have ended in ties.

In their season openers last week Wake Forest defeated Boston College 20 to 6 while State was beaten by North Carolina 21 to 0 in a game much closer than the score indicates. It will be the final State-Wake Forest game for a number of the Deacon players. Included in this group are Ed McClure and Ken Bridges, ends; Bill George and Ed Listopad, tackles; Dickic Davis and Ed Kissell, quarterbacks; Guido Scarton, Lou Pollacci, and Bobby Stutts, halfbacks; and Bill Miller, fullback.

Both clubs will match heavy, experienced lines against each other backed by a corp of fast, powerful and seasoned backs. Alex Webster, a hard-running, triple-threat tailback will direct the strong single-wing Wolfpack offense while Quarterbacks Ed Kissell and Dickie Davis will likely alternate in the key quarterback spot in the Wake Forest T attack. Davis paced the victory over Boston College last week by throwing three touchdown passes. He completed 11 of 17 aerials for the best performance of his collegiate career.

The game will mark the first night contest between these old rivals in six years. In the last under-thearcs contest played in 1945 Wake Forest won a 19 to 18 decision in one of the most exciting games of the entire series. A 95-yard kickoff touchdown run by Nick Sacrinty was the biggest factor in the Wake Forest victory.

Tonight's contest also marks the first meeting of the current conches of the two teams. Although Beattie Peathers is in his seventh season as head coach at N. C. State, this is Tom Rogers' first year as head coach of the Deacons. However, Rogers is widely known throughout this section for his outstanding work as line couch at Wake Forest for the past five years. He also put in three seasons as an assistant coach with the Deacons in 1938, 1939, and 1940.

This will be the first of eight Southern Conference games for Wake Forest this season. Other Conference games are with Richmond, William and Mary, George Washington, North Carolina, Clemson, Duke, and South Carolina. On the Saturday preceding the South Carolina game Wake Forest meets Baylor in a top intersectional attraction at Wason, Texas.

Regardless of the outcome of tonight's game, the fans are certain to see another A-1 Southern Con-

BASKETBALL

For the past five years North Carolina State's baskethall squad coached by Everett Case and Carl Anderson have topped the Southern Conference, winning both the regular season and the conference winning to the conference for the conference of 137 victories against only 29 defeats ranks as one of the best coaching records in the nation.

During each of Case's five seasons at State the Wolfpack has

participated in a major tournament. Three times the squad has been invited to the National Invitational and twice has earned berths in the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

Two All-Americans have been produced at State under Coach Case. Forward Dick Dickey was named to the top teams in 1948 and 1950, while Forward Sam Ranzino earned the honor in both 1950 and 1951.

No less than seven All-Southerns have been named at State. Besides Ranzino and Dickey the stars include Center Pete Negley and Leo Katkaveck in 1947, Eddie Bartels and Leo Katkaveck in 1948, Vic Bubas in 1949.

During each of Case's five years at State the Wolfpack has been a contender for national scoring honors. In 1948 the team lost the national title by three-tenths of a percentage point to Bhode Island State and last season by only one-tenth of a percentage point to the University of Cincinnati.

Prospects for the coming season are very good. Eight lettermen including Forwards Bobby Speight, Paul Brandenburg, Bill Kukoy and Bob Cook, Center Bobby Goss and Guards Lee Terrill, Bernie Yurin and Eddie Morris will return. Other top prospects include several sophomores, Forwards Kim Buchanan and Dick Tyler, Guards Bobby Adams and Herb Applebaum, and several freshmen,

chalking up triumphs over North Carolina, Duke, Davidson, The Citadel, Virginia Tech, and West Virginia and losing to Virginia Military and Camp LeJeune Marines twice.

In the annual Southern Conference tournament the Wolfpack has done well each year. In 1947 and 1948 State finished second in the team scoring and has copped individual titles in the 155-pound, 175-pound and heavyweight divisions.

Last season the State grapplers appeared in the William Neal Reynolds Coliseum on several occasions following basketball contests and several thousand persons remained after the Wolfpack cage contests to witness the wrestling matches. The sport attracted more spectators last season than for any other previous year of its existence on the campus and many fans were converted to collegiate wrestling.



BASEBALL AT N. C. STATE

Since Coach Vie Sorrell took over the reins of the Wolfpack baseball squad in 1946 the State squads have been among the best in the Big Four and Southern Conference. In the compact Big Four of Duke, Carolina, Wake Forest and State,

the Wolfpack has never finished below second place and in conference competition State has always been among the top six teams in the 17-school circuit.

Last year, despite a sophomore dominated squad, State finished in a tie for second in the Big Four, Prospects for the 1952 season are among the best ever at the college and Coach Sorrell is expected once again to be a contender for the Big Four title.

Among the stars returning are Eddie Morris, first base, Roland Brinson, second base, Johnny Yvars, shortstop, Ed Horbelt, leftfield, John Fuscoe, All-Southern outfielder and Pitchers Footsie Gardner, Lunsford Lewis, Bernie Bean and others.



SWIMMING AT

One of the finest records in any sport has been compiled at State by Coach Willis Casey's Wolfpack swimmers. Since Casey took over the coaching reins in 1947 the team has won

64 meets and lost only seven, including both freshmen and varsity competition.

In '47 the team won all nine dual meets, copped the North and South Carolina A.A.U. championships and placed two members of the squad, Bill Kelly and Bill Ward on the All-America Intercollegiate team.

In '48 the Wolfpack mermen won seven and lost two and were runners-up for the Southern Conference title. The freshman squad was undefeated.

In '49 the State swimmers won nine straight meets without a loss and were co-champions of the Southern Conference. The freshmen were again undefeated.

In '50 the team copped seven of 10 meets and finished third in the Southerna Conference. Two members were conference champions and one later became national junior champ.

During the past season State won seven of nine meets and tied for the Southeastern United States team championship. Freshmen were undefeated and were rated as the finest team in the history of the college.

Prospect for the 1952 year are better than ever. Such standouts as Bob Mattson of Worchester, Mass, who finished fifth in the National A.A.U. and won the North and South Carolina A.A.U., Donald Sonia, Paul Arata, Craig Lyness and several others indicate that the Wolfpack tankers will again field one of the strongest outfits in the Southern Conference.

CROSS COUNTRY

Coach Tom Fitzgibbons has turned out some of the finest runners in the history of State College during his two year tenure here. Last season State finished second in the Southern Conference championships and Clyde Garrison of High Point, a sophomore, won the individual cross country championship,

setting a new record. Garrison also holds the Southern Conference Indoor and Outdoor Two-Mile championships in track.

Prospects for 1951 are very fine. Along with Garrison are such top runners as William "Buzz" Sawyer, Virginia A.A.U. mile champion, Joe Shockley, Eddie Beal, Captain Bobby Leonard, Darrel Winslow, John Smith Dewey Adams, John Smith and Bill Macredy.

RIDDICK STADIUM

Riddick Stadium, present site of North Carolina State's home football contests, was started in 1907 as an athletic field and the first football contest was played on September 30, 1907 between State and Randolnh-Macon.

In 1912 the stadium received its present name when the senior class voted to name the field in honor of Professor W. C. Riddick, who is regarded as the father of athletics at North Carolina State.


Construction of the concrete stands on the west side was begun in the summer of 1916 and during that year football contests were held at Raleigh with Davidson and Wake Forest.


In 1928 the stadium was enlarged and the east stands were completed. The field house and present lighting system were completed during the 1938-39

Many changes have taken place in the physical field as it now exists. Once it was level with surrounding ground, but grading and new construction has lowered the present field until it is approximately eight to ten feet below the level of the surrounding earth.

During recent years the large crowds attending contests in Riddlek Stadium have forced athletic officials to increase the seating capacity by adding extra bleachers at both ends of the playing field. The structure, which once could care for only 5,000 persons in 1916 can now accommodate a gathering of about 20,000 people.

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
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
