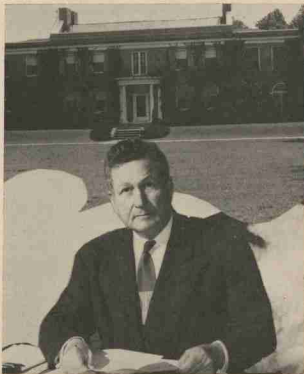

North Carolina State College

North Carolina State College, which proudly plays host to its many friends this season, is more than a State Institution. It is a full-fledged partner in a national land grant system of higher education.

Beginning its first year of service on October 3, 1889, the college has advanced from an humble founding to become one of America's most highly respected institutions in the field of technology.

It was established under the provisions of the Morrill Act, passed by the United States Congress and signed into law by President Abraham Lincoln on July 2, 1862. Its principal curricula are devoted mainly to resident teaching, research, and extension in the applied sciences, but it also embraces a broad program of training in the humanities.

Speaking in Pullen Hall on the 60th anniversary of the founding of North Carolina State College, Dr. David A. Lockmiller, president of the University of Chattanooga and a former faculty member at N. C. State, paid the following tribute to this institution:

"This college, in cooperation with other agencies in the State, has a definite responsibility to provide the kinds of education that will retain and restore the fertility of the soil; protect and preserve forests and wildlife; keep streams free from pollution; promote industrial diversification and improved methods in agriculture, engineering, and manufacturing; beautify and improve homes, schools, churches, factories, and highways; and clean up cities and small towns.

"It is difficult to summarize State College's program and resources. The ultimate value of 5,000 students on the campus, in classrooms, laboratories, and libraries, receiving instruction from a staff of teachers and specialists holding degrees from leading institutions of the world staggers the imagination. . . ."

Aside from its classroom and laboratory training, State College puts great emphasis on the development of character. Chancellor J. W. Harrelson, the present chief administrative officer of the college, has constantly hammered home the idea that the South and nation needs more than educated men. The Chancellor believes that the country and the region both need educated gentlemen, and that conviction has motivated the progress of State College through the years.

The late Dr. Wallace C. Riddick, former president of the college, once said: "State College always has been and always will be interested in men. The best advertisement of a college is the character and success of its alumni."

Physically, the college is composed of seven major schools: the School of Agriculture, the School of Design, the School of Education, the School of Engineering, the School of Forestry, the School of General Studies, and the School of Textiles. Closely allied in function and administration with these schools are the Agricultural Extension Service, the Agricultural Experiment Station, and the College Extension Division.

Collectively, they provide the resident teaching, research, and extension training of the College. The work of these divisions each year affects the lives of virtually all of North Carolina's approximately 4,000,000 citizens.

State College today is a dedicated servant of the people, working hand in hand with other institutions, agencies, and individuals toward a brighter future for mankind.

THE 1952 PROSPECTUS

It's unlikely that Coach Horace Hendrickson's first season as head football coach at N. C. State will be crowned with any miraculous results, for the task ahead is of major proportions and will require unlimited resourcefulness on the part of the entire coaching staff.

Inexperience at key positions, the lack of any concentrated reserve strength and the installation of a completely new system of play are but three of the reasons why Hendrickson's job in 1952 is difficult. Only 14 lettermen will be back in harness. Left guard, quarterback and right-half are without a single monogram winner, and right end, left tackle, center, right guard have only one letterman available.

Most of the experience on the current team is at left end where three lettermen are at work and in the backfield where two players are veterans at left halfback and at fullback with a pair of holdover monogram winners.

Perhaps the brightest spot is at left halfback where All-Southern Alex Webster, one of the greatest players in State football history, returns for his third and last season of competition. Last year Alex, who has become known as the "Kearny (N.J.) Express," racked up 78 points to lead all Southern Conference scorers, he amassed 1,256 yards running and passing to rank third in the circuit and had a punting average of 38.5 yards per try.

Webster's presence alone should be enough to bring cheer to even the most pessimistic coach and Hendrickson is perfectly willing to admit that the big New Jersey star will mean much to the current team. Also Hendrickson admits that one man cannot in any sense become a good team, thus Webster doesn't alleviate the situation which exists at other positions on the squad.

Despite the presence of four lettermen veterans at end, this position is regarded as one of the problems for the season. Offensively Steve Kosilla, a six-footer from Tarrytown, N. Y. is the standout. Last year Kosilla hauled in 21 passes for 226 yards, which ranked him among the top 15 receivers in the conference. Defensively, three men, Harry Lodge, Bernie Allman and David Butler, are capable, but lack the weight and height desirable in rough, tough end competition. This spot will need some major assistance from the ranks of the untried frosh, but the picture is bright with Don Davidson, former Camp LeJeune star, and Gilbert Gfell, Lorraine, Ohio prospect, heading the freshman contingent.

At tackle the task of building potent offensive and defensive play is a big one. Two lettermen, Jim Hillman and J. C. Britt, both seniors, will be available with experience. Captain Ray Barkouskie, who was a blocking back for two years, has been switched to tackle. Behind these three are non-lettermen, including Ken Urgovitch, Percy Riden and Glenn Nixon, all sophomores and Freshmen C. M. Price, Tony Leone, Dewey Stallings and John Szchuan. Price and Hillman appear to be the defensive leaders with Britt and Barkouskie likely offensive starters.

The guards have only Sophomore John Bagonis returning with experience. Although the two positions will be manned by relative newcomers, this

could be one of the stronger positions on the team. With Bagonis as a potential starter is Ed Mazgaj, a Lackwanna, N. Y. sophomore, who suffered a broken wrist last year and did not play. Mazgaj, however, learned much during his freshman year and is looked to as one of the better offensive blockers on the team. Other likely standouts here are Sophomores Charlie Davis and James Frazier, both of Goldsboro, and Freshman Al D'Angelo, Bill Painter, Jack Haskell and J. W. Frankos.

The absence of an experienced man at center is also a big reason for concern in the Wolfpack camp. Fred Battaglia, a 200-pounder from Niagara Falls, N. Y., who has been a reserve for two years, probably will be the top man on offense. Two freshmen, Dick Tonn, 230-pounder from Cleveland, Ohio, and Jose DeBoisbriand of Amesbury, Mass., will be on hand to help out. Defensive center duties likely will fall to Bob Paroli of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., who has been concerted from tackle. Behind Paroli will be Henry Spivey, a 245-pound freshman and probably Ralph Mueller, a sophomore holdover.

An analysis of the backfield again brings forth the name of Alex Webster. He stands out as the star of the team and barring injury will be the top man at left-halfback. To assist him will be two others, Ted Potts, a senior from Alexandria, Va., and Freshman Colbert Micklem of Hopewell, Va. Micklem has been the talk of pre-season drills and looks like an important understudy for Webster. Potts will help out with the punting and may see some service as a defensive safety.

At the right-halfback slot two men stand out, Tommy Swanger, a junior from Hamburg, N. Y. and Bob Tacker, a freshman from Stiles, Pa. Both have looked good in pre-season work. Another good prospect for action here is Dickie Bethune, a wiry speedster from Clinton, N. C., who is the breakaway type runner that will give the opposition many an uneasy moment.

Quarterback is a ticklish proposition for once again experience is lacking. Four men appear to have a fairly equal chance of seeing action including Freshman Eddie Frantz and Eddie West, Sophomore Hal McCarter and Junior Carl Wyles. In the pre-season work West has been impressive. He is tall and built ruggedly and is a capable passer. Frantz is a good field general and has the edge in experience. McCarter must overcome a knee injury from last year to be effective, but could develop into top man on team. Wyles' only experience has been in practice, but he has the moxy to be dependable star.

At fullback it's highly likely that two new men will do most of the offensive performing and both will be sophomores. Don Langston, 195-pounder from Lexington, Ky., is a hard runner and starts fast. He looks like the key man. Joe Barringer, 190-pounder from Midway Park, N. C., is coming fast and will definitely see plenty of action. On defense two lettermen, Dick Spritz and Harvey Yeates will get the job done admirably. Both can play offense, but probably will specialize on line backing.

Hendrickson's task is definitely of major proportions at State, but "Horse" as he has been nicknamed, has a knack for coming up with good teams. In 18 years of coaching he's never been associated with a losing team and his friends do not figure he came to State to begin taking it on the chin. In five years at Elon in the North State Conference, Hendrickson

won two loop titles and departed there in 1942 with 38 wins, 12 losses and one tie.

A definite asset toward getting the job done at State will be the excellent staff of assistants Hendrickson has selected. Mike Karmazin, the new line coach, has professional and college background and is an outstanding teacher of line fundamentals. Backfield Coach William (Billy) Hickman, a former Virginia quarterback, is a brilliant student of the split T-formation and C. A. (Tim) Temerario, State's end coach, boasts 15 years' experience at Indiana University and five years with the professional Cleveland Browns. Former head coach, Beattie Feathers, will handle the defenses and Feathers' teams at State led the nation on defense in 1946 and 1947 which is enough said of his tested ability.

A lot will depend on the development of the youngsters on the squad. Hendrickson believes State will have a representative team that will improve as the season progresses.

"We can promise no miracles," Hendrickson says, "but we have confidence our team will be a fighting outfit that won't be beaten without putting forth its best effort. Our boys want to play and that's half the battle," he concludes.

MEET NORTH CAROLINA STATE'S DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

After four years at the helm of N. C. State's athletic program, Roy Bennett Clogston has shown that he knows his way around. His popularity has grown by leaps and bounds and everywhere he has made additional friends for the school's athletic teams.

Taking over the reins at State on August 1, 1948 Clogston found many problems confronting the program, but with a systematic effort he set about the task of building Wolfpack teams and facilities to the point where today they are considered among the best in the Southern Conference.

Under Clogston's administration the huge William Neal Reynolds Coliseum was completed and readied for the 1949-50 basketball season. It was largely through his personal efforts that the first contest was staged in the structure on December 1, 1949.

Clogston has untiringly devoted his time to the progress of athletics at State. He has been instrumental in helping round out the schedule of inter-collegiate contests for State teams and through his efforts a full-time tennis and soccer coach was added to the Wolfpack staff. Not only is Clogston vitally interested in the major sports on the campus, but he is a close follower of the so-called minor sports of swimming, track, tennis, golf, soccer and wrestling.

A graduate of Springfield College at Springfield, Mass., Clogston is a native of Ballston Lake, N. Y. He holds a degree in physical education from Springfield and a Master's degree in physical education from New York University.

Clogston's background in college athletics is extensive. For nearly 20 years he was director of athletics at St. Lawrence University at Canton, N. Y. and during his tenure there established St. Lawrence as one of the leading small colleges in national athletic circles. At St. Lawrence he served as head football coach as well as golf and wrestling mentor.

During World War II Clogston saw extensive service with the Navy. He served as administrative officer under Commander Tom Hamilton in the far-famed Hamilton-program which brought recreation facilities to the far corners of the world. He also served as rehabilitation officer on Guam and several other bases in the South Pacific. Clogston left the service with the rank of commander and is still active in the U. S. Naval Reserve.

Willis R. Casey

Assistant Athletic Director and Swimming Coach

Jack-of-all trades on the State athletic staff is Willis Casey, who has one of the most impressive records as any tank coach in the Southern Conference. Besides his coaching duties, Casey handles much of the business of the athletic department, is manager of both the Dixie Classic and

Southern Conference basketball tournaments, and pitches in to assist in running off track and cross country meets.

Casey's record as swimming coach is slightly terrific. Although only 32 years old he has amassed a record of 123 victories against only 12 losses in seven years as head tank coach at N. C. State. His 1952 Wolfpack team won 14 and lost once and as individuals won eight Southern Conference titles. During his 10 years of coaching in the Southern Conference, he has nine times won the Carolinas A.A.U. title and copped five Southern A.A.U. crowns.

Over the years Casey has coached many successful swimmers, including 40 boys who were National Junior Champions of America. Standouts of the past year include Frank Nauss, Southern Conference 1,500, 440 and 220 champion, who

is also a member of the All-America team in the 440-yard free style, Bob Mattson, Southern Conference 150-yard individual medley, and 150-yard breaststroke champion, also a member of the 1952 All-America medley team.

Willis is a graduate of the University of North Carolina where he majored in Physical Education. He was a champion swimmer in his undergraduate days and one of the top breaststrokers in the nation. After graduation from Carolina he remained as swimming coach for two years before coming to N. C. State in 1946.

Casey has been instrumental in not only raising the standard of swimming teams at N. C. State, but he has also assisted greatly in improving track and cross country teams. He began the North Carolina Cross-Country Championships, which are held annually at State and also instigated the first Big Four All-Star track and field meet, which is held each year. Casey was recently elected as secretary of the Southern Conference Cross Country Coaches Association and is also a member of the Southern Conference Swimming Committee.

The prospects for Casey's 1952-53 swimming squad are very bright and the Wolfpack squad likely will be one of the best in the nation and a definite threat for the Southern Conference title.

Taking over the football coaching reins at N. C. State this year is Horace Hendrickson, former Duke University football star, who has been in the coaching field for the past 18-years. He brings a wealth of experience to his first head coaching job in the Southern Conference, which includes positions at Duke, Elon College, University of Pennsylvania and with the professional Brooklyn Dodgers.

A native of Beaver Falls, Pa., Hendrickson attended Kiski Prep and was a standout performer on football, baseball and basketball teams. In 1930 he entered Duke and went on to become one of that institutions greatest all-around athletes, starring as quarterback of the Blue Devils first Southern Conference championship team, as regular third baseman on Coach Jack Coombs baseball squad and earning letters as a basketball regular under Coach Eddie Cameron. He is one of the few three sport-lettermen in Duke athletic history.

Wallace Wade, now commissioner of the Southern Conference, who coached Hendrickson at Duke, rates the new Wolfpack football coach as one of the greatest quarterbacks he ever coached. Wade's career covers nearly a half-century of coaching great teams at Alabama and Duke. Hendrickson achieved his nickname "The Horse" during his senior year at Duke when he played every position in the Blue Devil backfield.

Hendrickson's football achievements at Duke were many. He was selected to the All-American first-team and was a standout in the 1933 game with Tennessee, which Duke won 10-2. Hendrickson was also voted to several All-America blocking teams.

After his graduation in 1934 from Duke, Hendrickson was named assistant freshman coach by Wallace Wade. He remained in that capacity through June 1937 and also assisted in basketball and baseball.

In the summer of 1937 Hendrickson was selected to his first head coaching job at Elon College and it was the start of one of the most successful connections ever made by the Fighting Christians. During the five years from 1937 through 1941 that Hendrickson guided the destinies of Elon, the football squad won two North State Conference championships, two in basketball and three in baseball. Hendrickson was head coach of all three sports as well as athletic director. His football teams, meeting the best in the North State, won 32, lost 12 and tied 1.

After a highly successful 1941 season when the Elon Christians won eight and lost only once and claimed the North State Conference crown, Hendrick-

son resigned to move to the University of Pennsylvania as backfield coach under George Munger and head baseball coach. Hendrickson served as chief scout for Munger's Pennsylvania Quakers, who won the Ivy League title each year during Hendrickson's stay between 1942 and 1948.

Hendrickson resigned at Pennsylvania in 1948 to join Carl Voyles with the now defunct Brooklyn Dodgers of the National Football League. In the Dodger organization Hendrickson scouted for the baseball team and handled the backfield coaching job.

When the Brooklyn team decided to withdraw its football interests from the professional game Hendrickson had several offers of coaching assignments, but his love of North Carolina drew him back to his alma mater, Duke University, where he was named head freshman coach of football, baseball and basketball.

Hendrickson's second job at Duke was a highly successful venture as all his other assignments had been. His first Blue Imp freshman football squad was undefeated in six games during the 1949 season and ranks as one of the best yearling teams ever produced at Duke. In 1950 Hendrickson's freshman team won three and lost two. Among the victories was a 19-0 win scored over an N. C. State freshman team, which was one of the best turned out at West Raleigh.

When State began a search for a new backfield coach in the summer of 1951, Hendrickson was recommended for the position and was immediately signed to a three-year contract. He assumed his duties on August 1, 1951, and took over as chief scout in addition to his backfield coaching job.

In December, 1951, when the State Athletic Council began a search for a new football coach they had to look no further than their own staff to pick a successor to Beattie Feathers. Hendrickson was given the approval of the council and was signed to a three-year contract. He immediately assumed the duties and began to lay plans for the 1952 season.

A thorough student of football, Hendrickson has had experience with all styles of play. He began to switch from the single-wing to the split T-formation in spring practice in April and succeeded in moulding the squad into the new style of play in time to impress observers in the annual Red-White intra-squad contest in May.

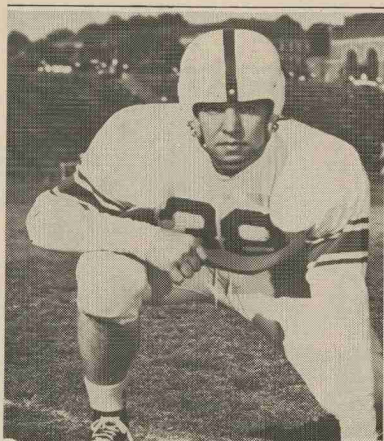
Hendrickson faces a big task with the 1952 Wolfpack, but its one that he is tackling with a determination that has characterized his entire coaching career, which has never been marred by a losing season. He predicts no miracles with his first Wolfpack team, but those who know "The Horse" feel that he will give State one of its better clubs. Hendrickson's lifetime record as a head coach shows 41 victories, 14 defeats and only one tie. During five years in the tough North State Conference at Elon his teams lost only five league games and were never beaten by more than two touchdowns. At Duke as freshman mentor his teams won nine and lost only twice and his Blue Imps were regarded as the best coached yearling team in the Southern Conference.

At Duke Hendrickson was an outstanding campus leader as well as one of the greatest athletes in that institution's history. He graduated with honors with a Bachelor of Arts degree in History and a minor in Education. He was a member of the Omicron Delta Kappa, honorary fraternity, and Red Friars, campus secret organization composed of the top seven men at Duke based on leadership, scholarship and personality. Hendrickson is also a member of Phi Delta Theta, national social fraternity. As a sophomore

Hendrickson was named to BOS-Sophomore honorary fraternity and as freshman received the gold "D" as the school's most outstanding freshman athlete.

Hendrickson's football honors were many during his stay at Duke. He was selected to both the All-South and All-Southern first-teams by the leading wire services in 1933 and named alternate quarterback on the *New York Sun* first-team All-America. Hendrickson was the first man to receive the Southern Conference Blocking Trophy as the circuit's most outstanding blocker. The award was then known as the Millis Blocking Trophy and has today become the Jacobs Blocking Trophy, given annually to the best blocker in the conference.

Coach Hendrickson is the father of two boys, Dick, 12, and Jay, 3. He and Mrs. Hendrickson, the former Gene Swartz, make their home on St. Mary's Street in Raleigh. Hendrickson observed his 42nd birthday on August 24.

C. A. (Tim) Temerario – End Coach

The appointment of C. A. (Tim) Temerario, former end coach and chief scout with the Cleveland Browns as football end coach and defensive coach at North Carolina State College was announced last April by Dr. H. A. Fisher, chairman of the college athletic council.

Temerario, a native of Lorraine, Ohio, has an extensive background in both collegiate and professional football circles. A graduate of Geneva College, Beaver Falls, Pa., with a Bachelor of Science degree in Education, Temerario holds a Master's degree in Education from Indiana University and has completed a major portion of his work toward a doctorate in Physical Education.

Following his collegiate gridiron career at Geneva College and his graduation in 1931, Temerario played one season of professional football before entering the coaching ranks of East Liverpool, Ohio, High School. In 1934 Temerario accepted an appointment as freshman line coach at the University of Indiana and remained until 1938 when he moved to Denison University as football line coach and head baseball coach.

At Denison Temerario served as assistant professor of Physical Education and worked in both football and

baseball. In 1941 Temerario left Denison to become a physical education instructor at Indiana University and football end coach under Coach Bo McMillian.

Temerario entered the Navy in 1942 and served in the V-5 program under Captain Tom Hamilton. His first assignment was at the Iowa Pre-Flight School at Iowa City, Iowa, where he worked with Bernie Bierman, former Minnesota coach as head of athletic department and assistant football coach.

During his Navy service Temerario saw overseas duty in both the Philippines and during the invasion of Normandy. He was twice commended during the invasion of France.

Temerario was released from the Navy in September of 1945 and immediately took over as head line coach at Indiana University. He remained at Indiana through 1947 when he joined Coach Bo McMillian in a move to the professional Detroit Lions. Temerario remained with the Lions through 1949 when he switched to the Cleveland Browns.

In his two seasons with the Cleveland Browns, Temerario gained a wide reputation for his ability as defensive coach. This year his services were sought by several professional teams but Temerario turned down one

particularly attractive offer from the Dallas Texans, formerly the New York Yankees, to become end coach; in order to take the position at N. C. State.

Commenting on Temerario's appointment, Head Coach Horace Hendrickson said, "We are very fortunate in securing the service of Temerario as our end and defensive coach. I have admired his work for many years while he was with Bo McMillian at Indiana and later with the Detroit Lions and Cleveland Browns. Tim turned down a very good offer with the professional league to be here with us and I know he'll mean a tremendous lot to our ball club."

Line Coach Mike Karmazin

Big, likable Mike Karmazin joined the State football staff last March in time to assist Coach Hendrickson with the installation of the brand new split T-formation attack for the Wolfpack.

A native of Irwin, Pa., Mike has a rich football background both as player and coach. After making all-state at Norwin (Pa.) High as a guard in 1939, Karmazin cast his football future with Duke's Blue Devils at Durham, N. C. where he was to become one of the Big Blues best forwards.

Karmazin was an All-Southern under Coach Wallace Wade for two years, 1940-41 and was regarded as one of the best running guards ever to play for Duke. He was selected to the All-America second-team and made a first-team selection on the All-America Blocking squad. Mike was one of the mainstays of the Duke Rose Bowl team which met Oregon State in the transplanted contest at Durham, Jan. 1, 1942.

Mike entered the Coast Guard in 1942 and served for three years before returning to Duke to complete

work on a Bachelor's Degree in History. At Duke he was assistant under Coach Wade during his undergraduate days.

Karmazin decided to take a crack at professional football in 1946 and played two seasons with the New York Yankees. During both seasons in the play-for-pay ranks the Yankee team was runners-up to the Cleveland Browns for the pro championship. Karmazin returned to Duke in 1948 to assist with the Duke defenses and remained with the Blue Devils until 1951 when he was named head coach at Fork Union Military Academy, Fork Union, Va. His 1951 team had a record of five wins and four defeats.

When Horace Hendrickson was named head coach at State he immediately sought Karmazin's services to help install the T-formation attack for the

Wolfpack. Mike agreed to terms and immediately moved his headquarters to Raleigh where he and his wife, Betty and their two-year old daughter now make their home.

Although only 33 years old Karmazin is regarded by Hendrickson as one of the best young football coaches in the business. At State Mike will have charge of all line play and will concentrate his work on developing offensive blocking assignments, a department in which he excelled as a player.

Backfield Coach Billy Hickman

A T-formation quarterback with wide and varied experience, Billy Hickman is a valuable addition to Coach Horace Hendrickson's coaching staff. Like Mike Karmazin, Hickman assumed his new duties at State last March in time to assist with off-season drills.

Hickman, a native of Baltimore, Md., has earned five varsity monograms, four at the University of Virginia and one at Maryland. After a highly successful prep school career at Baltimore Polytechnic, Billy entered Maryland in 1943 and played regular at quarterback as a freshman under Coach Doc Spears.

In 1944 Hickman was inducted into the Navy training program and assigned to the University of Virginia where he played football under Coach Art Guepe for one season before going to Cuba for another Navy assignment. In 1946 Hickman was discharged from the service and entered Virginia. He was a regular quarterback for Coach Guepe for the next three seasons, 46-47-48 and one of the stars of the team. During his stay at Charlottesville Hickman played every position in the Virginia backfield on both offense and defense.

After taking a degree in Mechanical Engineering in 1948 Hickman remained at the University of Virginia to help Coach Art Guepe with the Cavalier backfield. After two years at Virginia, Billy moved to Duke University at Durham, N. C. in 1950 where he helped Coach Wallace Wade set up defenses against the T-formation.

In 1951 Hickman accepted a position with the Elliott Machine Corp. of Baltimore, Md. as a consulting engineer. During the fall he kept his hand in football by doing some scouting for Coach Guepe at the University of Virginia.

Last March when Coach Hendrickson began a search for a T-formation specialist, Hickman was recommended to him most highly by several

leading coaches. A call to Baltimore brought an interview with Billy and after two weeks of negotiations, Hickman finally agreed to return to the coaching field and take the post at N. C. State.

A very serious student of the T-formation, Hickman has become a virtual authority on the subject as far as the Wolfpack staff is concerned. He has set-up complete books for every member of the State team on the split T-formation attack and has diagrammed every step in executing ground and air patterns.

Hendrickson calls Hickman, "a football nut," who is just the kind of a coach that every school needs on its staff.

Defensive Coach Beattie Feathers

Former Head Coach Beattie Feathers, who tutored Wolfpack teams from 1944 through 1951, has been retained on the current staff to guide the defensive destinies at State. He is certainly well-versed in this art, having produced teams which led the nation in defense in both 1946 and 1947.

In point of service Feathers is the oldest member of the State athletic staff. He came to West Raleigh in 1943 as assistant football coach to Williams (Doc) Newton and in 1944 was named head football coach. During his eight seasons as head coach his teams won 36, lost 37 and tied four.

A native of Bristol, Va., Feathers has a long career behind him as a player that includes 15 seasons in high school, college and professional football. He was an All-State fullback at Bristol, Va. before heading for the University of Tennessee where he became one of Coach Bob Neyland's all-time great stars. Feathers was selected All-America in 1933 and was rated one of the finest backfield stars ever turned out at the Volunteer institution, which is a consistent producer of stars.

In 1934 Feathers moved into the professional ranks with the Chicago Bears and here he attained the height of achievement once again. In his freshman season in the play-for-pay ranks, Feathers led the league in the ground gaining department, personally accounting for 1,800 yards rushing, which stood for 13 years as the league record until it was broken by Steve Van Buren of the Philadelphia Eagles in 1948. Feathers teamed with Fullback Bronco Nagurski as the one-two punch of the fabulous Chicago Bears, which won the pro title for five seasons while Feathers was a player.

Beattie saw seven seasons with the Bears and then wound up as a player with the Brooklyn Dodgers and Green Bay Packers. Injuries hampered

him during his last season in the league. In 1940 Feathers moved into the coaching field with Appalachian State Teachers College at Boone, N. C. After two years as assistant he was made head coach and in 1942 the Mountaineers won seven of 10 games under Feathers.

Feathers should prove to be a great asset to the State staff this season. Head Coach Horace Hendrickson says, "I know of no one who can do a better job of setting up defenses than Beattie Feathers. He is highly respected among coaches throughout the Southern Conference and we are mighty happy that he is staying here to help with our squad."

Coach Feathers is the father of three lovely girls and he and Mrs. Feathers make their home in Cary, N. C.

Head Trainer Merle J. McIntosh

Newest addition to the N. C. State athletic staff is Trainer Red McIntosh, who comes to West Raleigh via the University of Arizona and Rhode Island State University. McIntosh reported for duty on September 6.

A native of Newcastle, Pa. Red was an outstanding football player in 1929. In 1930 Red enrolled at Duke University as a player under Coach Wallace Wade and saw service with the Blue Devils for two years before leaving that institution to play professional football. For two years he barnstormed around the country until he signed with the Cleveland Rams.

In 1936 McIntosh returned to college, enrolling at Slippery Rock Teachers College at Slippery Rock, Pa. As an undergraduate he also assisted with the football team as line coach. During McIntosh's stay at Slippery Rock that institution ran up a string of 23 straight football victories that extended over three seasons.

After leaving Slippery Rock in 1940, Red was football coach at Emerson High School in Union City, N. J. for a period of four years. In 1944 McIntosh accepted a job as assistant football coach and trainer at Rhode Island State. During his eight year stay with the Rhodies, McIntosh took time off to study physio-therapy at New York University, and serve an internship at St. Joseph's Hospital in Providence, R. I.

McIntosh holds a degree in physical education from Slippery Rock Teachers College and has completed graduate work in physio-therapy at New York University. While at Rhode Island he was an instructor and assistant professor of physical education.

Trainer McIntosh has wide experience in treating all types of athletic injuries. Rhode Island Football Coach Ed Doherty says, "Red McIntosh can rehabilitate an injury faster than anyone I've seen in the business." Other Rhode Island coaches attribute much of the success of the Rams great basketball teams to the skill and savvy exhibited by McIntosh. Frank Keaney, former cage coach, and H. C. Haire, present basketball mentor, both are high in their praise of McIntosh's ability as a trainer. Fred Tootell, Rhode Island track coach, says "If Red McIntosh can't get 'em ready to run, there's no hope."

The new State trainer was to have accepted a position at the University of Arizona on Sept. 1, but when he was offered the opportunity to join the staff at West Raleigh he requested to be released from his contract at Tuscon in order to report to the Wolfpack.

LEFT ENDS

KOSILLA, Steve—6-1, 188 pounds. Senior. Tarrytown, N. Y. Veteran of three previous seasons of competition, Kosilla has all the attributes of a top flight end . . . speed and aggressiveness. Steve is perhaps the best pass receiver on the squad and during his three years in a Wolfpack uniform has scored 10 touchdowns. Against Duke in 1949 Steve caught a pair of touchdown passes. Last year Steve caught a total of 21 passes for 226 yards for an average of 10.8 yds. and he scored two touchdowns. Kosilla likely will be top man at his left end position on offense and is slated for some defensive work. Studying Rural and Industrial Recreation.

MARTINI, Ralph—5-11, 205 pounds. Junior. Niagara Falls, N. Y. Injury hampered this big fellow last year, but indications point to his becoming one of the top flight defensive flankers on the current squad. During his two previous seasons Ralph has played both blocking back and fullback. Early in the '51 season he suffered a shoulder separation, but came back to see limited service near the end of the year as a defensive specialist. Ralph has the stamina and physical build to be rough on defense and probably will see most of his service in this department. Studying Rural and Industrial Recreation.

BUTLER, David—6-1, 170 pounds. Senior. Fayetteville, N. C. A rugged competitor despite his lack of size, Butler can play both offense and defense. Will be counted on extensively to bolster end position. Studying Textiles.

RIGHT ENDS

LODGE, Harry—6-0, 185 pounds. Sophomore. Blawnox, Pa. A regular last year on defense as a freshman, Harry likely will be one of the key men in the 1951 set-up. Both a good pass receiver and rugged tackler on defense, Lodge was unknown last season until he came into his own in the second game of the season. Probably will specialize on defense, but can play offense too. Studying Textiles.

THOMPSON, John—5-11, 185 pounds. Junior. Kenmore, Pa. Another good pass receiver, Thompson will probably specialize on offense this year. Last season as sophomore he caught 8 passes for 161 yards for an average of 20.1 yards per catch, which was the highest average on the team. Very fleet afoot, Thompson is particularly deceptive to follow for defensive halfbacks. Is expected to pair with Steve Kosilla as starter on offense. Studying Rural and Industrial Recreation.

SMITH, Paul—6-0, 187 pounds. Junior. South Charleston, W. Va. Rugged performer who can play both offense and defense. Used more on defense last year and earned a letter. Is expected to develop even more this season and could be one of the best ends on the club. Likes it rugged and rough and has plenty of stamina to play extensively. Studying Textiles. Married.

ALLMAN, Bernie—5-11, 195 pounds. Senior. Parkersburg, W. Va. Veteran of two previous varsity seasons, Allman can play either offense or defense, but probably will specialize on defense. Biggest of the ends, Bernie has been hampered by recurrent knee injury. If he can play extensively this year he may be one of the best ends in the college's history. Studying Textiles.

DAVIDSON, Don—6-2, 200 pounds. Freshman. Pontiac, Michigan. Member of Camp LeJeune Marine service team for the past three seasons, Davidson is one of the brightest of the incoming freshmen. Plays both offense and defense and is expected to work his way into regular job before season is over. Good track man in both field events and as high jumper. Studying Architecture.

DALATRI, Dick—190 pounds, 6-0. Freshman. Glen Rock, N. J. Entered school last spring and took part in off-season drills as tackle. Has been shifted to end to strengthen flank position. Outstanding prospect and is particularly good defensive player. May become star before season has run its course. Studying Textiles.

LEFT TACKLES

BRITT, James C.—6-3, 208 pounds. Senior. Fayetteville, N. C. One of the best linemen on the State squad, Britt has the speed of a jet plane and the hitting power of a Mack truck. When he's at his best there's no finer tackle in the Southern Conference and even on off-days he's superior to most forwards. A brilliant offensive blocker, Britt can also do a great job on defense. He'll likely be called upon to play both this year. Few big men have Britt's speed in the open and only Halfback Alex Webster is faster on the present State team. Unless an injury comes along to hamper this big fellow, he should be a leading candidate for All-Southern honors this year. He does everything well. Studying Textiles.

URGOVITCH, Ken—6-1, 205 lbs. Sophomore. Garfield, N. J. A 19-year old sophomore, Urgovitch is likely to give the opposition plenty of rough moments this year. In spring practice game he was one of the top men on the field. Has improved steadily after seeing little action as freshman, but is rated near top for left tackle job. Probably will specialize on defense, but can play offense too. Lots of speed and hard tackler. Ability fits T-formation style of play perfectly. Studying Industrial Arts.

O'BRYANT, Charles—222 pounds, 6-1. Junior. Reidsville, N. C. One of the most improved players on the squad, O'Bryant is likely to have a key role in this year's defensive line play. Impressed coaches in spring game and only needs experience to become regular. Hits hard and knows blocking

assignments well. Has played very little in his two previous seasons on squad, but may come into his own this year. Speciality is defense and he likes it rough. Studying Horticulture.

PRICE, C. M.—200 pounds, 6-1. Freshman. Prospect, Va. Entered school last spring and participated in off-season drills. Shows promise and probably will see action this year on defense. Outstanding high school performer. Studying Forestry.

LEONE, Anthony—205 pounds, 6-1. Freshman. Bronx, N. Y. Attended New York Military Academy and was outstanding performer. Has plenty of speed and likely will be used extensively on defense.

RIDEN, Percy—210 pounds, 6-0. Sophomore. Lewistown, Pa. Held out last year Riden has plenty of potentialities and probably will be key man in 1952 plans. Good offensive blocker and rugged on defense. Studying Agriculture.

STALLINGS, Dewey—210 pounds, 6-2. Freshman. Wallace, N. C. Member of Wallace High team which won 11 straight victories last year. Selected All-Conference Class A Schools and All-Eastern Central. Probably play defense only.

RIGHT TACKLES

BARKOUSKIE, Ray—210 pounds, 6-1. Senior. Kulpmont, Pa. Captain of the 1952 squad Ray has seen extensive service on Wolfpack teams for the past three years. He held forth as a blocking back the past two years and was a defensive standout as a line backer. Ray takes over at tackle after playing at guard in the spring game, but Hendrickson knows that Barkouskie can do a top job no matter what his assignment. A very popular member of the team, Ray also handles the extra point tasks on the team. In 1950 he booted 10 of 14 tries and last year converted 12 times in 19 attempts. Majoring in Industrial Arts, Barkouskie is an excellent student. He is also an officer in the campus R.O.T.C. regiment. Ray is a brother of Pittsburgh All-America, Ernie Barkouskie of several seasons ago.

HILLMAN, James—6-3, 240 pounds. Senior. Kane, Pa. Biggest man on the squad, Jim is a rugged offensive and defensive player and he'll be counted on strongly this season. Two previous letters for line play, Hillman has experience needed in State line this year. Navy veteran, Hillman is 26 years old, which is the oldest on the present squad. He is also track performer, used primarily in the shot put and discus in the field events. Rated by Grantland Rice among the standout linemen in the South this year, Jim should have the best season. He has the build and power to open good holes on offense and on defense he's hard to move. May specialize on defense, but probably will be called upon to play offense too. Studying Rural and Industrial Recreation.

NIXON, Glenn—5-11, 215 pounds. Junior. Buffalo, N. Y. As sophomore Nixon saw some action, but played in the shadow of All-Southern Elmer Costa. Capable of doing big things, Nixon showed sparks of greatness on

occasions last season. Probably will develop even more this year and will be counted on extensively. Likely will be No. 2 offensive tackle. Studying Rural and Industrial Recreation.

SZUCHAN, John—6-0, 220 pounds. Freshman. Phoenixville, Pa. High school star last year, Szuchan will likely be a defensive specialist this year at State. Honorable Mention All-WPIAL.

LEFT GUARDS

MAZGAJ, Edwin—205 pounds, 6-0. Sophomore. Lackwanna, N. Y. Although Mazgaj failed to participate in a single varsity game last year due to a broken wrist sustained in pre-season drills, he is rated among the top candidates at guard this year. Rugged defensive performer and good offensive blocker, Mazgaj could become one of the standouts on the '52 squad. Great hustler and enjoys contact. Studying Agriculture.

FRANKOS, J. W.—191 pounds, 6-0. Frosh. Portsmouth, Va. Enrolled last February and took part in spring drills. Looked good in Red-White intra-squad game and showed he can block and tackle. Needs experience, but rates high in pre-season picture. Outstanding high school record. Studying Engineering.

DAVIS, Charles—205 pounds, 5-11. Sophomore. Goldsboro, N. C. Outstanding in spring practice, Davis may be one of the best offensive blockers on the squad. Has quick charge and is crisp blocker. Holds his own well on defense. Potentially one of the best newcomers on team and could produce surprise this year. Studying Construction Engineering.

D'ANGELO, Albert—190 pounds, 5-11. Frosh. Greensburgh, Pa. Top prep school player and was selected All-Western Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic League. Also member of Pennsylvania all-star squad. Excellent college prospect and is expected to see plenty of service this year, particularly as defensive player.

KENNEDY, William—205 pounds, 5-11. Senior. Fayetteville, N. C. Member of Fayetteville High state champs in 1949, Kennedy has never seen much service in his two previous varsity years. Has desire to play, but needs more speed and blocking ability. Could develop this year, but will have tough fight to make grade. Excellent student. Studying Construction Engineering.

RIGHT GUARDS

BAGONIS, John—195 pounds, 5-11. Sophomore. Luzerne, Pa. Earned letter as freshman last season and played some excellent football. Blocked two punts in Catawba game and saw regular service in half-dozen games. Fast and great blocker, Bagonis needs only added experience to become one of State's finer guards. Brother of Vince Bagonis, State's regular guard for the past two years. Probably will rate starting assignment on offense. Studying Industrial Arts.

PAINTER, Bill—225 pounds, 5-11. Frosh. Irwin, Pa. Outstanding high school star, Painter hails from the hometown of State's line coach, Mike Karmazin, who rates him standout collegiate prospect. Big and fast, Painter needs only experience against college competition to do good job. Probably will play defense only in early season.

PERRY, Bob—225 pounds, 6-2. Frosh. Jeanette, Pa. Another good Pennsylvania newcomer to squad, Perry is expected to bolster State's defenses this year. Excellent high school record. Willing to learn and has ability to produce. May take several games to find his real worth to squad, but is rated high among freshman candidates.

FRAZIER, James—193 pounds, 5-10. Sophomore. Goldsboro, N. C. Fine offensive blocker, Frazier developed well in spring drills. Saw extensive service in Red-White intra-squad game and is one of faster linemen on squad. Will need experience, but coaches believe he'll produce. Studying Civil Engineering.

KAPP, Ben—207 pounds, 5-11. Sophomore. Paterson, N. J. Held out of varsity action last year, Kapp should be asset to team this season. Has build and speed to be top guard, but potential must be developed. Rugged defensive player and likes to play. Studying Rural and Industrial Recreation.

HASKELL, Jack—195 pounds, 5-10. Sophomore. Garwood, N. J. Rough and rugged Haskell has played both end and guard. Is fast and blocks well, but needs experience. Has the desire necessary toward becoming an outstanding player and if he can develop fundamentals will be one of the best guard reserves on squad. Studying Textiles.

CENTERS

BATTAGLIA, Fred—225 pounds, 5-11. Junior. Niagara Falls, N. Y. Improvement in spring drills has soared Fred's chances of becoming Wolf-pack's top offensive center this year. He has experience and although has not earned monogram, can do the job excellently. Fine offensive blocker. Likes it rough and rugged. Studying Rural and Industrial Recreation.

PAROLI, Bob—235 pounds, 6-0. Sophomore. Poughkeepsie, N. Y. Switched from tackle to center, Bob is only letterman returning here. Fine defensive performer, Paroli likely will specialize as line backer and may not see much service on offense. Hard worker, Bob can do good job anywhere in forward wall and Hendrickson may elect to utilize his talents at tackle as well as center. Studying Rural and Industrial Recreation.

TONN, Dick—220 pounds, 6-0. Freshman. Cleveland, Ohio. Probably the best freshman prospect on the squad, Tonn was a big star in high school and made All-State selections throughout the area. Fast and hard-hitting, Dick probably will be top man in State line before many seasons. Needs experience, but is likely to see plenty of service as offensive pivot.

DEBOISBRIAND, Jose—6-0, 230 pounds. Freshman. Amesbury, Mass. Another excellent freshman prospect, DeBoisbriand is a bit overweight but is due to mould into shape quickly. Good line backer and will spell Paroli on defense and may be used also as offensive performer. Great high school record.

SPIVEY, Henry—245 pounds, 6-5. Freshman. Weldon, N. C. Biggest man on team, Spivey is potentially a great football player. Moves well despite weight and can block. Probably will be defensive specialist until knows system better. Also can play defensive end. Fine high school record.

QUARTERBACKS

FRANTZ, Eddie—170 pounds, 5-10. Frosh. Charlotte, N. C. Although only a freshman, Frantz is being groomed for a big task in State's '52 plans. Enrolled last February and was outstanding in off-season practice game. Great ball handler and excellent passer, Frantz has plenty of attributes necessary toward becoming great quarterback. Very cool-headed and calls signals with authority. Squad respects judgment and will go all out to make his decisions work. Has good deception and carries out fakes as well as any freshman seen by coaching staff. Had fine high school record at Central High, Charlotte, and is due to develop into great college player with more experience. Studying Textiles.

McCARTER, Hal—170 pounds, 5-10. Sophomore. Portsmouth, Va. Although McCarter was unable to play in spring game due to operation for cartilage in right knee, he is very much in the quarterback picture at State this year. As a tailback last year McCarter showed plenty of promise before going out with injury and coaching staff believes he'll be excellent quarterback. Good passer and cool performer under fire, McCarter will need to work on ball-handling and learn system before his true worth can be ascertained. The potential is here and needs only development. Studying Textiles.

WYLES, Carl—180 pounds, 5-9. Junior. Buffalo, N. Y. A definite threat for the starting quarterback job, Wyles has never seen much service at the slot except in practice. Last year he worked as quarterback for the State Jayvee squad, simulating the T-attack of the opposition. He is cool-headed and can throw well. A bit hampered by his short frame, Wyles, nevertheless, is rough and rugged and likes to play. Is learning fast as ball-handler and will give other candidates a run for the position. Also plays baseball and is outfielder-catcher. Fine hitter and is expected to be regular for Coach Vic Sorrell this year. Studying Electrical Engineering. Excellent student.

WEST, Eddie—195 pounds, 6-2. Freshman. Alexandria, Va. Outstanding high school star, Eddie may rate higher in the quarterback picture as the season goes along. Selected All-America, All-State, All-Metropolitan as high school star at Mount Vernon High, Alexandria, Va. Great passer and has the physical build necessary to outdistance other candidates. Needs experience. Has good potentiality.

FAIRES, Archie—170 pounds, 6-0. Freshman. Wallace, N. C. Best player on top high school team which was undefeated in two years. Faires was best scorer and passer and rated one of state's best quarterbacks. Is capable of making team this year, but needs to work under fire to prove ability.

RIGHT HALFBACKS

TACKER, Bob—170 pounds, 6-0. Freshman. Stiles, Pa. Enrolled last February in time to take part in off-season drills. Has developed into top runner and likely will have major role in State's offensive plans for '52. Plenty of speed and is excellent pass receiver. Can be expected to have great career with Wolfpack before he is through. Studying Rural and Industrial Recreation.

SWANGER, Tommy—175 pounds, 5-10. Junior. Hamburg, N. Y. One of the fastest men on the squad, Swanger has been great in early season work. Starts fast and is capable of going the distance at any time. Although he has not lettered, Swanger has seen action in many games. Is great threat as pass receiver. Shifty, open-field runner. Studying Textiles.

BETHUNE, Dickie—170 pounds, 5-11. Sophomore. Clinton, N. C. Another breakaway type runner that should prove to be dangerous. Although he lacks weight, Bethune is tough and likes to play. Is also capable passer when the situation arises. Saw little service last year because of injury, but is expected to be important performer this year.

FRAUENHOFER, Chris—188 pounds, 5-11. Junior. Kenmore, N. Y. Strictly a defensive player, but a standout in his own right. Frauenhofer is excellent at pass defense, a fine tackler and has plenty of speed to go along with it. Probably will be starter on defensive unit. Studying Rural and Industrial Recreation.

TEER, William—175 pounds, 5-11. Sophomore. Hillsboro, N. C. Another fine defensive performer, who likes it rough and does a good job. Particularly adept at pass defense and is good defender against end sweeps. Hard to block. Likes to play. Studying Textiles.

NARDONE, Mike—175 pounds, 5-8. Freshman. Peakville, N. Y. Fine record at New York Military Academy. Played fullback and halfback in prep school, but is being used primarily as defensive line backer in early season drills. May shift to offensive fullback later in season. Has plenty of potential.

SEEHORN, Monte—175 pounds, 6-0. Sophomore. Lenoir, N. C. Was counted on as regular defensive halfback, but suffered a dislocated shoulder in early practice and may not be in uniform until third or fourth games on schedule. Has speed and is good pass defense man. Studying Forestry.

O'HARA, Paul—175 pounds, 5-8. Junior. Niagara Falls, N. Y. Another pre-season practice casualty with knee injury. May be in shape to play by third game. Probably will specialize on defense. Studying Civil Engineering.

LEFT HALFBACKS

WEBSTER, Alex—195 pounds, 6-3. Senior. Kearny, N. J. Nicknamed "Kearny Express," this big veteran is the key performer of the 1952 team. As a triple threat player he will have no peers in the Southern Conference this year. Last year he gained 1,256 yards running and passing to rank third in the conference, his passing was above average, gaining 726 yards on 41 completions in 73 attempts. As a kicker, Webster averaged nearly 39 yards per try and ranked among the best in the league. His ability is proven and the switch from the single-wing to the split-T-formation has only enhanced his value to the team. Should be a cinch for sectional honors this year and among the best in the nation. Studying Rural and Industrial Recreation.

MICKLEM, Colbert—180 pounds, 5-11. Freshman. Hopewell, Va. In early season drills this youngster has shown he'll be an important performer for the Wolfpack this year. Has speed and ability to pick his field. Runs with authority and knows the job facing him on every play. Has adapted himself to State attack brilliantly and is certain to have key role. Can pass if necessary.

POTTS, Ted—175 pounds, 5-11. Senior. Alexandria, Va. Excellent punter, Potts likely will be called upon for reserve job on offense and to play as defensive safety at times. Fine passer, Potts needs to hustle to keep up with the competition. Has ability to get job done, but likely will be used only as relief for Webster and Micklem. Studying Construction Engineering.

WILLARD, Gene—195 pounds, 5-10. Sophomore. Buffalo, N. Y. Rugged defensive player, Willard probably will specialize as a defensive halfback or safety man. Converted from fullback, Willard is fine athlete and will have important job on pass defense and covering outside zones. Studying Rural and Industrial Recreation.

ZUBATY, John—190 pounds, 6-1. Freshman. Blairsville, Pa. Probably will be strictly defensive specialist this year, but will work in on offense as season progresses. Has speed and ability to move ball. Will become more valuable with experience. Excellent high school record.

FULLBACKS

LANGSTON, Don—195 pounds, 6-1. Sophomore. Lexington, Ky. One of the hardest running fullbacks ever to wear a State uniform, Langston, although unheralded may become one of the stars of the '52 team. Has all the speed and ability to do topnotch job and opponents who don't know him now may find out about him the hard way. Great prospect. Studying Textiles.

BARRINGER, Joe—190 pounds, 5-11. Sophomore. Midway Park, N. C. Another top prospect at fullback, Joe can run and hit with the power of a truck. 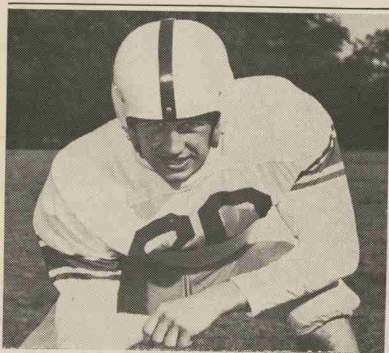

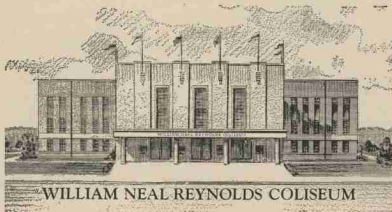

Riddick Stadium, present site of North Carolina State's home football contests, was started in 1907 as an athletic field and the first football contest was played on September 30, 1907 between State and Randolph-Macon.

In 1912 the stadium received its present name when the senior class voted to name the field in honor of Professor W. C. Riddick, who is regarded as the father of athletics at North Carolina State.

Construction of the concrete stands on the west side was begun in the summer of 1916 and during that year football contests were held at Raleigh with Davidson and Wake Forest.

In 1928 the stadium was enlarged and the east stands were completed. The field house and present lighting system were completed during the 1938-39 seasons.

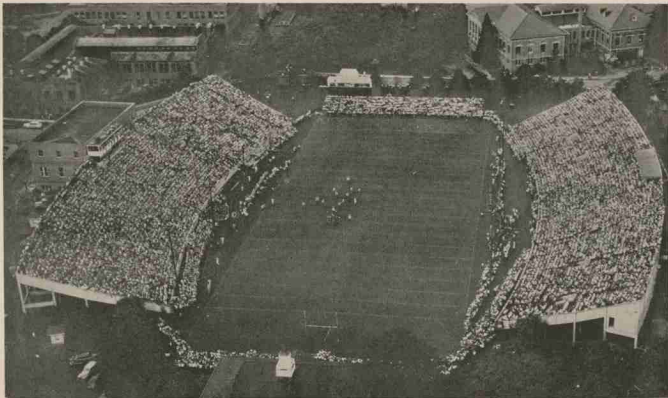
Many changes have taken place in the physical field as it now exists. Once it was level with surrounding ground, but grading and new construction has lowered the present field until it is approximately eight to ten feet below the level of the surrounding earth.

During recent years the large crowds attending contests in Riddick Stadium have forced athletic officials to increase the seating capacity by adding extra bleachers at both ends of the playing field. The structure, which once could care for only 5,000 persons in 1916 can now accommodate a gathering of about 20,000 people.

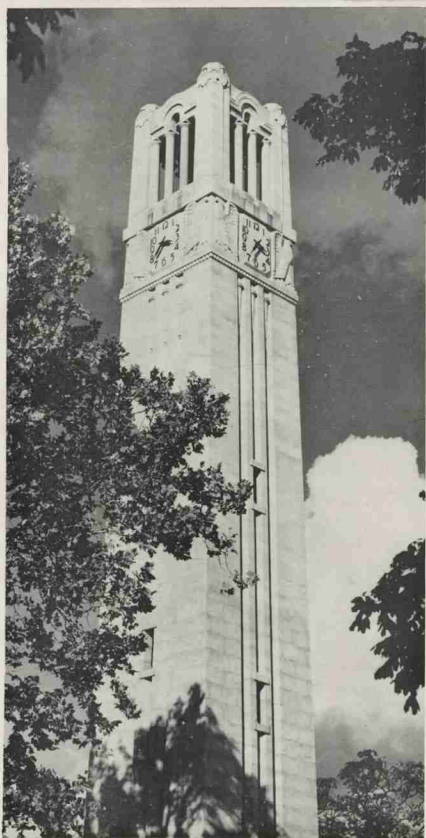
