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
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Tonight marks the beginning of another football season for N. C. State followers and perhaps the start of a new era in gridiron success for the Wollpack. That success may not be achieved immediately, but should be forthcoming within the span of the next few years.

State supporters will find many new innovations greeting them tonight. The split T-formation offense replaces the time-worn single-wing and your State squad takes the field tonight resplendent in brand new uniforms from head to toe. Behind this team is a new coaching staff, probably the most capable group of men ever to tutor a Wolfpack squad.

New personnel make up this year's Wolfpack squad, youngstex who're destined for stardom in the near future. Freshmen will play a major role in the progress of this seasor's club and one glance at the State roster will tell you that at least two yearling candidates, Halfback Bob Tacker of Stiles, Pa, and Quarterback Eddlie West of Alexandria, Va, are in the starting offensive lineup. On defense two other freshmen, Safety John Zubaty of Blairwille, Pa, and Tony Leone, a 195-pound guard from the Bronx, N. Y, are due to start. It has been several years since freshmen were so important on a Wolfpack team.

But the backbone of the 1952 squad is still the upperclassmen. Such stars as Captain Ray Barkonskie at defensive guard, Tackles J. C. Britt and Jim Hillmank. Ends David Butter and Steve Kosilla and Fullbacks. Harvey Yeates and Dick Spritz, all seniors playing their final year for State, will be key performers on both offense and defense during the year. No better men can be Ionud.

In the backfield the standour is Alex Webater, the 200-pound Kearny, N. J., product, destined to become one of State's all-time great football stars. Last year he was an All-Southern selection, clipping of 1,256 yards running and passing and leading the Southern Conference in the important scoring department. This year Big Alex is likely to be even better than last season. He'll be a marked man, for the opposition well knows his capabilities, but Webster has the stuff to produce. Webster, too, is a senior.

But behind the seniors are other fine football stars who'll be around to help with future Wolfpack teams. These younger players are the hope for success to come. Men like Tackles Bob Paroli, Ken Urgovitch, C. M. Price and Henry Spivey; Guards John Bagonis, Charlie Davis, J. W. Frankos, John Suchan: Ends Harry Lodge, Don Davidson, Dick Dalatri and Dick, Tyler; and Centers Dick Tom, Jose DeBoisbrind and others with still two and three seasons of eligibility remaining are the future stars.

It is because the current State team is a young squad that the general outlook this year is not as bright as might be the case if more experienced personnel were available. Alumni and friends of the Wolfpack, howver, may look with pride on the team this year, knowing that many players will be available to get the bigger jobs done successfully in the seasons ahead.

There are many behind theseeness men responsible for any foothall team. Some are recognized publicly, others remain in virtual obscurity. Two such men are Trainer Merle J. McIntosh and Student Manager Vitus Kaiser. Without the work of both the team would be lacking in a viral asset. McIntosh, a former football player, has studied physic therapy at two graet hospitals and spent seven years at Rhode Island as head trainer. He has no peer in his field as an athlete trainer. Kaiser, an Eric, Pa., lad, played four years of football for the Wollpack and tremains in school as student manager to complete work on his degree. No one works harder than Kaiser to get the team ready for Saturday's game.

Ahead are three more home appearances for the State team. Next Startday night the opposition will be furnished by the up-and-coming Davidson Wildcats, a team with a new coach, a new system, and new spirit. Outober 18 an afternoon feature game is billed with Duke's Blue Devils and on October 25 Florida. State is the Homecoming Day contest. Better get tickets now for the best seats.







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

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
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Colonials Star of Stars

Bino Barreira, GW's mighty mite, last year was hailed as the smallest fullback in the country, also one of the best. This year with GW's switch to the split "T," Barreira will be touted as the smallest right hallback in the country and again one of the best.

Barreira has been described as a "pair of shoulder pads with shoes attached." (by Walter Haight of the *Washington Post*).

Standing 56" with football shoes and weighing 155 Ibs. with football equipment. Bino finished second in pass-receiving and third in scoring in the Southern Conference last year. He caught 34 passes, one less than Glenn Smith of Clemson, who led the pass receivers. He scored nine touchdowns and kicked two extra points to finish behind Alex Webster of N. C. State and All-American Ed Modzelewski of Maryland. His scoring record is remarkable considering G. W. didn't score until the third game of the season.

In rushing Bino carried the ball 132 times for a gain of 519 yards, an average of 4 yards per attempt. He returned 19 kickoffs for 314 yards very close to 20 yards each time.

If his rushing yardage could be added to his pass-receiving yardage he totaled 1,038 yards which would have placed him seventh in total offense in the Southern Conference last year.

Take away 519 yards from Andy Davis' record and it leaves only 287.

After G. W. upset South Carolina last year Coach Rex Enright said, "Barreira beat us with his pass-catching," Bino caught nine for 160 yards, but five of them and 122 of the yardage came in the fourth quarter resulting in two touchdowns.

He scored G.W's first touchdown of the season against Maryland-the only one scored that day; scored both G. W. touchdowns against Wake Forest; scored all three touchdowns against Furnan; scored once against V.P.J. and once against the big Kentucky line. The indestructible bantam in accounting for almost half of G. W.'s 128 total points last year was not injured during the season.

Bino, a native of Hudson, Mass., where he was the only Class C high school player even to make the All-State team, came to G. W. on the recommendation of Roger Antaya, former G. W. coach, now coaching at Bolling Air Force.

Strange thing about Bino is that he was considered a great hockey player making the All-State team in that sport also. He declined a hockey scholarship at Dartmouth to come to G. W. for football, his first love.

His teammates elected him co-captain this fall and they couldn't have made a better choice. Bino made an eloquent acceptance speech. He charged every freshman and veteran with their first duties as football players their classwork.

After the first four weeks of fall training at G. W. Coach Bo Sherman has at least a shallow indication of what his freshman crop and non-lettering returnees are capable of.



J. star the looked good at fullback also.


Dick Gasperi, freshmen center from Hershey, Pa., has moved in behind veteran Steve Korcheck. Gasperi is also available for line-backing duty.

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Head Coach Horace (Horse) Hendrickson

Taking over the football coaching reins at N. C. State this year is Horace Hendrickson, former Duke University football star, who has been in the coaching field for the past 18-years. He brings a wealth of experience to his first head coaching job in the Southern Conference, which includes positions at Duke, Elon College, University of Pennsylvannia and with the professional Brooklyn Dodgers.



HORACE HENDRICKSON Head Football Coach N. C. State

A native of Beaver Falls, Pa., Hendrickson attended kiski Prey and was a standout performer on football, haseball and baaketball teams. In 1930 he entered Duke and went on to become one of that institutions greatest allaround athietes, starring as quarterback of the Blue Devils first Southern Conference championship team, as regular third baseman on Coach Jack Combs baseful squad and earning letters as a basketball regular under Coach Eddie Cameron. He is one of the few three sport-lettermen in Duke athletic history.

Wallace Wade, now commissioner of the Southern Conference, who coached Hendrickson at Duke, rates the new Wolfpack football coach as one of the greatest quarterbacks he ever coached. Wade's career covers nearly a halfcentury of coaching great teams at Alabama and Duke. Hendrickson achieved his 'fnickname ''The Horse'' during his senior year at Duke when he played every position in the Blue Devil backfield.

Hendrickson's football achievements at Duke were many. He was selected to the All-American first-team and was a standout in the 1933 game with Termessee, which Duke won 10-2. Hendrickson was also voted to several All-America blocking teams.

After his graduation in 1934 from Duke, Hendrickson was named assistant freshman coach by Wallace Wade. He remained in that capacity through June 1937, and also assisted in baseball.

In the summer of 1937 Hendrickson was selected to his first head coaching job at Elon College and it was the start of one of the most successful connections ever made by the Fighting Christians. During the five years from 1937 through 1941 that Hendrickson quilded the destinise of Elon, the football and three in basehall. Hendrickson was bade and coach of all three sports as well as athletic director. His football teams, meeting the best in the North State, won 32, lost 12 and tied 1. After a highly successful 1941 season when the Elon Christians won eight and lost only once and chained the North Static Conference crown, Hendrickson resigned to move to the University of Pennsylvania as backfield conch under George Wanger and head basheall conch. Hendrickson served as chife scout. for Munger's Pennsylvania Quakers, who won the Ivy League title each year during Hendrickson's stay between 1942 and 1943.

Hendrickson resigned at Pennsylvania in 1948 to join Carl Voyles with the now defunct Brooklyn Dodgers of the National Football League. In the Dodger organization Hendrickson scouted for the baseball team and handled the backfield coaching job.

When the Brooklyn team decided to withdraw its football interests from the professional game Hendrickson had several offers of coaching assignments, but his love of North Carolina drew him back to his alam mater, Dake University, where he was named head freshman coach of football, baseball and basketball.

Hendrickson's second job at Duke was a highly successful venture as all his other assignments had been. His first Blue Imp freshman football squad was undefasted in six games during the 1949 season and ranks as one of the best yearling teams ever produced at Duke. In 1950 Hendrickson's freshman team won three and lost two. Among the vitcrives was 119.0 win scored over an N. C. State freshman team, which was one of the best turned out at West Raleigh.


When State began a search for a new backfield coach in the summer of 1951, Hendrickson was recommended for the position and was immediately signed to a three-year contract. He assumed his duties on August 1, 1951, and took over as chief scout in addition to his backfield coaching iob.

In December, 1951, when the State Athletic Council began a search for a new football coach they had to look no further than their own staff to pick a successor to Beattie Feathers. Hendrickson was given the approval of the council and was signed to a three-year contract. He immediately assumed the duties and began to lay plans for the 1952 season.

A thorough student of football, Hendrickson has had experience with all styles of play. He began to switch from the single-wing to the split T-formation in spring practice in April and succeeded in moulding the squad into the new style of play in time to impress observers in the annual Red-White intra-squad context in May.

Hendrickson faces a big task with the 1952 Wolfpack, but its one that he is tackling with a determination that has characterized his entire coaching career, which has never been marred by a losing season. He predicts no miracles with his first Wolfpack team, but these who know "The Horse" feel hat he will give State one of its better clubs. Hendrickson's lifetime record as a head coach shows 41 victories, 14 defeats and only one tie. During five years in the tough North State Conference at Elon his teams lost only five league games and were never beaten by more than two touchdowns. At Dake as freshman mentor his teams won nine and lost only twice and his Blue Imps were regarded as the best coached yearling team in the Southern Conference.

At Duke Hendrickson was an outstanding campus leader as well as one of the greatest athletes in that institution's history. He graduated with honors with a Batchelor of Arts degree in History and a minor in Education.



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
