
# STATE in '68

# 1968 OUTLOOK

Only five starters return from North Carolina State's 1967 Liberty Bowl champions as Earle Edwards must rebuild the Wolfpack, which has compiled the best overall record over the past six years of any team in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

One of State's finest backfields must run behind an offensive line that has only center Carey Metts returning as a starter from the team which compiled an 8-2 regular season record and which beat Georgia in the Liberty Bowl, 14-7. The defensive unit that gained distinction with its white shoes and in yielding the fewest yards in the ACC, has only two members, end Mark Capuano and linebacker Mike Hilka, back from the men who started in the Liberty Bowl. The entire secondary has graduated.

### Lose Two All-Americas

Most of last year's second units, on both offense and defense, will move up to starting positions for 1968. Seven of the 25 lettermen returning are offensive backs, although the Pack did lose its top rusher, halfback Tony Barchuk, and total offensive leader, quarterback Jim Donnan, among the 17 missing lettermen. Two all-Americas, tackle Dennis Byrd and defensive back Fred Combs, and all-ACC choices, Norman Cates at guard and end Harry Martell, are also top losses.

Senior quarterback Jack Klebe, a lefthander, will direct an all-letterman backfield of Bobby Hall and Charlie Bowers at the halfbacks and senior Settle Dockery at fullback. Seniors Leon Mason and Jimmy Lisk, along with sophomore Jim Hardin, give the Pack its best depth ever at halfback. This is the quickest set of backs the Pack has had in many years. Junior Art Waleski and sophomore Darrell Moody back up Klebe, while hard-running Dave Rodgers, the top surprise of the spring drills, gives excellent support to Dockery.

### Line Lacks Depth

Don Jordan, potentially the finest guard State has had, and Robby Evans saw a lot of duty last year and move into the starting offensive guard spots to flank Metts, an exceptional center. Marvin Tharp, a reserve in 1967, and sophomore holdout Ed Nicholas figure to start at tackle, while Wayne Lewis, a lanky junior with sure hands, and Charlie Tope won first unit spots at end. Five of the seven men counted on for depth in the offensive line have never been in a varsity game.

Defensively, State will be led by four of the ACC's finest in Capuano, all-ACC in 1967; tackle Ron Carpenter; line-backer Hilka: and safety Gary Yount. But depth is again a problem, with three tentative starters and eight second unit men completely void of varsity competition.

### **Experienced Tackles**

Junior Bob Follweiler will start at the other defensive spot, with senior Benny Lemmons swing man for both starters. Art Hudson and Carpenter are both experienced tackles, while transfer holdouts Harry Billger and Pete Sowirka add reserve strength. Middle guard, in the Pack's 5-4 defense, will be manned by either of two sophomores, Andy Solonoski or George Smith. Hilka heads the list of three lettermen linebackers, with Steve Diacont and Pete Bailey battling for the other starting position. Jerry Loftin is a promising sophomore linebacker.

The secondary will remain unsettled until the opening game, with Yount and Dick Idol the only lettermen among the available personnel. Yount, who is expected to do the punting after a tremendous performance in the Liberty Bowl, is the secondary leader at safety. Paul Sharp, up from last year's freshman team, has a lot of defensive savvy and has won a starting spot at the other safety. Paul Reid, a quick but non-lettered senior; sophomores Jack Whitley and Marcus Martin; and Idol are the cornerback candidates, with Whitley and Reid running on the first unit at the end of spring practice.

Gerald Warren should be one of the bright spots for the Wolfpack in 1968. The talented kicking specialist set a new national collegiate record of 17 field goals last year while leading the nation in scoring by kicking and the ACC in scoring with 70 points. Warren was named to two all-America teams last year and his 56-yard field goal in the spring game indicates another outstanding year for the slender specialist whose kickoffs are consistently at the goal line.
