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### 4-H NARRATIVE REPORT

#### INTRODUCTION:

There are eleven junior 4-H clubs in Bladen and one Y. W. club.

The h-H membership was delineated according to neighborhood group. Each club has its own president, secretary, tressurer, school sponsor and neighborhood leaders, consisting of men and women selected by the club members.

The 4-4 Council was organized in 1944. Their officers being selected from the elementary local 4-4 clubs, eleven.

Due to the extra large cotton crop - only about half of the 4-H clubs were organized in September for the school attendance was greatly reduced.

#### ORGANIZATION:

All new 1-8 club members have explained to them, in the beginning, the types of projects that they may carry. Then the clubters are asked what they think they want and need most to learn about. The agents help when needed with new members' selection of their projects.

Conferences are held, with h-H clubs to find out their thinking or programs for themselves. This year questionnaires were used in program planning for the Y. N. v. club and with guidance they did a good job at program planning.

The agents give more assistance to juniors in program plenning. h-H neighborhood leaders are also contacted in regards to h-H programs and their cooperation sought.

The Mt. Clive Y. M. W. has a total enrollment of 39, while the junior enrollment is 11h club members are trained, in club meetings at school, churches, at their homes and in the agents offices. A few hell leaders attend hell local meetings and say they learn quite a bit from attendance, not only about hell program but they get general information.

### ANNUAL DISTRICT PICNIC 4-H AND ADULTS:

7h5 adults and h-N'ers attended the District picnic held at the State mecreational area, Jones Lake. The total attendance at this meeting was estimated to be around three thousand.

The County Superintendent of Bladen County Schools gave words of welcome, after which a short program of singing and square dencing was rendered. Eladen's club members same a song and did one source dance.

#### 4-H CLUBS:

The reorganisation of L-W County Council officers took place Thursday, Warch 27. The duties of club officers were explained and the new L-W leaders hand books just received were passed to the leaders with due explanations. 38 club members

and officers attended this meeting held in the court house.

The title of the Dairy Food's Individual Contest demonstration is "Cream of Peanut Soup". This being a peanut section and where the making of peanut butter has been taught; makes possible the making of this soup with little cost. Skim milk or whole milk may be used in the making of Green of Peanut Soup.

We suggested to school club sponsors the teaching of this demonstration to three girls in each club; therefore, copies enough were sent to each school having a h-H club. h-H neighborhood leaders are becoming more interested in assisting with the h-H girls projects. More time is being given to explaining h-H work to our adult club leaders.

### NATIONAL 4-H WEEK:

National h-H week was celebrated in Bladen by placing two exhibits in store fronts; the one set up on main street, Elizabethtown had the caption in large print, "A Good Citizen Is A Well Informed Citizen". The moche form of a h-H girl seated at a properly lighted desk reading and a moche figure dressed in h-H boys uniform stood facing the attractive National h-H Club Week Poster. The title of this poster in "Serving as Loyal Citizens Through h-H". Spreaded out on the floor of the show case were h-H publications such as boys and girls project and record books. Over a thousand persons viewed this exhibit that remained up for 7 days.

The second exhibit was placed in the Colored business section, called Newtown; a similar poster to the one just mentioned was put on display and k-H printed publications were mounted on a huge poster in order that passerbys would be sure to take notice---"Learning the k-H way", was the theme of exhibit number two. This makes the third time that the moche forms used at the State Fair, Releigh, have been used in exhibits.

## YOUNG MEN AND WOMEN'S CLUBS:

The Mt. Clive Y. M. W. club was organized a little over two years ago in the A. M. E. Zion Methodist Church at Mt. Clive. This community may be called a surburb of Elizabethtown. Therefore, part of its members are Elizabethtown youth. Meetings are held wherever invited by the club members.

So far the agents have been invited to all meetings and socials. However, we stay in the background and try to be tackful when helping. This organization has officers from both neighborhoods. We have from college graduates to the Clementary grados belonging to the Y. M. W. club.

The 1952 Years program as was planned by club members is included in this report on a separated sheet.

The Y. M. W. assisted the home demonstration Achievement Day Frogram by giving two musical numbers and they are helping to work in the h-H Foundation Fund.

This organization planned and carried out their weiner reast party. Several members are talking attending the Christmas Frogram at the Flanitarium in December and, also, the annual Christmas Choral program in Milliston High, Wilmington, Sunday, December 7. The home agent will attend, also. Private cars will be used to take club members.

### SPECIAL MEETINGS:

### DAIRY FOOD'S INDIVIDUAL CONTEST:

27 club girls familarised themselves in April with more facts about the food value of milk, as they learned how to make "Gream of Peanut Soup".

The home agent demonstration the making of Grean of Fearut Soup. The County Winner will repeat this demonstration at the County 4-H Achievement Day program.

### 4-H ACHIEVEMENT DAY:

Sixteen girls took part in the apron parade on May 2nd, hall cohievement Day. Mary L. McKoy, of Mt. Olive Club gave for the second time the demonstration in the making of "Gream of Feant Soup". All present enjoyed the lively manner of this eleven year old demonstrator. Mrs. Mandall, assistant hall state leader, spoke on the "Four Hrs. All were greatly benefitted. She, also, awarded medals to the winners in the District Estry Food's Contest.

More parents attended this program than ever before. There were 261 persons present.

Mary McKoy, also, participated in the h-H District Federation Dairy Food's Contest in June and received very high rating. Hadon's h-i winners in the dress and apron contests, also, participated in the District Federation Contest.

The judges for the County Contest were: Home Economics Teachers, Vocational Agriculture Teachers and Clothing Leaders.

#### PROJECT PROGRAMS:

Each year the term "project" is explained to new club members and examples of the same given old club members do this - but the agents adds or explains what may still be misunderstood. Both cons ructive and destructive criticisms are given when project work is exhibited. In order to impire club members to do a higher quality of work, elminations and judging contests are held yearly. We believe that such contest help improve standards and help toys and girls to better evaluate their own efforts.

h-H leaders.—Ten received training in club organization, also, the h-H Foundation drive was sore fully explained. The h-H leasens on protective clothing was exhibited were boots, galashes, unbrells, rain cap and rain coats. Jesson Assign: Report on how many have bought protective clothing against rainy weather by the next meeting. Rainy weather clothing seems to be a real need in all schools visited. The reasons why we need protective clothing were discussed - examples of what has happened to children who never wear protective clothing - made great impression on the children.

Time was given to those club members who did not understand club record keeping. School sponsors were asked to help solve any problems arising concerning records in the absence of the agents.

Certain members assisted with the showing of the slides since the farm agent is ill.

Louise Miller of East Arcadia School has filed application to attend the 4-H Regional Conference for 1952, Louise shows great leadership ability both in her church and her school.

# T. M. W. CLUB--ELIZABETHTOWN COMMUNITY:

A called meeting of the Ya M. W. club was held in the Methodist Church at Er. clive, Thurday, August 28. The purpose of this meeting was program planning for 1953's.

After the purpose of the meeting had been explained and time for questions given each member checked his sheet and passed those in.

We divided the members into four groups and gave each a chairman - then four different lists of activities for Y. M. M. To were divided among the groups - where each chairman read the lists - discussions followed and lastly a designatednumber of items were selected by each group as their choice once for 1953. The Y. M. W. held their weiner roast outing at the home of Mr. & Mrs. W. C. McDowell, neighborhood leaders. All members left with more interest in the club as an organization. A few games were played including apple bobbing. Eleven persons participated in this outing.

# 4-H CLUB HEMS:

Personal contacts were made to business places in interest of selling h-H calendars. In most instances these firms contacted had already placed orders for 1953 calendars. Three hundred calendars were purchased. (telia Blanks' h quarts of cannel food were inspected and suggestions were given for making improvements before placing it on exhibit. Home improvement was observed.

4-H club Christmas parties are being planned with h-H neighborhood leaders assistance for their December meetings. Each club will, also, present a skit and appropriate games will be lead by the club recreational leaders.

# Baltimore 4-H club wakes up1

Under the sponsor Mrs. Davis the h-H club at Baltimore hasumade rapid strides. This club is planning a trip to Planitarium in November and gives the best club program of any club in the County at their monthly meetings. They expect to get an electric sewing machine in December.

Porterville h-H club decided to join Beltimore in making the trip December 3rd to N. C. Flanitarium where they will witness a program entitled "Star of Bethel-hem".

VI. PROJECTS:

A. CLOTHING:

Number enrolled 251. Number completing 218.

The general results noted -- improvement in evenness of hem lines, pressing of garments, more thought was given to selecting patterns to suit their figures and becoming colors.

The dress revue, and apron parade were held on the day that Dairy Foods eliminations were held. Mise Olllespie of Mt. Olive club represented Bladen in the District Frees Revue.

Clothing Construction - Making a girls slip was the lesson for May. The materials used to get this lesson over were as follows: pictures, princess slip pattern, a well constructed slip. I showed how to lay a pattern on the straight of the material, a tape measure was used, also cloth.

### APRIL: CLOTHING:

Time was taken to instruction on how to select a commercial pattern, the mirls. They were encouraged to get hell uniforms in time for hell achievement Day.

Over two-thirds of the clubs have their delegates money for 4-H Week.

Clarkton's club had two girls who exhibited their school dresses in April's club meeting. In four clubs, dust mittens were exhibited; made as one result of the clean-up compaign. Each girl was given a pattern to make her dust mitten. Odd scraps of old articles were used by these girls to make their dusters. Thirty mittens were made.

#### MAY. SUBJECTS STRESSED:

"Clothing Cons ruction" -- Pattern Study -- Slip. Camps for h-H members -- Canning C ntest and h-H Federation.

### 4-H CLUBS CLOTHING AND TEXTILES:

Method demonstration; & meetings, attendance 352. Most of the girls taking clothing were not familiar with commercial patterns nor how to select a pattern. How to lay a pattern correctly was demonstrated; a study of guide sheet was also stressed.

The best style of slip for young girls was discussed and illustrated. Suitable material for slips was discussed. As our girls have feed sacks they were encoraged to use these for every day slips.

This lesson will be followed up with club exhibits of slips next fall. Booklets on "Sewing with Cotton Bage", were given to clothing project girls; with suggestions for its use this summer. L-H neighborhood leaders helped chiefly by enco raging and praising the girls efforts. One leader gave a demonstration in clothing.

### B. FOODS AND MUTRITION:

- 1. Enrollment and completions:
  - a. Total number girls enrolled in food preparation projects 152.
  - b. Total number completing 148.
    - 1. Breakfast unit-enrolled 60-completing 59.
    - 2. Lunch or supper--enrolled 52-completing 50.
    - 3. Dinner unit-enrolled h0-completing 39.

### PROGRAMS AND DEMONSTRATIONS:

Dairy foods "Cream of Feanut Soup".

This subject was chosen to induce more people to use more milk in the dist. Youth and adults are being encouraged to use powdered or dry milk until a cow can be bought or raised. "satures are being started by several farm families as a result of Mr. Womn's talks and the arents help.

Approximately 750 persons saw the demonstration in Bladen in making "Cream of Peanut Soup" and in making "Soft Custard".

These demonstrations were closely related to the matritional problem of motivating our people to want more milk, to sense the bodys need for it.

#### RESULTS OF DEMONSTRATION AND PROCRAMS:

Number of meals planned by girls 626. Number of meals served 556.

The 1-H chek books are being used by the girls mothers as well as by club members, as a result more dishes are being prepared.

### C. 4-H HEALTH IMPROVEMENT:

1. The outstanding health problem as it applies to young people is to get them to become more health conscious.

We discussed the following health topics: Protective clothing, Safety in and around the home; Yearly physical check-up, Canear detection clinics, Santtation in homes, Planmed recreation and others. One third of the club members have

a yearly medical check, one eighth have dental checks a year.

The yearly better health and clean-up campaign has helped to solve several health problem. The slides we showed "Objective Flazzing for letter living", helped, also, training meetings for leaders and movies shown by our excellent Health Decartment.

### D. FOOD PRESERVATION:

- 1. Canning.
- 2. Number enrolled 178; number completing 153.

In Bladen there was almost a total failure this year in growing successfully tomatoes.

The Food Preservation demonstrations were given by the agent 21, and by leaders were 18 demonstrations.

Most of the food canned was peas, string beans, lima beans, beets, corn and of fruits-apples, pears and peaches.

### PORTERVILLE:

Ten club members brought in their March assignment very neatly writtens A Day's Menu. The two boys who passed in menus proved that they as well as the other eight, understand the lesson of the previous month-on "Know Your Foods For Better Nutrition. Their school sponsor, Nrs. Nelkeill is correlating the h-H work when its possible, with health work in the school.

### 4-H CIUB ACTIVITIES:

Letters and personal contact with club mem or and the different leaders were concerning December club meetings. Farties for heliters and their neighborhood leaders and food mass and better use of native shrubbry for holiday decorations for adults, were planned and discussed.

h-H and adult club members will take active part in their December club and community meetings.

All Junior 4-8 clubs planned their own parties including their menus. They are partly furnishing their refreshments.

Their neighborhood leaders will be served free, but in extending their invitation to leaders they are asking if they will assist in serving the refreshments and help with the games to be played.

Thus, the agents hope to tie in community leaders more closely with 4-H work. For them the 4-H skit by clubsters will be most informing.

#### SUB JECTS EMPHASIZED IN NOVEMBER:

- 1. Clothing protective clothes; for both adults and hell clubs.
- 2. 4-H Foundation Drive; worked with voluntary leaders.
- 3. Club members, parents cooperated with the County Health and the Eladen hospital Auxilary in making plans to give Curistans cheer to patients of the hospital and needy ill persons in the rural communities.

## L-H CLUES:

h-H Club Christmas parties were planned with h-H neighborhood leaders' assistance for their December Heetings. Each club will, also, present a skit and appropriate games will be lead by the club recreational leaders.

4-H Trip to Flanitarium at Chapel Hill, N. C. A bus load of 4-H club members and school sponsors will go to witness the planitarium program called "The Star of Bethelahem", December 3. Arrangements have been made for 40 club members to go.

### SU JECTS EMPHASIZED: FEBRUARY -- FOOD PRODUCTION:

- 1. Know foods for proper nutrition.
- 2. Growing varieties of vegetables-gardens(starting early seed beds).

### 4-H CLUBS:

Our older clubsters have been given demonstrations previously and, also, slides shown on making seed beds and on growing their own tomato plants; greater variety will be striven for in h-H gardens this year.

Contributions are still coming in, although in small amounts, from several h-H boyo and girls.

Flans are about complete for h-H team and individual Dairy Foods contest training.

Gream of Peamt Soup and Gream of "hite Potato Soup are being considered in this connection. Previously, demonstrations in making peamt butter were given to a few mothers and neighborhood leaders and recipes were also passed out of the same.

#### MARCH OF DIMES:

h-H club members are taking active part in the March of Dime Brive. A report on this activity is not available at this time.

#### REPORT ASKED FOR:

The lesson assignment in January was to have high boys and girls report how many seed Beds were sown and to report this in February's club meetings.

#### VII. LEADERS SCHOOLS:

Home Management and Family Economics and Care of Refrigerators.

Five group leader meetings were held during June in the following places: East Arcadia, Pleasant Weedow, Council, Spring Branch, Elizabethtown. Individuals trained: Mrs. Alma Melvin, Mrs. Louis Richardson, Mrs. Thelma Spaulding, Mrs. McDowell.

Total number trained in home management 18.

In recreati n and community life: Pleasant Meadow, Bladenboro and Shady Grove. Number attended were 8.

In food preservation and storage -1- attended 6.

Making a grand total of 26 leaders trained in meetings and individually.

### VIII. FOOD CONSERVATION:

Bladen 4-H carning contest or County limination.

Porterville club---- Otalia Hlanks, 2nd place winner. New Light club-----Helen Council won 1st place.

Foods ca ned were; 2 quarts each of tomatoes, and 2 quarts each of apples.

Helen Council's four quarts of food were entered at the State Level.

#### IX. HONORS WON:

Little Hiss Cromartie, Whites Creek 4-H club has a milk cow to win first place in the Southeastern District Dairy Cow Show. She won \$20.00.

Already. I have mentioned the other wimmers.

#### X. COMMUNITY PROJECTS:

The boys and girls take active part in the clean-up campaign causing church, achool and home grounds to look better and to be safer places for all who live in or who visit these places.

The North Cirolina Progress Program is in eresting to helders and many are aiding this effort.

Baskets of food for needy and Christmas cheer for shut-ins are always given by many club members.

#### XI. RECREATION AND RURAL ARTS:

Dr. A. E. Weatherford met a few of the people interested in recreation aid, gave material on conducting recreation as a result of this training, this

year more interest is being shown in represtional activities.

We hope to have singing for recreation by trained 4-H groups on next Achievement day. Recently each club received a booklet of Ballads.

A 4-H leader is now capable and did teach square dancing to a group who performed at the District picnic in june.

XII.

The home agent did not accompany her delegates to hell Week. But five girls attended the meeting in July at A. & T. College, several made good reports when the schools opened this fall. Ten club members attended hell Week.

NATIONAL 4-H MEER -- has already been mentioned, two store window exhibits, one on Eye Care the other displaying 4-H Extension printed matter.

4-H Sunday programs have, also, been discussed. The best h-H Sunday program was the one at which three different neighborhood leaders were present. It was held at Round Branch Church in Hladenboro Community. The new h-H leader was responsible for getting the program together. But the children carried it out. Brs. Lewis played the plane and how happy the club children seement to sing by plane suurie.

Home Safety

Suggestions for teaching home safety were received from half magazines and from materials sent to agents through the co/rtesy of other agencies.

A few points given to club members were as follows:

1. Clean-up home and home surroundings or you may burn up.

Replace or repair wek steps and weak places in floors of homes.
 Place medicine and matches where yound children cannot reach them.

4. Be cautious when handling or using farm machinery.

5. Hang up such tools as rakes and pitch forks.

### E. OTHER PROJECTS:

1. Gardening.

Number enrolled 197. Number completing 187. The first two months in the year agents taught the importance of growing what we need to eat or producing the same. As a result much interest was created. Pictures such as "objective Flanning for Better Living " helped to fix some garden facts taught earlier. Club members are growing more green and yellow foods than before.

# LOOKING TO THE FUTURE:

At present, we are working harder on parent cooperation with hell work. This is our greatest problem. Some improvement has been noted, but agents need to plan even better ways of getting parents to support hell projects and programs for youth.

I strongly believe that heH work is going to take a bigger place in the hearts of Eladen's citizens as time moves on. Both agents plan to attend the State Recreation and Forcet Conservation meeting in January at which time a group camp will be asked for Jones Lake, State Recreational Center. If we succeed, better training in citizenship, recreation and in many of the finer things that go to enrich rural boys and girls lives can be taught.
