# 4-H Club Introduction

4-N. Club work began in this County previous to my coming.

In beginning work here there were 15 4-N Glubs organized with an enrollment of 179 girls and 170 boys. This year the enrollment increased to 181 girls and 174 boys making a total of 355 4-N Glub members.

In the beginning of the year we found quits a few large boys and girls not wanting to become members, but before the year was gone they found we could get along very micely without them and we were having such fine times in Glub meetings and were participating in so many extra activities they came very humble and wanted to join the Glub.

The beginning of next year we hope to have a greater increase in members.

#### Organization

There are 13 4-H Clubs in the County with an enrollment of 174 boys and 181 girls making a total of 355 members.

The South Iredell and Morrows Chapel 4-H Clubs held local Achievements Days within themselves, other 4-H Club Members displayed what they had accomplished at the Harvest Festivals held by the schools. There was cooperation with the teachers and 4-H Clubs leaders in doing this. They had a table to themselves marked 4-H Club.

The 4-H Club @manty Council is made up of officers of each Club. It has a membership of 90 girls and boys. The programs consisted of business, recreation, and sometimes refreshments. Two or three Clubs usually have the recreation side of the program monthly. It usually meets 4 times a year the first Thursday of the month.

Regular 4-H Club meetings are held once a month either by the leaders or the Agents during the school year. During the summer months the leaders meet with their groups two or three times or whenever it's necessary to call them together.

The neighborhood leader system has increased slightly to what it did last year, yet it dosen't function as I will like to see it. Some are putting forth a good effort and do whatever you ask of them others are very slow about doing or do not at all. As a result of the neighborhood leader system we do have more summer meetings and the members are having better projects.

## General Activities of 4-H Club Girls

The girls yet are hard to get away from the usual types of projects they have carried previously. However, they have improved slightly over last year. It is our effort to encourage the girls to select more projects on the homeside, although we like for the girls to carry money making projects too. It is hoped that neach girls will have at least two projects next year. The projects carried out are listed below:

Not any of the girls enrolled in Food Preparation as a project but they did splendid work with the project. The project leader played an important factor in this. Everymemonth she would have a very good report telling of some wonderful dish some little girl had prepared and she would aik the little girl to tell how she prepared that dish. Many times the leader would ask one member to bring in a dish she had prepared so all could sample it, other times they would give demonstrations in the school, especially something with raw vegetables or fruit and sometimes something cooked.

The demonstration "Eggs and Their Place in the Diet" was given in February. We demonstrated Fried Eggs and Egg Salad, the Food Preparation leader assisted me. This demonstration was given along with Table Manners and through this they got two lessons in one. The pamplet on Eggs went a long ways with them, every recipe given in that bullentin was prepared.

#### Food Preservation

Of the total girls completing their projects there were 5270 quarts of cood canned.

Food preservation was very inspiring to the 4-H Club girls.

Many did their first canning this year, There were several canning demonstrations held for 4-H Clubers, During Food Preservation Week there were joint demonstrations of both Adults and 4-H Club girls. In Communities where there were only 4-H Clubs there were demonstrations especially for them. However, it an adult wished ti attend they were perfectly welcomed to do so, in many cases they did. In each Club there was one vegetable and one fruit to be canned, although, whenever a person was having a probelm with a particular vegetable or fruit they would bring that to the demonstration in order to get the correct precedure for canning it. The food preservation leaders were very proud to offer whatever assistance they could.

Each Club held a local exhibit od canned products in its
Harvest Festival held cooperatively with the school teachers and
Home Agent. The food was judged for the best jer of string beans
and peaches coming from the same person. The winners were brought i
into the County exhibit. These judged, the person winning first
place was Edna B. Bailey of Scotts Club, Her two cans were mailed
to Greensboro to participate in the District Contest. There she won
in the third place grouping.

#### Room Improvement

A few of the girls, after the demonstration of last year, decided they would like to carry the project of room improvement and improve their begrooms, arrange them into units and do whatever possible to make them more attractive and convient.

Dorothy Summers of Chestnut Grove Club, said that she s mhared her bedroom with her sister, but she would like to work out something on the same order of the one found in her lesson sheet and that I had demonstrated in the Club meeting. She invited me over to her home to see the situation so we sat down in the presence of her mother and sister and began to anke plans. The family didn't have very much money and we had to use what we had end buy as less as possible. The room needed wall papering, dressing table, washatand and study table. She had the lower part of an old dresser that was converted into a dressing table and used a nail keg as a stool. She used printed sacks material for the dressing table skirt and stool. For her washitand she used orange crates and covered them with plain colored sack material trimmed with material of the dresser skirt material. Fortunatley she found an old table in the wood house that she removed old paint from, sanded and repainted it for her study table. The walls estreetly were papered by the two girls pictures were hung on the walls correctly, and the furniture was arranged correctly into units, study, sleeping, and dressing units. The girls used cretonne draperies and bedspreads to match The total cost of everything was \$10.84. The two girls shared the

Not any of the girls enrolled in Home Beautification as a project but there has been aplended work done by 4-H Club girls.

Home Beautification began early in the season during our Clean, up Champaign. The girls began to clean their yards, plant flowers, shrtbs, and sew grass.

Mae helen Morrison, of the Troutman club knew early in the year that she would have all the house work and yard work to do during the summer months so she began early in the year preparing for it. She and her brother cleaned all around the house, front and back, out down all the weeds and burned the rubbish. As soon as the planting season came she began spading, planting bulbs, reseting flowers and sewing seeds. She is also fond of pot flowers and had a lovely pot on the porch, the flower stand was painted and all of the pote. On the edge of the porch there were lovely boxes of petanias in a variety of colors. The back yard and porch was just as beautiful as the front. Flowers were blooming from March through late fall when frost hit them.

Ohenna Stevenson of Scot s had her mother's yard in charge and did a splendid hob with it. This is a new place and soil needed building up before sewing grass so she had her brothers to plow the yard and sew peas to emprove the soil, she planted shrubs and flowers and flowers. Home Garden played an important part in the girls projects this year. They find in carrying gardens they have a money meaking project, can some of the products and prepare them for home use, making this a two fold project. For the most part the garden have been used for home use, the foods were canned or eaten fresh from the garden. There were a few that sold products from their gardens; bought 10 of the girls and income of \$555.00 by selling a portion of the things grown in their gardens.

Vivian Weaver of the Heywood Chapel carried an outstanding project for the year. She had a variety of vegetables growing in her garden, four of this variety of vegetables. She canned and sold vegetables. Her garden brought her an income of \$53.50 too, she canned 50 quarts from her garden. The cost of the garden was \$5.50 profiting her \$49.00.

Vivian is growing year round garden, now she has derrots, greens, collards to eat, onions, cabbage and lettuce set in her garden for early apring vegetables.

#### Community Projects

A very good Community Project was carried out at the Chestnut Grove School. There they cultivated soil, fertilized the soil and planted a variety of vegetables. With the information gained by recommended methods. They sent outuby the Dept., plowed and hoed by recommended methods. In this garden they planted Garden peas, Gumumbers, String beans, Okra, Egg plants, Beets, Corn, Asparagus, Squash, and Salaify. Later they planted Spinach. Turnips, Lettuce, Collards, Kale and Leek.

People from the Community often stopped by to see the garden and raved over what a beautiful garden it was.

The New Hope School had a similar project.

The leaders supervised these projects very closely. They carries the information gained from us to members of their community group and they have improved their gardens to a great extent.

The Scottd Club had as a community project beautifying the se school ground. They sold fruits, milk, hot soup, and hot dogs to raise funds for buying shrubs, grass seeds, flower seeds and bulbs. There were cement walks laid by Club leaders. The P T A was responsible for the Cement.

The soil was spaded by the Club members and the large boys hauled a load of compost and spreaded it over the grounds. The seeds were sewn, shrubs set out and the flowers bulb set.

Both quite and active games were played, which included sort ball, dodge ball, ring games, asked riddles, told jokes and played stants. The adults that were present joined in with the active 4-H Club members. The leaders lad many games.

The two Glubs really enjoyed meeting together and with to make it an annual affair. They plan to always meet at the New Center school beacuse thay have more space for playing. The leaders cooperated nicely and did whatever they could to make it enjoyable for all.

#### Special Activities

Each Club sponcered some type of activity for raising money ror the Club.

The Piney Grove Club sponcered a safety playlet, "Careless Johnny" at the school early in the spring and charge \$.10 and \$.15 at the door. The play sonsisted of six characters; 2 boys and 4 girls. A brief synopsis of the play, "Johnny's Carelessness worries his family and teachers dreadfully so together they arranged a unique scheme to cure him of his bad habits." After the playlet they sold refreshments and made a profit of \$15.00. Those present unjoyed the little playlet so well they had the children to give it over in P & T meetings.

Houstonville Club, which has much larger children and more children give the pageant, "Long may it Wave" in the month of February. This pageant required 10 boys and 12 girls. A brief synopsis: "Introduces Uncle Sam, Columbia, Fhag Bewrer, Peace, School Children of America, Indinia, Pilgrims, and Children of other lands. Introduces American Partoitic songs and the songs of other lands. The admission was \$.10 and \$.15. They also sold refreshments after the pageant. They made a profit of \$18.00.

Chestnut Grove Club sponsored an Ametuer show with music, vocal and instrumental, dances and stunts. The admission was \$.25. Tickets were sold all over the County.

There were other money making programs sponcered such as Church Sunday's entertainments and other similar to those mentioned.

#### Demonstration Teams

This year there were eight teams trained for demonstrations. For the most part it was something new to them but they didn't hesitate about taking part because they knew there was a trip in view.

The state subject was dairying and topics were taken from this subject. We used only one subject for the eight teams, "Feeding the Sick with Milk Dishes."

May 17, four of the teams met in my Office for the County elimination. Prior to the elimination the four teams gave their demonstration to two groups, one to the entire student body of their school and the other to the P & T meeting. Chestnut Grove Club won first place; Dorothy Scott and Bettye Jean Tabor. All of the teams were very good and the judges had a hard time making their devesions for the first place team.

June 25, the winning team entered the District Elimination held at A and T College, Greensboro, N. C. It won third place there, receiving a white pibboh.

All of the girls that perticipated in the Team Demonstration went to Greensboro on that day.
