

Introduction

At the beginning of the year there were twelve 4-H Clubs organized in the county with an enrollment of 250 girls ranging in ages from 10 - 18.

To date there are 13 clubs organized in twelve agricultural Communities in the county, comprising 311 h-H club girls. One club was consolidated and two new clubs organized. The schools located in these 12 communities where higher ideals and higher standards of living are realized through the training given in h-H club work, are staffed with efficient teachers ranging in numbers from one to fourteen per school.

Through the strenuous efforts and cooperation of the teacher sponsors and leaders such has been done to further these ideals as well as to raise the standards which are conducive to continuous improvements in the homes of these two hundred and fifty industrious 4-H club members.

Members have been led to feel that they have a useful part of the world's work to do and in doing it they have grown mentally, socially and spiritually; that they as and integral part of the community have a definite responsibility in improving their community and in making it finer in every way.

4-H Club Nembers and neighborhood leaders played a vital part in planning the 4-H program for the year. Members of each club, assisted by their Neighborhood Leaders made recommendations relative to their major problems and needs. These recommendations were considered by the agent and were presented to the county council for final considerations.

The Neighborhood Leader system is growing rapidly and marked improvements in number of adequately kept records have been noted along with the completing of better and more projects as a result of the cooperation received from Neighborhood Leaders.

Through 4-H project activities this year, 4-H Club Hembers were able to save many dollars for themselves and their parents by carrying out projects in clothing, food preservation, food preparation, home management, room improvement, gardening, and many others.

A Gounty-wide Achievement Day was also held which featured the awarding of certificates, achievement awards and charters to outstanding clubs, leaders and 4-8 club members. A canning contest was also held in conjunction with the Achievement Program.

## Iredell County 4-H County Council

The 4-H County Council is composed of officers and outstanding members of each 4-H club. The present slate of officers elected this year consists of a president, vice-president, secretary, assistant secretary, treasurer, song leader, and reporter.

The council has 77 active members who help in the formulation and execution of the annual plan of activities.

The council meets quarterly on the fourth Saturday.

### Iredell County 4-H Club Work

#### Monthly Program as Executed

All 4-8 Glubs hold a regular meeting once a month. The program for these monthly meetings consists of four parts, namely:

- 1. Opening
- 2. Business
- 3. Demonstration
- 4. Recreation

About eight or ten minutes are devoted to a joint opening which generally consists of the call to order by the president, some club songs, and the club pledge. About ten or fifteen minutes are usually required for the business part of the meeting which is also held jointly. Careful attention is given to the reading, correction and approval of the minutes. The roll is called and dues are collected simultaneously, business matters are next in order.

At this point the group is divided for project study or demonstration (as the agents see fit). This is a very important part of the meeting for the club members for this is where they are really able to learn something constructive that they can take home with them and apply it to their everyday living and also learn more about the entire h-H Club program. Usually about twenty to forty minutes are devoted to this feature.

At the end of the meeting about ten or fifteen minutes are taken for recreation. During this time inactive games are played and songs are called upon. If no ne responds, the agent proceeds with recreation as suggested by the members. In all cases the member who knows games and has a natural ability to lead is given an opport nity to develop this talent.

A new song or game is taught each month.

In all four parts of the meeting the important role of the M-H member in executing the program is evident and is placed foremost.

In some instances when meetings are held in the absence of the president, or vice-president there is always a willing member to take his or her place, whose real joy or catisfaction of a job well done can be noted when he is congratulated for his fine qualities of leadership.

# Iredell County Clothing Winter Storage of Clothing

In order to save summer clothing from deterioring during the winter months, the agent stressed the importance of having clothes cleaned before packing or storing away. Methods of treating and storing clothing for protection against moths etc. were demonstrated to 30% 4-R Club Members.

To help 4-H members in carrying out their projects in clothing - 12 demonstration were given on "The Belection of Bress Patterns" to 255 club members. The Bone Agent showed how measurements of the body should be taken and explained how each member could use her measurements in determining the correct size to buy. Patterns for different figure types were also shown.

Out of the 62 girls enrolling in this project there were 51 completions. Five hundred and ten garments, including dresses, slips, skirts, aprons blouses, pajamas and scarfs, were made at a cost of \$387.00 and valued at \$1,461.00. 4-H members were able to save their parents \$1074.00 as a result of this project. One hundred and sixty-four articles were exhibited, 72 garments were remodeled and mended.

Clothing

4-H Dress Revue

A Spring 4-H dress revue was held in the county with 13 members partics pating. Cotton school dresses were modeled and ribbons were awarded for the three best dresses.

Winners were: First place - Margaret Louise Morrison; second - Dorothy
Mae Balton; third - Annie Lee Olispy; and honorable mention - Vivian Gray
and Jessie Ann Sharpe.

Maraget Morrison, a junior 4-M club member, modeled her dress in the District dress revue and was placed in the blue ribbon group.

Margaret says that she experienced quite a bit of difficulty in putting in her zipper but now she understands why its so important that plackets and hems are put in correctly and why every little construction detail should be done right because if everything isn't just right the judges will certainly see it.

All of the girls advised others to take part in the dress revue next year because - as they put it - "Certain techniques in sewing can only be learned through actual experience in doing the job."

#### Foods and Mutrition

This year, emphasis was again placed on producing and eating the proper foods to maintain good health. Drowing out of a need for vitamins A and C to be included in diets of Iredell County afflies, demonstrations were given to 4-H clubs by the Home Agent and leaders on "Add Hore Color to Meals with Salads," in which a salad was made from canned yellow peaches. The basic 7 chart and a recent dietary survey were used in discussing the body's need for vitamins A and C foods. Excellent sources of these two important vitamins were shown. 4-H members enjoyed the salads to the highest and said they were glad to learn that peaches tasts so much better and are more nutritious in the form of a salad than they are "just sweetened."

Resulting from the food preparation project 37 girls planned, prepared and served 9,850 meals, 28 girls assisted in preparing and serving 119 meals, 96 packed lumines were prepared, 27 improved methods of cooking and 31 improved food habits.

#### Foods and Nutrition

#### Team Demonstration Contest

Twenty-six demonstration teams were trained this year-two in each club - using as a theme, "Get Hore Color in Heals with Salads." In this demonstration the girls showed how meals could be made more attractive and nutritious by using garden fresh tomatoes in meals in the form of salads. Three salads were made by the girls - the Tomato Rose, Tomato Pinwhell, and Tomato Cotton Bowl Salads.

Fifteen audiences were reached through these demonstrations which offerred a wonderful opportunity for the girls to receive training in the fundamentals of nutrition, techniques in food preparation and a greater use of home grown foods containing vitamins A and C.

This was also a means of conveying information to community groups on how to make the best possible use of tomatoes.

### Iredell County Food Preservation

In order to supplement their family's diets with necessary foods during non-production months, 67 h-H Glub members canned for home use - 1,709 quarts of meats, 3,168 quarts of vegetables, 2,021 quarts of fruits including jelly, preserves and pickles. In addition to this - 37 quarts of fruits and vegetables, and 293 pounds of meats were frozen in home freezers and cooperative freezer lockers.

# Iredell County Food Preservation Canning Contest

Fifty-eight h-H Club cirls participated in the h-H canning contest which was made possible by the Savannah Sugar Refinery. The objectives of this contest were as follows:

- To emphasize the importance of conserving every bit of food produced.
- To acquire the knowledge and develop skills essential to successful preservation of fruits and vegetables.
- To have club members take an active part in canning for the family.
- 4. To utilize products raised on farms.
- To promote a more varied, well-belanced diet and reduce cash expenditures for food by the use of a family food preservation plan.

County winners were: First - Ervinia Leach, second - Margaret Ann Norman, and Third - Loleen Dalton. The jars of tomatoes and berries, exhibited by the first place county winner, were entered in the District Contest.

4-H canning exhibits and contests have served as an incentive for greater participation by 4-H members in food preservation projects.

### Iredell County Room Improvement

Forty-seven h-H club girls successfully completed their Room Improvement projects for the year which included refinishing furniture, improvement of walls and floors, taking curtains, selection of new furniture, making chair cushions, and build ing or improving clothes closets.

Resulting from this project, seven pieces of furniture were made 51 pieces repaired, 11 pieces refinished, 19 improved closets, 17 improved floors and walls, 41 girls hung pictures correctly, 7 worked out color schemes for their homes and 235 articles such as wastebaskets, curtains, doilies, rugs, bedspreads, and dressing table; skirts were made.

Parents of the 4-H club girls enrolled in this project, as well as the girls themselves, were pleased with the results which served to create a great r interest, on the part of all family members, in the home.

Room Improvement
Arranging the Study Unit

Eleven demonstrations were given on "Arranging the Study Unit" by the Home Agent. As a result of this demonstration 400 girls and boys learned how they could arrange study units in their homes by using a table and straight chair of correct beint, study lamp, bookease or shelves, and waste paper basket. Forty seven members gave a report of having improved her bedroom by arranging it into units, thus making it more convenient, attractive, and livable.

#### Family Relationships

Demonstrations were given to 11h h-H Clubs on "Measuring Happiness in Our Homes" with an attendance of 289.

Personality rating sheets were distributed to 250 girls who checked themselve s over a period of three weeks and returned the rating sheets to the agent at the end of that period.

Through these demonstrations and check sheets, 250 girls were able to note their faults and improvements in the following qualities were made: loyalty, courtesy, truthfulness, tactfulness, and friendliness.

Hamel Roseboro, Route 4, Statesville, N. C. saie that she soon discovered her weak points and now that she has improved on those qualities she has more friends and she's really happy.

Ten girls completed wildlife projects during the year. R uby Nell Starks of the Troutman 4-H Glub - having the most complete and well kept record on Tree Study was eligible to attend Wildlife Conservation wamp which was held at camp Whispering Pines, Cary, N. C. Ruby Well was also chosen as C ampion in the tree study project. She identified and mounted the leaves and bank from thirty different trees grown on her Father's farm. She also gave the description and uses of each kind of wood along with the common and scientific name of each tree. Because of Ruby's trip to camp many h-H girls in her club throughout the county have been benefitted. Suby gave a report of the various camp activities at the county-wide Achievement Bay Program.

### Iredell County Home Beautification

Home Beautification is another project carried by 4-H members from which the whole family as well as the community is benefited. Mine girls completed the Home Ecautification project-making improvements in the general appearance of their homes by planting shrubbery, seeding permanent lawns, constructing walks and driveways, and a general clean-up of surroundings.

4-H members again sought an answer to their food problems this year by growing a variety of vegetables in their home gardens for family use. Surplus of vegetables were conserved and offered for sale. One hundred and seventeen girls raised gardens comprising a total of 5 acres which yielded approximately 500 bushels, 5,000 quarts, and 2,700 heads of eight different kinds of vegetables.

Products sold were values at \$32.00, value of products used at home or given away \$ 2,950.00. Total of garden products - \$3,270.00

Broiler production and the production of quality eggs for sale were emphasized this year. Eleven 4-H club girls completed this project and gave reports of having raised 1,573 birds, 976 dozens of eggs were produced of which 583 dozens, valued at \$49.80, were sold.

Eleven girls carried out recommended practices for gathering, storing, and grading eggs for home use and for sale.

#### Recreation

A Leaders' Training School was held for Neighborhood and Project Leaders on recreation.

Active and inactive games and songs were taught 4-H

Leaders who conducted recreation meetings during the year.

The Annual 4-H Recreation Meetings or Picnics held during August, Christeas programs and parties and club recreation were conducted by leaders.

One hundred and seventeen club sembers participated in h-H Church Sunday Programs in thirteen communities. They took part in such church activities as Sunday School, served as ushers for regular church services, rendered susic, and collected offerings.

Resulting from this program, Junior Choirs have been organized in several churches and young people in general have been placed in more prominent places in various activities in the churches.

#### National 4-H Achievement Week

During the celebration of National 4-H Achievement week outstanding activities of the organization were highlighted through the press and on the air.

Local and County-wide Achievement Day Programs were held which featured exhibits, the awarding of prizes, certificates, and charters to outstanding members, leaders, and clubs, and the newly-elected 4-H County Council Officers were installed in a special ceremony - all of which served to acquaint the public with 4-H club work and what it offers rural youth.

4-H Contribution to the World Community Christian Eural Overseas Program

Through the Christian Rural Overseas Program, 4-H Club members were able to participate in a World Citizenship effort by helping foreign indegent families. They contributed small grain and approximately 50 cases of milk.

### Iredell County Exhibits

Individual exhibits of canned food were displayed at each of the 11 local Achievement Day Meetings and the county-wide Achievement Meeting by 157 4-H Glub girls.

County winners in these exhibits were: First - Envinia Leach; Second - Ann Norman; and third - Loleen Dalton.

These exhibits were very beautifully displayed and served to stimulate interest and to inspire others to participate in exhibits and other 4-H activities.

### Iredell County Looking to the Future

Much attention is being devoted to long range program planning a County-wide basis. Local problems are being cited in every farm community and plans are made for the year shead.

Through program planning basic facts are collected and studied and the best possible solutions to existing problems are outlined and evaluated.

One of the major problems cited is a need for stronger 4-H Club work which can be realized through the concerted e orts of all eligible girls and boys, parents, teachers, leaders, and Extension Workers to make 4-H Club work what we hope for it to be in 1950 and the ensuing years.

There is a possibility of organizing two new clubs this year and with this possibility of increased enrollment, the future in 4-H Glub work looks promising.

Two Young Wen and Women's Clubs will be organized early in 1950.
