Dr. Bernice Milburn Moore

Dr. Moore served for 20 years in a joint capacity with the Hogg Foundation for Mental Health and the Division of Home and Family Life education of the Texas Education

Agency. She is now a full time staff member of the Hogg Foundation.

She serves as a consultant to groups and organizations throughout the nation and the state whose programs and projects are related to the family, personality and mental health.

Dr. Moore has lectured to thousands of persons in youth and adult groups and has conducted planning and training institutes in numerous communities. She was a forum speaker for the 1960 White House Conference on Children and Youth.

She received her Bachelor of Journalism and Master of Arts degrees from the University of Texas, Austin, and her Doctor of Philosophy degree from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Dr. Moore, author of several books, has been a newspaper reporter, magazine editor, a farmer and advisor for an industrial youth group.



Dr. Myrtle R. Reul

Dr. Reul has been a professor in the School of Social Work, in the University of Georgia, since January 16. Previously she was associate professor in the School of Social Work at

Michigan State University, East Lansing, Michigan.

In addition she served as Acting Executive, Michigan Children's Aid Society, Jackson, Michigan, in 1957, and was Director of Special Research, Michigan United Fund for two years.

he has been a public school teacher, school social worker and principal and caseworker.

Dr. Reul is presently involved in a study on the Educational Needs of Migrant Children with the Rural Manpower Center at Michigan State University. In 1963-64, while on a sabbatical leave, she and her husband traveled for a year living and working as migrant farm workers which was described in the book, "Where Hannibol Led Us,"

She received her Bachelor of Arts degree from Albion College, Albion, Michigan, and her Master of Arts, Master of Social Work and Doctor of Education degrees from Michigan State University.



Dr. Patsy Graves


Dr. Graves has spent 29 years working with women and girls, mainly in rural areas in North America, South America, Asia and Africa. She is now home economics advisor for

International Development (AID) in Washington.

Born in Tuscumbia, Ala, and educated at Spelman College, West Virginia State College and the Columbia University School of Social Work, Dr. Graves began her professional career as an assistant in adult education with the Tennessee Valley Authority. She has served as a home demonstration agent in Alabama; state-wide agent in West Virginia; neighborhood secretary with the Urban League of Greater New York; national home economist in the Farmers Home Administration; regional home economics advisor for the five northeastern states of India, and as chief home economist of the U. S. AID Mission to Brazil.

Dr. Graves' last foreign assignment was as home economics advisor to the Western State of Nigeria where she organized one of the first home economics extension services for women in West Africa. Dr. Graves received an honorary Doctor of Humanities degree from West Virginia State College in 1966 and a meritorious award from AID in 1964.




