A former Extension agent donated a drink machine which was placed in the Courthouse with profit on sales going to 4-H. All 4-H clubs conducted tulip bulb sales county-wide and three 4-H bake sales in helping to raise their quota.

OPENING FOR STAFF ASSISTANTS IN CITIZENSHIP EDUCATION

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Opportunities are again available for work as Staff Assistants with Citizenship Short Course in Washington, D. C. Each state may submit two applications for consideration. We will consider one application per county. From there, final selection will be made by the National 4-H Foundation.

The following criteria should be applied in the selection of these two nominees:

- 1. One who believes in the dignity and value of youth and respects them as individuals.
- One who recognizes the present developing leadership capability of youth and their future potential.
- 3. One who works well with teenagers.
- 4. One who can lead discussions.
- One who could work effectively with adults having various beliefs and representing different parts of the country.
- 6. One who could profit from a national learning laboratory experience.
- One who would return home and utilize this experience in training others.

The qualifications for applicants include:

- 1. Completion of junior year in college.
- Considering an Extension career not mandatory.
- Experienced and skilled in working with people.
- 4. Talented in music, recreation, discussion group work and public speaking.
- 5. Familiar with 4-H and Extension work.
- 6. Physically and emotionally stable.
- Knowledgeable in American history, government and current issues.

Deadline for applications in this office is February 10.

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ANOTHER LEADER TRAINING TOOL

How many of your leaders receive the <u>National 4-H News</u>? Although the <u>News</u> will not replace group and individual leader training, it is an excellent way of providing leaders with new ideas and up-to-date information on youth. There are special features each month plus a section on ideas, booklet helps, idea trade shop, etc.

A recent tabulation by the <u>News</u> indicates that only 1,730 North Carolina leaders receive the magazine. This is only 14 percent of our leaders.

Subscription rates are reasonable. Single subscriptions \$3.00 per year; group of 50 or more \$1.50 or group of 20 through 49 \$2.00 per year.

If your leaders are not receiving the <u>National 4-H News</u>, may I encourage you to discuss with members of the county staff the possibility of providing your leaders with a subscription to the <u>News</u> in 1972. Consider finding a subscription donor; asking the 4-H clubs to buy subscriptions for their leaders; or asking leaders to subscribe for themselves. No matter how--let's see that more than 14 percent of our leaders receive this valuable training tool.

HEALTH EXAMINATIONS REQUIRED FOR SUMMER CAMP PARTICIPATION

It is important to note that the N. C. State Board of Health, effective January 1, 1972, requires that each child be given a physical examination by a licensed physician within six months before admission to the summer camp program.

The term is defined "to include those camp establishments which provide food or lodging accommodations for children or adults in organized recreational or educational programs. This definition includes Day Camps, church camps, assemblies and retreats.

It is recommended that any of you who plan to conduct any type of camp during this year, secure from your County Health Department a copy of "Rules and Regulations Governing the Sanitation of Summer Camps." Or it may be ordered from Sanitation Section, Sanitary Engineering Division, N. C. Board of Health, P. O. Box 2091, Raleigh, N. C. 27602.

GAME CHOICE

The first game is a word guessing contest. "I'm thinking of a word (or phrase) connected with George Washington," the leader announces. The guests may each ask one question and, from the replies, guess the word. Two points go to the table whose player guesses it first. Use about 10 words such as "Delaware,""Declaration," "President," etc.

The second game is a jigsaw puzzle considering Washington or his times. Get some cheap colored pictures of Washington and cut each into 50 pieces, one set for each table. The four players at each table work to put their puzzle together.

The third game is to have the players make an original poem about George and Martha Washington. Consisting of four lines, one line written by each player at a table. the first table finishes wins a score of 25 points. Poems are read aloud, and the group signifies by its applause which one it considers best, which second best, etc. The score (25, 15, 10, 5) goes to each one at the table, so it is to the interest of everybody to do good work.
