AN AXIOM OF THE YOUTH WORLD

Ideally, every youth program should be followed by a discussion. Even a musical offering, say a guitar recital, would be livened up if, after it ended, the floor was thrown open for talk about it. Every discourse by an adult might well be ended in the same way. The idea of "feedback" or "audience input" is bound to become more important during the next few years.

A youth organization with enough faith in itself to follow this procedure must necessarily be more vital, more attractive to more young people, than one which does not. The old way, of presenting a "finished" program, and ending it there, simply does not meet the conditions and needs of today. Youth programs should be shaped, not to keep doubters and objectors away, but to bring them in so that they can express their doubts, affirm them, or, in the fires of discussion, burn them out.

ANOTHER EXCHANGE

The 4-H of Ingham County, Michigan is interested in developing an exchange program for the summers of 1972 and 1973. They were involved in an exchange with a Colorado County the last two years and after traveling last year, would prefer to be host county this year. They would consider visiting in the summer of 1972 and hosting in 1973.

They would like to involve a busload of 30-40 young people and chaperones. Their age limit is 15 and older. Late June or early July would be the best time for them to host or visit.

Ingham County includes Lansing, Michigan's capitol, Michigan State University, industrial, suburban and rural communities. It is located about 90 miles northwest of Detroit in the south central part of the lower peninsula. There are many points of interest not far from Ingham County - Battle Creek's Kellogg Factory, Flint's General Motors Plant, Greenfield Village just outside of Detroit, as well as the Oldsmobile assembly line and M.S.U.

SHARE THE FUN IN 4-H

Accompanying this issue of the Newsletter is the new "1972 Share the Fun Program Leaflet" with suggestions and guidelines for you. Your 4-H leaders will need this information very soon now.

You will note one new change in this year's talent elimination guidelines. It now reads "one to three acts may be selected whose combined total time for presentation will not exceed 10 minutes in the district program." This is a change from last year, and we hope that each county will carefully time their blue ribbon group of acts and conform to the 10 minute time limit for the district participation.

Also enclosed in the 4-H Coordinator's Newsletter is a copy of the "1972 Rating Guide for Share the Fun." You will note that this rating guide or score sheet might be used by your county talent judges in determining your blue ribbon group (one to three acts) who will participate in the district run-off. The score has been changed this year and will be used also at the district elimination. Three items are considered by the judges - 1) Entertainment - 40 points, 2) Talent in field - 40 points, 3) Showmanship - 20 points. Several former judges of Share the Fun have recommended that talent should be given more value points in note that the talent has equal number of points to that of entertainment.

ANOTHER EXCHANGE

Jones County, lowa would like to start a two-year Exchange with a county in North Carolina.

Objectives of Exchange: Citizenship - gain understanding and friendships of a new family in another region of the United States. Personal Development - courtesy and manners, self understanding, acceptance of others are all utilized in an exchange experience.

Numbers: 30-40 4-H'ers and adult chaperones. Usually four chaperones. Exchangees would be approximately 16 years or older.

Time: Between June 20 and July 20. Jones County would prefer traveling in 1972 and hosting in 1973.

Location: Jones County, lowa, is 200 miles west of Chicago. Sixty miles west of the Mississippi and 30 miles north of I-80. It is 25 miles from Cedar Rapids, a city of 100,000 population.

Past 4-H Background: Jones County has had exchange programs since 1955. The most recent exchanges have been with Hartford County, Conn. (1970-71); Jay County, Ind. (1968-69); Judith Basin, Mont. (1966-67).

There are approximately 725 4-H members in the Jones County 4-H program belonging to 47 community clubs.

Jones County has a population of 19,000 people. Agriculture is a major industry in the county as well as several small manufacturing companies.

GAME OF THE MONTH

Ring-The-Bottle

A. Playing Area

B. Object

To place the suspended ring on the neck of the bottle and tip the bottle over.

C. Skills

Steadiness in placing ring over top of bottle.

D. Procedure

Place a catsup or milk bottle on the floor. Make a fish pole with a fruit jar ring attached to it by means of a cord. Hold end of pole at arm's length and stand as far as possible from the bottle so that the rubber ring is suspended over the bottle.

Players attempt to place the ring on the neck of the bottle and then tip the bottle over.

E. Scoring

Players attempt to see who can tip the bottle over in the least time. Shortest time is the winner.

F. Suggestions

- A celluloid ring will make the attempts more difficult than a rubber ring.
- A bottle with a narrow neck will be more desirable than one which has its outside diameter similar to that of the ring's inside diameter.
- A small stick or pole about six feet in length is satisfactory for the fish pole.

SHAPE THE FIM IN 4-H

ELIGIBILITY:

- Participants should be nine years of age as of January 1, 1972, and not over nineteen years of age on this date. They must be currently enrolled or participating in the 4-H program.
- 4-H members who have appeared in previous county, district, and state
 4-H talent screening programs may participate.

TYPES OF TALENT THAT WOULD BE SUITABLE:

- 1. Individual participation
 - a. Vocal solo
 - b. Instrumental solo guitar, piano, etc.
 - c. Dancing tap, ballet, etc.
 - d. Novelty puppetry, animal act, arcobatic, ventriloquist, baton twirling, impersonations. etc.
 - e. Humorous reading or recitation.

2. Group Participation

- a. Vocal duet, trio, quartet, chorus
- b. Instrumental band, etc.
- c. Dancing folk, square, etc.
- d. Novelty puppetry, animal act, acrobatic, etc.
- e. Skit

PROCEDURE:

COUNTY: It is suggested that a county talent program be held at which time blue ribbon winners are selected. From this blue ribbon group, participants should be selected for the District 4-H Share The Fun Program. One to three acts may be selected whose combined total time for presentation will not exceed 10 minutes in the District Program.

DISTRICT: From county participants in the district program a blue ribbon group will be selected.

In the district program, each talent number, whether individual or group, will be evaluated against all other talent numbers in the district when making the determination of those to receive blue ribbons.

STATE: From the blue ribbon groups in the six districts, certain individual and group talent numbers will be selected and notified to appear on special programs and the talent parade at N. C. 4-H Congress Week.
