COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIPS AVAILABLE! SUBMIT APPLICATIONS BY SEPTEMBER 15

Agribusiness Careers 4-H Awards Program -DeKalb AgResearch, Inc. (New this year) One entry per state - a boy. Must be in junior year in college in fall of 1972 and planning to major in some phase of agribusiness. Also must fill out Agribusiness Information

4-H Animal Science Scholarships - Allied Mills Foundation

One entry per state - a boy. Must be in junior year in college in fall of 1972 and planning to major in Animal Science.

Crop Protection and Crop Production - Chevron Chemical Company, Ortho Division

One entry per state. Boy or girl enrolled as a freshman or sophomore in college in fall of 1972 and majoring in the Plant or Biological Sciences including Agronomy, Soils, Entomology, Floriculture, Plant Pathology, Horticulture (vegetables and fruits) or Ornamental Horticulture.

4-H Forestry Scholarships - Homelite, a Division of Textron, Inc.

One entry per state - a boy or girl. Must be freshman in college in fall of 1972, majoring or minoring in forestry.

Home Economics Scholarships - The S&H Foundation, Inc., The West Bend Company One entry per state - a girl. Must be in jun-

ior year in college in fall of 1972 and planning to major in Home Economics.

Scholarship for Youth From Low-Income, Disadvantaged Families - The Wehr Corporation (New this year)

One entry per state - a boy or girl. Must be in junior year in college in fall of 1972 and must come from a low-income, economically disadvantaged family.

Alpha Gamma Rho - A National Agriculture Fraternity

One entry per state - a currently enrolled 4-H boy.

OVERNIGHT CAMPING AT KELLOGG 4-H CAMPSITE IN HENDERSON COUNTY

Our 50 acre campsite in Henderson County is available for overnight camp groups this summer. We will have a single faucet with running water available in a camping area, outdoor toilets and a temporary 20 x 20 shelter.

Most important we have a beautiful area with natural resources, many scenic trips available closeby. A self-interpretive nature study and ecology guide is being prepared on two different trails on the campsite. This will be published and distributed to you soon. Areas will be marked on the trails to correspond to the interpretive guide providing an excellent buginning study in ecology and nature.

We would like for you to invite 4-H groups and any other groups who desire to use this site to do so. Reservations should be made with our resident manager, Dr. Paul Shoemaker, Mountain Horticultural Crops Research Station, RFD #2, Fletcher, N. C. 28732. His telephone number at home is 704-693-9458.

A nominal fee is to be paid to the manager for the use of the grounds. (\$2.00 for groups of 10 or less and \$5.00 for groups of more than 10.) We would not recommend that more than 40 camp at one time. Each group coming to the camp would have to bring their own sleeping equipment, including shelters if desired.

Groups using the area will be required to leave the grounds as they found them and not disturb any of the natural vegetation. It would be necessary to bring your own fuel for cooking and carry your own garbage and trash with you.

Side trips and activities available in the immediate area include a visit to Davidson Fish Hatchery, The Cradle of Forestry, Looking Glass Falls, Pisgah National Forest, Chimney Rock, Lake Lure, Blue Ridge Parkway, etc.

The site is located on South Rigby Road about five miles west of Hendersonville. For a map to the area and further information including the self-interpretive ecology and nature guide write to Fred H. Wagoner, 4-H Specialist, 203 Ricks Hall, N. C. State University, Raleigh, North Carolina 27607.
