MAILROOM INITIATES NEW SERVICE

Doug Phillips, in charge of the Ricks Hall Mailroom, has announced a new service exclusively for 4-H Agents visiting Ricks Hall.

The service called "Selection Tour" will allow 4-H agents to enter the Mailroom and select 4-H literature from storage and take it with them. Mailroom personnel will provide agents with a "tour" of the appropriate storage areas and assist them in completing 4-H Order Forms for Mailroom and County inventory records as they "shop."

Phillips said the idea of "Selection Tours" was suggested to him by Nancy Goodgame during State 4-H Congress. The tours will be held on a trial basis until January, 1975. Agents wishing to use this service should go to the Mailroom between 8:00 and 3:30 any day and ask for Phillips. Agents will be reminded to limit their "carry-outs" to anticipated county use plus 10 percent. Agents who do not want to "carry-out" can have their selected materials boxed and mailed to them.

The National 4-H Foundation is, again this year, planning a Holiday Humanities Workshop for young adults. The program is designed for older 4-H'ers and former 4-H'ers who are interested in music, art, dance or drama.

In addition to these workshop sessions, the program will also feature special tours and performances in the Washington, D. C. area. The tentative dates are December 27-January 4.

Last year we received information on this workshop too late to generate any interest in North Carolina; however, I hope you will begin now to "talk it up" so that when we receive additional information you will have some indication of the possible interest of those in your county.

The cost of room and board at the National 4-H Center last year ranged from \$140 to \$172. Transportation was the responsibility of the participant. Arrangements will probably be similar this year with possibly an inflationary rise in cost. We will send you additional information as soon as it is available.

As costs for printing 4-H literature increase in every state, more and more states are deciding to charge for their publications.

Many states will provide one free file copy to out-of-state Extension Service employees. However, requests for one copy of each of several different publications or several copies of a single publication usually require payment. So be prepared to purchase materials that you request from other states.

If you have a demand for a project we do not have in North Carolina, contact me. I will locate project materials for your approval, and Jimmy Tart will secure quantities to meet your needs.
